School Transport Service. IMPORTANT NOTICE TO PARENTS AND GUARDIANS. A-Free Transport to Post-Primary Schools. Is your child eligible? To be eligible for free transport, your child must first of all be eligible for recognition as a post-primary pupil i.e. (a) enrol for an approved course in a recognised post-primary school; (b) be not less than 12 years of age on 1st January, 1973; (c) have completed sixth standard in a national school or its equivalent. The child must also live three miles or more from the nearest school providing free post-primary education. This is the walking distance, measured by the nearest available route. Please note especially that it is the distance from the nearest school that matters—not from the school attended. How is transport provided? Free transport for eligible pupils will be provided only on the nearest school—either on public transport or on a special school bus where there is no public transport. Special school bus services are organised as a network of main routes. If you live off a main route your child is expected to get, or be brought, to a convenient pick-up point on the main route. If you want your child to obtain post-primary education entirely through Irish (in all subjects except English), free transport will be given to the nearest school providing such education; you must, of course, live at least three miles from it.

Bishop Re-dedicates Ancient Parish Church of Abbeyside

NEW LOOK CHURCH WITH TRADITION OF CENTURIES

When the second foundation of the Augustinians in Ireland was established in Dungarvan it was on a sequestered site separated from the town by the sea that they chose the site for their Abbey and it was there that under the patronage of Thomas, Lord Offaly, one of the famous McGrath family that the Order began its first association with Dungarvan in 1295. The Order was further endowed as the years went on by another local leading family, the O'Briens and the Priests remained in Abbeyside until the 16th century when by order of Queen Elizabeth they were driven out and the building fell gradually into disrepair. Two centuries later when the Penal Laws were relaxed, Abbeyside was established as an independent parish and in 1832, the then Parish Priest, Very Rev. J. Shanahan decided to build a new parish church and the site he selected was the site where the old Augustinian monastery had once stood and so it has remained there to this day. On Sunday last this church which has a tradition going back through many centuries saw its second renaissance, when, following a complete reconstruction and modernisation which took place over the past 9 months at a cost of

£35,000, it was re-opened and re-dedicated to SS. Augustine and Felix by his Lordship, Most Rev. Dr. Russell, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore. HISTORIC DAY Without doubt it was yet another historic day in the annals of this very historic church and a red letter day for the parishioners of Abbeyside. It was the climax to a wonderful community effort and encouraged by the priests of the parish the people willingly rose to the occasion and made it one of great joy and rejoicing. Flags and bunting, flowers and decorated altars were to be seen everywhere in a profusion of gay colours and even the weather could not be more favourable as the bright summer sun shone warmly on the crowds as they flocked to the church for the ceremonies which commenced at 3.30 p.m. Following the blessing of the altar and the consecration of the altar and the procession of relics which were placed and sealed in it then took place. At the church door his Lordship was received by a Guard of Honour of Abbeyside Scouts. Concelebrated Mass at which Dr. Russell was chief celebrant followed the other concelebrants being Very Rev. M. Farrell, P.P., Abbeyside, Very Rev. J. Roche, P.P., Abbeyside who retired last year but who still resides in the parish, Rev. M. Walsh, C.C., do. Very Rev. T. C. Butler, O.S.A., Prior, St. Augustine's, Dungarvan, Rev. C. Mansfield, O.S.A., do., Rev. D. Kelleher, O.S.A., Nigenia, Rev. M. Enright, C.C., Ring, Rev. M. Murray, S.D.B., Rev. C. Kelleher, C.C., Kilmogimer and Rev. M. Drummy, C.C., Dublin. Very T. Canon Fitzgerald, President, St. John's College, Waterford, was Master of Ceremonies and other clergy present included Very Rev. P. Farrell, P.P., Stradbally, Very Rev. J. Canon Farrell, P.P., Leeds, Very Rev. J. Canon Guiry, P.P., Dungarvan, Rev. J. Murphy C.C., do. The Lessons, the Responsorial Psalm and the Prayers of the Faithful at the Mass were read by the following pupils of Abbeyside National School - Billy Slattery, Sean Feehan, Sandra Dunphy, Julie Kiehy, Kevin Mulvihill, Catherine Maher, Caroline Pennell, Maurice O'Donnell, Paddy Organ and Jacqueline Regan, while pupils of the school also made the presentation of the gifts at the offertory. The school choir under Mr. Pat Veske, M.T. Principal, sang the many beautiful new hymns, which Mr. F. Keeney presided at the organ. BISHOP'S ADDRESS Addressing the overflow congrega-

