PENSMAN TAKES YOU BEHIND THE SPOTLIGHT

THE APPORTIONMENT SHOULD BE FAIR AND EQUITABLE

On the agenda for the County Council's meeting on the new closure of the roads in the urban area of Dungarvan, the person appointed to the Minister for Health to examine the proportions in the expenditure of the Health Board will be the urban area of Dungarvan unless the apporportionment is made on a fair and equitable basis. In all the six contributing Councils of the County of Waterford, Kilkenny, Tipperary (S.R.), Carlow and Wexford and the Corporation of Waterford City, the combined total population is almost 320,000.

The report which he submitted to the meeting, the County Secretary, Mr. J. G. Dowling, informed the members that the person appointed to the Minister to determine the case was Mr. R. M. Barry, Inspector of Audits and the report recalled that when the Council last dealt with the matter at their February meeting they adopted a resolution which intimated that they felt strongly that the expenditure should be apportioned over the contributing Councils on a population basis.

The report then stated that the preliminary submissions (in relation to the Council's resolution) had been made to Mr. Barry on June 16 and three headings. The first was an objection to the formula recommended by the Councils and stated:

"The other Councils indicated their willingness to contribute on the basis of average expenditure over the previous years, but it will be appreciated that on comparing the percentages yielded by that formula, the excess of the expenditure percentage, in the case of County Waterford over either the population or valuation percentages, is very substantially more than appears to be the case in the other areas."

One of the other two submissions dealt with the standard of service maintained by the former Waterford Health Authority of which it was stated: "Waterford can justly claim that they always maintained a very high standard of Health Services and this is reflected in the expenditure over the years preceding the establishment of the Health Board; while the last referred to the effect of an expenditure based on the average net expenditure per head of the population in each of the areas over the last 5 years. A table which accompanied this showed that the amount expended per head in Co. Waterford was just short of £20 while the next highest, Co. Kilkenny, was just a little over £15 and the lowest, for Co. Carlow, was £13.44.

From these expenditures readers will note that the per head expenditure in Waterford is almost 50% greater than the lowest figure and this will give some indication of the standard of the service being maintained in this county as compared to the others.

I remember in the past that Waterford always kept a very high standard in road maintenance but the net result of this was that Departmental grants in later years were never as much for Waterford as for other counties who had

SLAUGHTER ON THE ROADS

More than seven times as many people have died on Irish roads since 1969 than died in the Northern Ireland troubles. A total of 2,395 people have been killed in accidents in the 32 counties since 1969 and in 405 people have perished in violence in the North.

Commenting on these figures, the Secretary of the Safety First Association of Ireland, Miss A. Kelly, has stated: "The deaths in the North of Ireland due to violence have caused widespread distress and concern not only in this country but in other countries as well. Yet we are killing seven times as many people on the roads in this small country and very few people appear to be concerned about it."

"If that number of people died of some infectious disease you would have a whole series of emergency procedures brought in. But people have become so accustomed to road deaths that nothing is done. This is due to the apathy of the public."

Can it be true that we have become so inured to violence and sudden death that these

COUNTY WATERFORD TO THE FORE IN WEMBLEY EVENT

County Waterford horses were very much to the fore in the principal event at the Royal International Horse Show in Wembley (London) last Tuesday night when three figured in the final jump-off in the Moss Brothers Piusant Competition.

After three strength-sapping rounds only 4 of the original 19 starters remained in the competition and of those two were ridden by Italy's Raimondo d'Inzeo—"Gene Away" bred by Mr. Ned Foley, Kilmathomas and formerly owned by Mrs. T. D. Morgan, The Kennels, Lismore and "Believe" which was bred by Mr. Thomas McGrath, Lisfennel, Dungarvan. Another one of the four was "Manhattan," also bred in Kilmathomas by Mr. Foley and ridden by David Broome.

Captain d'Inzeo was the outright winner clearing a height of 7 ft. 2 ins. with "Gene Away". With the amazing "Believe" which also figured in his two previous major successes at the show, and which barely missed a clear round by just touching the coping, Capt. d'Inzeo shared second place with David Broome and Paddy McMahon on "Forge Mill".

All the drama was concentrated in the last round when the four horses faced the wall at a most formidable height of 7 ft. 2 ins. but only "Gene Away" succeeded in going clear to win the event.

ANOTHER OIL SPILLAGE IN DUNGARVAN HARBOUR

The foreshore along the Look-Out at Dungarvan was once again badly polluted by an oil spillage on last Monday night and a great deal of concern has been expressed at the recurrence of this pollution.

Early in June protests were made at meetings representative of the Boat Association, Sailing Club, Rowing Club and other interested parties against the rather frequent spillages which were polluting the inner harbour and causing considerable damage to boats, nets and ropes.

