RETAIL PRICE (FOOD) DISPLAY ORDER, 1972

The Minister for Industry and Commerce made an Order under the Prices Acts, 1958 and 1965 entitled the Retail Price (Food) Display Order, 1972. The Order came into effect on 1st July, 1972.

As from the 1st July, 1972, every person who is carrying on in the State the business of selling by retail any commodity mentioned in the Schedule below is required to exhibit a notice at the shop, vehicle or other place where the business is being carried on. The notice must specify every commodity mentioned in the Schedule which is on sale at the shop, vehicle or other place, together with the retail price being charged for each such commodity in respect of the number or unit of weight specified in the Schedule for the commodity.

A notice exhibited pursuant to the Order must— (a) if it is at a shop, be in such a position as to be clearly visible and easily accessible to all persons frequenting the shop before or immediately after entering the shop; and (b) if it is at a vehicle or other place, be in such a position as to be clearly visible and easily accessible to all persons in the immediate vicinity of the vehicle or other place, as the case may be.

A notice exhibited pursuant to the Order must be in such form as to be capable of being easily read by all persons frequenting the shop, vehicle or other place at which it is exhibited and the letters and figures on the notice must be at least three millimetres in height and of proportionate width.

HEALTH BOARD DISCUSSES MEDICAL CARD ELIGIBILITY

The new medical services were seen as a sophisticated scheme, and people who in the past were not prepared to apply for the pauperism of a medical card, were now prepared to avail of the new services. Ald. Tom Brennan of Waterford told the monthly meeting of the South-East Regional Health Board in Kilkenny. Ald. Brennan was speaking on the subject of the standards of eligibility for medical cards, and was objecting to the standards in the Lower Income Groups which allowed medical cards to couples with a weekly income of £15 or less; to single persons with a weekly income of £8 or less; and allowed an extra earnings allowance of £1.25 for each dependent child in the case of a married couple. He said that medical cards were the main axe on which the entire health services of the country revolved. The problems of medical cards was something which public representatives and doctors participating in the scheme knew day after day. He was dissatisfied with the standards as originally laid down and understood that the CEO would have come forward with a new scheme. The Community Care Committee of the Board, of which he was a member, believed that the CEO should make at least a 25 per cent increase in the case of a married couple, and an increase of £1.25 per child. He was disappointed that the CEO had not indicated some forward trend. The average basic wage was £20, so he therefore imagined that this should be the starting point for a married man and woman. Colr. J. Cummins, Waterford, asked the CEO how many young people over the age of 16 had been issued with medical cards and how many people who had held cards in the past had now been refused cards. He said that the worst anomaly of all concerned the Old Age Pensioner. The man who paid into a contributory pension scheme all his life was not now entitled to free medicines, while the person who never contributed to anything now got all the free services. The matter was raised by Ald T. Byrne of Wexford who said that with the very great exaltation in Sub. J. O'Brien for M. O'Brien Reference—D. O'Brien (Cork).

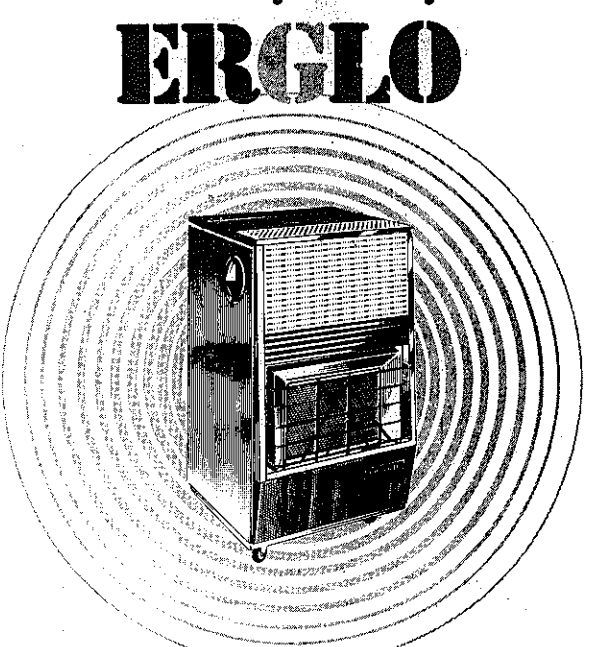

Thirdly, he said he would look into the possibility of giving automatic eligibility to persons who had passed a certain age, and if possible would grant cards to as many old age pensioners as he could. He said that non-contributory old age pensioners were automatically entitled to medical cards, but people who received a contributory pension as well as the old age pension, or who had some private income were not included. Although the scheme did cover those old age pensioners. WHO SCORED WINNING POINT? COURT SEQUEL TO DISPUTE. A dispute over who scored the winning point in a Cork-Limerick hurling game had a sequel at Tallow Court when Michael Murphy, Tallow, pleaded guilty to assaulting Timothy Mulcahy and with being drunk and disorderly. GARDAI WILL GET ALL POSSIBLE COURT PROTECTION

