PENSMAN TAKES YOU BEHIND THE SPOTLIGHT

TOUR CYCLISTS HERE

The eighth Dunlop 8-day Tour of Ireland Cycle Race will start on Sunday with over 100 cyclists vying for the major prize of £1,000 (Friday) and there will be a night stage stop at Dungarvan.

The cyclists will enter Dungarvan from the Ballydoole side along the Shonohore road and on to the Square where the finish will take place.

The local Dungarvan Athletic Club members under Mr. P. O'Connell will be in charge of organising the stage and with their experience of former occasions anything should be run off most satisfactorily.

SEA ANGLING IN DUNGARVAN

After a rather disastrous start to the season, common to practically all areas in the country because of the variable fall-out in the number of cross-channel tourists, the Dungarvan Sea Angling Club has been reporting a big increase in business in recent weeks.

The Club and its sister company, Dungarvan Boats Ltd. which supplies the craft to many anglers to and from the fishing grounds in the harbour had fallen on their feet during the week in fact, for some time, anglers were rife, that the situation was beginning to fall austerly with boats being wrong and not being available when anglers turned up to go.

It is true any of these things were I am not able to say because I have no personal knowledge, beyond complaints which were made by disappointed visitors who came to Dungarvan to do a spot of sea-fishing.

However, I am now aware that things generally in relation to the Club have taken a turn for the better and under the direction of Mr. Seamus Baumann, action of the Angling Centre on the quay is again booming. Mr. Baumann, who is a very busy man in his own business, has amazed everyone since he took over by his indefatigable manner and in finding the energy and time to arrange everything to the satisfaction of all concerned.

BEHIND THE SPOTLIGHT

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Last week-end I happened into Lawlor's Hotel which has become the headquarters of hundreds of Dutch and Belgian angling visitors during the last few years and there I saw a new group fresh arrived from Cork after being air-lifted from Amsterdam and Sev was with them, busily engaged arranging for boat accommodation and departure times.

Dungarvan is now a booming industrial town but it has also a great tourist potential, not the least of which is what it can offer in the line of sea-fishing. It would be a great pity if anything should happen to see the Sea Angling Club go out of commission and Mr. Baumann, Mr. Eoin Goode, P.R.O., Mr. Nick Cleary and others associated with them, bringing new life to it are to be congratulated on putting so much of their time and energy into something which can be of so much benefit to the town.

The Club should receive another big boost by the International 3-day festival sponsored by Quigley Magistrate which is due to commence on the 24th of this month and which has attracted entries from leading sea anglers from Ireland and several European countries.

SHE REMEMBERS OLD DUNGARVAN

A letter from Australia which reached the "Leader" Office lately came from Mrs. M. Geraghty of Springvale, Victoria, through an old native of Dungarvan who has recently become a subscriber for the "Leader." She was put in touch with us by Rev. Jack O'Regan a member of the Oblate Order, now doing mission work in Australia, himself a member of an old Dungarvan family who still keeps up his associations with the town.

DANNY BOY

A request has come to me to request the "Leader" to publish that old song with the haunting, nostalgic air, "Danny Boy," and it is with pleasure that I can oblige.

They say that this was an old recruiting song for the British Army in Ireland years ago but be that as it may the song is still a beautiful one and is one worthy of inclusion in any song session.

Actually, the story behind the song as I heard it concerned a father up in Derry whose two elder sons joined the British Army during the 1914-18 War, as indeed did so many other sons throughout the entire country at the time. Like so many others, the light of their young lives was quenched in Flanders. He was then left with only his youngest son, Don, who eventually came of age for military service and joined up. The father was heart-broken as he accompanied the boy to the military barracks and there in the last Monday selected and we know the appointment of Mr. Stephen O'Connor as Group General Manager. He will be Chief Executive of the new organisation.

Prior to this appointment Mr. O'Connor was General Manager of the dairy division of the original Waterford Co-operative, a native of Glenmore, Co. Kilkenny. Mr. O'Connor left University College, Cork in 1952 and spent a short period with the Piltown Creamery in Co. Kilkenny, before joining the Waterford Co-op in 1953. He has served in every department of the organisation since he joined it. He is currently a Director of Kilmacdonagh Creamery Ltd. and Wexford Creamery Ltd.

RADIO NAVIGATION SERVICE

On a brief visit to Ardmore recently my attention was attracted to a change in the sky-line in the form of a tall, slim steel mast. My curiosity whetted, I made inquiries and learned that it was part of the new radio navigation service for which there will be a station in Ardmore for the benefit of trawlers fishing along this part of the coast.

The mast station is located in Oramore in the Co. Galway and the complex includes other sub-stations in Co. Kerry (Ballydoole) and Co. Donegal (Dungannon).

