behind the SPOTLIGHT

MOTORISTS AND INCREASING INSURANCE

Insurance Companies are to be allowed to increase their basic premium rates for motor insurance by 10% from June 1st next. This was the recommendation of the National Prices Commission recently published after they had considered an application on behalf of the tariff motor insurance companies for permission to increase premiums from 20% to 50%.

But in making the recommendation the Commission made it clear that companies should not be permitted to increase their present "loadings" above existing levels and that when granting cover to a new customer or renewing cover for an existing customer, the companies should, from June 1st next, itemise the basic premium and the precise amounts of each loading and of each abatement by way of no claims bonus or other reason.

The application of "loadings" to basic premiums is a common practice among insurance companies where they judge a particular risk unattractive—for example for young, very old or inexperienced drivers, policy holders with accident records, vehicles over a certain age or policy holders resident in certain areas or attached to certain professions. But while the right of insurance companies to apply such loadings where the risk involved is above average is not disputed, any moves by the companies to increase them merely to deflect the purpose of the control exercised by the Minister for Industry and Commerce must and should be questioned.

For a long time now motor insurance has become a growing problem and has been the cause of much dissatisfaction among the motoring public. In the case of young drivers especially the frustrations of attempting to obtain cover are fairly well-known. This was pin-pointed at the last sitting of the District Court in Dungarvan when two young drivers were fined heavily for driving without cover despite the fact that both explained that they had made attempts to obtain the necessary insurance cover which the law requires. One of the defendants stated that he had "tried" six companies, all but one of which absolutely refused to offer him any terms while the sixth agreed to accept him for an annual premium of £181! The other stated that he had been offered coverage for a premium of £150 but could not afford to take it.

It is now becoming apparent that many companies want to opt out of this sphere of insurance activity altogether and are discouraging any new business by applying excessively high rates to those referred to in the preceding paragraph. The principal reason which they give for this is that they are suffering heavy losses on the motor side of their business but the picture being painted by the companies is black as they would have you believe. Admittedly

they do suffer losses in this field but the underwriting profit or loss (that is, premium received less claims paid and outstanding management expenses, commission, etc.) does not have regard to the income earned by the companies on investment of their funds. In 1971 when losses were reckoned at £390,000 this investment income has been roughly estimated to have approached the region of £1 million. So while they may be losing on the swings the insurance companies are certainly making up on the roundabouts in this way.

Meanwhile the unfortunate motorist, no matter how good his record, can only look with dismay at the ever escalating cost of getting even minimum cover so that he may continue to drive his car on the roads and remain within the law!

WHAT IT COSTS HERE AND THERE

In recent weeks housewives in the United States sparked off world wide TV coverage as they mounted a big protest about high meat prices. They boycotted butchers' shops and supermarkets and pressurised the White House to such an extent that President Nixon eventually came up with the suggestion that perhaps one or two meatless days each week would help in balancing the domestic budgets.

Here in Ireland rising food prices have also been proving a great headache for the harassed housewife who is finding that the pace at which they are accelerating is fast outstripping what she can afford. Recently the President of the Farmers' Association was highly critical of people in this country who find fault with the rising prices especially of meat and dairy products because of the increases which farmers are getting for livestock and dairy produce.

Are Irish housewives justified in the complaints they are making and how do they stand in relation to their opposite numbers in the U.S. where food prices are concerned? Michael Duggan recently made a comparison of the cost of living in this country and in America based on U.S. prices quoted in New York for the first week of April and Irish prices quoted in Dublin for April 16) and his findings which were published in last Saturday's "Irish Times" will, I am sure, surprise you as much as they did me.

From the tables published in the Times I take the following random prices for Dublin with the New York prices in brackets and readers will have little difficulty in judging the present situation for themselves: Butter (1 lb.) 28p (21p); Margarine 7p (16p); Sireaky Bacon (1 lb.) 38p (40p); Eggs (Doz. large) 39p (24p); Tea (72 bags) 28p (24p 100 bags); Bread (sliced) 14p (10p); Meat prices (per lb.) show that we are more consistently higher than in the grocery lines and samples given were (with Dublin prices again first) Leg of Lamb 44p (24p); Lamb chops (shoulder) 58p (56p); Pork

MOUNT MELLERAY SEMINARY TO BE PHASED OUT NOTED EDUCATIONAL ESTABLISHMENT WILL CLOSE IN TWO YEARS

A DECISION which has been given deep consideration for many months past was finally reached last week when the members of the Cistercian Community at Mount Mellerey Abbey, Cappoquin, decided by majority vote to phase out the Secondary Boarding College which has been attached to the world famed Abbey and run by the Community for the past 130 years.

The decision to break this teaching link which has covered such a long span of years and which has become so much a part of the tradition in which Mount Mellerey is steeped was announced by the Lord Abbot, Dom Paul Hennessy. The secondary college, which in the present year has a total of 127 boarders, will not, however, cease to function immediately. Instead it is planned to phase it out over the next two years, and parents of pupils have been officially notified to that effect.

