Legal Advice Call At Co. Council Election Procedure

STORMY INTERLUDE OVER NEW HEALTH COMMITTEE

The election of representatives to the new local health committee to be set up under the Health Regulations 1972 caused a stormy interlude at last Monday's monthly meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan and ended with a member of the Fine Gael party calling for legal advice on the ruling of the Chairman, a party colleague, on the procedure which had been adopted.

The new committee which will have a total of 33 members will operate for the combined area of the County and City. It will consist of 12 members of the County Council, 7 members of the City Council, the County and City Managers and representatives of the medical and other related professions.

At the outset, Mr. W. Kenneally, T.D. (F.F.) suggested instead of expediting the matter that the members in each area should vote for his two party colleagues, Mr. N. Walsh and Mr. S. Heskin, announced that he was going to abstain from voting for a third nominee (one of the three Fianna Fail members nominated).

Mr. Deasy said that he would then be prepared to accept this procedure in two of the areas. Mr. Deasy asked the County Secretary for a legal opinion.

Mr. Deasy said that he was not prepared to accept the procedure any longer and held that the Council should go back to the system of successive single election as laid down in the regulations.

Mr. Deasy said that he was voting for two only and in accordance with the regulations he could not abstain if he wished and that was what he was doing.

B.L.O.E. CHAMPIONSHIPS TONY RYAN LED MUNSTER TO VICTORY
A narrow margin of three points enabled Munster to retain the Bishop McFeely Cup in the B.L.O.E. interprovincial cross-country championship at Bellfield, Dublin, last Sunday.
The Cup went to the province with the best overall total in the boys and girls under 16 races. And straight away let it be said that it was the Munster boys who carried the day. The girls' race opened the proceedings and here the southern province suffered a first rate shock.
Carlton's Beatrix Lambert, who assists the Irish Ladies senior team in Cambridge next Saturday, gained her expected victory with two Cork girls Joan Fleming and Jo O'Leary following her over the line. But Munster's challenge fell flat at this point and the next five minutes were all Leinster. This gave the host province a points total of 31 and when Munster trailed in second place by 18 points the pressure was well and truly on the boys.
But splendidly led by Dungarvan's Tony Ryan, who raced to his 13th victory in a hectic season, the cup holders well and truly turned the tables on their Leinster rivals.
When the score for the leading six finishers from each province was calculated there was a 21 points margin in Munster's favour and this gave the southern teams their exciting triumph overall.
The awards were presented at a function in the South County Hotel, Dublin, by Mr. Dan Liddy, President B.L.O.E., and teams and officials from the four provinces were present.

PRELIMINARY SURVEY TO ASSESS COAST EROSION DAMAGE

Mr. Hally said that there would not be much point in asking the Board of Works to do this but he proposed to submit preliminary schemes for those other areas to them and thought these would bring better results.
Mr. J. Keane said that the sand dunes at Donmahon had been extensively damaged by erosion in recent months.

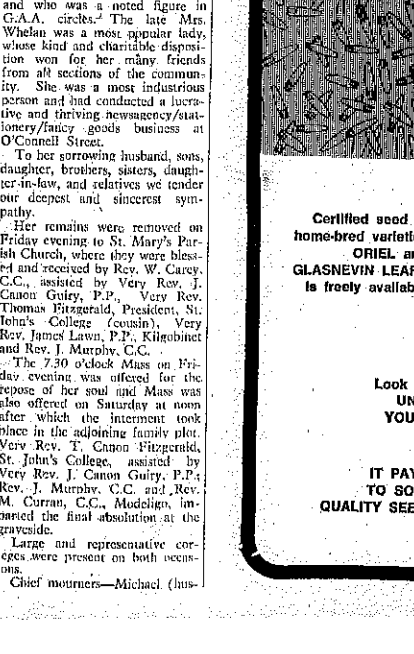

THE AUGUSTINIANS IN DUNGARVAN: 1295 - 1972

THIRD INSTALMENT

1603-1649: CALM BEFORE THE STORM

The death of Elizabeth (1603) and the accession of James VI and I was the signal for the public restoration of the Catholic religion.

Although deprived once again of safety and shelter, the Augustinians did not relinquish their claim at Dungarvan.

1649-1660: HUNTED

Although Cromwell spared the walled town of Dungarvan, he did not spare the Abbey.

1660-1690: SURVIVAL IN SUFFERING

From 1660, there was a relaxation of persecution and the clergy were able to carry out their duties.

1690-1720: CALM BEFORE THE STORM

The death of Elizabeth (1603) and the accession of James VI and I was the signal for the public restoration of the Catholic religion.

1720-1792: HUNTED

1792-1869: CALM BEFORE THE STORM
