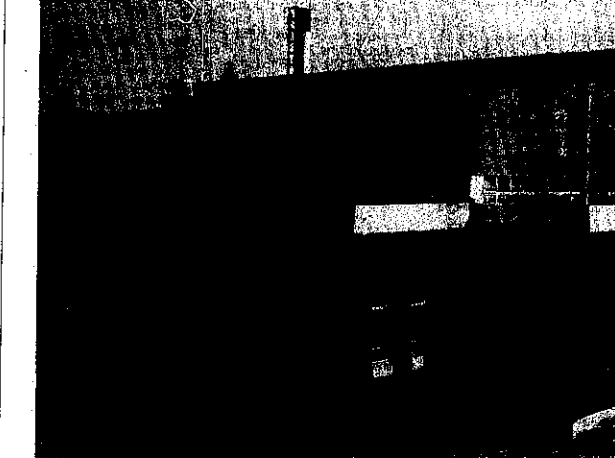

The new £1m. factory of Dungarvan Crystal Ltd., a new development Waterford Glass, at Mapstown, Dungarvan, was officially opened by Taoiseach, Mr. J. Lynch, T.D., on Friday last... WELL PAID EMPLOYMENT... Councillor Thomas Kyne, proposing the toast of "Dungarvan Crystal Ltd.," said: "In common

with almost every Urban Authority in the Republic, the Council members in Dungarvan have long sought the establishment of a worthwhile industry in our town. When the opportunity came to cooperate with the Waterford Glass Company in securing a site for their factory, the Urban Council and our County Manager, Mr. Charles O'Connor, immediately sought an option on the lands at Springmount. To the owners, Mr. and Mrs. Martin Duggan, who in the interests of the people of the town, agreed to sell the necessary site at a price the Company readily accepted, go my thanks on behalf of the Urban Council.

"Here I would like to pay tribute to the Management of Waterford Glass, who in the initial negotiations gave an undertaking that persons from the Gaeltacht and under-developed areas would be considered when the work force for the new industry was recruited. This undertaking, I am happy to say, has been honoured."

"The future of our town is now closely linked with the future success and expansion of Waterford Glass. Already over 200 boys and girls are being trained by the Company craftsmen in Dungarvan. Within the next few years, this will be increased to some 500 workers."

"The Company have not only upheld the proud reputation of the world famous Waterford Glass of over 100 years ago for its beauty and excellence but have actually enhanced that reputation, and this gives us here in Dungarvan, as well as Waterford City, prospects of a continuity of well paid employment by an all Irish Company, well known for the excellent care of its staff."

SEPARATE COMPANY... Responding to the toast, Mr. Noel Griffin, Managing Director, Waterford Glass Ltd., said: "The expansion of the Waterford Crystal Industry in Dungarvan is being carried out by a separate company, known as Dungarvan Crystal Limited."

"Already this Dungarvan factory is well established. Ample proof of its success is provided by the very important announcement today by our Chairman that we are immediately putting in hands the doubling of the existing Dungarvan factory. I doubt if this will be the last expansion and all of us have hopes that in years to come even more than 500 people will be employed in Dungarvan by our organisation."

"We are grateful for the wholehearted co-operation which we have received from those associated with the Urban Council in Dungarvan, the Waterford Council and from the many other people who enthusiastically supported our efforts. We believe that it is economic common sense to establish this factory in Dungarvan, but we also had in mind the ideal of setting up a craft industry as near as possible to the Gaeltacht."

"Indeed the proximity of Dungarvan to Ring was one of the prime considerations which made us reach our final decision. Today in the factory we all saw one whole team of glass cutters who were entirely Irish speaking. Using Irish on the shop-floor, they are producing workmanship of the highest quality."

"The whole philosophy underlying the re-establishment of the Waterford Crystal Industry many years ago was that Irishmen, given the opportunities, the leadership and the financial backing, can effectively produce goods of the highest quality and craftsmanship and sell them competitively on the markets of the world. This is the belief on which our industry is founded, the real touchstone of our success."

WATERFORD GLASS EXTENDS TO DUNGARVAN

The legendary association of glass and metal has survived the centuries. Toledo steel, Limoges ceramics, Zurich watches, they have added their own hallmarks to the products of their people. Today we have witnessed over the past 20 years the loving revival of the kind of associative tradition of Waterford, where the crystal glass making had lasted for 180 years, has so successfully revived the industry under the national name of Waterford Crystal. It is a mark of excellence throughout the five continents of the world.

The revival of the legend of Waterford glass was a formidable task but a remarkable success which has been attended to by an enterprise whose responsible to extend the legend of Waterford Crystal to the administrative headquarters of the County of Waterford, a household name across the world.

