OIL SPILLAGE IN DUNGARVAN HARBOUR

Brought Protests From Local Organisations

In a report to Monday night's meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council the Acting Town Clerk, Mr. B. White referred to a serious instance of oil spillage into the harbour on April 22/23 last, which brought a subsequent storm of protest from several local organisations and several private boat owners.

Mr. White said that the Town Engineer submitted a report on April 25 to the effect that oil appeared on the foreshore opposite the Waterford Co-Op. plant and also at the Lookout. From the evidence available, he said, it appeared that the oil had come from within the harbour.

Mr. White said that on inquiry it appeared that the spillage had taken place through the neglect of an outside agency and occurred during the filling of auxiliary tanks in the tankers premises on the night of April 24.

The Acting Town Clerk went on to state that the matter was taken up with the Manager of Waterford Co-Op, who undertook to clean the oil from the affected areas as a matter of goodwill but without admitting liability. The detergent for this clean up, he said, was provided by the Urban Council.

REMOVAL

Mr. White went on: "The likelihood of such a spillage taking place again is very remote as the Co-Op are completing the installation of a new oil storage tank at a cost of £10,000 which will incorporate a bund to prevent the escape of oil. It may be accidentally spilled."

He confirmed that letters of protest about the spillage had been received from the Rowing Club, the Waterford Fishermen's Association, the Wild Bird Conservancy, the Harbour Sailing Club and from a number of local boat owners.

Mr. D. Cooke said it was obvious from the Town Clerk's report that Waterford Co-Op were making an effort to solve the problem and ensure there wasn't a recurrence.

The Chairman, Mr. T. A. Kyne said the fact that the spillage cost £10,000 was an indication of their desire to see to it that there was no further oil spillages into the harbour.

UNSUCCESSFUL APPEAL AGAINST SEVERITY OF SENTENCES

Richard Coleman, a 21 year old unemployed labourer of 7, Parks Road, Lismore was unsuccessful in his appeal at Dungarvan Circuit Court on Tuesday against the severity of sentences imposed on him by Judge Sean Mac D. Pawlett at Dungarvan District Court on Tuesday when he was sentenced to six months imprisonment for breaking and entering the premises of Thomas Barry, Church Street, Lismore, and stealing cash to a total of £134.

Dr. D. E. Counahan, State Solicitor, said the appellant had been sentenced to six months in St. Patrick's Institution on each of the charges, the sentences to run concurrently.

Dr. Counahan said the injured party was an old age pensioner and Coleman watched his opportunity to go to the house when Mr. Barry was gone to steal a period of time stole a total of £134.

PREVIOUS CONVICTIONS

Sergeant M. Bowen, Lismore, said Coleman had several previous convictions dating back to 1960 for housebreaking and larceny. He had already served three previous sentences in St. Patrick's Institution.

The defendants told Judge Sean Mac D. Pawlett that when interviewed by the Garda he admitted stealing £80 from Mr. Barry. But when the case was brought against him he was charged with the larceny of £134.

Sergeant Bowen explained that Mr. Barry reported that a total of £134 had been stolen from his home and the defendant voluntarily pleaded guilty to the larceny of that amount.

When Coleman declined to give any evidence under oath on his own behalf, Judge Pawlett said he saw no reason to interfere with the District Court sentence and disallowed the appellant's appeal.

"DRUNKEN DAY OUT" ENDED IN SERIES OF ASSAULTS

Middleton Man Appeals Against Six Month Sentence

A "very drunken day out" which ended in a series of assaults was described as Dungarvan Circuit Court on Tuesday last when Michael Merrigan, 26 Rosary Place, Middleton, appealed against a total of six months imprisonment imposed on him at Cappoquin District Court.

The appellant had been sentenced to one month on each of two charges of assaulting Michael Cowling and Patrick Dunne at Aglish on May 8th, 1970. He was also sentenced to six months for demanding £12 from Cowling with menace, all the sentences to run concurrently.

Dr. D. E. Counahan, State Solicitor, said Merrigan and his wife took a taxi from Middleton to Aglish on the date in question and while there assaulted Cowling whom he alleged owed him money. He also assaulted the taxi driver, Mr. Dunne, but came out a bad second in that respect.

