FIVE YEAR PROJECT TO BUILD 200 NEW HOUSES IN DUNGARVAN COUNCIL APPROVES LAY-OUT PLANS

The lay-out plan prepared by Messrs. J. Thompson & Partners, Architects, Limerick, for the 32 acre site at Rignansillogue (Quinn's) purchased by Dungarvan Urban Council for development for housing and an amenity area was considered by members of the Council at their monthly meeting last Monday night.

Mr. B. White pointed out that the development of the area would be a 5-year project and he felt that if the Council succeeded in having close on 200 houses erected in that time they would be doing a good job.

Mr. J. Dowling, Acting Co. Manager, pointed out that the many houses would cope with an additional 1,000 in the population.

Mr. P. Walsh said that the plan made provision for the erection of 192 3-bedroomed houses in blocks of 6 with an entrance from the Youghal Road. The amenity area would be located along the sea-front.

It was proposed to start off with the erection of a 30-house scheme and this would be followed later with a group of 54, with the remainder being built at a later date. The house density would be 14 to the acre and an attractive feature of the plan was, he said, the inclusion of small play areas adjacent to each group of houses.

Mr. Walsh added that plans for a shopping centre which could be leased by the Council were also included. A total of 14 acres of the site would be devoted to housing and about 17 acres would go for amenities.

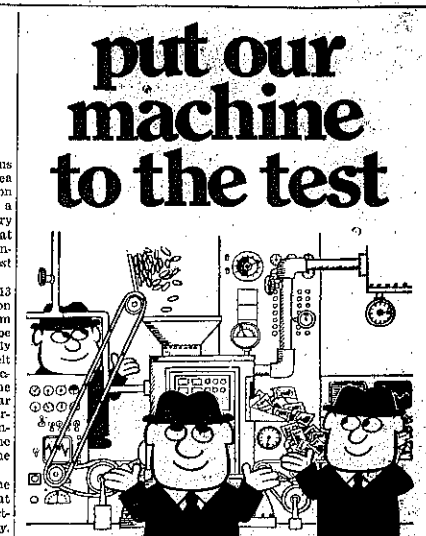