Like most modern industrial processes, glass-making is still a handicraft. True, the most enlightened management techniques have been brought to bear in the industry. The factory in Dungarvan is brightly lit and the interior and layout of the plant carefully planned to enable teams of craftsmen to work efficiently and productively. However, the crystal itself, in spite of the product of the skill and dedication of men working together in a team. These craftsmen, as at Waterford, are a mixture of chemists.

crystal is still mouth blown and hand cut as it was in the olden days. Some of the Waterford pieces have to be engraved. This is entirely free-hand work, from photographs and drawings, and when finished, the design stands out in three dimensions. Excellent examples of this "sculpture on glass" were the presentation pieces, depicting The Magi, which were produced at Waterford last year. The response to these beautiful pieces was so immediate throughout the Company's worldwide markets that the subscription list for the limited number available was filled shortly after their production began.

While men predominate in the Dungarvan Crystal factory, there are, naturally, many areas, such as picking, inspection and finishing, where women play an important role. The checking of the crystal at every stage in its manufacture is one of their most responsible jobs. Each piece of Waterford Crystal is indelibly stamped, usually on the base, with the word "Waterford." The stamping is very faint in order not to spoil the glass and can be seen only if held to a certain light. But connoisseurs do not need to look for this stamp. They recognise in every piece of Waterford the signature of the craftsmen who created it.

Dungarvan, although only thirty miles from Waterford, has never had a tradition of glass-making. But, with their usual pragmatic optimism, the Waterford Company set about creating one in the area.

Early last year, management representatives visited the Dungarvan schools and carried out initial tests of the students. Selected youngsters were then brought to the Waterford plant for a full day's aptitude test before being engaged as apprentice craftsmen.

Next came the problem of training. Over a hundred people were involved and they were all in their teens, so Waterford's management decided that the most practical solution was to provide on the spot, full-time courses in

the Dungarvan area by senior Waterford craftsmen.

Two temporary training schools were set up in January, 1971, a year before the factory came on stream. One, a glass cutting school, was situated in the grounds of the Waterford Co-operative Fruit Growers' Association premises and the other, for training in glass blowing, in the embryo factory.

When the factory building was completed, the young apprentices were phased into the actual production. Their training, however, will continue for the full, five-year apprentice term.

The training plant has worked well. Mr. Noel Griffin, the Company's Managing Director, commenting on it, said: "The standard

of the Dungarvan apprentices is very high. Irish people are naturally quick and alert, but it is these young people's keenness and enthusiasm which we find so impressive."

The intake and training of apprentices have continued over the past eighteen months. Now 240 people are employed in the Dungarvan plant. Thirty of them come from An Rinn and Baile na nGall, the first Gaeltacht area five miles south of Dungarvan town.

PROXIMITY TO GAELTACHT

Indeed one of the reasons why Waterford Glass chose Dungarvan as the site for its new plant was its proximity to this Gaeltacht region. "Our industry," said Mr. Griffin,

"which has its roots so firmly embedded in the history of Waterford will transplant naturally to the Dungarvan area. We believe that this is a practical move to support the Ring Gaeltacht. And because of the highly skilled work it entails and the reputation which its products enjoy, I myself feel that there is a psychological benefit, apart altogether from the economic benefits which the industry will undoubtedly bring to the people of the Gaeltacht."

This broad vision of an industry's objectives has been explicitly stated by the Chairman of Waterford Glass, Mr. P. W. McGrath. Speaking at the opening of the Company's Sports & Social Centre earlier this year, he said: "Ever since the revival of the Waterford Crystal Glass industry it has been the policy of those connected with it to ensure that the success of the industry would benefit all those working in it not only financially but also socially and culturally and, furthermore, be of value to the community as a whole."

This is an inherited tradition for these were the ideals which inspired the men who, twenty years ago, started the industry.

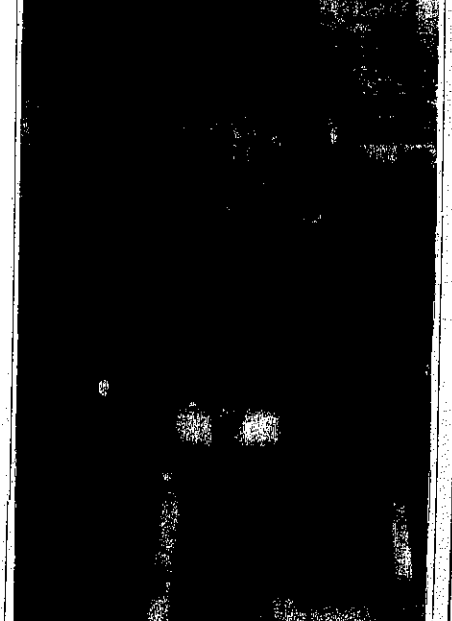

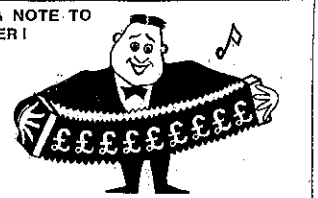
