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PENSMAN TAKES YOU BEHIND THE SPOTLIGHT

**A PRE-PLANNED
COLD-BLOODED
MASSACRE**
I know that many words
have been written and spoken
about the terrible happenings
which befell the Civil Rights
marchers in Derry last Sunday
afternoon and that my poor
pen can add very little to what
has already been said but I
feel that I could not let the
weeks pass without voicing in
some form the terrible re-
vulsion experienced when the
news first broke on Sunday
evening, the heartfelt sym-
pathy that I wished to extend
to the families and relatives
of the shot youths and men
and the great anger at this
cold-blooded act of utter bar-
barity which has remained with
me ever since.

Whatever the spokesmen
of the British Army or of the
British and Stormont Govern-
ments for that matter, say,
there can be little doubt but
that this was a pre-planned,
cold-blooded massacre of peo-
ple peacefully protesting
against the manner in
which they are discriminated
against in the North.
Having seen what happened
on the television screen
as captured by the cameras
of RTE and BBC there
can be no denial but
that the British soldiers of the
First Battalion of the Para-
chute Regiment went abso-
lutely berserk, having, evidently
got orders from their field
commanders to shoot to kill.

General Robert Ford, com-
mander of the British Long
Force in Northern Ireland was
quoted after the shootings as
saying that his soldiers only
fired when they had come un-
der sniper fire and that then
they had discharged no more
than three rounds. Countless
independent witnesses have
given the lie to this statement.
No shots were heard before
the British soldiers opened up
and the peculiarity of the
British brassard in claiming that
his men only fired three times
is shown for what it really is
in the fact that when the
shooting ended, thirteen vic-
tims had dyed the streets of
Derry with their life's blood
and British Bullets in their
bodies.

The claims and counter-
claims and the talks have gone
on since. But the 13 men and
youths who died last Sunday
were not the only victims.

DAY OF MOURNING FOR DERRY DEAD

MASSIVE DISPLAYS OF SYMPATHY

While the thirteen men and youths of Derry murdered by British Troops during last Sunday's Civil Rights demonstration were buried in Derry last Wednesday, the nation as a whole for the first time in almost half a century, north, south, east and west, stood united as it mourned for the dead martyrs and displayed a solidarity with our northern kin such as has not been seen for a long, long time.

Throughout the country there were mass parades to Requiem Masses for the repose of the souls of the dead men and boys and the quiet dignity displayed in all areas was an inspiration and must undoubtedly have been a great source of comfort to the bereaved relatives of the shot victims and indeed to all those in the North who are fighting for their just rights.

In Dungarvan all work came to a standstill at 11 a.m. on Wednesday morning and crowds began to gather at Grattan Square from where a parade to a special Mass at St. Mary's Parish Church at 11.30 a.m. had been organised. By the time the parade moved off, led by the Dungarvan Brass Band playing a howling dirge and leading rain had swelled to thousands.

Factory employees from all the local factories, waited side by side with the staffs from the local business and commercial firms. Members and officials of Dungarvan Urban Council and Waterford County Council also took part in the parade while boys and girls from the local schools either took part in the parade or made their separate ways to the Church. Black flags with white crosses and many placards were carried in the parade.

There has been much violence in the North in recent times and the authors of it all are not the I.R.A. but Mr. Faulkner and his government with their selective, repressive legislation and there are no more violent men in the Six Counties at present than the soldiers of the British Army and of which the thugs of the Parachute Regiment are the tops. There will be no peace until every last vestige of this regime is wiped from Northern Ireland — Stormont must go, the British Army must go and the Parachute Regiment must go and the repressors and liars must be repealed and perhaps then there may be some hope of a political solution to bring peace at last to this much troubled corner of our country.

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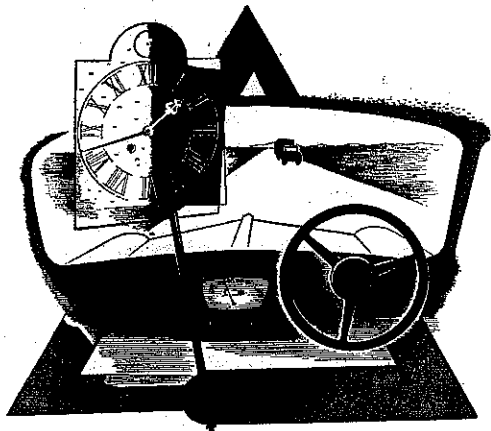

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

SIX COUNTY RELIEF

In view of recent reports in various daily papers on the role of the Red Cross in Six County Relief, the Executive Committee of the Irish Red Cross Society has directed that the following information be supplied to the media:— Since the troubles started in August 1969 VOLUNTARY Red Cross uniformed personnel have given continuous service in the various Camps in which refugees have been and are being accommodated.

Red Cross personnel assist the Army Medical Service in caring for the refugees. They prepare food for all the babies in the Camps, they escort patients to and from hospital and distribute clothing, footwear, toilet and household requisites.

EXPENDITURE TO DATE ON RELIEF INCLUDES:—

Table listing expenditures: Cash transfers to Relief Organisations in the Six Counties (£102,735), Clothing, footwear, toilet and household requisites, special baby foods, etc. (£11,702), Transport costs (£14,657), Hospital and medical expenses (£3,440), Pocket-money (£5,677), Total (£138,211).

Large consignments of food, medicine, clothing and bedding donated to the Society have been sent to the Six Counties for distribution as required.

Members of the Junior Red Cross entertained the school-going children of Kilmorth Camp to a Christmas Concert and Party at the Presentation Convent, Fermoy, where each guest received a Christmas gift provided by Juniors from schools all over the country.

The Society provided Christmas parcels for each family in the Camp, each member receiving a gift-wrapped packet.

At present there is a total of 165 refugees in Lynch Camp, Kilmorth. Three to four VOLUNTARY uniformed Red Cross personnel are in constant attendance in the Camp and at week-ends the number is increased.
