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## PENSMAN TAKES YOU BEHIND THE SPOTLIGHT

**WHAT WILL IT BE**  
The Chairman of Dungarvan Urban Council, Mr. T. A. Kynne made two rather important statements at the monthly meeting of the Council held last Monday night. Both concerned the future prospects of Dungarvan and for that reason they are important for all of us.  
The first concerned the fact that the local administration of the town is likely to take under the proposals for the reorganisation of local government will be restructured, probably some time next year.  
Mr. Kynne was always optimistic in the past that Dungarvan would survive in any moves to abolish Urban Councils because of its very progressive outlook and its record in providing houses, sewerage and water supplies. This optimism was completely absent at last Monday night's meeting when he stated that the latest news he had from the proposing authority was that towns like Dungarvan and Youghal and in fact all towns with a lesser population than 9,000 people would lose their Councils in the new reorganisation.

Despite the fact that in the past I have crossed swords with the Council, collectively and individually, I believe that if the Council are as good as can be got under the present system of election, it would therefore be a backward step if the town were to lose its status in this respect and would definitely be a loss to the town. I hope that the lobby which they are now trying to set up to defeat the proposals in the white paper will prove successful.  
The other statement made by Mr. Kynne concerned the setting up of an amenity centre in the town at an estimated cost of £100,000. If we are to believe what he stated at last Monday night's meeting, then this proposed centre which looked far so long to be just a pipe-dream because of the high cost involved, is within reach of realisation.  
An amenity centre which would service not only the town but the entire West Waterford area is certainly something that will be welcomed with open arms provided of course, and this is the nub of the matter, that the cost is not such as to put another big hump on the backs of the ratepayers.

## £100,000 Amenity Centre For West Waterford?

**MAY BE LOCATED IN DUNGARVAN**  
BEHIND the scenes activities which may mean the establishment of a £100,000 amenity centre to service West Waterford and which would be located in Dungarvan were referred to by Mr. T. A. Kynne, Chairman, Dungarvan Urban Council at the monthly meeting of the Council held on last Monday night. The amenity centre and sports complex, when completed, would incorporate a heated swimming pool, tennis courts, pitch and putt course and other sports and social facilities.  
The announcement was made by Mr. Kynne towards the end of the Council meeting on Monday night when he referred to a motion proposed some time ago by Mr. A. Deasy that a Community Centre be set up in the town.  
Mr. Kynne recalled that a few years ago they had been approached by officials of Bord Fáilte who informed them that the Prizer Chemical Corporation would probably be prepared to provide a sum of £100,000 towards the cost of an amenity centre if the Council would contribute their share. He said that they then went ahead and purchased the land at Quann's believing that this offer was still in the air but it did not materialise and nothing had come of it since.  
They then discovered that an amenity scheme was to go ahead in Tralee and when COSAC (the body set up by the Government to deal with the establishment of local sports and amenity centres) was formed a meeting was held in Waterford at which all the interested local authorities and sporting organisations were represented.  
Mr. Kynne went on to say that a local committee under his chairmanship was then formed and when they met and discussed the problem they decided to send a delegation to the Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Education, Mr. Michael O'Kennedy, who is in charge of the project. He said that Mr. O'Kennedy had received the delegation very well and gave them an undertaking that he would send down an inspector to inspect suitable sites and discuss with them the prospects of getting whatever proposals they had at the ground.  
Mr. Kynne then stated that Capt. McDonagh had come down from the Department to Dungarvan about a fortnight ago. He surveyed the site they had at Quann's and looked at other places around and discussed the matter with the Town Clerk. He was highly interested in the prospects and said that he would see as far as he could go to help them go ahead with their proposals. He told them that the first thing to go ahead with was a heated swimming pool and everything else could be built around this.  
Mr. Kynne said that Capt. McDonagh had been very impressed with what he saw and he thought that if they went ahead now they would get sanction for the project in the course of a few weeks.