At the June monthly meeting of the Urban Council a report by the Acting Town Clerk, Mr. B. White, detailed six spillages which had occurred in the harbour area during the previous 15 months.

At the meeting Mr. White told the members of the Council that the Town Engineer had informed him that he was more than satisfied with the precautions now taken by the firms concerned and that it would be literally impossible to have an oil spillage by accident in the future.

Mount Sion Favourites For S.H. Quarter Final

BUT LISMORE MUST HAVE A CHANCE

Says Commentator

NEXT SUNDAY

The eagerly awaited clash between Mount Sion and Lismore in the quarter-final of the senior hurling championship at Cappoquin on next Sunday, opens up a very interesting scenario and there will be general disappointment if the clash between the two top hurling sides does not provide the highlight of this year's championship. Only a few years ago this clash between the same teams would be treated as just a formality for the city team, but not so at the present time, with Lismore having won a very high reputation by reason of their repeated success in all grades leading up to senior and their consistency in the top grade during the past two years.

Mount Sion are so concerned about this one that two weeks ago they played a trial game against Cappoquin at the venue for Sunday's clash. They realise the potential of Lismore and make no secret of their concern about the power of the chances of the Western team.

In their game against Dunhill we saw Lismore in devastating form and a repeat of that display would certainly see Mount Sion in serious trouble. Their fifteen points victory that day showed their real merit against a tough uncompromising side, who themselves had their sights set on a County title. Michael McGrath who made such a brilliant return to centre field on that day is not a certain starter for Sunday, but if the brilliant midfielder is back to partner Billy Cunningham, the Western side must be given a good chance to upset the odds. Strong in defence with such players as Denny Buckley in goal (and he can be brilliant), Jimmy Geoghegan, Billy Ormond, Patsy Quinn, and John Landers, they can be even stronger in attack with P. Foley, Liam Gannigan, Ducky Ormond, Blaine Ormond, etc. Yes they must have a chance!

What of Mount Sion? Many of those who have seen them and remained in close contact with them this year are convinced that they are now geared to recover the title. It is known since the early part of the season the Mount Sion players have been active in other championships during the past few weeks. Abbeyside are the more experienced side in the grade and on the side of maturity they may also have the edge, so they should just about win.

DUNGARVAN CLUBS ASK COUNCIL TO PURCHASE PLAYING PITCH BUT LACK OF MONEY COULD PROVE STUMBLING BLOCK

A joint deputation from the D.G.A.A. Club and the Dungarvan United Soccer Club attended last Monday night's meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council and made a request that the Council might purchase the Friary Fields at Springmount on their behalf.

The fields which contain 14 acres are the property of the Augustinian College but will no longer be required for this purpose as the new college with several playing pitches attached at Duck's...

Mr. Tom Drummeary, who acted as spokesman for the D.G.A.A. Club said that if the fields were purchased by any outside interests his club members would find themselves with nowhere to train. He pointed out that their club teams were still involved in 7 championships this year.

Mr. Drummeary told the Council that they had been in touch with the Friary Community and were informed that the price was reasonable and that the land should continue to be used for sporting purposes and if this could be arranged they would be prepared to sell for £20,000.

Mr. Michael Lyons who acted as spokesman for the Soccer Club said that if present plans by the Health Board to build a hospital go ahead they would find themselves with no pitch in September when their championships commenced. He said that the Friary Fields could be used immediately as the pitches were laid out there and if the Council would buy them he thought it would prove a viable proposition and would pay for itself over the years.

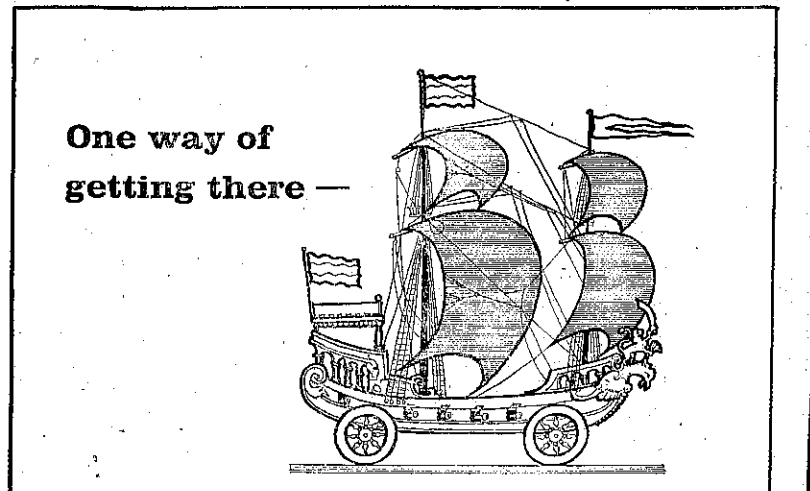
