PENSMAN TAKES YOU BEHIND THE SPOTLIGHT

THE BIGGEST SINGLE CAUSE

At a recent presentation of the Minister for Local Government, Mr. Robert Molloy, referred to the grim story of death and destruction which is still being written on Irish roads. The Minister pointed out that in the month of October, according to statistics published by the Garda Commissioner, 54 people were killed. This fact does not seem to have any great impact on the general public but if the monthly average was maintained at this level the total number of deaths on the road would reach about 650 for a full year. Perhaps this figure may mean something more to you!

Lack of care will always be a factor in road accidents and it is only through the limited power of advice and propaganda that this can be countered and then only to a very minor degree but a factor which has helped towards a reduction in the number of accidents is the new much more intensive enforcement of the breathalyser.

According to Garda statistics available up to mid-November some 1,200 blood or urine samples have reached the Medical Bureau from Garda Stations throughout the country. Experience shows that when a final tally is made in these it will transpire that only a handful of them will be found to be below the permitted blood alcohol level — in other words almost all the drivers concerned will be judged as 'drunken drivers.'

All the available international research pinpoints the drunk driver as probably the biggest single cause of road accidents and, indeed, indicates that he is responsible for up to 50% of fatal accidents. It is not without significance that our statistics show that the hour beginning at 11 p.m. is by far the worst hour for road accidents generally, particularly for fatal accidents.

We are now into what is traditionally a dangerous period on the roads just as it is traditionally a joyous period otherwise. In the Christmas period the amount of alcohol consumed in Ireland gives rise to serious problems, particularly when it is consumed by those with the responsibility of driving a car or other vehicle. I think in circumstances then that a good resolution which all drivers who drink should make is so as to be well trained by Christmas is that if they think they will not drive or the other way round if it suits them better!

A BIG DAY IN OLD PARISH

Sunday last, December 5, was a big day for the people of Sean Phobal for it marked the blessing and solemn dedication of their new church by Most Rev. Dr. Russell, Bishop of the Diocese. The ceremony was beautiful, simple but most impressive and the good work of the organising committee under their Parish Priest, Very Rev. P. Flavin, was evident in the fact that everything went off from start to finish without a hitch.

The new church, a beautiful edifice, is built with a steel structural frame, its walls being of cavity construction and it cost about £26,000 to erect. It was planned by Patrick J. Sheehan & Partners, Architects, Limerick, and the main Contractors were Matthew Malloff, Ballinamona, Camille, Co. Wexford.

The speed with which the new building went up can be gathered from the fact that the old church which had stood on the site since 1839 was explosively demolished on Decian's Day (July 24) 1970. Exactly twelve months after the new church was completed! It was originally

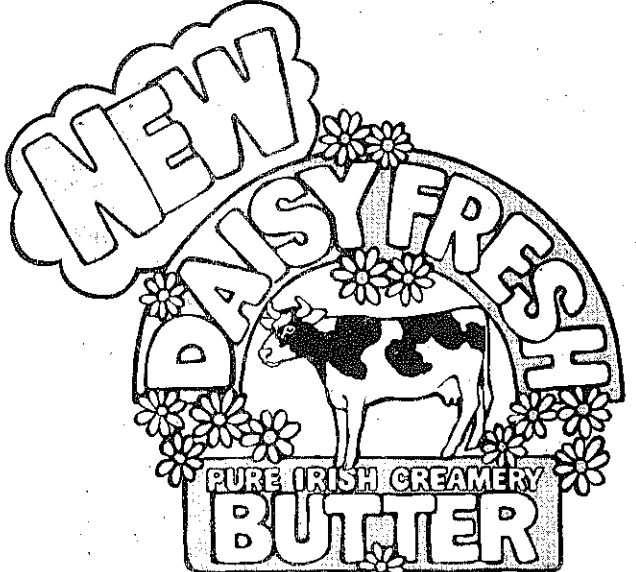

Bishop Blesses And Dedicates New Church At Old Parish

The solemn blessing and dedication of the new Church of the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary at Old Parish, Dungarvan, was performed on Sunday last by His Lordship Most Rev. Dr. Michael Russell, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore at 12 o'clock (noon).

Built at a cost of £30,000, it accommodates 300 and replaces the old church built in 1839 and which was demolished last year because of its deteriorating condition.

The blessing was followed by concelebrated Mass at which Dr. Russell was the chief concelebrant. The other concelebrants were Very Rev. P. J. Flavin, P.P., Old Parish; Very Rev. W. Meehan, P.P. Ardmore; Very Rev. W. Power, P.P. Rathgormack; Very Rev. T. C. Butler, O.S.A., Old Parish; Very Rev. J. J. O'Sullivan, P.P. Clashmore; Rev. M. Wall, C.C., Tinnove; and Rev. P. Quailly, C.C. Lismore.

