Complaints by Council Tenants in Dungarvan

Three tenants of Council houses came before last Monday night's meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council as separate deputations to complain about conditions in their houses.

Mrs. O'Leary, 49, Murphy Place, Abbeyside, said that she had been waiting for over 20 years for a range because she was unable to use what was there. She threatened to withhold paying her rent unless something was now done about the matter and before leaving she mounted a personal attack on the Chairman, Mr. T. Kyne, stating that he had never been any good as a T.D. or as a member of the Council.

Mr. Whelan, Cathal Brughna Place, then came before the meeting to complain that his next door neighbours, the Moylans, kept a houseful of dogs which were causing his great annoyance. He also threatened that if the Council did nothing to abate this nuisance that he would pay no rent.

Chairman—It looks as if most of our tenants will be paying rent soon.
Mr. E. Fitzgerald, Congress Villas, was the third tenant referred to previous meetings but he had attended. He claimed that the Chairman had made a personal attack on him on the last occasion and said that this was being looked after in other quarters.

Subsequently the Council discussed the matters raised and the Town Engineer stated in relation to Mrs. O'Leary that the range at her house needed repairs but they were waiting for the parts required from the suppliers. If these could not be got without too long a delay he would have the old range replaced.

In regard to the problem of the dogs, the Acting Town Clerk, Mr. A. White, stated that he had already written to the Moylans telling them that they would have to remove the dogs from the property. They had sent him a reply saying that they would do so but apparently this had not been done.

Mr. C. O'Connor, Co. Manager, said that there was a section in the Housing Act under which possession of the house could be recovered from the Moylans if they failed to carry out the instructions of the Council to remove the dogs.

Referring to repairs complained about by Mr. Fitzgerald, the Town Engineer said he would look into the matter.

FARMERS ANNOYED OVER INCREASE IN FERTILISER PRICES

The Irish Farmers' Association Industrial & Transport Committee expressed dissatisfaction that the National Prices Commission has approved an increase in the fertiliser prices before having a thorough assessment made of the scope for absorbing cost increases by improving the efficiency and productivity of the fertiliser industry.

Mr. Eugene Scanton, Chairman of the Industrial & Transport Committee, said that farmers were now finding it necessary to concentrate more than ever before on achieving the highest possible level of productivity in their own farm enterprises. They were entitled to expect a corresponding effort from industries supplying agricultural requirements. Such an exercise would be directly to the advantage of the fertiliser industry itself in terms of its own survival under free trade conditions in the immediate future.

Exciting finish to Dungarvan Stage of Raleigh-Dunlop Tour of Ireland Race

The 7th stage of the Raleigh-Dunlop Tour of Ireland race which ended in Dungarvan last Friday provided a thrilling finish which was watched by a big number of spectators. Best in an 8-man sprint for the line was young Kieran McQuaid the Dublin-born member of the 4-man Irish Olympic Squad who travel to Munich this week and he won from Brendan Ferris (Fairreagh) of the London Chequers Club third.

The stage which began in Fermoy covered 94 miles the first 32 of which saw the riders travel along narrow winding roads as far as Youghal. They came on to Liscrore and then as they went up the Vee all were together. Having reached the top the riders went down hill on a 12 miles circuit before they came back up the Vee again for a second King of the Hills prime and then they went on to Cappoquin and Dungarvan.

**Tallow and Round About Notes**

**Tallow's Great Horse Fair Festival Opens on Sunday Next**—Tallow's Great Annual Horse Fair Festival opens on Sunday next, August 27th and an action packed programme will provide entertainment for visitors to the nine day festival. It is the popularity which has surrounded previous festivals is any criterion then this year's festival is virtually assured of success.

Last year's festival of Tallow surpassed the Committee's wildest dreams as it drew fantastic crowds. The festival lasts from August 27th to September 4th. The closing date will also be the date of the 'Great Horse Fair' which on account of the traditional date, September 3rd following on Sunday this year the fair will be held on Monday, 4th September.

Tallow's festival is now highly acclaimed as one of Munster's best and we venture to say a far more ideal location for a festival could not be found than Tallow. The festival is held in the valley of the Bride, a combination of a festival atmosphere on the streets with open air dancing, talent competitions and impromptu music is aimed for each night.

In tracing Tallow's tradition one has to stretch into the misty past which so often baffles our curiosity and yet arouses it all the more. There is scarcely a tract of land in Ireland so full of historic interest as there is about the district around Tallow, with its castles and keeps going back centuries. But so much for that we will now take a look at the programme for Festival Week and we will find in it many new innovations.

The official opening takes place at the Square on Sunday, August 27th at 7 p.m. Gary Street of the Fairways Showband will perform the opening ceremony earlier on Sunday. The first Tallow tennis championships will be played at the tennis court and at 2 p.m. also a 40 mile road cycle race under B.L.E. rules will be held. This is sponsored by O'Brien Bros, Garage, Tallow, it starts at the Square at 2.30 p.m. The race will go via Curraglass, turning right at Mogeely to Harry Hill's Cross, turning right here again for Tallow Bridge and back to Tallow. There will be five circuits of this course. Entries for this race have been received from all over Ireland.

At 7 p.m. the official opening as aforementioned will take place. At 7.45 p.m. there will be an adult fancy dress parade led by the Castleyons Pipe Band with £40 in prize money. At 8.30 p.m. Tony Hegarty will be on stage at the Square and music and singing, also John O'Hea guitar and songs. Heat of spot the talent competition for which there is prize money of 250, also Annette Stapleton, accordion and banjo and from 10.2 a.m. the opening dance in the Arch Ballroom commences with Dick and the Royal Showband supplying the music.