When the service becomes operative, expected sometime at the end of the year, it is hoped it will boost fish landings by as much as 25 per cent. Up to the minute reports of fish movements will inform trawler skippers of the best grounds to fish while it will also be a boon in bad weather conditions.

It is good to see such a service being provided for our trawler men who have to face the hazards of the sea in good weather and in bad, in summer and in winter.

Leading European Sea Anglers for

Dungarvan

ANNUAL GOLD MEDAL INTERNATIONAL FESTIVAL

Leading anglers from many European countries will compete in the three-day Dungarvan Gold Medal International Deep Sea Angling Festival, which opens on Friday, August 25.

The event, organised by the Dungarvan Sea Angling Club and sponsored by the Quigley Magistrate Division of the Pfizer Chemical Corporation, has drawn a top class entry of up to 100 anglers from Holland, Belgium, West Germany, Britain and Ireland.

Previous medal winners competing again include Joe Litter (GB), Louis Delcourt (Belgium), Tony Van der Pot (Holland), A. Dekker (Holland), Tony Gibson (Derry) and Captain A. O'Hara (Dublin).

GROWING IN STATURE

The festival has been continually growing in stature and the organisers have agreed to an approach by the Irish Federation of Sea Anglers to have the International Competition incorporated in the programme this year. Consequently, the four top anglers from the Provinces will be in opposition for the special prize on Saturday, August 26.

The Festival will be officially opened on August 24 and will conclude on the Sunday night with the Pfizer awards presentation banquet in Lawlor's Hotel.

I HAVE BEEN BLACKGUARDED BY SOME RATE COLLECTORS COMPLAINS COUNCILLOR CAHILL

Moving a motion at last Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan that all ratepayers receiving any form of Social Welfare Benefits be exempted from rates, Councillor Cahill, Kilmeadan, said that his heart was broken by some rate collectors who went around to see what these people who were entitled to exemption from rates had for their breakfast and whether they could afford to smoke.

Mr. C. A. O'Connor, Co. Manager said that the suggestion which had originally been made by the Minister had not been adopted by the Council because the Minister had made no funds available to meet the cost which would have to be paid out of the rates. He added that the Council had agreed that at the end of each year any cases affected should each be dealt with on its merits and this was being done.

Mr. Cahill — This resolution was not adopted by every other county in the country and we should adopt it here too. I won't stand for it any longer. Mr. A. Deasy said that a lot of what Mr. Cahill said was correct and that it was much easier to get a rebate on rates collected through the Council's office collection than by rate collectors. The Council officials were more considerate on these matters than the rate collectors. Mr. T. Kynne said that he had two cases in point but he would not go to the rate collectors about them but the Co. Manager. "I don't know why you go to the rate collectors about these matters," he said.

Mr. Cahill said that the officials might be considered but the rate collectors were not. He had the case of one unfortunate widow woman who was told by a rate collector to do away with the cigarettes she was smoking and to pay her rates instead. "I have been blackguarded by some of these rate collectors and called a liar," said Cllr. Cahill "but I won't stand for it any longer."

Mr. C. Curran said that the motion was one which could not be passed at that meeting as the Council would have to go into the costings of it. "Poor people are being treated very decently in this County," said Mr. Curran.

Mr. K. O'Ryan said that he was surprised to hear Mr. Cahill talk about rate collectors as he did. He recalled that on the last occasion when a proposal was before the Council to have rates collected through the Council's office, Mr. Cahill was opposed to it and wanted to have rate collectors appointed.

Finally when the Co. Manager stated that he would have the costings of the motion prepared it was agreed to adjourn the matter until the September meeting.

It was explained that planning for the Home was well advanced and work should begin in a year or so.

Cllr. Curran raised the question of providing homes for the aged in Co. Waterford and the provision of home help for old people. A report on the matter will be provided.

One farmer visitor to the I.F.A. Stand summed up the situation very well when he said: It is now more important to support firms like "Cappagh Lime" who responded beautifully than it was to support the campaign itself.

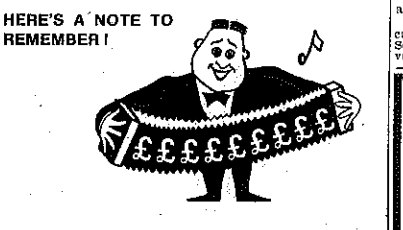

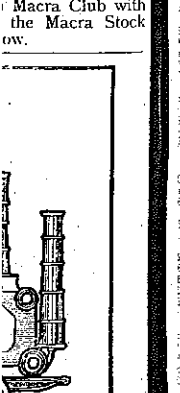
