GOVERNMENT PLAN WILL REDUCE RATES

As forecast in my column last week that a statement was imminent from the Government on their proposals to reduce health charges on rates with a view to their complete removal within a period of four years, a statement was, in fact, issued by the Government Information Bureau on behalf of Mr. James Tully, Minister for Local Government last Friday.

The text of the G.I.B. statement was as follows: "In the 14 point plan announced by the Government before the General Election it was stated that rates would be reduced by transferring health charges and housing subsidies to central taxation. The Government have now decided that for the coming year, i.e. 1973/74 the rate in the £ to be levied by each local authority for health services and local authority housing subsidies can be reduced by 25% as compared with the rate levied in 1972/73.

The effect of this decision is that in 1973/74 the Exchequer will bear the full increase in the cost of these services over the cost in 1972/73 in addition to the equivalent of the 25% by which the rates for these services are being reduced.

The Government intend to complete the transfer of the total cost of the health charges and the housing subsidies over a 4-year period commencing as mentioned above in the year 1973/74. When Waterford Co. Council met in Dungarvan on Monday, March 26, to consider the annual estimates for the coming year they had before them a general rate of 26.87 in the £ which was an increase of 95.84p over last year's rate. The amount included in the rate to cover the health services was £2.70 or 30p. in the £ more than they cost last year. The Council in the wisdom decided to strike no rate that day but agreed to defer the matter until Friday the 13th (of this month) by which time they expressed the hope that they would have more information at their disposal so as to help them reach a decision.

Since the G.I.B. statement on the health charges and housing subsidies was released the Co. Secretary, Mr. Joseph G. Dowling and the members of the staff have been going into the position of existing estimates and preparing a new rate.

When I made inquiries at the Co. Council headquarters in Dungarvan on Tuesday last I was informed that on the basis of the Minister's statement the rate for the health services for the coming year would be reduced by as much as 25% in the £. Surely this must be the best news of the County Waterford.

While there was no problem in declaring what the reduction in the health charges would be, the officials of the Council were unable to say at the time I made my inquiries about the effect of any reduction in the housing subsidies which would have on the overall rate.

In addition to this, in giving their final figure, the Council will have to take account of the increase in the bank interest rates, announced last week. The estimates were originally compiled. However, it would now seem that how- ever on Friday the 13th my inquiries will find the Council's estimates and ratepayers of Waterford in a much better frame of mind than were a fortnight ago!

MAIN STREET TRADERS WANT ONE WAY TRAFFIC IN DUNGARVAN

RE-THINK IN PARKING REGULATIONS CALLED FOR

For the second time in a couple of months traders in Dungarvan have called on the Dungarvan Urban Council to change the parking regulations which have been in force in the principal streets of the town since the beginning of January.

A 9-man deputation representing the traders of Main Street attended the monthly meeting of the Council on last Monday night and called for the introduction of a one-way traffic plan for the street with restricted parking. A month ago a similar deputation of O'Connell Street traders called for a change in the parking laws which permit no parking in these streets.

Spokesman for the Main Street traders at last Monday night's meeting was Mr. Kevin D'Arcy and he told the Council that the present regulations were proving injurious to the business people in the street. He said that the position now was that of a very strict member of the Garda force was on duty in the street and that the present facilities were not adequate and they had discussed the problem among themselves and had agreed that this was the main bone of contention and that the only solution was one-way traffic through the street.

Mr. James Ducey, another member of the deputation, said that in suggesting one-way traffic he felt that this should run from the Square towards Friary Street corner and in addition to this that limited parking confined to one hour should be allowed in the street.

When Mr. T. Kyne, T.D. Chairman, asked what side of the street they wished such limited parking to be allowed, Mr. D'Arcy replied that this did not really matter as any side of the street would do.

The members of the deputation then withdrew and the Council proceeded to discuss the position.

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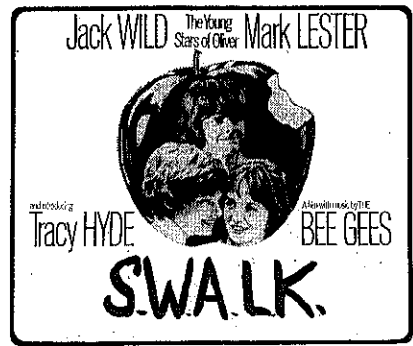

Six charged following ship sloop at Helvick

DUNGARVAN MEN REMAINED ON BAIL

SIX men, including two from Dungarvan and one from Helvick were charged at the Special Criminal Court in Dublin last Friday arising from the incidents off Helvick Head on the previous Wednesday night when the 298 ton Cypriot freighter, Claudia, was arrested by the Irish fishery protection vessel, the L.E. Deirdre and a 25 ft. blue and white fishing launch found in the vicinity at the same time was taken into custody by another naval service vessel, the L.E. Fola.

