PENSMAN TAKES YOU BEHIND THE SPOTLIGHT

DOUBLING UP
A couple of months ago the penman of Waterford County decided that their meetings should last longer than 5 p.m. At the same time, it was decided that meetings should be held fortnightly in the town. In other words, the regular meetings were to be held on a Monday and a Wednesday. The Council decided on a split decision, to have increased travelling and subsistence allowances for themselves when they attend meetings. These messages will mean that in future the cost of a meeting will be as much again as it is at present. In other words, the Acland County Council will be paying out the cost of a meeting of £42 per year. With a population of 24 per year—two each month—the total cost will now be £13,144.

A CHEAP WAY TO PURCHASE A HOUSE

BY HUBERT ROCHE

One of the greatest social evils of this country to-day is the lack of housing. Who is to blame? One can say that the Government is at fault by not providing enough money for housing, or local authorities by not planning enough in advance or by not building sufficient local authority houses. But can these bodies be continuously to blame? Are you one of the many thousands of people who are either: (1) on the waiting list for a local authority house; or (2) striving to accumulate a deposit to buy a house on the open market; or (3) trying to buy a site at an inflated price, before you even think of getting the money together to build your own house.

If you are in either of these three categories, have you heard of Co-Operative Housing, or, you may ask: what is Co-Operative Housing?

Co-Operative Housing provides the opportunity for such people in need of housing to join with others in similar need, so as to obtain a house of his own—strength in numbers!

Joint effort and self-help methods have, of course, been used before in this country with considerable success by farmers and fishermen. The Irish Farmers' Co-Operative movement, an example of a producers' co-operative, has 148,500 members, organised in 26 co-ops, with a turnover of £107,439,039 in 1970. However, it seems a terrible shame that this type of co-operative is not used in other fields as well, because it seems that the operations of such organisations in the provision of housing—which is a basic need in any community, but which has been particularly subject to the effects of inflation—would provide the necessary participation in, if not the control of the means of providing the communities' needs for shelter.

Now, through the use of co-op methods, many people in need of housing have found it possible to obtain a home at a reasonable price. Perhaps this is a good omen for the future. Seeing as believing, and the growing number of houses built by co-ops will show

THE DISADVANTAGES
The only disadvantage that comes to mind is that you are restricted by the democratic rule decisions of your own co-operative society. So it can be seen that for many people of limited income, co-operative societies provide the opportunity by which such persons can provide their own house.

CO-OPS IN WATERFORD CITY
At present there are two co-ops in Waterford City which are affiliated to NABCCO. Both of these societies—Waterford 71 Utility Society and Deiseach Utility Society—are building houses in Upper Grange, and between the two groups they will be building about fifty houses. Fermoy Old I.R.A. Man's Death

The unexpected death of a well-known and highly respected community member took place in Fermoy last week of Mr. Patrick Ahern, 1, McDonagh Terrace.

A native of Fermoy, he was member of a well-known and highly respected family. He grew to manhood at a time when patriotic instincts were high. He joined the Fermoy Company of Volunteers at an early age. As a member of the 1st Battalion, Cork No. 2 Brigade his cool demeanour and clear mind soon led to his promotion to the rank of 1st Lieutenant and he became Intelligence Officer of the Battalion.

He took part in many engagements against enemy forces. He took a leading part in the attack on a party of British Military whilst on their way to the Wesleyan Church, Fermoy, which led to the death of one of the British Military, Private Jones, and the capture of their arms. This attack was led by Lar Condon and planned by General Liam Lynch, who was wounded in the attack. Also in the attacking party was Comdt. Michael Fitzgerald, who was later arrested and died on hunger strike in Cork Jail after 84 days fast.

The evening before Comdt. Fitzgerald's death, Mr. Ahern was entrusted with the task of obtaining entrance to Cork Jail on the guise of being a relative of Fitzgerald's and was thus able to bring out any last message from the dying Commandant. He was later arrested and interned in Ballykinnear Camp, Co. Down. He then home at Barrack Street was a haven for many men who were "on their knees" at that time, and Mr. Ahern's mother will always be remembered for her bravery and kindness during the "four glorious years."

In his later years Mr. Ahern was manager of Mayes Provision Stores, McCurtain Street, Fermoy, and retired some years ago.

In recent years he was a well-known figure at the Gen. Liam Lynch Commemoration and was Treasurer of the Commemoration Committee. His last act on the Sunday before his death was to attend the annual commemoration ceremonies and the unveiling of the plaque at Campa Mac Leoinis.

