APPOINTED ACTING C.E.O. OF CORK COUNTY VOCATIONAL EDUCATION COMMITTEE

WHO OWNS WHAT
Two-thirds of the personal wealth of Ireland is owned by less than 5 per cent of the population, according to a survey carried out by Trinity College (Dublin), lecturer Patrick M. Lyons.
In the South the top 5 per cent own 47 per cent. At the other end of the scale, nearly 60 per cent of adults in Northern Ireland and almost 65 per cent in the Republic have no property or wealth.
In Northern Ireland there are only 360 people who possess wealth worth in excess of £100,000 but, between them, they own more than £57 million. In the South there are 811 people with estates worth more than £100,000 and they are jointly worth more than £216 million.

In addition to the lecture programmes a number of competitions are being held which are being sponsored by leading firms throughout the country to arouse the interest of our young people and children in the importance of and need for dental health measures.

Salary increases, additional staff, up county agricultural estimates by £9,000

COST OF SCHEMES NOW TOTAL ALMOST £72,000
The provisional estimates for the advisory services provided and the schemes run by the Co. Waterford Committee of Agriculture, preceding the estimates for the coming year. This is an increase of £9,000 over last year and members of the Committee who were informed of the various allocations at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan last Monday were told that salary increases and the appointment of additional staff were two of the main reasons responsible for the increase.
Mr. J. P. Cadogan, Divisional Inspector, Department of Agriculture, presiding the estimates pointed out that increases were happening in all the committees with which he had dealings and Co. Waterford was now no different in this regard.
The first major increase under the heading "instruction in agriculture" showed a jump of £3,000 from £30,249 last year to £33,286.
Mr. Cadogan said that this increase arose mainly because of an increase in staff, the normal increments in the salaries of instructors and a bonus increase in salaries which was expected to become operative during the coming year and for which provision was now being made.
IN VANGUARD
Mr. Cadogan went on to state that the Committee now employed ten agricultural instructors including the C.A.O. and he said that Co. Waterford was in the vanguard of agricultural progress in the country especially in the fields of pig production.
To service the demands from farmers engaged in these operations they had to have adequate trained staff and he felt there was a definite need for the number of agricultural instructors which they had now employed. While preparing the estimate they had considered the need for appointing an additional instructor but decided not to go ahead with this. However he said that the Committee would have to seriously consider the appointment of a deputy C.A.O. probably next year or if not then the year after as there was a need for such an appointment.
Commenting on the staff position, Mr. George Frost, C.A.O., said that while they were not the most intensively staffed county in the country he felt they were adequately staffed at the moment.
Mr. Cadogan then referred to an increase of £1,600 under the heading "instruction in horticulture" (up to £10,561 from last year's figure of £8,954) and said that this was due to the appointment of an instructor to fill the vacancy resulting in the death of the late Pat O'Shea and to normal increments.
An increase of £1,000 for instruction in poultry keeping (up from £6,180 to £7,152) was also stated to be due to salary increases.
A rise of £2,200 in the cost of administration (up from £5,735 to £8,935) was accounted for by Mr. Cadogan as due to salary increases and increments and to increases in the travelling and subsistence allowances for members. He referred to an increase of £300 in the cost of printing and advertising as showing that these costs "had gone out of all control."
There was an increase of £1,100 under the heading of scholarships (up from £2,200 to £3,300) and Mr. Cadogan said that in accordance with a recommendation of the General Council of Committees of Agriculture they had decided to increase their scholarship (12 per boys and 10 per girls) from £100 to £150.
DEMAND ON RATES
Mr. Cadogan then stated that the total increase would require an increase of 14p in their demand on the Co. Council. Last year this amounted to 10.25p so that they would be seeking 11.75p next year. The maximum which they could demand was 15p in the £.
The estimates were provisionally adopted without discussion.

