PENSMAN TAKES YOU BEHIND THE SPOTLIGHT

MAKING US PAY

These are the "attitudes" of the British Government in regard to the problem of Irish units who would believe that Britain would be prepared to discuss any moves based on consultation and peaceful means as being a little more than a pipe dream. Those of us who would accept this mistaken idea are the mistake in the sense that the forces of British Conservatism would allow us to continue in that belief that what happens "up there" does not reflect upon us "down here" in the most particular way.

It does reflect on us insofar as the control of British sport is concerned. For more than a year now we have seen major international sporting fixtures cancelled for this country while English "Sportsmen" have not only themselves mounted a boycott of this country but have influenced others to follow suit. The latest in this long line of cancellations has been the 1973 European Amateur Golf Championship fixed for Killiney.

The reason given in all these cases has been the political situation in Ireland. But in fact the true reason, although it is not and cannot be admitted by these British Sporting Organisations and individuals, is that they want to make us pay for what is taking place in the North and to make us feel the pinch of financial loss as a result.

It is not really the function of sporting organisations to concern themselves with politics and while we may forget, at this stage, how these organisations conveniently overlooked that it was Britain's neglect of the past fifty years which has led to the present violence, we cannot forget, nor should we forgive how these British sportsmen bend themselves when their empire (sic) demand it.

ARDMORE'S HOUSING NEEDS

Does Ardmore need a housing scheme or not? In the light of information which came to me during the week, the answer can be closed as a "Yes" for the past fifty years.

At the October meeting of Waterford County Council the matter was raised and the opinion was voiced that there was no great demand for new houses in the area. It came to light at that meeting that the Council were the owners of a site for a scheme there for many years although they were unaware of this themselves. Then it was stated that the site in question was unworkable as it would be unworkable to develop it.

At last Monday's meeting of the Council the opinion that there was no demand for houses in Ardmore was reiterated. How true is this?

Since Monday I have learned that a meeting, called by the clergy and teachers of the parish, was held last week at which this matter of the housing needs was discussed at length. The final result of this meeting was that there was a strong need for the building of a number of houses and it was decided to send a deputation to the next Council meeting to press this demand.

I have been making some enquiries about the position myself in the meantime and it would appear that the information I have received and the opinions voiced by some members of the County Council on the matter are completely at variance.

I understand that at present there are six people who would be firm applicants for houses in Ardmore and I was told that the housing situation is so bad there that some young men with their families have been forced to go elsewhere to find homes. Because of the lack of houses it is estimated that the population of Ardmore shows a distinct downward trend, as evidenced

I.F.A. SYMPOSIA ON DEATH DUTIES

GOVERNMENT CASHING IN ON INFLATED LAND VALUES

The Co. Waterford Executive of the Irish Farmers' Association, in conjunction with Allied Irish Banks Ltd., will hold a symposium on Estate Duty in Tramore and Dungarvan, and the importance of the talks to be given at such of these venues as are referred to a Press Conference held at Lawlor's Hotel, Dungarvan on Tuesday last.

Present at the conference were Mr. Michael Kieley, Chairman, Co. Executive I.F.A., Mr. P. Coghlan, member of the I.F.A. National Rates Committee, Mr. Tom Corcoran, P.R.O. Co. Executive, and Mr. T. Boyd, Manager, National Bank and Mr. R. Stack, Manager, Bank of Ireland, Dungarvan. Mr. Coghlan who addressed the conference stated that estate duty was intended to re-distribute wealth accumulated over a lifetime. This was fair enough in the days when taxation was very light but it could be argued, nowadays, that it would be more equitable if it could also be argued that because of inflation, estate duty was now being levied on people it was never intended to hit.

CASHING IN ON INFLATION

Mr. Coghlan went on to say that the 50 per cent increase in the value of land since 1945 has meant that a farmer who owned a 100 acre farm in 1945 would now own a 100 acre farm worth £200,000 and did not attract estate duty. Today a similar farm would be worth £2,000,000 and can be liable for estate duty amounting to £200,000. Land values have risen 10 times but estate duty has risen from £10,000 and thus the Government is cashing in on inflation.

PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT OF CARAVAN PARK AT HELVICK NOT ACCEPTABLE TO TOURIST BOARD

At their meeting last July, members of Waterford County Council approved the carrying out of certain amenity works in the Helvick area at a total cost of £25,000 of which £3,000 would be provided by grant from Bord Fáilte through the agency of the Regional Tourist Board. One of the projects submitted by the Council was the development of a caravan park at Helvick at an estimated cost of £4,000.

At last Monday's meeting of the Council the development of the Council in Dungarvan, the County Secretary, Mr. J. G. Dowling reported that they had since been informed by the Regional Tourist Board that it was not acceptable as such projects did not come within the ambit of the fund provided and they had been requested to submit an alternative scheme. The report added that the Helvick Tourist Board had suggested that the Council might reconsider the scheme for the development of a caravan park at Helvick which was one of the original proposals laid before the Council, the cost of which was also estimated at £4,000.

Mr. C. Curran, Chairman, suggesting that the Council might adjourn discussion on the matter until next meeting said that it was possible that the Tourism Manager might have another look at the proposal.

Mr. S. Whelan said that the most needed project in Helvick was a caravan site and Mr. M. Harby agreed that this was so.

The matter was then adjourned.

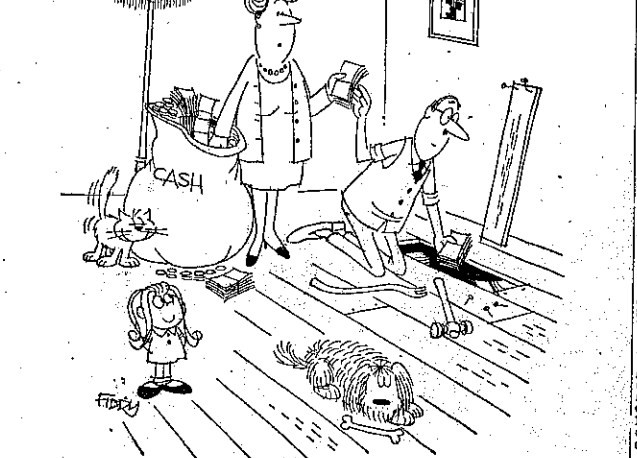