Mr. Brendan Breen, B.A., H.Dip. in Ed., senior lay teacher at the college (he has been there since 1945), commenting on the decision to close the college said that the lay teachers deeply regretted the demise of so long established an educational institution in which he and his teaching colleagues had committed their lives in a full and unique way. He understood fully the reasons which prompted the decision, but he and his colleagues were deeply appreciative of the certain success given them by the Lord Abbot and community.

NEW JUDGING PROGRAMME AT SPRING SHOW

The programme of judging for the cattle and sheep classes at this year's Spring Show has been arranged so that the dairy and the beef cattle will be in the ring at a different time. There is also a major educational aspect to this year's show with five carcass beef competitions, lamb carcass classes, a wool centre in the Simmons court extension, with fleeces classes, and a very comprehensive programme of lectures.

NEW NAVIGATIONAL SYSTEM WILL HELP FISHERMEN

"Slave" Station At Ardmore

Final accurate calibrations to put the Decca navigational system for the west coast on the air will be carried out over the next few weeks. The calibrations or accuracy testing of the system could not be undertaken before now due to the interference caused by the short daylight periods.

The Decca Navigator, as the system is called, will give exact positional information over the fishing grounds of the western approaches to Ireland. As this also includes our northern and southern coasts, it will cover the rich sea fishing areas which, up to now, have been outside the range of a similar system on the west coast of Britain.

From these stations equipment leased from the Decca Navigator Company will continuously transmit radio signals which can be received and recorded on special receiving sets on fishing vessels and other craft.

A vessel's precise position can be plotted from these signals. Provided at a cost of £1m, the benefits of the system to our sea fishing industry will be immense. Navigation of trawlers to reach selected fishing grounds as quickly as possible and subsequently to return to port by the best route, will be made easy. No longer will the hours of darkness or fog or navigation out of sight of land marks, or conditions of poor visibility, have their special hazards for the fishing skipper.

The position of good fishing grounds can be noted and, by relating the Decca position to the indications on the echo sounder, effective trawling can be undertaken.

A skipper can return with a maximum of delay to fishing grounds that he has previously found productive. The position of wrecks, rough bottom and other obstacles that can damage nets and other expensive gear can be pinpointed and avoided in future. In addition to these advantages, the larger vessels now joining the fleet will be able to venture further into the Atlantic and to remain at sea for longer periods.

It is estimated that the Decca Navigator will increase our sea-fish landings by as much as 25 per cent, based on the present level of the fleet. Fishing nowadays is a highly skilled operation. To get the best results we need the most efficient vessels, the most modern fishing gear and the best electronic aids available.

The provision of the navigator system is, therefore, yet another step towards the greater prosperity to which our fishermen are fully entitled.

HAS TELEVISION KILLED READING

Objection To £70,000 Development Plan For Waterford Libraries

The advent of television had wreaked havoc on the library service throughout the country and he doubted the wisdom of proceeding with so costly a development programme.

Mr. Norman Walsh said he believed they would do it; development for £70,000.

Mr. Foran said with the readership potential on the decrease, it was a fantastic burden to place on the ratepayers of the county. He honestly doubted the wisdom of proceeding with so elaborate a development programme, particularly in the light of the havoc wreaked on the library service since the advent of television.

From "The Dungarvan Journal," 1883 A HISTORICAL SKETCH OF DUNGARVAN

We take the following article from the old "Dungarvan Journal," dated November, 1883. It is a historical sketch of the Old Boro, written at that time by some anonymous historian, probably the Editor of the Journal who was also the publisher, the late Mr. D. Brennan.

"Dungarvan, the second town in this county can lay claim to a very high and hallowed antiquity. It was founded early in the seventh century by Garbain, in whose honour it was anciently called Achad-Garbain where was founded a great Abbey of Canons of Saint Augustine, but no trace of the building now remains.

The sketch should prove of interest to those interested in the history of the town.

A reasonably good mark was off Helvic Head, best fish of Conger. Another area 3 miles east of Mine Head yielded good general fishing for a variety of species.

Drop a line to the Conger King at 10, St. John's St. that he can assess the support to this after season Lecture and Film Show.

The Trust recommends the return of all unwanted fish to help in conservation of fish stocks, especially Skate, Monkfish and Bass, which have become very scarce on account of overfishing.

Trout Fishing - Trout returns after the 1972 season. The anglers fishing waters developed by the Trust showed a total of 32,936 trout weighing 45,740 lbs. (over 20 tons). These figures represent a small proportion of total catches for the season as the vast majority fail to stay a return. A good sporting angler would give a return and help the Trust.

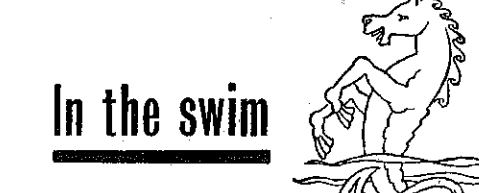