PROTEST AT MINISTER'S MOVE TO DOWNGRADE AGRICULTURAL COMMITTEES

DICTATORSHIP IS NEXT STEP
We should stand up and fight and not take this thing lying down said Mr. Tom Foley (P.P.) who has proposed a resolution at the monthly meeting of the Co. Waterford Committee of Agriculture in Dungarvan last Monday calling on the members to resign en bloc if the Minister for Agriculture made any move to reduce the present status of the Committee.
Mr. Foley added that if the Minister's plans were enforced they would have no more significance as Committee than schoolboys with a mock agenda and if they took this lying down they would wind up with a bureaucracy and would deserve what they got. He said that Mr. Gibbons intended to set up regional committees on the same lines as the health boards. There would be only two or three members of the existing committee on this and they would be hostages in a bureaucratic set-up while the rest of the committee would be reduced to the role of advisors without any power or authority.
Mr. N. Walsh said that by resigning they would just be playing into the Minister's hands.
TAKEOVER MOVE
Mr. E. O'Riada, Chairman said that Committees of Agriculture had stood the farmers well since they were established in 1931 and farmers would not now like to see them disbanded. They were fighting this issue at General Council of Committees level as they realised that the Minister's move was aimed at a takeover of the agricultural advisory services which were at present in operation under a democratic system.
"We were elected by the people just as Mr. Gibbons was," said Mr. O'Riada, "and we are entitled to make a stand on this. We should fight him to the bitter end and fight we will."
Mr. Foley said that the danger about bureaucracy was that dictatorship was the next step to it and that seemed to be the way they were now heading in this country.
Mr. Walsh—We're just playing into the bureaucrats' hands to resign and I would go along with Mr. Foley's proposal barring that.
Mr. Foley said he did not think this was so and he added that it would not be used as a political pawn by anybody.
When a seconder for Mr. Foley's proposal was called for there was no reply.
ALTERNATIVE RESOLUTION
Mr. Walsh then proposed an alternative that they pass a strong but simple protest against the Minister's attitude in any moves he might make to reduce the functions or change the constitution of Committees of Agriculture.
Mr. S. Whelan seconded the proposal which was passed with Mr. Foley dissenting.

VANDALS WREAK HAVOC AT WALSH PARK

Vandals came close to causing a complete disruption of last Sunday's County senior football final between Stradbally and Kill, when they caused damage estimated at £200 to Walsh Park, Waterford, last week end, in what was believed to have been a deliberate attempt to sabotage the fixture.

The vandals broke into the venue in the early hours of Saturday morning and in the playing pitch itself, chopped down the goalposts from their bases, ripped the nets and also extensively damaged the iron rigging behind the goals.

The vandals then proceeded to the dressing rooms where locks were forced and doors jammed. The showers in both dressing rooms were smashed as were the lighting systems.

The malicious act was not discovered until midday on Saturday when the groundsman, Frank Penkert, went to the Park to take the pitch for Sunday's three game programme.

Mr. Penkert immediately notified County Board Secretary, Seamus Grant, who in turn notified senior County Board officials and the Garda.

Voluntary workers from clubs all over the city, had to work frantically throughout Saturday afternoon and late Saturday night to get the venue ready for Sunday.

The incident is likely to be discussed at the next meeting of the County Board.

PROPOSAL TO INCREASE COUNCILLORS' TRAVELLING EXPENSES

CO. COUNCIL MEMBERS EXPRESS DIFFERING VIEWS

These allowances are quite adequate as they are and they were never intended to be a profit making matter stated Mr. H. R. Dowd at a recent meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan when he proposed an amendment opposing a motion to approve increases in the rate of expenses and allowances for members in respect of attendance at meetings on or after April 1st.

A report submitted to the meeting stated that the Minister for Local Government had already indicated that no objection would be raised to the payment of the increased rates.

The new rates were then set out as follows (old rates in brackets): Travelling expenses 11p per mile (7.5p); Subsistence allowances—absence from 3 to 7 hours £1.60 (£1.25), over 7 hours £2.25 (£1.75); Allowance for members residing less than 5 miles from meeting place and absent from home for at least 3 hours £2.50 (£1.75). New mileage allowances—absence from 3 to 7 hours £1.60 (£1.25), over 7 hours £2.25 (£1.75); Allowance for members residing less than 5 miles from meeting place and absent from home for at least 3 hours £2.50 (£1.75). Mr. Dowd pointed out that these allowances were not intended as compensation for loss of time but just to cover out of pocket expenses. If members were to be paid on this basis it would cost far more money.

COMMITTEE "PERTURBED" ALLEGATIONS OF NEGLIGENCE IN BOVINE T.B. TESTING

This was a very serious matter stated Mr. K. O'Riain, Chairman, Co. Waterford Committee of Agriculture, when he referred to an article in the "Farmers Journal" at the monthly meeting of the Committee in Dungarvan last week.

The article, which was alleged that veterinary surgeons were guilty of gross negligence in carrying out tests under the Bovine T.B. eradication scheme.

The article also censured the Department for covering up other matters by blaming the vets and he said that these statements would clearly disturb the entire farming community.

Mr. N. Walsh said that he always believed that there were two sides to every story and he thought they should hear both sides before making any comments.

Mr. T. Foley said that this scheme had cost the taxpayers of the county millions upon millions of pounds and it was supposed to make millionaires out of the farmers but in fact it had caused farmers more hardship and financial loss than any other scheme.

The cause of all the trouble, he said, was the administration at top level and he thought that had the scheme been administered by the Committee of Agriculture instead of the Department they would now be much nearer total eradication.

Chairman — There's something wrong somewhere.

