CLEARING THE STREETS
A great deal of work was done on Tuesday last by the members of the Council who cleared the streets to enable the workers to put up the new parking signs. One of the things that impressed Fred most was the wonderful prosperity of the country since he left it 45 years ago. This delighted him a great deal. Another feature of his visit which brought him much pleasure was the fine weather. His stay here coincided with the wonderful spell of weather which we had in July—he said he never remembered such weather in Ireland in the old days!

Before going back to America Fred and his wife visited another brother, Mr. Robert Templeton in Dublin and his sisters Isabel and Kathleen in Birmingham. Both returned across the Atlantic bringing with them many happy memories of a most enjoyable holiday.

CROWDS THROG LISMORE FOR FESTIVAL WEEK

CARNIVAL ATMOSPHERE IN TOWN
Lismore's annual festival was favoured by the weather on Sunday when record crowds patronised the many attractions of the first day's programme.

The festival was officially opened by Tomas Roseingrave, national director of Muintir na Tire, who delivered a most inspiring address on the concept of the community. "It was," he said, "a concept which had gained a new importance in the past few years with the growth of a concern for civil rights, the dignity of the human person and the ill effects of urbanisation. Economic development had not been equally distributed and an adjustment must now take place, but only if the will is to be found in the people of the local communities. Sound, constructive leadership was necessary and vague and grandiose notions of socialism would not put money in the pockets or food in the mouths of those in need."

NEIGHBOURLINESS
Communities can look after their under privileged and deprived in practical ways; this is community responsibility, a sense of neighbourliness, a sense of concern for the neighbour. There was a great potential to be developed for the improvement of the economic, cultural, social and recreational life of the community.

"Plans and programmes must take account of people and people must be given the opportunity to express themselves and to become involved in decision-making. The need for community action becomes more urgent as the power of decision making appears to be receding more and more from the people. Today's festival was a result of united effort and should be a spur of encouragement for future progress. Towns like Lismore ought to be the focal points of development. We needed confidence and hope in ourselves. We enjoyed a superior tradition and culture and need have no inhibitions about our ability to adapt to change."

Mr. Roseingrave was introduced to the very large gathering by Mr. P. Vaughan, chairman of the Community Centre committee, promoters of this year's festival to raise funds for the proposed new centre. Speaking in Irish and English, Mr. Vaughan appealed for support for the centre project. It must, he said, be a genuine community effort, not one for the committee alone. Other speakers were Very Rev. Dean Mays and Very Rev. T. Canon Cassidy, P.P., V.F., and the platform party included Mr. F. Geoghegan, Mr. K. Fenton, Mr. J. Moore, Mrs. R. Campion, Mr. T. Murphy and Mr. C. O'Keefe.

Introduction of Value-Added Tax

The Value-Added Tax Act is now law and the tax will come into operation on 1st November, 1972. Turnover Tax and Wholesale Tax will be abolished from that date.

A Guide to the Value-Added Tax has been prepared. Copies of the Guide will be issued during the next few days to persons who are registered for turnover tax.

Additional copies of the Guide will be available after 10th August, and they may then be obtained free of charge from offices of Inspectors of Taxes and from the Revenue Commissioners (Supply Branch), Dublin Castle, Dublin 2. The Guide is not available from the Government Publications Sale Office.

Two young Dungarvan sailing enthusiasts were involved in a two-hour sea drama off Hellick Head on last Sunday evening at about 5.30 p.m., as they clung to their upturned boat before being rescued by a deep-sea angling vessel launched from Dungarvan.

The alarm had been raised by members of the staff of the Quigley Magnesite Plant at Ballinacorney, who telephoned the Garda Barracks in Dungarvan when they saw the dinghy capsized.

Michael, Midelby and Donal Walsh, both of Main Street, Dungarvan and both in their early twenties, had gone on a sailing trip in Michael's light dinghy, "Fireball". Shortly after 5 o'clock, while midway between Hellick Pier and Ballinacorney, the boat was overturned by strong winds and both men thrown into the choppy seas.

The sail was smashed. Despite all their efforts they were unable to get the boat upright again. Fortunately, both were wearing lifebelts and succeeded in climbing onto the upturned dinghy.

Their plight was soon noticed by members of the Quigley Magnesite Staff at Ballinacorney who rang the local Garda Barracks.

They immediately alerted Dungarvan Boats Ltd. and a deep-sea angling boat, skippered by Mr. William Murphy of Ring, and accompanied by local Garda, set off on its rescue mission.

DISTRICT JUSTICE CARROLL APPOINTED TO SPECIAL CRIMINAL COURT

The Government has appointed four additional members to the Special Criminal Court, following heavy pressure of work on the existing three judges.

The new members are Mr. Justice O'Carroll, President of the High Court; Judge Patrick N. Ryan, Judge of the Circuit Court; District Justice William A. Torney, and District Justice Bernard J. Carroll.

The Court previously consisted of only three judges, the minimum number of members to constitute the Court at any particular sitting. The three existing members are: Mr. Justice Griffin, of the High Court; Judge J. Conroy, of the Circuit Court; and Justice Cathal O'Flainn, President of the District Court.

District Justice Bernard J. Carroll, of Strokestown, Co. Roscommon, was educated by the Marist Brothers, Strokestown, and in St. Joseph's College, Garbally Park, Ballinacorney. After qualifying as a solicitor in 1946 he practised at Ballyvaughis, Co. Mayo.

From 1949 to 1952 he was Assistant State Solicitor in the Circuit Court and Justice Cathal O'Flainn, President of the District Court. In 1958 he was appointed as Curk City Solicitor. In 1969 he was appointed a temporary district justice and six months later, took his oath of office on his permanent appointment.

District Justice Carroll's areas include Dungarvan, Cappoquin, Lismore, Tallow, Ardmore and Youghal.

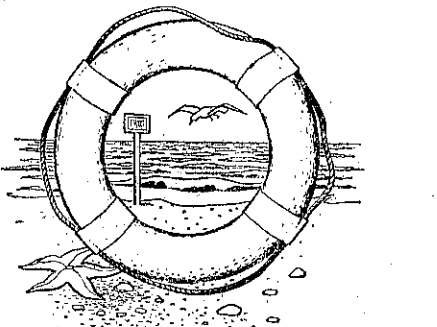

TOUR CYCLISTS HERE