tion during the Mass Dr. Russell said that they could not have picked a nicer Sunday to reopen and bless their church than the Sunday of the Good Shepherd. He said that the church was the sheepfold which the faithful entered at the call of Christ. The Church was not really so much the beautiful building as the one they were now in as the gathering of the people. The people came to the church to pray and to bring away from it the spirit and courage and hope to help them to face the weeks and years ahead. His Lordship went on to say that the church was the community of all the faithful who believed in Christ and his special prayer was that the true spirit of the Good Shepherd and of the true church would be instilled in the hearts of all who entered this new building. "This church has a great tradition over the centuries," said Dr. Russell, "and countless people have come here and have had their prayers answered at their hearts filled with hope. Let us hope it will continue in this way." The Bishop then said that for him one of the most wonderful things of the day was that Rev. Fr. Roche, their retired Parish Priest, was able to be with them for the ceremonies and he pointed out that Fr. Roche had, in fact, the longest period of service as pastor in the history of the parish. He thanked him and Fr. Walsh and their new Parish Priest, Fr. Farrell, all the parishioners and all who had helped in the work of beautifying the church. "My prayer," said his Lordship in conclusion, "is that you will find that Christ is the Good Shepherd and that you will hear his word and take it home with you." Before Mass concluded, the Parish Priest, Fr. Farrell, thanked the Bishop for coming to rejoice with them and for consecrating the new altar and handing it over to Almighty God. They were all glad he said that the old church was once again restored to the service of God. TRIBUTE TO O'BRIEN FAMILY Having thanked the Architects, Patrick J. Sheehan & Partners, Limerick, for the tasteful manner in which they had designed the interior, Fr. Farrell went on to congratulate the main contractors responsible for re-building the church, E. O'Brien and Sons, Ltd., Abbeyside, and for the speed with which they had completed it. The O'Brien brothers had done a wonderful job, he said, and they were all justly proud that such excellent work could be done by natives of the parish as had been done on the church. This must surely be a great day for the O'Brien family, he added, as they had restored their own Parish Church and made a lasting monument of it in the parish to their family. Fr. Farrell then thanked Fr. Roche, Fr. Walsh and the committee and the congregation for all the work they had done in the past two years ago. He thanked the splendid body of workers who had helped throughout, the Co. Engineer, Mr. J. D. Hally and his assistants for their help, advice and assistance, the organist and choir of schoolchildren for their excellence and all the teachers. He thanked the Boy Scouts and all for all the co-operation they had given to make the day a red letter day for the parish and concluded by saying that the total collected to date for the building fund was £21,400 which left a debt of £14,000 still to be met. "But," said Fr. Farrell, "what is that I can assure his Lordship that he doesn't have to have any worry as there won't be a penny due this time twelve months!" After the Church ceremonies the parishioners were entertained to tea and light refreshments in measures set up in the school grounds and with his Lordship mingling with the crowds it proved a happy and fitting ending to a really great occasion. CHILDREN'S DAY On Tuesday morning the Church was again crowded but on this occasion by the hundreds of children attending Abbeyside National School. It was the wish of the Parish Priest that this should be observed as Children's Day to mark the reopening of the Church. It was an imposing and inspiring sight as Concelebrated Mass commenced at 10 o'clock. Very Rev. M. Farrell, P.P., was the chief celebrant with Rev. M. Walsh, C.C., Very Rev. J. Canon Farrell, P.P., Leeds and Rev. M. Murray, S.D.B., as concelebrants. It was really a big occasion for the children who were addressed by the Parish Priest. 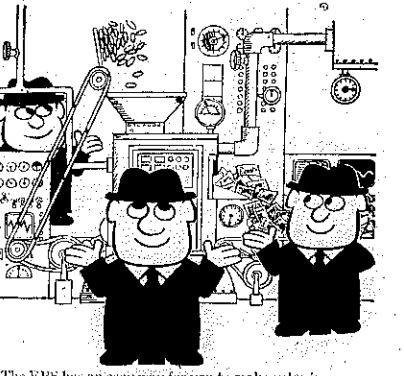