Mr. Walsh — That is so but the matter is too serious for us to comment on at the moment. We can only say that we are perturbed by the news but we can't go beyond that.

DUNGARVAN COUNCIL OF TRADE UNIONS CONDEMNS DEVLIN REPORT

At the monthly meeting of the above Council, the members strongly condemned the Devlin Report which recommended huge increases for MBs, TDs and higher civil servants.

The members expressed the view that these proposed increases are a breach of the National Wage Agreement and that increases of from £20 to £30 per week for certain individuals could in no way be justified when old age pensioners, who had given a lifetime of work were obliged to live on allowances of a little over £5 per week, and have to wait for a period of five months before any increases given to them in the Budget are paid out.

OUR "SMALLS" BRING BIG RESULTS

HIGHER SOCIAL INSURANCE PAYMENTS

Social insurance benefits, pensions and contributions are being increased from the beginning of October, 1972.

The new maximum personal rates of disability and unemployment benefit will be £5.55 a week from October 2, 1972 and the increase of benefit for an adult dependant will be raised to £3.75 a week, invalidity pension will be likewise increased from October 5, 1972.

The maximum rate of widow's (contributory) pension will be £5.60 a week from October 6, 1972 and the weekly additions for child dependants will be raised to £1.50 per week.

Mountain Grazing.—Approximately 3,000 acres of mountain land was purchased by farmers in the Old Parish and Clashmore districts — in parcels of from 60 to 200 acres.

Education.—There is a lack of agricultural education amongst young farmers who have not attended courses in the last 3 years. Winter Farm Schools will be conducted in the Waterford and Lismore areas.

RAM PREMIUMS TO BE INCREASED

A deputation from the Co. Waterford Sheepbreeders' Association attended the monthly meeting of the Co. Waterford Committee of Agriculture in Dungarvan last Monday asking the Committee to approve an increase in the amount of the premiums which they gave for the purchase of rams.

Mr. John Harrington, with whom was Mr. Frater and Mr. Walsh, was principal spokesman for the deputation and he said that when the work of registering the sheep in the Association, as proposed, was carried out, was finished, they would be unique as they would be the only association registered in the British Isles.

He said that at present the Association awarded 64 premiums at £8 each and he suggested that half this number should be reserved for registered rams next year for which the premiums could be increased to £12 while the other 32 could remain at £8.

EMPHASIS ON MILK, CATTLE, BEEF AND SHEEP IN COUNTY

WATERFORD ADVISORY PROGRAMME

The main emphasis will be on the exploitation of grass and grass-based products such as milk, cattle, beef and sheep stated Mr. G. Frost, C.A.O., when he presented an outline of the Advisory Programme planned for the coming year at the monthly meeting of the County Waterford Committee of Agriculture in Dungarvan last Monday.

Details of the programme which were circulated to the members were set out as follows:—

AGRICULTURE

The main emphasis will be on the exploitation of grass and grass-based products e.g. milk, cattle, beef and sheep. Milk—The drive begun in 1971 for increased and intensified milk production will be continued on the lines that more milk need not necessarily mean more work.

Bull Beef — 30 bulls will be fattened on a Co. Waterford farm for demonstration purposes.

Sheep — The campaign begun in 1971 to establish a Flock Book in the county for the Scottish Blackface will be continued — with the object of having a complete registered ram sale for the breed.

Pigs — Attention will be given to bonham producers — with the emphasis on worthwhile sow herds (at least 20) and efficient sows.

Goats — The members of weaner groups continue to get attention by way of maintenance and expansion. An insufficient number of weaners to meet local fashions needs in the county is being produced.

Mountain Grazing — Approximately 3,000 acres of mountain land was purchased by farmers in the Old Parish and Clashmore districts — in parcels of from 60 to 200 acres.

Education — There is a lack of agricultural education amongst young farmers who have not attended courses in the last 3 years.

HORTICULTURE

With orchards, group activity through meetings, discussions, demonstrations, and field visits will be continued. Expansion on the basis of improved orchards of existing members will be encouraged. It is aimed to have at least two modern orchard stores erected in the county.

An objective of a 10 per cent increase in the number of beekeepers will be sought. Existing beekeepers will be encouraged to expand and equipment will be standardised.

Emphasis will be on turkey production and marketing. Producers will be advised to plan disposal of finished birds — before buying points, and to put their enterprise on a business-like footing by keeping accounts.

FARM HOME ADVISORY SERVICE — An informal survey has revealed that many homesteaders lack an appreciation of the nutritive value of foods and spend excessive money on expensive foods.

AD HOC CALLS — In addition to carrying out the above programme, ad hoc visitors will attend to requests for information or advice from farmers and rural dwellers.

UNANIMOUSLY ADOPTED — Members generally expressed satisfaction with the report which was unanimously adopted.