HEARD AND ADJUDGED

Dr. Counahan said all the incidents occurred from a very drunken day out. The appeal had already been heard and had been adjourned for twelve months.

Judge Pawlett said when he adjourned the appeal twelve months ago it was to decide whether he would double the appellant's sentence or leave it at the six months.

Inspector John O'Shea said that during the past twelve months the appellant had not come under unavourable notices.

Mr. Declan Budd B.L. (instructed by E. A. Ryan and Co., Solicitors for the appellant, said Merrigan was in a state of acute alcoholic confusion at the time of these offences.

Judge Pawlett reiterated that when he heard the appeal initially he was of the opinion of doubling the sentence. He would adjourn the appeal to the next Dungarvan sitting before giving a decision on it.

DUNGARVAN THE "FAVoured BABY" OF URBAN COUNCILS

Council Members Discuss Town's Housing Needs

Dungarvan were the "favoured baby" of Urban Councils with the Department of Local Government, Mr. T. A. Kyne, Chairman, told Monday night's meeting of the Urban Council, during a discussion on the present housing needs of the town.

The Acting Town Clerk, Mr. B. White, said the immediate housing needs of Dungarvan represented about 1,000 to 1,200 houses and ten four-bedroom ones and if they proceeded with such a scheme it would leave their two-bedroom houses standing at about twenty houses.

Mr. White went on to say that about six of the forty acres of land purchased by the Council at Yeoughal Road would suffice for this housing programme. They had instructed the architect to give them a lay out plan for a thirty house scheme of three and four bedroom houses.

The Chairman, Mr. T. A. Kyne, said they were also endeavouring to build eight or ten more old peopled houses.

"COVER UP"

Mr. Hackett asked if all this was not a "cover up" of the fact that in fact only six of the forty acres of land purchased at Yeoughal Road were suitable for housing, "I'm very suspicious about this particular land and always have been," he added.

Mr. P. Whelan said he would be very disappointed if they were to limit their immediate housing plans to just thirty houses. They had bought nearly forty acres of land at Yeoughal Road but now they were talking about building houses on only six acres. They should be planning to build much more than thirty houses and have them available to people who might want them in the future.

The County Manager, Mr. C. A. O'Connor said it should also be remembered that they were not dealing with a bottomless financial well. Building houses required careful expenditure, he said.

The Town Engineer, Mr. P. Walsh, told the members that there was development on the Yeoughal Road land to build anything up to 140 houses. Six acres there could be developed and serviced immediately at the least possible cost.

Mr. T. Wade said they had purchased that land for £10,000 a very long time ago. They should now be at the stage where houses were actually built on it.

"FAVoured BABY"

Mr. Kyne said Dungarvan Urban Council had got away with murder with the Department of Local Government up to now. "Dungarvan in fact has been the favoured baby of Urban Councils in this country," he said.

Mr. R. Walsh said they had the highest rate of Urban Council housing in Ireland.

It was finally agreed to try and expedite sanction of the proposed layout for the three and four bedroom houses at the Yeoughal Road site.

