Proposed Dungarvan Council Houses Would Have Inflated Cost

A new crux has developed in regard to the proposed layout and housing scheme for the Quann's site at Dungarvan. The report submitted to the Council by the consultants for the site at Quann's, which was approved at their September meeting, is a lay-out design for the erection of 180 houses at Quann's (Ringmulligan) and agreed to start with a first stage of 30 houses. The report stated that the consultants for the development were then asked to prepare lay-out drawings with drainage and road proposals, stated plans for houses and over all costs for the scheme.

NEW CRUX IN DEVELOPMENT OF SITE AT QUANN'S
 "An access road of considerable length from the Youghal Road would have to be provided as part of the cost of the first thirty houses, thus adding to the cost of such houses. In order to avoid the additional cost under this heading it was considered desirable to re-locate the site for the proposed shopping centre to the far side of the access road from where it had been positioned and erect 30 houses on the area which this would leave available. The cost of the necessary road layout for the first 30 houses would be reduced and this would help to bring the house costs down to an acceptable level.

 Mr. Dowling said that they would have a report on the feasibility of such a proposal for the next meeting and this could be considered in conjunction with the consultant's report. The Council agreed to this procedure.

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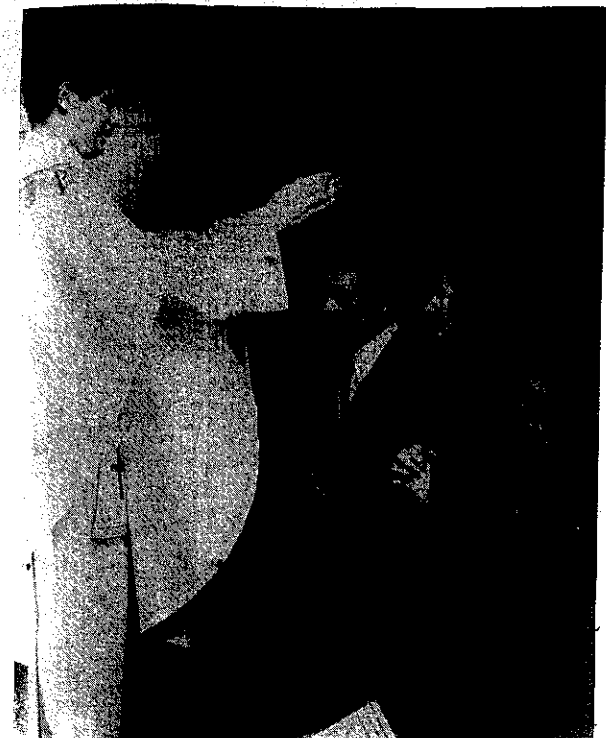

TEN PER CENT SALARY INCREASE FOR NURSES

At a special meeting of the Executive Council of the Irish Nurses Organisation it was decided to accept the offer made at Conciliation on the 13th inst.

A ten per cent increase to all nursing grades in the general hospital and Public Health was agreed to be payable retrospectively to January 1, 1972, calculated on the basis of wages in operation at December 31st 1971.

The Organisation's claims based on other anomalies, arising from the delay in implementing the concept of equal pay for work of equal value specifically referred to in the Interim Report of the Commission on the Status of Women are referred to Arbitration.

A new claim on behalf of Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent Public Health Nurses is also being referred to Arbitration. The Organisation claims specific anomalies arose because of the Minister's agreement at Conciliation in their regard in 1971. This was based on an increase granted to all general hospital and public health nurse grades at a result of an Arbitration Award in 1970.

Existing scales in the basic grades, inclusive of the first and the 13th rounds: Staff Nurse £1,400-£1,480; Ward Sister £1,480-£1,715; Public Health Nurse £1,575-£1,805.

Special allowances are payable for geriatrics, coronary or intensive care, orthopaedics, cancer and theatre duty. Two long service increments of £47 each are payable in addition to above scales following 18 years service and a shortening of the incremental scale is due to be considered also at Arbitration.