A 12-man armed party boarded the Claudia and she was taken to Haulbowline where five tons of guns, explosives and ammunition which were found on board were unloaded. The fishing launch was taken into Helvick where she remained moored under guard throughout the past week.

Following a combined Garda-Military operation, three men were taken into custody in Dungarvan on Thursday morning and they were removed later on Thursday evening under heavily armed guard to Dublin. They were Denis McInerney, a printer of Lifford, Ennis, Co. Clare, Gerard Walsh, Heating and Plumbing Contractor, Main Street, Dungarvan and Donald Whelan, Skibbereen, Co. Kerry, who is headmaster at Kilmacshamus Vocational School. Arrested in Cork were Jur Cahill, a teacher, and Mr. Justice Finlay told Whelan he had the right to return to the court at any time to seek bail on the same terms and in the same amount as that fixed for Murphy and Walsh.

'NOT FAMILIAR'

Inspector Murtugh, when asked if he was familiar with the man and had reservations about granting him bail.

He said that Murphy's wife was out of the country and that his house was wide open. Later it was submitted to the court that Murphy's wife had gone to a wedding and that she was not home permanently.

It was also submitted that he did have substantial roots in the country in that the new house into which he moved recently was owned by him. His job as assistant engineer for Waterford County Council was a substantial one with a salary in excess of £3,000 per year.

Mr. Farrell, the Assistant State Solicitor, said he would not be against bail being granted to Murphy provided there was a sufficient surety.

He said the circumstances in Murphy's case differed from those in Walsh's, and he asked that an independent surety of £7,500 be demanded.

RE-ARRESTED

Inspector Murtugh said he arrested Denis McInerney, Donald Whelan and Gerard Walsh at 11.5 a.m. on March 20 at Dungarvan Harbour, off Helvick Pier, Co. Waterford, under the Offences Against the State Act. He handed copies of the charges before the court to these three defendants and three others.

MANY ENQUIRIES

Mr. Farrell, Assistant State Solicitor, asked that the case be put in for mention a week's time as extensive enquiries had still to be made. Mr. McInerney and Garvey did not apply for bail, and they remained in custody until Friday, when Mr. Justice Finlay, who presided said that the case will be brought before court again for mention.

HOW THE 'SUNDAY TIMES' SAW IT

This was how the 'Sunday Times' reported the incident last Sunday. The report, headed 'Gumbat caught in wind of change', across 4 columns on the front page was prepared by a team of five reporters, two in London and one each in Dublin, Belfast and in Hamburg.

The first government's arrest of the gun-running master Claudia just before midnight last Wednesday resolved a long-standing conflict in British diplomatic and intelligence circles about when and how to blow the whistle on IRA smuggling.

Both military intelligence and the espionage services have known for more than two years about IRA efforts to import arms from Eastern Europe via the Mediterranean, as well as the United States. But the Foreign Office, sensitive to the need not to reveal to play Big Brother to Dublin, was not made use of the knowledge.

From time to time that has led the more impatient services to look for a substitute for action. As recently as last December, Dublin was denying that such reports were true. But it was according to a knowledgeable and highly-creditable British source 'a number of things were put together. These were:

1. The surprise victory of Liam Cosgrave in Dublin's snap election of March 2, after the Claudia's gun-running operation had got under way.

2. The IRA's failure to foresee that an impending change of government could affect the Claudia operation.

3. The fact that when Cosgrave took office, he surprised even Britain by ending so promptly the free government's traditional attitude of indulgence towards 'the Movement.'

The cruise of the Claudia began on December 12 last year when she left Hamburg on her maiden voyage under a new name and a new owner, a registered arms dealer and convicted arms smuggler, Gunter Leinhausen. On January 2 the Claudia arrived in Malta. From there on her movements became something of a mystery. Intelligence surveillance of minor shipping movements in the Mediterranean is limited, and relies to a large extent on what the captain tells harbour authorities.