GOVERNMENT'S NORTHERN POLICY ATTACKED

Standing Idly By For Far Too Long

A scathing attack on the Government's Northern policies was made by the Fianna Fail Chairman of the County Waterford Committee of Agriculture, Mr. K. O'Ryan, at Monday's meeting in Dungarvan. He warned that their next national anthem could well be "the Sash" and also denounced the recent expressions of sympathy by the wife of An Taoiseach to relatives of shot British troops in the Six Counties.

The discussion arose when a resolution was read from the County Leirinn Committee of Agriculture. It called for the recall of Irish troops from Cyprus and end to involvement in the North and a call to all public representatives in the 26 counties to support all efforts to end the "Hitlerite" methods being used by the British army.

Mr. O'Ryan supporting the resolution, said it was about time every public representative came out into the open in condemnation of British tactics in the North. The week-end holocaust in which fifteen people died was clearly not the work of the I.R.A.

Mr. O'Ryan went on: "Our troops should be withdrawn immediately from Cyprus and from any place else they are stationed overseas and placed on the border. We are contributing to peace all over the world yet can do nothing to bring peace to our own small island."

Mr. O'Ryan added that they had "stood idly by" for far too long. He was disgusted recently to hear the wife of the Taoiseach offering sympathy to the relatives of British troops shot in the North—troops, he said, who were murderers and torturers. He wondered

of the week-end tragedy the I.R.A. was not responsible for all the bombings and burnings. It was finally agreed unanimously to support the Co. Leirinn resolution and forward it to the Government.

Regretted Death Of Very Rev. Canon Leahy

WAS NATIVE OF KNOCKANORE

The death occurred on Monday last, December 6, following a brief illness, at the Mercy Hospital, Cork, of Very Rev. Canon Michael Joseph Leahy, P.P., L.S.S., Ballybricken, Waterford. Aged 63, he was a native of Knockanore, and educated at St. John's College, Waterford, and the Irish College in Rome. He was ordained in 1934 and obtained his L.S.S. Degree in 1937.

In 1938, he was appointed Professor at St. Patrick's College, Kildangan, and in 1940 was appointed Chaplain at the De La Salle College, Waterford, as well as Bishop's Secretary.

Two years later, he was appointed Professor of the Old Testament (Second Scripture) at St. Patrick's College, Maynooth, and in 1962, he was appointed Parish Priest in Killea, Dunmore East. Six years later, he was appointed Parish Priest at Ballybricken, and later in the same year, 1968, he was appointed Canon.

Canon Leahy was brother of Mr. Frank Leahy, Templemichael, Yougal, Mrs. Michael Condon, Glengour, Tallow, Mrs. Declan Hennessy, Conna, Mrs. Nan Flynn, Glendine, Yougal, and Mrs. Michael Cotter, Tallow.

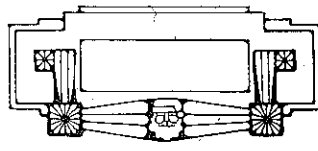

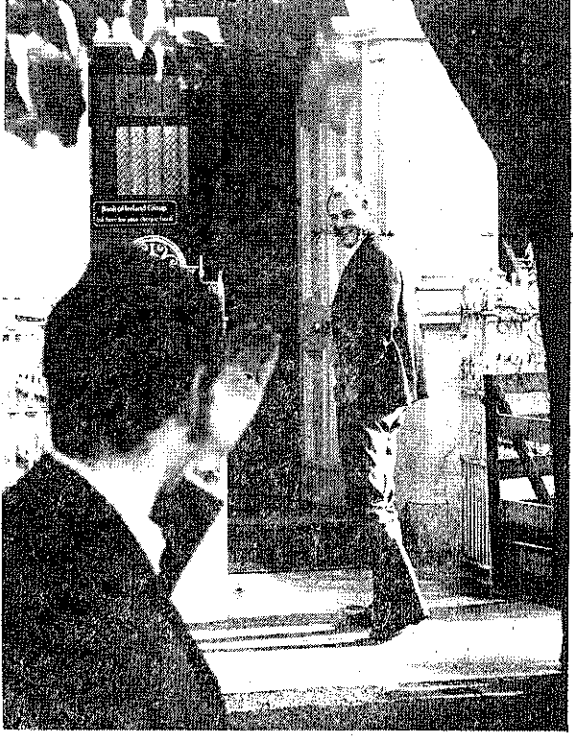

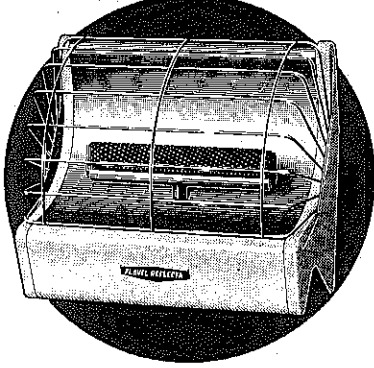