**WATERFORD BORN PRELATE TO BECOME BISHOP OF SOUTHWARK**  
Waterford born Mr. Magr. C. J. Henderson, P.P., V.O., was named by Pope Paul to become auxiliary bishop of Southwark, London, it was announced by the Vatican on Tuesday last.  
The 48-year-old prelate is at present Vicar General in the Archdiocese of Southwark and Parish Priest in the parish of Blackheath village. He will become auxiliary to Archbishop Corderoy (67).  
Magr. Henderson's elevation to the hierarchy will be heartily welcomed with jubilation in Waterford City and County where he is not only well and popularly known but has many friends and several relatives as well.  
He is son of Mr. Charles Henderson, and the late Mrs. Hon. Mrs. M. Courtney, Gracefield Waterford and brother of Mrs. Nicholas Quinn, City View Leamy Street, Waterford, Mrs. M. Bannigan, Ballybricken, Waterford, Mrs. Courtney, Gracefield Waterford and Mrs. E. Judge, England and cousin of Mrs. O'Donnell, Youghal Road, Dungarvan, Mrs. Mackey, Clonca, Dungarvan and of the Walsh family, formerly of Youghal, R.D., Dungarvan, and the Clancy family, 8, Mitchell Terrace, Dungarvan.  
Magr. Henderson was ordained in 1948 and was appointed Vicar-General in 1959. He had been President of the Waterfordmen's Association in London for several years. He is a close friend of Very Rev. M. Farrell, P.P., Abbeyside on a visit home earlier this year.

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I.F.A. WEEKLY BULLETIN

WHEAT CONTRACTS TO BE DISCUSSED. Arrangements are being made for an early meeting between the I.F.A. Grain Committee and the Irish Flour Millers Association for discussions on the future of wheat growing in this country under EEC conditions. Wheat contracts, once a very controversial item in farmer-miller relationships, are likely to figure prominently in those discussions. In the past, farmers, through I.F.A. (N.F.A.) objected strongly to any form of wheat contract system which would have the effect of controlling wheat production at the complete discretion of the Flour Millers. Under the new EEC situation, Irish farmers will have the alternative of growing high yielding soft wheat varieties which would provide a very high quality animal feed, but would not measure up to the present quality requirements of the Irish Flour Milling Industry. The Irish Flour Milling Industry, the de-naturing subsidy on wheat,

which is an established feature of EEC grain policy, would enable our wheat growers to obtain a price for soft wheat which would compare quite favourably with the present price for wheat of flour milling quality. The situation on wheat will therefore be very similar in future to what has been the position on barley for several years past. In order to secure the production of high quality making barley, the Malting and Brewing Industry has found it necessary to pay a substantial premium over and above the price of feeding barley. A contract system has been used to operate this arrangement. The removal of substantial quantities of surplus wheat off the world market, largely as a result of purchases by the U.S.S.R., has resulted in a sharp upward trend in world grain prices in recent weeks. This serves to underline the fact that it would be very much in the interest of the Irish Flour Milling Industry and of the consumer to secure the maximum possible amount of our flour milling wheat requirements from home production.

At the time of writing the Ballysaggart selectors are unable to name their team as there is a doubt about Michael Barry whose declaration to play in the West seems to be in dispute. Barry is still waiting for the "all clear." His absence from the team would prove a severe handicap as even though they can call on any of their several good substitutes, a hurler of the calibre of Barry would greatly enhance their chances of winning their second Junior final within three years.

When they beat such a good Dungarvan team, everyone seemed to regard them as hot favourites to take the title, but while they feel fairly confident, they do not, nor will, public opinion in this regard. In defeating Dungarvan and St. Mary's in the County Cup, Ballysaggart did not show the form of the past. In the matter of age and experience, there is little between the teams and both sides have their quota of good hurlers. Ballysaggart led by Brian Shanahan, who has been called to the county panel, Willie John O'Gorman, Bobby Begley, Mick Clancy, Willie Roche, Jim Bennett, Jim O'Brien, G. Dempsey and company, led by Kilgobinet with outstanding players in Paddy Lynch, Peter Power, Noel Walsh and the outstanding player against Abbeyside, Connie Keohari, Mick Keohari, John Walsh, Eamon Byrne, Tom Landers, etc.

I did not see Kilgobinet in their game against Abbeyside, but from reports I understand that they showed great improvement on their display against Ballinacash and if they have continued to make improvement since, they might well cause a shock. They are a side who invariably do best when they are rated as outsiders and about that they are. Ballysaggart, during the game they would be hard to "catch." "Whichever" side wins this game, one thing is certain and that is the "pitch" will be well worth seeing. It will be exciting, it could be close. Of course it is not going to be easy to get over Kildare who have already beaten Dublin, and who are also fighting their way out of the bottom section. They defeated us last year and this will put them on to try to repeat the feat. One very encouraging fact is that the entire panel has been training very seriously and there seems to be tremendous spirit in the camp over the past few weeks. This is a welcome change and it could herald a new era in Waterford hurling. So Sunday's game will tell a lot. We should have a very exciting game on Wednesday night last. NEW BANK CHARGES AN UNJUSTIFIED SCANDAL V.E.C. SENDS BACK BANK SHEETS

County Waterford Vocational Education Committee is the latest local authority to gear itself for a major confrontation with its bankers on the question of the recently introduced "special bank charges."