It has recently been agreed that continuous temporary service preceding permanent service will reckon for service increments. Health Boards have also obtained Ministerial sanction to give incremental credit in all hospital or public health grades for previous relevant service in Northern Ireland or abroad. Up to a few days ago this applied in the Staff Nurse grade only in Health Boards.

MINISTER'S SIGNATURE HOLDING UP DUNGARVAN PARKING LAWS

The enforcement of the proposed new parking by-laws for Dungarvan was being held up because the Minister for Local Government had not so far signed the necessary order members of Dungarvan Urban Council were told at their monthly meeting last week.

The Town Clerk, Mr. M. O'Connor, said that the Council had made several requests in recent months to have the matter completed and a letter had now been received from the office of the Garda Commissioner in which it was stated that the by-laws had in fact been submitted to the Minister for his signature.

Mr. P. Whelan said that the present position was doing the business people of the town a great deal of damage. Mr. N. Kelly asked why the people of O'Connell Street should be victimised as they would when the new parking laws came into force.

Mr. P. Whelan said that local people should use the new car park and leave the parking space in the town for people who want to come in to do business. Mr. T. Wade said that the car park had been provided at a cost of £18,000 and it should be used.

Finally the Council unanimously agreed to send an urgent request to the Minister to sign the order without further delay.

PINNACLES OF DUNGARVAN CHURCH OF IRELAND DANGEROUS PUBLIC APPEAL PROPOSED FOR RESTORATION

The pinnacles of St. Mary's Church of Ireland in Dungarvan are in a dangerous condition and steps will have to be taken to carry out repairs if the Church in its present form is to be preserved. This was the message contained in a letter from Rev. Canon D. G. A. Clarke, Rector, which was read at the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council last week.

A short time ago, Mr. Walsh (Town Engineer) very kindly pointed out to me that he considered the pinnacles on the lower part of the church required examination. Our architect, Mr. Harvey Jacob, Waterford, has examined the tower and he has reported that the pinnacles are in a dangerous condition. We have posted a notice to this effect.

The letter then goes on: "The architect reports that we can either remove the pinnacles altogether, or have them renewed. He realises that such an operation would be a considerable strain on the financial resources of a small community, especially as over £20,000 was spent on this building a few years ago and he suggests that if the townspeople of Dungarvan are concerned to preserve a part of their cultural heritage there might be a public appeal to assist the members of the Church of Ireland. In view of the very happy ecclesiastical relationships which exist in Dungarvan I write to put this suggestion before the Urban District Council for comment."

GOOD COMMUNITY EFFORT... Mr. T. Ryan, Chairman, said he felt it would be a pity to destroy the appearance of the church for the sake of about £20,000 which he understood would be the cost of renewing the pinnacles. He added that he felt sure that the public would join in any effort to preserve the church as it was and thought that it would be a good community effort for the people of the town to join in.

Mr. D. Goode said that the Council should give Canon Clarke's letter every sympathy and while he realised that the Council could not become involved financially in the matter he felt they should co-operate in every way to see that this work could be carried out.

Mr. J. G. Dowling, Acting Co. Council Chairman, said he agreed to endorse the letter and recommend the proposal to the public for their support. Mr. J. G. Dowling said he agreed that the Chairman should confer with Canon Clarke and he would be glad to deal with the problem.

So vast was the concourse that the church was unable to accommodate all who turned up for the celebrated Requiem Mass.

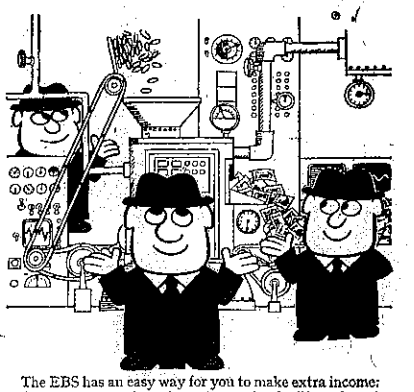
