PAYING FOR OTHERS

The Minister for Health has certainly put a proper "tag" on the ratepayers of Co. Waterford with his latest decision concerning the apportionment of the cost of running the Regional Health Services by the contributing bodies in the region. The wordings which I voiced in the column last week have, in consequence, been now said to have been only too true.

The Minister's decision was announced at last Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan and came as a great shock to all members of the Council. I understand the Council reacted by protesting against the Minister's action and seeking to have a deputation received to discuss the matter further.

Another point of course is that much of the expenditure included in the estimates of the Regional Board are for hospitals and institutions in other counties and Waterford will now have to contribute to this while getting very little in return. As one member of the Council succinctly put it "we will be paying, more for a poorer service."

good a condition. And now we have the health services. It can be said that the Health Services provided by the old Waterford Health Authority and the high standard of the hospitals and institutions which it maintained were better than those to be found in most counties. Now because of that and because we have gone into a region where things have not been to the same standard in most other counties in past years, Waterford is again to be victimised and not only that but discriminated against as well.

We have taken a lot lying down in the past and somewhere along the line someone called us "The Gentle County." But this is a time to fight back because if we allow this impost which the Minister is trying to put upon our ratepayers to remain unchallenged it will be one of the greatest injustices ever to be placed on the people of the county.

HEADS TRANSLATING TEAM

The manner in which the Irish representatives were progressing with the technical problems of translating into the Irish language the terminology of E.E.C. documents at Brussels made the headlines in a number of daily papers last week.

The story was that the Irish translators were away ahead of their British counterparts and were finding no difficulty in finding words and phrases to correctly translate these documents into Irish. Not so the British who were finding an abundance of snags and who as a result were much behind schedule.

It is worthy of note then that the head of the Irish translating team in Brussels understood the situation of Mr. Seamus Dalton, a native of Villiers-town, Mr. Dalton has a long association with the government department dealing with translations into the native tongue and he played a big part in the translation of the 1937 Constitution before it was enacted.

Waterford Ratepayers Will Be Mulcted For Regional Health Services

COUNCIL'S PROTEST TELEGRAM TO MINISTER

Method of apportionment of expenditure South Eastern Health Board not acceptable to Waterford County Council. Apportionment on population basis considered equitable. Request for receipt of deputation to follow. Signed Norman Walsh, Chairman.

This was the text of a telegram sent to the Minister for Health at 3.45 p.m. last Monday evening after members of Waterford County Council had been informed at their meeting in a brief report from the Co. Manager on the method to be adopted by the Minister for the apportionment of expenses to be met arising from the annual estimate for the coming year for the S.E. Regional Health Board.

Mr. C. A. O'Connor, Co. Manager, in his report pointed out that as far back as February 8 last year the Council had requested the Minister for Health to appoint an Arbitrator to determine the proportion in which the expenditure of the Regional Health Board, outside of grants, should be contributed by the Local Authorities in the region.

It went on: "A copy of letter dated December 21st, 1971, in which the Department of Health to the Chief Executive Officer of the South Eastern Health Board has been forwarded to us intimating that arrangements for termination made as soon as possible but the Minister is advised that it is unlikely to be available before June next. In the circumstances, he has, in accordance with the Health Act 1970, directed that the expenditure should be apportioned on an interim basis in relation to the years 1971/72 and 1972/73. It should be noted, however, that the Arbitrator's final apportionment will operate as from 1st April 1971."

The report then gave details of the interim apportionment to be made as directed by the Minister by the various contributing bodies as follows: Carlow Co. Council 10.5%; Kilkenny Co. Council 10.5%; Tipperary (S.E.) Co. Council 10.5%; Waterford Co. Council 18.5%; Wexford Corporation 2.7%; Wexford Co. Council 2.7%.

Percentages of population and of valuation of the region were then given as Carlow Co. Council, 10.51 and 10.47; Kilkenny Co. Council 10.52 and 20.67; Tipperary (S.E.) Co. Council 11.59 and 13.27; Waterford Co. Council, 13.53 and 15.38; Wexford Corporation 2.25 and 7.23 and Wexford Co. Council, 26.11 and 23.10. The report concluded:

ILLEGAL SALMON COME TO LIGHT IN ROAD ACCIDENT

The story how illegally caught salmon were detected when the car in which they were being transported was involved in a road traffic accident was told at Dungarvan Court before District Justice B. J. Carroll on Wednesday last. Before the Court was Maurice Whelan (23) unemployed labourer, 45, Cahal Brugha Place, Dungarvan and he was charged with dangerous driving, driving with dangerous driving, without insurance, without a driver's licence, with two bad tyres and with false number plates at Ballymacarney South on September 18 last. He was further charged with being unlawfully in possession of salmon.

RATHER HOPELESS CASE Mr. A. R. Farrell, Solicitor, for the defendant said that this was a hopeless case where his client was concerned. When he became involved in the case he was caught when he was driving on a road which was closed to traffic.
