#### FORMER DUNGARVAN AUGUSTINIAN STUDENT ORDAINED IN ENGLAND

Rev. David Kieley, whose father hailed from Strabally, has been ordained in England following his ordination in Shirehampton, Bristol, on August 28. Fr. Kieley received his secondary education at St. Thomas More's, Eastville, Bristol, and the Augustinian College, Dungarvan. He was raised to the priesthood by Right Rev. Joseph Ruddenham, Bishop of Clifton, in St. Bernard's Church, Shirehampton. It was the first ever ordination ceremony in that church. He is son of Mr. and Mrs. Kieley, who took up residence in Middleton, Co. Cork, last year.

Due to the agitation he carried on, Michael Byrne got all this changed and in addition, for the first time, the men received some tobacco while the women were given snuff. No longer had they to endure the stigma of being called paupers with the pauper's brand on the clothes which they wore.

Michael Byrne's life-long humanitarian interests are commemorated in a plaque set in the wall at the entrance to Dungarvan Town Hall and erected some years ago by the Dungarvan Council of Trade Unions. The plaque reads: "Councillor Michael Byrne R.I.P. Member of Dungarvan Urban District Council, 1908-1918 and Board of Guardians 1913-1917. In grateful remembrance of his untiring and successful efforts to secure concessions and comfort for the inmates of the institutions under the control of the Board. He spent his public life fighting for the interests of his fellow-workers."

### CLOSING PUBS ON GOOD FRIDAY

#### ARCHAIC LAW SHOULD BE AMENDED COMMENTS SOLICITOR AT YOUGHAL COURT

A suggestion that in the event of the drafting of amendments to the constitution in the hope of achieving the unification of the country, Good Friday be made an "open day" for publicans, was made at Youghal District Court before District Justice J. Carroll last Friday.

It came from Mr. Patrick J. Lavan, Solicitor, who appeared for a local publican, Bridget McCarthy, Main Street, who had pleaded guilty to a breach of the licensing laws on Good Friday.

Garda W. Hunt gave evidence of finding 21 people drinking on the premises.

Mr. Lavan said they were all customers and there was a tradition of custom in the town of Youghal whereby "regulars" were given a drink on a Good Friday.

The Justice said if such was the case the publicans should try and have the law amended. The law as he understood it was very strict in regard to the opening of licensed premises on a Good Friday, and while that law existed he would uphold it.

Mr. Lavan said it was clearly an archaic law and might be amended in the revision of the constitution which seemed imminent in an effort to unify the country.

### NINE AGRICULTURAL INSTRUCTORS IN COUNTY—BUT MORE NEEDED SAYS C.A.O.

#### £1 Million Boost For Farmers If....

A 10% increase in livestock numbers in County Waterford would result in an additional output of about £1,000,000 annually, Mr. George T. Frost, C.A.O., told members of the Committee of Agriculture at last Monday's meeting in Dungarvan.

Mr. Frost said that a 10% increase was quite attainable and that he would go all out to achieve it. He said that a 10% increase would mean a tremendous financial boost for the farming community of the county, he said.

Mr. Frost's revelation followed remarks by Mr. Tom Foley who estimated that there was great concern among farmers who were unable to get the services of members of the County Agricultural Instructors for "weeks on end". Never was there a greater need for farm instruction than at the present time, he said, and he wondered if in fact they had a sufficient number of instructors.

### FAR AWAY TRIPS FOR COUNTY WATERFORD AGRICULTURAL INSTRUCTORS

Approval for a member of the advisory staff of the County Waterford Committee of Agriculture to undertake a two-weeks Pig Production Study Programme in Holland and France this morning was given at last Monday's meeting of the Committee in Dungarvan.

The programme will last from September 11th to the 28th and the participant will be Mr. Laurence Curran, Ballydoon.

Mr. George T. Frost, C.A.O., said the Committee would be responsible for only one-third of the cost which would come to £90. He recommended that Mr. Curran be sent.

### NEW ZEALAND VISIT

Leave of absence was also granted to Mr. Austin Penton, B.A.S., to study dairying in that country.

Mr. Frost said Mr. Penton would be away for about four weeks but he was undertaking the trip entirely with his own financial means.

**Big Crowds At Festival** — It was a week of fun and gaiety in the Bridestown town for the annual festival. Other good news is that the festival, there may be something different from the festival that is being held in the town. The comprehensive programme showed that the festival committee had worked hard to ensure that the bowl of success which was won by the town in the year's festival was handed over to the friends who visited this town on the 27th to August 27th to September 4th, and the entertainment and catering arrangements.