There was a very large and representative attendance at the removal of the remains to St. Patrick's Church, Fermoy. The first colour draped coffin was flanked by a guard of honour of former comrades under Mr. Matt Flood, Fermoy. Veterans came from many parts of the country to pay their last respects to an old comrade-in-arms who rose in dark and evil days to free his native land.

The interment took place in Kilkerrum cemetery on Tuesday, September 19th. A military firing party from the 1st Motor Squadron rendered military honours and a bugler sounded the "Last Post" and "Reveille". Chief mourners were Mrs. C. Ahern (widow), Miss Hilma Ahern (daughter); Mr. David Ahern, U.S.A. (brother); Mrs. Linn, Keaney, U.S.A. and Miss Elizabeth Ahern, Fermoy (sisters); Mrs. P. Ahern (daughter-in-law); and a large circle of relatives to whom we extend our deepest sympathy.

Former Voughal Schooner Healer At A Cost of £100,000.
The topsail schooner "Kathleen and May," once owned by the late Martin J. Fleming, Voughal, and named after his daughters, which was a frequent visitor to the port of Voughal some years ago has now been restored by the Maritime Trust, London and has a great attraction during the past summer at Sutton Harbour in the old port of Plymouth.

The work of restoration was carried out by the Maritime Shipyard, Cornwall. A million, six hundred and thirty thousand (£1,630,000) were spent on the ship, whose 120 ships range in tonnage from 26,000 up to 200,000 gave £100,000 to the Maritime Trust to restore the "Kathleen and May," and to meet the cost of maintenance and running expenses for seven years.

The "Kathleen and May" is the very last of the old British West Country sailing ships. She was built at River De Shipyard and traded between England and Ireland for a long number of years. She was bought from the Fleming family by Captain Tyrrell, Arklow, and traded in the Bristol Channel and Irish Sea. She was laid up in the 1950's. Her gross tonnage is 140 and her net tonnage is 83.

A sister ship of the "Kathleen and May," the "Nellie Fleming," also owned by the Fleming family, Voughal, was lost at sea with all hands during a storm many years ago. She was on a voyage from England to Voughal with a cargo of coal.

ADULT EDUCATION CLASSES WILL RESUME DURING COMING WEEKS

Adult Education Classes organised by the County Waterford Vocational Education Committee will resume in County Waterford during the coming weeks.

Details of the courses, enrolment dates and centres are given in the advertising columns of this paper. A wide range of subjects is offered this year at the 26 or more centres throughout the county. A feature of this scheme is the introduction of many new courses and subjects.

LEAVING CERTIFICATE A Leaving Certificate Course for adults will be organised at Ardmore and Kilmacomas Vocational Schools, if there is sufficient demand. It is proposed to conduct classes on a number of nights per week during the session. Persons who, for one reason or another, were unable to sit for this examination while at school, or were obliged to leave school at an early age, are now offered the opportunity of studying for the Leaving Certificate. It is not necessary for adults to sit for this examination in all subjects in one year. They may obtain their certificate by accumulating Passes over a number of years, and accordingly, the course will be so organised that an opportunity will be given to interested adults to sit for this examination in all subjects in one year. Details of these courses may be obtained from the Principals at Kilmacomas and Ardmore Vocational Schools.

RURAL BUILDING SCHEME The Educational Rural Building Scheme has been in operation in County Waterford for a number of years. This year the scheme has been re-organised and two additional instructors have been appointed by the Vocational Committee to service the expansion of the scheme.

Under this scheme Building Construction Teachers will be available to give assistance to people who will engage in the work of improving their dwellings, or in building new houses. Persons who are interested in this scheme should enrol at the Technical Schools at Dungarvan, Kilmacomas or Tramore on Monday next.

The scheme will be two part. Firstly, an organised formal class will be held for participants at the local Vocational school where the principles involved in various constructional processes will be explained and demonstrated. Secondly, on the site informal instruction will be given by the instructor to class members.

In the past building projects have varied from the erection of complete new buildings, both dwellings and farm buildings, to simple repair work, such as installation of windows and doors. Whatever the project has been, the participant had a twofold benefit, the satisfaction of completing a worthwhile task with his own abilities and skills and the deeper and perhaps less obvious self development, which the educational arm of the project brought him.

OTHER COURSES A very wide range of classes and courses is organised at the Vocational Schools, in Dungarvan and Kilmacomas. The up to date equipment and facilities in these schools afford an unique opportunity to adults, young and old, to pursue further education if they desire to do so. Classes in additional subjects to those advertised will be organised if there is sufficient demand.
