### PENSMAN TAKES YOU BEHIND THE SPOTLIGHT

**ON BEATING CHILDREN**

It might be a useful gesture if we doctors suggested that patients that they produce a year's amnesty for their children in 1972," writes Dr. Daly in the "High Road Times," when he writes to the fact that a child is sometimes beaten by a teacher who is very often suffering from a depressive illness.

I have been prompted on a number of occasions in the past to refer to this habit of beating children which is followed not only by many parents but by several teachers in the lower and upper grades in schools as well.

It is a fact that it is a fact that some teachers still believe in corporal punishment when their pupils are concerned.

In his article, Dr. Daly states that parents who beat their children should be deeply ashamed of themselves and he claims that by doing so, they are not producing peaceful homes or producing peaceful children and that certainly a following practice that they are not giving good example.

He goes on to say that they must be excused on extenuating circumstances. First, they have emerged from the Irish educational system where an attitude of judgment and punishment is almost intrinsic to the school, like the air in the classroom, or the chalk-dust on the desks.

Secondly, they seem to have heard very little about the value of true peacefulness from those whose duty it is to impart peace. In fact beating children has found a definite, corrupt, moral sanction in some religious orders who use stress in the course of their catecholate to the young.

Putting the matter fairly and squarely, Dr. Daly then says that before a child is given the one major question which a parent or any other person in a similar position must ask themselves is: What exactly am I teaching this child by beating him? He answers in five parts.

(1) I am teaching him that I do not forgive, and I teach him that I intend to sit in judgment on his moral value of other people's actions; (2) I teach him the extreme power of physical violence so that when he is with impunity, injure him to varying degrees; (3) I teach him to "behave," not because this is the good thing to do but because it is the way to avoid being hit; (4) I teach him to absorb the atmosphere of ever-present physical violence.

The article concludes in a manner: "Parents must be urged to keep their hands off themselves. They must be urged to change their attitude to their children. What do you do with a child if you don't beat him? You must using the Christian virtues for a change... you start with patience, forbearance, forgiveness, tolerance, respect.

### THE FOLLIES OF IRELAND

This is the title of an article by Mrs. Desmond Guinness in the current issue of "Ireland of the Welcomes" but in case you might be misled it is explained that the word "Folly" when used of a building, was said to derive from the French "Feulliere," or arbour made of leaves. Within this meaning of the word, Mrs. Guinness then states that there are now more follies to be seen in Ireland than anywhere else in the world.

A number of "follies" in Waterford are mentioned in the article including the Wexford Arch at Dromano and the Grand Gates at Ballysaggartmore.

Concerning the first named, the writer states: "This is said to have been made out of paper and plywood, a surprise for the newly married Villiers-Stuarts, of about 1830. They had just spent their honeymoon in Brighton, and the arch does look like the gate to the Prince Regent's Pavilion there. It is much prettier, though, being perched unexpectedly over a bridge. The young people liked it so much that they had it rebuilt more permanently, in stone and plaster."

Indeed the archway has now taken on a new lease of life having been incorporated in the new bridge which was recently completed over the river Finisk at this point.

The article on the "Follies" then says: "Not far away, are the even more eccentric Grand Gates of Ballysaggartmore. The owner, one feels, must have been a sort of Waterford Ludwig II. Wagnerian towers, machicolations, arrowslits and battlements loom threateningly under the dripping trees, leading further into the forest, where a second set of turretted gates frown gloomily. All are made of the most expensive cut stone. So costly were they indeed, that there was no money to build the house with!"

I must admit to never seeing this "folly" at Ballysaggartmore nor do I know anything about its historical background.

By the way in case any of my readers are wondering what a "machicolation" is, it is an opening for pouring molten lead or hurling missiles on assailants and I did not know this either until I had a look at a dictionary!

**CHURCH HOLIDAYS MAY BE MOVED.**

A Vatican announcement made last week-end stated that the possibility of moving some of the Roman Catholic holidays so as not to interrupt the work in factories and offices was being studied.

The Vatican spokesman, Federico Alessandrini said, however, that if such changes

were made, they would not affect such big holidays for the Roman Catholic Church like Christmas. He said that these were "deeply rooted in Christian conscience and customs."

Here in Ireland we have eight church holidays through the year but these do not affect trade or industry to any extent as business in these fields proceeds as usual on such days. However, the rural population do observe Church holidays as workless days. On the other hand they ignore the Bank holidays, when industry, trade and business concerns generally close down.

The only section of the community, as far as I know, that population do observe Church holidays and Bank holidays are those employed in the public services—officials and staffs of County Councils, Urban Councils, Civil Servants and State Departments.

People working in this sector have the double benefit of doing no work on any of these occasions. How this came to be or why this section should look upon themselves as entitled to this additional privilege I do not know.

I do not think that they could claim the additional free days on the basis that at all other times they work harder or longer hours than their opposite numbers in commercial life or private enterprise. As a matter of fact, if anything, I am sure that it is very much the other way round!

However, now if the Vatican decides to switch some of these Church Holidays to Sundays I wonder what it means that Council officials and employees of State Departments may have to forego this preferential treatment of these additional holidays or will the various Unions, Associations and Organisations which represent them place a claim for special days off "in lieu" so that the "differential" may be maintained!

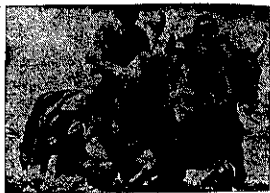
