## TRAGIC DEATH OF YOUNG COLLIGAN WOMAN

Collapsed While Playing in Camogie Match

News of the death of Mrs. Mairead Kirwan (nee Quarry), Colligan, Dungarvan, which occurred in Ardkeen Hospital on Tuesday morning, May 9th, stunned the many people in the area who knew her.

Only 27 years of age and married just seven months, she collapsed while playing in a County Waterford Camogie League game on Monday night.

A member of the Kilbrien team playing Partlaw at Colligan, she had been on the field only about ten minutes when she was seen to collapse. She was immediately assisted off by team mates and spectators and rushed to Ardkeen Hospital where she died shortly before 7 o'clock on Tuesday morning.

Mrs. Kirwan did not receive any blow or injury during the game and it is thought that death may have been caused by a brain tumour. Mrs. Kirwan was principal of "Mairead's" Hairdressing Salon in the Square, Dungarvan.

She was a member of a Waterford family which has long connections with the Gaelic Athletic Association in the County. She was niece of Mr. Declan Goodie who was Waterford County Secretary for 33 years. Her husband, Seamus Kirwan was a playing member of Colligan G.A.A. Club, while her brother, Johnny Quarry, played in goal for the County senior hurling team before emigrating to the U.S.

A most popular young lady in the area, her untimely passing has caused sorrow to her legions of friends in the locality with whom we now join in extending deep and sincere sympathy to her sorrowing husband, parents, brother, sister and other relatives on their tragic loss.

## DUNGARVAN BOY LOSES FOUR FINGERS IN EXPLOSION

A fifteen-year-old Dungarvan schoolboy, William Beresford of Glendine House, Dungarvan, lost four fingers on his left hand on Monday night last, when weed killer and sugar substances with which he was experimenting exploded.

The accident occurred in a shed at the rear of the boys home. His older brother Cyril was with him in the shed at the time of the explosion, but he escaped injury although he was badly shocked.

William, who is son of Mr. and Mrs. Nicholas Beresford, Glendine House, was rushed to Ardkeen Hospital where an emergency operation was performed. His condition was, later, stated to be comfortable.

He is a pupil of St. Augustine's College, Dungarvan. Gardaí later visited the scene of the accident and a spokesman later confirmed that the fingers had not been found.

# Report On Maternity Unit And Casualty Services At Dungarvan

## MATTER BEFORE REGIONAL HEALTH BOARD

The following report was submitted to the General Hospital Committee of the South-East Regional Health Board held in Kilkenny yesterday (Thursday).

Mr. C. Curran has asked that a statement be made on the provision of casualty services at St. Vincent's Hospital, Dungarvan. The Board has submitted a memorandum on the matter to the Board and the latter has asked for observations.

**MATERNITY UNIT**

The four-bedded maternity unit which has been the subject of an earlier report was opened in September, 1971. It is operated by the Board and was intended to replace services previously given commercially by private individuals in Dungarvan, and which had been discontinued.

Initially, the labour and delivery room was placed in the former theatre of the hospital to save extra construction. It was decided to reconsider it when the number of patients and experience had been developed.

There have been many complaints about the location of the labour unit and it has now been decided to remove it to the private room on the ground floor of the hospital, turning the old theatre into a replacement private room which is objection to this exchange from the Sister-in-Charge who sleeps in the room which was proposed to be used as a labour ward. However, with the provision of the new room at home and convent in the District Hospital area, later this year, the question of accommodation for the Sister-in-Charge will have been solved and she can then take place in the unit.

Since the unit opened in September, 11 children have been born there. As there is a minimum staffing level below which cannot go while giving continuous coverage of midwifery trained nurses, it is clear that the staff provided could in fact deal with a substantially greater number of deliveries.

**CASUALTY**

There has been no casualty service provided in Dungarvan for three years. In 1969 the Waterford Health Authority decided to concentrate casualty services for the County in Ardara Hospital where there is a fully equipped and manned unit.

The provision of a casualty service in a community can be at a number of levels. Minor domestic and industrial injuries such as cuts and small burns can be dealt with very adequately by the local general practitioner or indeed within the household or factory itself.

When we are concerned with more extensive injuries—major burns, wounds resulting in extensive bleeding, dislocations or suspected fractures the problem becomes more important and the resources deployed more considerable. Over and above what can be done by a community-trained first aid team, the services of the local general practitioner are necessary to make a decision on the necessity for further treatment. The average general practitioner

should have facilities for treating accident cases. He was supported in this view by Dr. W. J. E. McKee, Senior Administrative Medical Officer of the Liverpool Regional Hospital Board. Each hospital could not do everything said Dr. McKee, and it had been shown in several surveys in several countries that, on balance, small and un-equipped casualty departments cost lives rather than saved them. It had further been shown, he said, that time spent travelling in an ambulance to a hospital was a relatively small factor in getting the treatment for the patients. Dr. Counihan said that it appeared that patients in this country might be admitted to some hospitals with injuries which the hospitals were not equipped to treat.

It was clearly not possible to supply the latter level of service for Dungarvan in isolation. The Board would be involved in substantial expense in providing a 24 hour medical service in a very minor population centre throughout the Region. It is felt that the return from such an investment would be very low in relation to alternative uses for the resources. The existence of such a unit would be unnecessary in the case of patients with very minor injuries; it would result in injuries being more serious in instances to a unit which was not really able to deal with them, thus delaying their removal to the properly equipped casualty centre. In the four surgical hospitals referred to

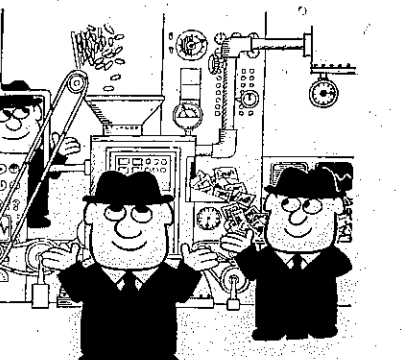