In this case the Claudia's skipper, Captain Hans-Ludwig Flugel, told the Malta authorities that her destination after Malta was Beirut. Wherever she went, it was not Beirut, because the Claudia was back in Malta five days later, too short a period for the 2,800-mile round trip. After two days the Claudia again left Malta. And again, according to Customs records, her destination was Beirut. On February 15 she arrived in Tunis, left saying that she was going to Dubrovnik, where she never arrived, and on March 12 was back in Tunis.

She sailed a day later, and British intelligence believes she loaded her cargo of arms at Zlata, to the west of Tripoli, in Libya. The coast road from Tripoli is a good one. The cargo arrived only five tons, a load for a single truck and from shore to ship for a small schooner. Claudia's own gear board in a matter of minutes.

From the moment the Claudia passed through the Straits of Gibraltar and was sighted by Lloyds Starlight Station there, her movements were known in detail. To begin with, her sighting

U.D.C. CHAIRMAN CONGRATULATED ON RE-ELECTION TO DAIL

CLAIMS THERE WERE 100 TONS

The West German arms dealer, Herr Gunter Leinhausen (40), has claimed that he was middleman in a £50,000 arms deal between the I.R.A. and Col. Gadafi of the Libyan leader, which resulted in the capture of the 290-ton freighter, Claudia, by the Irish Navy.

Speaking in Hamburg where the Claudia arrived last Monday night, Herr Leinhausen said he had flown to Tripoli to arrange the deal after he was contacted in late January by the I.R.A.

He said he had been paid half his fee in sterling in advance by the I.R.A. but had not lost on the deal. The I.R.A. dealt directly with the Libyans, and although he was not present when the arms and explosives were loaded on the Claudia, he claimed it had an original cargo of 100 tons of war materials.

However, the Claudia, which is owned by Gromar Shipping Co. of Hamburg, of which Herr Leinhausen is managing director, and his wife, Marlene, a 90 p.c. shareholder, had only a cargo of five tons when seized.

The other weapons could have been dropped overboard when the crew realised something was wrong, he said.

SEEMS UNLIKELY Such a task would have taken several hours, as the entire crew of the Claudia was only two Germans and three Turks. At the same time, it seems unlikely that the 290-ton ship would have travelled over 2,000 miles with the relatively tiny cargo of five tons.

Giving details of arrangements for transporting the arms, Herr Leinhausen said the 18-year-old Claudia was to have been loaded outside Libyan territorial waters, and an I.R.A. vessel was to have sailed off the Irish coast, outside the three-mile limit.

He said he would be asking the German Consul, Herr Ludwig Flugel, and his five-man crew, whether or not the ship was in Irish waters at the time of its arrest. He said he would then give a press conference if the ship was not seized by British police.

However, Hamburg police who launched an investigation into the ownership of the Claudia family business, on Friday last, said they would be taking no action. The Cyprus-based ship did not fly the West German flag and had not violated law within German territorial waters.

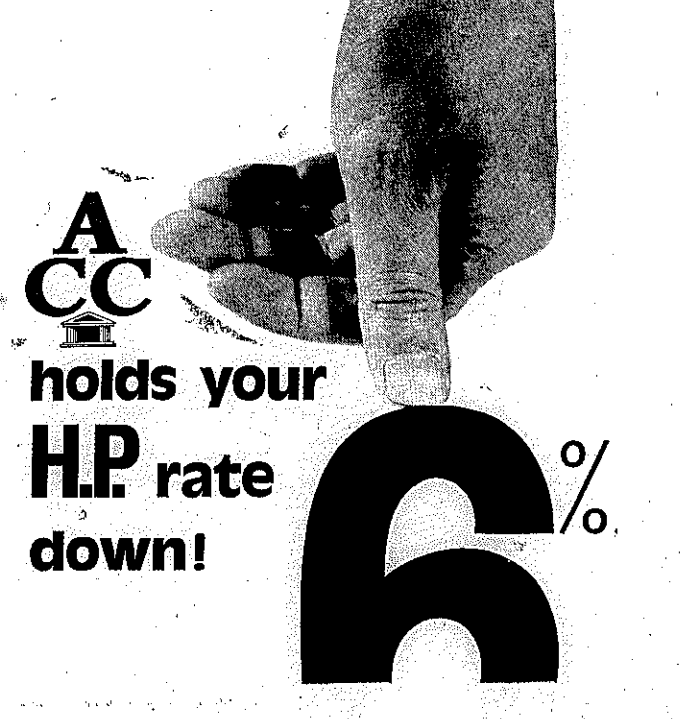
