CO. COUNCIL TO OVER-RIDE OBJECTIONS TO DEVELOPMENT OF HELVICK CARAVAN SITE

Mr. J. G. Dowling, Co. Secretary, submitted the following report on the Helvick Caravan site.

This is a matter which concerns far-reaching effects for the ratepayers of this county and of the urban area of Dungarvan unless the apportionment is made on a fair and equitable basis. In all there are six contributing bodies - the Councils of the Counties of Waterford, Cork, Kerry, Tipperary (S.R.), Limerick and Wexford and the Corporation of Waterford City, with a combined total population of almost 320,000. In a report which he submitted to the County Secretary, Mr. J. G. Dowling, informed the members of the Council that the person appointed by the Minister to determine the issue was Mr. R. M. Barragry, Inspector of Audits. The report recalled that when the Council last dealt with this matter of their February meeting they adopted a resolution which intimated that they would not object to the expenditure of the Regional Health Board being apportioned on a population basis. The report then stated that supplementary submissions (in addition to the Council's resolution) had been made to Mr. Barragry on June 16 under three headings. The first of these was an objection to the formula recommended by other Councils and stated:
