The Tramore Road Race — a very attractive 7 miles walking race, sponsored by Harp Lager — attracted local athletes last Sunday. In the men's race Jim Sheehan (6th) was the best performer, though P. Power, J. O'Mahony, Nicky Sheehan tried to match stride with Glenmore's J. Hartley. The Ladies Race, however, was a much more exciting affair. Here the winner was also a young Glenmore (Co. Kilkenny) athlete, but she was pressed all the way by Catherine Moore (Dungarvan A.C.). Both these young athletes finished 1st and 2nd respectively in the Ladies Race and in the u-16 event, and Catherine Moore seems to have met a worthy opponent in the Kilkenny cabin. However, the Dungarvan girl had not trained regularly for the event and one feels that with a little more regular practice she could indeed be a force in walking races. The marathon scheduled for last Monday fell through, so Tony Ryan now goes forward to represent Co. Waterford in the Community Games at Sautry.

But a complete transformation took place immediately after the resumption. Four goals were scored in a matter of three minutes (three for Bire Oge and one for Dungarvan). This brought the game to life and gave us a hectic 25 minutes. Further scores were within their grasp, tried desperately to pull the game out of the mire. Dungarvan, however, recovered midway through the half and finished the better side with a deserving 11 points to 2.

Their score should have been sufficient to win any game. Full marks to Ballyduff—they have shown tremendous improvement since winning the junior title last year and a little improvement in defence would have been a favourable chance to win the intermediate title. Both these games were superbly contested and were handled by referee, J. J. Lawrence.

Ardrone 0-4 Ballyduff 2-13 The scores here suggests Ballyduff were well on top all through this under 21 football semi-final and any game must install the champions as favourites to retain the title again. Kiltie 1-10 Mitchella 1-5 The scores here suggests Kiltie superiorly over their opponents as the winners were never in real danger after the restart. As a spectacle this was a disappointing semi-final which was tough and full-blooded. During the game and county play, the Lanning hurler, who was injured in Ardrone hospital, head injury which resulted in a concussion. Kiltie played splendid football and on their display will be but a matter of time before they will be the champions of the county final.

Hunhill 6-3 Portlough 7-7 This was a shock result as we expected the winners of the losers' group to put up a splendid performance against the champions. It was a tough and exciting battle and at times the clashes were of the dangerous kind.