On or off duty Gardaí are entitled to all the protection courts can give them, District Justice B. J. Carroll stated at Tallow Court when an unemployed labourer, Hugh Coughlan, Liffhilly, Tallow, pleaded not guilty to assaulting Garda Joseph O'Sullivan on the night of June 30 last. Garda O'Sullivan told the court that he went to the licensed premises of John Meado, Convent St., for a drink on the night in question. He was off duty and was immediately approached by Coughlan who seemed pretty drunk. The defendant became very aggressive and accused witnesses of having beaten up his son in the Garda station. Garda O'Sullivan said he told Coughlan that allegation was untrue and tried to make him see reason. Coughlan, however, struck him a number of blows in the face. Cross examined by Mr. P. J. Lavan, Solr., defending, Garda O'Sullivan admitted that Coughlan's son was under Garda surveillance at the time in connection with another matter which was being investigated. He denied however beating up the defendant's son in the station in connection with the matter. The defendant in evidence said he was having a drink when Garda O'Sullivan came into the licensed premises. He came over to witness and said: "I see your son is back in town again." Coughlan went on to say that he asked the Garda if he would like to give his son another beating. "I then put my hand on his shoulder and pushed him and said if he ever again beat up my son he would also have to beat me up," he added. The defendant told Justice Carroll that he had never assaulted a Garda and had nothing but the best to say for the Garda in Tallow as they were doing their best. He added that his son who was mentioned in the case was a complete alcoholic and had been a terrible worry to the family. Supt. M. English, prosecuting, said Coughlan had convictions dating back to 1964, he had been convicted of assault on several occasions and was previously bound to the police. Justice Carroll, convicting the defendant, said Coughlan acted most aggressively towards the Garda. The Garda, he said, were entitled to all the protection the courts could give them whether they were on or off duty. He added that it was lucky for the defendant that he did not consider this a terribly serious assault and imposed a fine of £2 on him. He marked "proved" a further charge of being drunk and disorderly on the occasion.

- 1 VAT starts on 1 November 1972.
2 VAT is not a new tax; it is only a change of system. It will replace the turnover tax and wholesale tax being paid already.
3 The rates of VAT correspond to the effective rates under the present system of taxes. Therefore the general level of prices should not increase due to VAT.

TAX WILL NOT CHANGE On the great bulk of goods taxable there will be absolutely NO CHANGE from the present effective rate of tax. The "no-change" goods include the following important items: FOOD, DRINK, CLOTHES, FOOTWEAR, FUEL, CIGARETTES & TOBACCO. MEDICINES, BOOKS, SECOND-HAND GOODS, HOUSING, CARS, SERVICES—laundry, hairdressing, shoe-repairs, cinemas and theatres, hotel accommodation, car repairs and servicing, and most other consumer services. The "no-change" items account for about five-sixths of all the goods liable to tax. Whether a shop charges tax separately at the check-out or includes it in the shelf-price, there should still be no increase in total charges to shoppers for these items.

REDUCTION OF TAX Tax will be reduced (by about 10% of wholesale prices) in the case of some goods, mainly the following: PAINT, GLASS (in sheet), TIMBER, NEWSPAPERS, PERIODICALS, CARAVANS (including mobile homes), and some BOATS. 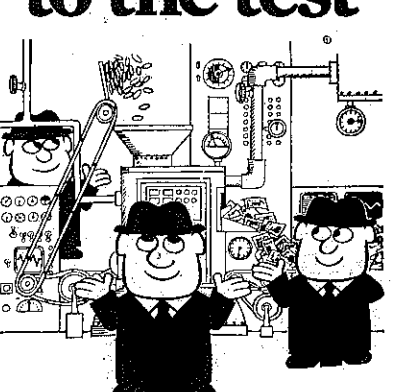
