F.F. Members Scuffle Over Northern Peace Resolution

ROW AT COUNTY COUNCIL MEETING

A resolution which was aimed at a solution of the present problems in Northern Ireland which was proposed just before the conclusion of the fortnightly meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Monday led to a brief heated discussion between two Fianna Fail members of the Council which culminated in a scuffle between them.

The exchanges developed after Mr. H. E. Dowd (F.F.) moved the motion which was seconded by Mr. J. Quirk (F.F.).

The terms of the controversial resolution were as follows:—

"That we, the members of Waterford County Council believe that our Nation's most urgent needs are: (1) Freedom from violence; (2) The release of political prisoners; (3) Withdrawal of British Army; (4) Sectarian Tolerance; (5) The Territorial Re-annexation of Ireland and (6) Justice and equal opportunities for all under one National Government."

"We further believe that those objectives cannot be achieved except by truly democratic and constitutional methods."

"We, therefore, most urgently and sincerely call upon all Irish people everywhere to reject totally the killing and maiming of human beings and the destruction of property as a means of attaining those urgent needs and, instead, to seek means of participating in a unified, constitutional and democratic approach that all rational people are hoping and praying will be pursued by the Oireachtas when the opportunity to pursue it is permitted to arise."

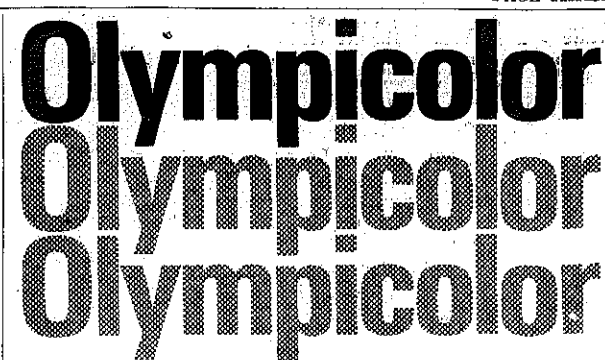