The thanks of all is due to the festival committee for their expert handling of the various events during the week in which everything went according to plan. The Garda also deserve high praise for their expertise in controlling the very heavy traffic during the festival. #### IMPORTANT STATEMENT ON VALUE ADDED TAX

It is extremely important that adequate measures be taken to ensure that farmers, as producers, are properly compensated for Value Added Tax paid by them on their inputs, said Mr. T. J. Maher, President of the I.F.A., in a statement.

He said: "We accept that it is the Government's intention that no tax be borne by producers of any commodity, but that it should be a consumer tax. This being the case, we insist that the measures used to compensate farmers for tax on their inputs be adequate and be seen to be adequate."

Farmers generally are now in the process of building up their productive capacity, in order that they and the country in general can derive maximum early benefit from EEC membership," he went on. "Any inefficiency in compensating farmers for tax borne will simply reduce the amount of investment funds at farmers' disposal."

"The Government accepted our recommendation that fertilisers and feedstuffs be zero-rated. We are disappointed that they did not see fit to take the next logical step, and zero-rate farm machinery. We fully accept that in the case of some items such as tractors this would cause difficulties. Nevertheless, there are many items of farm machinery which cannot possibly be used in any other type of activity. We believe that these should also be zero-rated, in order to ensure that the system functions as it is intended to."

"In our submission to the Minister for Finance, made jointly with the I.A.O.S., we concluded with a recommendation to the effect that prices generally be kept under close scrutiny during a period after the introduction of the tax, to guard against the possibility that it might be used as a cover for unjustified price increases. This is important to farmers, both as producers and as consumers."

"Many farmers are wondering about the question of registration. Under the VAT system as set out in the Act, a farmer would find it worthwhile to register if his purchases of taxable inputs—that is, generally speaking, all inputs of goods other than feedstuffs and fertilisers—amount in value to the equivalent of one-fifth or more of the total value of his sales. This is a figure of about 10% of his total sales. We will shortly be producing a comprehensive guide to the Value Added Tax aimed at clarifying its implications for farmers."

### ENORMOUS CROP DAMAGE BY DEER IN WEST WATERFORD

#### Move To Prevent "Shoots" Dropped.

Criticism of the wholesale damage being caused to crops by deer in several parts of the county was voiced by the members of the County Waterford Committee of Agriculture at last Monday's meeting in Dungarvan.

The criticism was a sequel to a discussion at the last monthly meeting when Mr. Patrick Kenneally had called on the Government to take steps to prevent the widespread slaughter of deer in the Lyonans area of the county. Mr. Kenneally at that meeting had alleged that organised gangs were being arranged and "crack" gunmen were coming from Dublin and other parts and picking off the deer at will.

The matter had been deferred to the September meeting to enable members ascertain the views of people in the areas concerned.

Mr. Norman Walsh told Monday's meeting that he had discussed the matter with a person from Dromana Estate and he was critical of the terrible destruction being caused in that area by deer.

Mr. William Dwyer said the same position existed in the Ardara area where the destruction of deer was enormous. He agreed that people were being invited into the area on "shoots" to tackle the problem.

The Chairman, Mr. Kieran O'Mahony, said the damage caused was well known and in his area of Ballymacarbery he had seen a trail of destruction and damage. The people of that area had no say in the matter and he expressed his views on the subject to the members. It was his intention to take any preventative steps against the shooting of deer in the county.

### POOR RESPONSE TO SCHOLARSHIP SCHEME

#### Only Three Applicants For Ten Places

Disappointment at the response to the County Waterford Scholarship scheme was expressed at last Monday's meeting in Dungarvan when the members were informed that only three applications were received for the ten scholarships awarded to girls.

Mr. George Frost, C.A.O., said that of the three applicants only one had accepted though they were still awaiting word from a second girl. They could, if the members so decided, transfer the unaccepted scholarships to boys and this would mean that all the nine applicants would then have been awarded scholarships.

Replying to Mr. Norman Walsh, the C.A.O., said the main reason why the response from girls was so poor was that the acceptance of the scholarships did not necessarily lead to employment subsequently.

Finally on the proposal of Mr. James O'Leary it was unanimously agreed to transfer all unaccepted girl scholarships to male applicants.

The Annual General Liam Lynch Commemoration will take place Sunday, September 10. It is now 49 years since a meeting of ex-officers of the Irish Republican Army representing the Brigade of the First Southern Division, met at Fermoy and decided to yearly honour General Liam Lynch.