On Saturday, 2nd September at 7.30 p.m. in the Bucket Race should bring plenty of laughs. A Banana Eating Competition will follow and at 8 p.m. a Dancing Competition will be held on stage for which there are valuable prizes. At 9 p.m. the final of the Spot the Talent Competition and at 10 p.m. the final of the Arch Ballroom commences with Dick and the Royal Showband supplying the music.

On Sunday, September 3rd at 2 p.m. Horse and Pony Races will be held in the Golden Acres near the town by kind permission of Mr. Con Ryan with £120 prize money. However, whether 'Marrigo' the horse that Napoleon rode at Waterloo was bred at Tallow and sold at Cahermee is true or not, Tallow area is famous for its horses and though we hear much talk of horses being on the way out a visit to Tallow on Horse Fair day will be this, for every year it has its streets almost impassable with horses and buyers from many counties attending this fair which now ranks as one of the three great horse fairs in Ireland. At 7.30 p.m. on horse fair evening Glenna Ballad Group with Conna Quartet and Guest Artists will be on stage at the Square and at 10 p.m. the grand closing dance will be held in the Arch to the music of the Cotton Mill Boys.

The Chairman of the Festival Committee, Mr. Tom Beecher, his energetic Secretary, Mr. Dick Pratt and other Committee members are deserving of the highest praise for the very fine programme which is being presented at this year's festival and we wish them every success. Well that's it for Tallow festival 1972 and we hope all will enjoy themselves to their hearts content and we almost forget there is a bar extension each night.

**Telephone Facilities At Kiltwatermoy**—Mr. Declan Ahearne, M.C.C., has received the following letter from the Secretary of the Waterford County Council with reference to a motion in his name that was passed at the May meeting of the County Council regarding the erection of a telephone kiosk at Kiltwatermoy. The Secretary enclosed a copy of a letter received from the Chief Contracts Manager Department of Posts and Telegraphs as follows:—Please refer to your letter of the 17th of May, 1972, conveying a request from the County Council for provision of a telephone kiosk at Kiltwatermoy, Tallow, Co. Waterford. The position is that under the Department's current programme for more rapid extension of telephone kiosk facilities in rural areas, call offices in local Post Offices which are used to a fair extent are being replaced by kiosks. The inclusion in the programme of such places as Kiltwatermoy where there is no Post Office is not envisaged and it is regretted therefore that it is not possible to accede to the Council's request. **Daonsoil Na Mumhan in Ring**

Opening the week-long Daonsoil na Mumhan in Ring, on last Saturday night, Aodhagna Bricson, B.Arch., said the arts could not flourish in Ireland until they were given their rightful place in the educational system.

In spite of all the reports and in spite of all the complaints that had been made about the standard of art education in Ireland, he said very little had been done over the last 30 years to rectify the position. Some improvements had been made, in as much as the new curricula allows more scope for teaching of the arts in the schools, but due to the shortage of properly trained teachers and lack of facilities full advantage of these changes could not be availed of.

Although the authorities are repeatedly reminded of the shortcomings of the National College of Art, these have not yet been remedied and it will be another few years before the necessary buildings are erected while proper courses under the direction of competent artists, designers and craftsmen also need to be provided.

**ENVIRONMENT**—Similar difficulties seemed to beset musical education. There weren't sufficient teachers and there was also a great lack of facilities. While expenditure on education in general had been greatly increased, the college of music didn't get a fair share. The speaker appeared to be the Chairman of the educational system while there was also a danger that, with the desire to provide additional classroom accommodation as soon and as cheaply as possible, architectural standards would be lowered. If they wished to develop the artistic sensibilities of their children it was important that they should be educated in a pleasant physical environment.

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**WARBLE FLY ERADICATION SCHEME, 1972**

This Scheme will be operated on the same general lines as the Warble Fly Eradication Scheme, 1971. The treatment period is from 15th August to 15th November, 1972.

The charge for treatment is 2tp per animal. Each herdowner will be notified in advance by his Artificial Insemination Station of the arrangements for treating his herd. On the appointed day he should have

- \* all cattle housed or in a yard
- \* help ready for the operators; this is essential if the job is to be done satisfactorily
- \* the correct blue card for each animal or
- \* a list of the ear tag numbers of animals for which blue cards are not available
- \* water, soap and a towel.

Untagged animals will be tagged at the time of treatment. Do not postpone treatment. The operators have a very full schedule and will not have time for return visits. From 16th November 1972 persons having cattle without current certificates of treatment for warbles will be liable to prosecution.

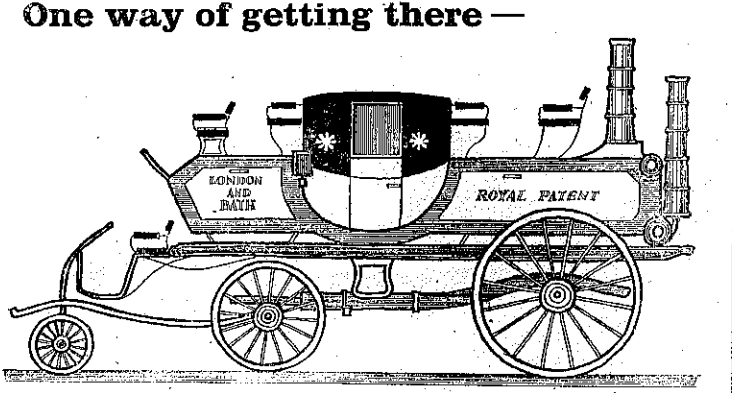
