Is the reporter more concerned about "selling" a story than with the facts and therefore more inclined to dress it up in as sensational a manner as possible. Are newspaper editors not so concerned as to whether the facts of a story are correct as they are with a story that will provide them with screaming banner head-lines: One time the catch-cry was "the truth in the news." How far have we wandered from that path in these days?