As usual the Parade will assemble at Fitzgerald Memorial Park at 2.30 p.m. and march in procession to Kiltumper where a wreath will be laid on his grave and a decade of the Rosary recited. Under the Chairmanship of Mr. Con Donavan, M.C., the Memorial Committee are making arrangements for seating to be provided at Kiltumper for the use of veterans and friends. Commander Paddy O'Brien will be in charge of the parade. The oration this year will be delivered by Mr. Seamus O'Riain, M.T., Past President, G.A.A., 1967 to 1970.

The memory of many veterans and comrades of General Lynch who will attend will surely go back to the Spring of 1923 when Liam Lynch presided over an Army Executive meeting of Republican Forces. It was held in a remote valley in the Comeragh Mountains. Following the meeting it was decided to adjourn for a fortnight. Before the meeting took place Liam Lynch fell mortally wounded in a fight on the slopes of Knocknea Mountain. He was taken prisoner to Clonmel and died during the night of April 10. After his death the Republican Army appointed General Frank Aiken Chief-of-Staff.

The attendance included Messrs. C. Curran, M.C.G.; W. Dwyer, M.C.G. and P. Kenneally, M.C.C., and members of local organisations.

### MOTORISTS FINED AT YOUGHAL COURT

### LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

#### Dungarvan Hospital

Editor, "Dungarvan Leader"

A Character with regard to a letter in last week's issue from Mr. Richard A. Walsh, U.D.C., concerning Dungarvan Hospital, I wish to comment as follows:

(1) The Dungarvan Hospital is not now a sort of glorified "kitchen" but is a first-class medical and maternity hospital with a fully qualified staff.

(2) There was no maternity unit in Dungarvan before the provision of the present temporary building. It is a disgraceful ground floor. This was a serious position and lives were at risk. The Health Board would have been failing in its duty to the expectant mothers of Dungarvan and district if it had not decided to provide the present service.

(3) Since the necessary resources are available it is proposed to take the necessary steps to provide the necessary maternity unit. The ward at present in use will then be used for other purposes.

(4) It is a fact that the decision to close the surgical ward was a most unfortunate one. Authority but it was not a political decision and was not in the interests of the Hospital. The Health Authority resisted the decision to close as long as it could. It is a pity that the decision to provide a permanent full-time surgical ward was not taken earlier and in any event, such a proposal would have cost a great deal more.

(5) Mr. Walsh's reference to politics does not interest me. The political interests are distinctly old-fashioned.

(6) At a recent meeting of the Health Board I explained the reasons, given officially at the time, for the closure of the surgical unit—no more and no less.

(7) I am a member of the Health Board I have done everything possible to secure the highest possible standards and best possible services for Dungarvan hospital and have had a reasonable measure of success. In the next future some £150,000 is to be spent to extend and improve the Hospital.

(8) A good deal of political mileage has been made out of Dungarvan Hospital and this has not helped either the hospital or the patients. Despite the fact that no unwelcome change was made in the character of the hospital its future is assured and neither the staff, patients nor people of Dungarvan have any reason for worry in this regard.

### THREAT ON LAND PROJECT SCHEME

Mr. J. Maher, President of the Irish Farmers' Association, commenting on the threat by 285 civil servants in the Department of Agriculture to work to rule on Land Project Schemes stated that any disruption of the land reclamation scheme leading to a slowing down of the programme would be serious, both from the point of view of the individual farmer and the industry as a whole at this time.

He said that in fact there is a pressing need to accelerate the work in increasing the area of productive land now that we are engaged in an expansion programme in preparing for the extra demands that will be made upon us when we enter the European Economic Community.

### CUT-BACK IN BEEF CATTLE INCENTIVE SCHEME MOST UNDESIRABLE

Representatives of the Irish Farmers' Association, meeting with minute met officials of the Department of Agriculture to convey the Association's strong opposition to the Department's proposal to reduce certain grants under the Beef Cattle Incentive Scheme as from 1973.

Mr. M. J. Bruton, Chairman of the Livestock Committee, said that the delegation had pointed out to the Department that a cut back in the incentive for expansion under this scheme was most undesirable at the present time. They had emphasised the very great potential which still remains for expanding cattle numbers by breeding from beef type heifers which are at present slaughtered or exported without producing a calf.

The delegation also pointed out that considerable areas of hill and marginal land are particularly suited to the maintenance of beef cow herds rather than any other type of enterprise.

The same applies to many farms which are unsuited to dairying because of remoteness from a creamery, unsuitable layout of the farm itself or the personal circumstances of the farmer.

These factors, said Mr. Bruton, set up a tremendous potential, which has only been partially tapped, for increasing production of good quality stock. Producers need the full incentive which has
