ROAD SAFETY SUNDAY
 Next Sunday, December 10, has been chosen throughout the country as Road Safety Sunday. The purpose of the day is to focus attention on the increasing slaughter which is taking place on our roads in an effort to reduce the number of road accidents. Here in County Waterford, the County Road Safety Officer, Mr. Bertie White, Dungarvan, is organising a programme to cover the situation while special sermons on the subject will be preached in all churches.

It is indeed a most terrifying truth that in 1971 the number of people killed on the roads was 576. The total of road deaths for this year is expected to exceed 600. It is a grim thought when it is noted that these figures represent the equivalent of a small town in Ireland every year. Apart from those killed, close on 10,000 are injured—some maimed for life. The cost of accidents in economic terms is bod enough, the cost in terms of human tragedy and suffering is immeasurable.

The causes of accidents are many—excessive speed, carelessness or aggressiveness by drivers, motor and pedal cyclists and pedestrians—but a single factor, however, stands out in the statistics as a major contributory cause in road accidents—particularly fatal accidents—drinking and driving.

In this country it has been estimated that the risk of being killed or injured in a road accident is over seven times as great as between 11 p.m. and 12 midnight compared with daylight hours. It is just too much of a coincidence that the number of road deaths with pub closing hours. The risks on Saturday and Sunday nights—traditional drinking nights—are even greater.