At last Monday's meeting in Dungarvan it was decided unanimously not to pay the charges and to return the bank statement to Allied Irish Banks.

Mr. Charles Curran described the special charges as "an unjustified scandal." If accepted, he said, they would cost the South Eastern Health Board an extra £12,400 a year but that body was certainly not going to accept it lying down.

VAST BUSINESS He went on to say that local authorities were leaving the banks a vast yearly business but clearly this business was not appreciated by the banks.

Mr. Austin Deasy supported Mr. Curran and proposed that they return the statement from the Duggarvan branch of Allied Irish Banks now before the meeting and which included the special charges.

RESISTED Mr. Curran said these charges were being strongly resisted all over the country and rightly so. The suggestion, he added, that local authorities set up their own banks did not seem to be a bad one at all.

Mr. Deasy's proposal was carried unanimously.

Dungarvan & Youghal Urban Councils May Be Abolished

HINT ABOUT L.A. REORGANISATION PROPOSALS

The news which he had received through the grapevine was that Urban Councils in towns with less than a population of 9,000 were to be abolished said Mr. T. A. Kyne, Chairman, Dungarvan Urban Council at the monthly meeting of the Council last Monday night.

The statement came during a discussion on a letter from the Youghal Urban Council on the proposals in the White Paper on Local Government Re-organisation with a request that members of Dungarvan Urban Council lobby the Oireachtas members in their constituency to fight against any proposals contained in the White Paper to abolish Urban Councils.

ACUTE ACCOMMODATION PROBLEM AT KILMAC VOCATIONAL SCHOOL

The £55,000 Vocational School at Kilmacshommas, which was opened little more than two years ago had now so acute an accommodation problem that the pupils were huddled like cattle in a pen, the members of the County Waterford Vocational Education Committee were told at their meeting in Dungarvan last Monday.

Present at the meeting was Mr. J. Matthews of the transport section of the Department of Education and he said the members of the Department would have to be satisfied of the "water-tight" need for further extension before the necessary sanction would be given.

Mr. D. Kelleher, Chief Executive Officer, said that where the new school was being planned initially the ground floor was so designed that if and when the enrolment numbers justified it a second storey could then be added to the school.

"HUDDLED LIKE CATTLE" Mr. T. Buckley, N.T., said this school had become depressed simply because it had not received the type of support it deserved from the Department. A total of 177 pupils had no recreation space and it was outstanding that that many teenagers should be huddled like cattle in a pen.

The C.E.O. informed the meeting that the pupils had a total play-space of quarter of an acre with no hurling or football playing facilities whatsoever. The Department, he added, informed them that sanction would only be given to purchase a five-acre site. They had sought 11 acres.

It was finally agreed unanimously to press the Department very strongly for sanction for further major extensions to the Kilmacshommas school "as a matter of extreme urgency."

Heart Research Unit To Visit Dungarvan

The Irish Heart Foundation Research Screening project, Medical, pays its second visit to Dungarvan from October 30 to November 3, inclusive. This is the first project of its kind in the world to help persons to avoid heart disease. It is designed to identify persons who are at risk so that their Doctors may be informed, and treatment prescribed.

At this stage screening is confined to men only in age group 30 to 65 years of age, and an appointment through your local doctor is necessary. If you wish to be screened the system is as follows: (1) ask your doctor for an appointment; (2) call to Miss Clancy, Asst. C.M.O.'s Office, Arus Bheatha, for an appointment; (3) booking opens Monday, October 23, during business hours.

The Screening, which is free, takes approximately 15 minutes and includes blood pressure check, blood test, questionnaire, etc. Only doctors' referrals will be screened and detailed results of your screening will be sent to your doctor in about 4 weeks. Experience has shown that there is a public demand for this check and it is suggested that you seek an appointment in good time.

A school Lecture/Film Show programme is being run in each Committee area in November/December period, and Committees will be contacted in the near future with further details. Finally the Heart Foundation wish to thank the local Committee and the people of Dungarvan for their support during the year.