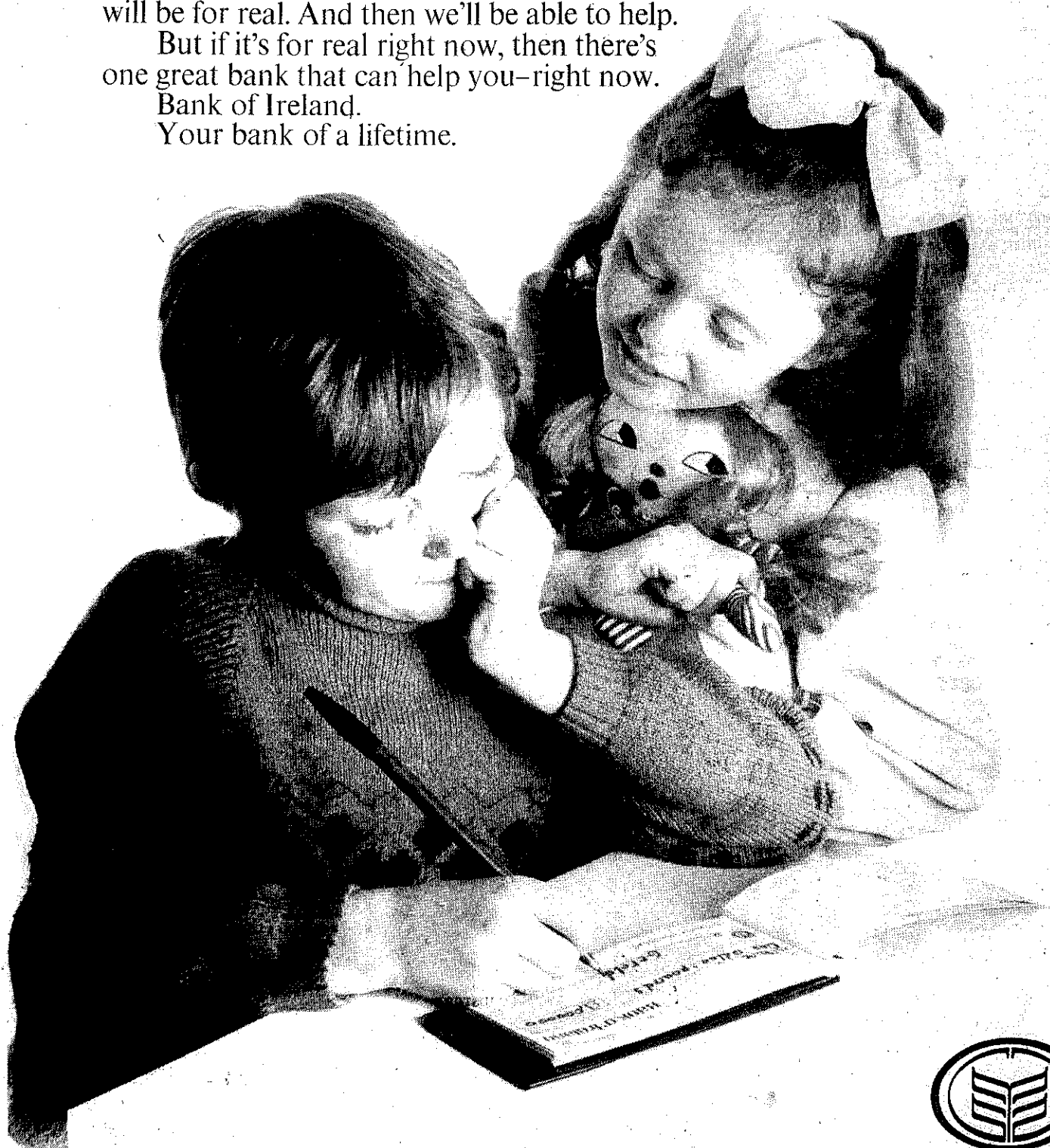

DEATH OF VERY REV. P. F. WALSH, P.P.
BELOVED PASTOR OF TOWNREANA

The death of Very Rev. P. F. Walsh, beloved Parish Priest of Townreana and the Nire, which occurred on Friday, May 19, at the Medical, Missionary and Nursing School, Clonmel, evoked feelings of profound regret, not alone among the parishioners who had served so well as Parish Priest since 1946, but also in Dungarvan, of which he was a native. He had been ill for just a brief space. Born eighty-four years ago into a family who were highly esteemed and well-known in the business life of Dungarvan, the late Fr. Walsh was ordained to the priesthood in 1914.

He served in a temporary capacity in Glasgow and Edinburgh and was also Chaplain to the British Army. He returned to the Diocese of Waterford in 1919 as curate in Portlao. He later ministered as curate in Killybeggs, Clashmore and Stradbally before being appointed Parish Priest of Townreana and the Nire in August 1946.

During his priestly life Fr. Walsh dedicated himself to the spiritual and temporal welfare of the parishioners who came under his care. He was zealous in his priestly duties and was held in the highest regard by the members of his flock, more especially in the Townreana area, where he spent twenty-six fruitful years in the Lord's Service.

Deep sympathy is extended to the sorrowing sister, nephews, nieces and friends.
