## €5.5m. MODERNISATION PLAN ANNOUNCED

Sluice Eirann has achieved a trading profit of €1.5m in the twelve months ended April 30, double that of the previous year. Its turnover rose in the period by 14% to €33.5m—an increase of €5.5m in 18 months.

In the next four years, at least €5.5m will be spent in modernising the sugar factories. The company has opened in Dublin a new office to promote trade in the Eire and Eastern countries. The company's annual accounts published today (Thursday, November 9) together with the statement of the Chairman, Mr. B. Announcing a €5.5m. improvement programme for the factories over the next four years, Mr. Godall says this will ensure competitiveness under E.C.C. conditions, but it will not increase capacity. If the full "A" and "B" quotas—awarded in the negotiations in Brussels in January—were to be taken up, a further €2m. investment in the factories will become necessary. ### LIMERICK FACTORY CLOSURE A NATIONAL DISGRACE

**NEW ZEALAND DAIRY FARMERS FAR AHEAD OF IRELAND**

The Clover Meats factory closure in Limerick was described as a national disgrace which bordered on sabotage by the Chairman of Waterford County Council, Mr. Charles Curran, at last Monday's meeting of the Co. Waterford Committee of Agriculture in Dunganarvan. Mr. Curran made his scathing attack on the circumstances of

the factory closure following an address by Mr. Austin Fenton, B.Agr.Sc., a member of the advisory staff following his recent three week tour of New Zealand.

Mr. Fenton outlined how far advanced of Ireland they were in all aspects of farming in New Zealand and in the question which followed Mr. Curran lashed out at the Clover Meats dispute.

Mr. Curran said that farming in Ireland had been greatly inhibited ever since the strikes in the industrial sector. "What happened in Limerick was a national disgrace and would not be tolerated in any other country in the world," he said.

Mr. Curran went on to say that the action of thirty or forty men had put more than three hundred others out of work and a whole region out of gear. It bordered on sabotage and nothing else, he added.

**A LONG WAY TO GO**

Mr. Fenton in his address on his visit to New Zealand had told the meeting that they in Ireland had a long way to go yet before they could hope to compete on a basis of parity with the New Zealand farmer. He regretted most of all not having made the Department aware of his land as the farmer had done so much of the advice he had given in County Waterford in that time would not have been given by him.

In Ireland, like New Zealand, he said, the rich farmer tended to get richer and the poor poorer and he believed the only possible way to get over this problem was by the introduction of group farming.

"By this I mean that two or three small farmers get together and buy a house and farm in Ireland in the coming years," Mr. Fenton also stated that it was going to take an awful lot of money to develop Ireland, farming wise, or the same lines as presently pertained in New Zealand. That was the country in his view for Ireland to follow and he believed the Department of Agriculture should have a scheme being developed there to pass on first hand information of the progressive schemes being developed there.

Concluding Mr. Fenton said that if every Irish farmer devoted his land as the farmers had done in New Zealand the return would be fantastic by present standards.

In the question and answer session which followed Mr. Curran made his remarks on the Clover Meats dispute in Limerick.

### FARMERS HANDICAPPED

Mr. W. Dover also stated that Irish farming had been handicapped down the years by the absence of a proper market for their products. But now they were entering a new era and it was time for them all to put their shoulders to the wheel.

It was finally agreed that Mr. Fenton would give an illustrated account of his New Zealand visit at the next meeting by means of slides. It was further decided that the slides would be used by Mr. Fenton at lectures on his New Zealand visit throughout the country.
