NO DEMAND FOR IRISH SCHOLARSHIPS AMONG CO. WATERFORD STUDENTS

The coming financial year was going to be a catastrophic one for as rates were concerned in Co. Waterford, Mr. Kieran O'Ryan warned at last Monday's meeting of the County Vocational Education Committee in Dunganvar.

The Late Mr. W. He joined the National Army at its inception in 1922 and retired at the end of the Emergency in 1946 with the rank of Sergeant (S.M.S.). He was Recruiting Sergeant at Collins Barracks, Cork, in the early 1930's, after leaving the army he was employed as postman at Youghal Post Office.

Death Of Mr. C. Curley—A member of one of Tallow's oldest and most highly esteemed families passed to his eternal reward unexpectedly on Friday, February 15th in the person of Mr. Cornelius Curley of West Street.

Deceased had been out and about on that day. He was taken ill that evening and died a short time later.

Son of the late John and Mrs. Curley, deceased, he was known and respected over a wide area and his death, though at an advanced age, removes from the town a very popular figure and one of its oldest inhabitants.

There was a large and representative cortege at the removal of the remains to the Church of the Immaculate Conception, Tallow, on Saturday, February 18th and at the interment in the adjoining cemetery on Sunday, following 11 o'clock Mass by Very Rev. P.P. O'Mahony, C.C., officiated.

He is survived by a large number of cousins and relatives to whom we extend our deepest sympathy.

Clommit Remembered—The anniversary of the Battle of Clommit, when 15 prominent members of the I.R.A. were murdered by British Military and Black and Tans on the 20th February 1921, was remembered at Middleton on Sunday last, 12 o'clock Mass was celebrated in the Holy Rosary Church, Middleton for the repose of their souls. A wreath was later laid on their graves in the Paganan Plot in the Holy Rosary Cemetery and a decade of the rosary was recited.

The circumstances of how those men were betrayed, has long been a mystery. Many historians of the East Cork Brigade were present in the lonely farmhouse at Clommit, there had been there in conference for some days and were preparing to leave on that fateful Sunday evening of February 20th, 1921, when two of their number, who had gone to fill water bottles in a nearby well, noticed the military closing in from all sides. They ran back to the house to tell their comrades, but were shot down. One of them, Alie Joyce, got as far as the door and shouted to his comrades: "The house is surrounded and no escape is possible."

Nevertheless the defenders put up a heroic fight until the house was set on fire, when they were forced to surrender. On coming into the yard of the house they were placed against a wall and shot and bayoneted by the military and Tans. Two who were not shot were later executed in Cork Jail. A few minutes later, among them the late Capt. Fostie, Aberne and Comdt Higgins.

As regards the spy who gave the military information, the book "The I.R.A." written by Tim Pat Coogan, we come across the following passage: "Whilst interviewing Sean Murray, one of the most famous of the I.R.A. leaders of the time, in his home at Terenure, Dublin, a short time before his death in 1968, Mr. Murray said he was waiting for a priest to call to hear his confession, because he was unable to leave the house owing to an injury suf-

ment it should be reported immediately to them who were always willing to help with advice.

In his address on behalf of the Directors, Mr. Thomas Murray stressed that the Credit Union belonged to the members and just as one is very careful in looking after his own personal property, so they should be willing to play an active role in running of the credit union which depended entirely on voluntary workers. Every one's personal initiative and talent would benefit the credit union. There was an equal opportunity for every shareholder to have his own nominee elected.
