# Behind the SPOTLIGHT

### A POOR SERVICE

A number of people have made complaints to me about the poor service provided by Dungarvan Urban Council in the matter of refuse collection in certain districts during the Christmas period. Household collections went dead as from mid-day on Christmas Eve and were not resumed until Monday last—a lapse of a full week. This meant that all areas of the town had to do without this essential service for seven days at a period when it was most required. But in addition to this there were parts of the urban area which had not had their bins cleared since the Thursday prior to Christmas Eve and for them the long holiday meant that they had to store refuse for almost a fortnight—surely a far too long period. Shops and business houses remained open until late on Christmas Eve; essential services had to be maintained even on Christmas Day and St Stephen's Day and for many it was a case of back to normal work the day after but this did not apply to the scavenging service of Dungarvan Urban Council and as a result many people had to put up with a great deal of inconvenience. When work has to be done it should be done and the men who have to do it should be paid accordingly. And certainly such an essential service as the collection of household refuse should not be suspended for such a lengthy period.

### CONTROL THIEVES

The great petrol shortage has once more seen the rise of thieves who move around at night-time equipped with rubber tubes and containers looking for a car parked in some quiet place and which has no locking cap on the tank. They then proceed to siphon off the contents and disappear. This has been happening with increasing regularity in recent weeks and many motorists are conscious of the fact that when they park their vehicles even in the most public of places at times now they are a target for these sly brigades. Locking caps for petrol tanks are at a premium and the demand for them has been so great that they are unobtainable at the moment. Consequently motorists cannot be blamed for not being able to protect their cars with their precious petrol supplies from these raiders. Perhaps this is a matter which the Garda night patrols might look into a little closer.

### ESPRIT DE CORPS

There was quite a display of esprit de corps, I understand, at the last meeting of the South-East Regional Health Board during which a new chairman for the coming year was elected. The Board is composed of a certain number of elected representatives and representatives of the medical, nursing and kindred professions. My information concerning the election is that the esprit de corps was in evidence only among the elected members of the Board and not among the representatives but when shown an utter loyalty to their colleagues.

The contest for the Chairmanship being vacated by Mr. J. Bowe (FG), lay between an "elected" and a "nominated" representative—Mr. Charlie Curran, Chairman of Waterford County Council and Dr. M. Keogh Carlow. Dr. Keogh won the contest by 11 votes to 11 for Curran. It is the build-up to the election that I wish to comment on not the actual outcome of it. At the outset the elected representatives, including four TD's were absent from the meeting and this was a "diplomatic" or one caused by the necessity where these

public representatives are concerned is hard to say, but one may hazard a good guess. Certainly the annual meeting for the election of Chairman is reckoned as the most important meeting of the year for any body, society or organisation and one would imagine that this being so, all the members of such a body as the Regional Health Board would make it a point of being present. In the actual voting between Mr. Curran and Dr. Keogh, one member of the Board abstained and two members from Waterford voted against Mr. Curran. They were Dr. M. Maughan and Mr. R. I. Gallagher, Dentist. This was where the esprit de corps appeared to act strongly among the professional group as both of these members opted to back Dr. Keogh as against the publicly elected representative from their own county area. Mr. K. Crotty, TD was criticised when the result of the vote was announced for not voting for the elected representative's candidate, Mr. Curran but he replied to this by stating that he had no personal commitment to do so and voted for the candidate from his own constituency of Kilkenny-Carlow.

Whether there should be any divisive feelings as between professional and elected representatives on the Health Board and whether any one group should feel itself entitled to monopolise the chair are debatable points. The fact of the matter, however, in the latest election is that the public representatives have no one but themselves to blame for losing. If they all had turned up to the meeting in the first instance and had they all supported "their" candidate, it would have made no difference what way the members of the professional group voted. In these circumstances there is little point in crying over spilt milk now. In regard to this whole matter the latest view expressed by the Minister for Local Government should however, be of interest. This is

contained in the Discussion Document on Local Government Reorganisation released last month and at paragraph 18, this document states "The public representative, elected by statutory elections, occupies the key role in local government. The Minister does not favour the proposals of the previous Government that representatives of community councils should be placed on committees of local authorities."

This clearly shows that where the Minister for Local Government is concerned at least the elected representatives are deemed to be of more importance than the non-elected nominees of other organisations.

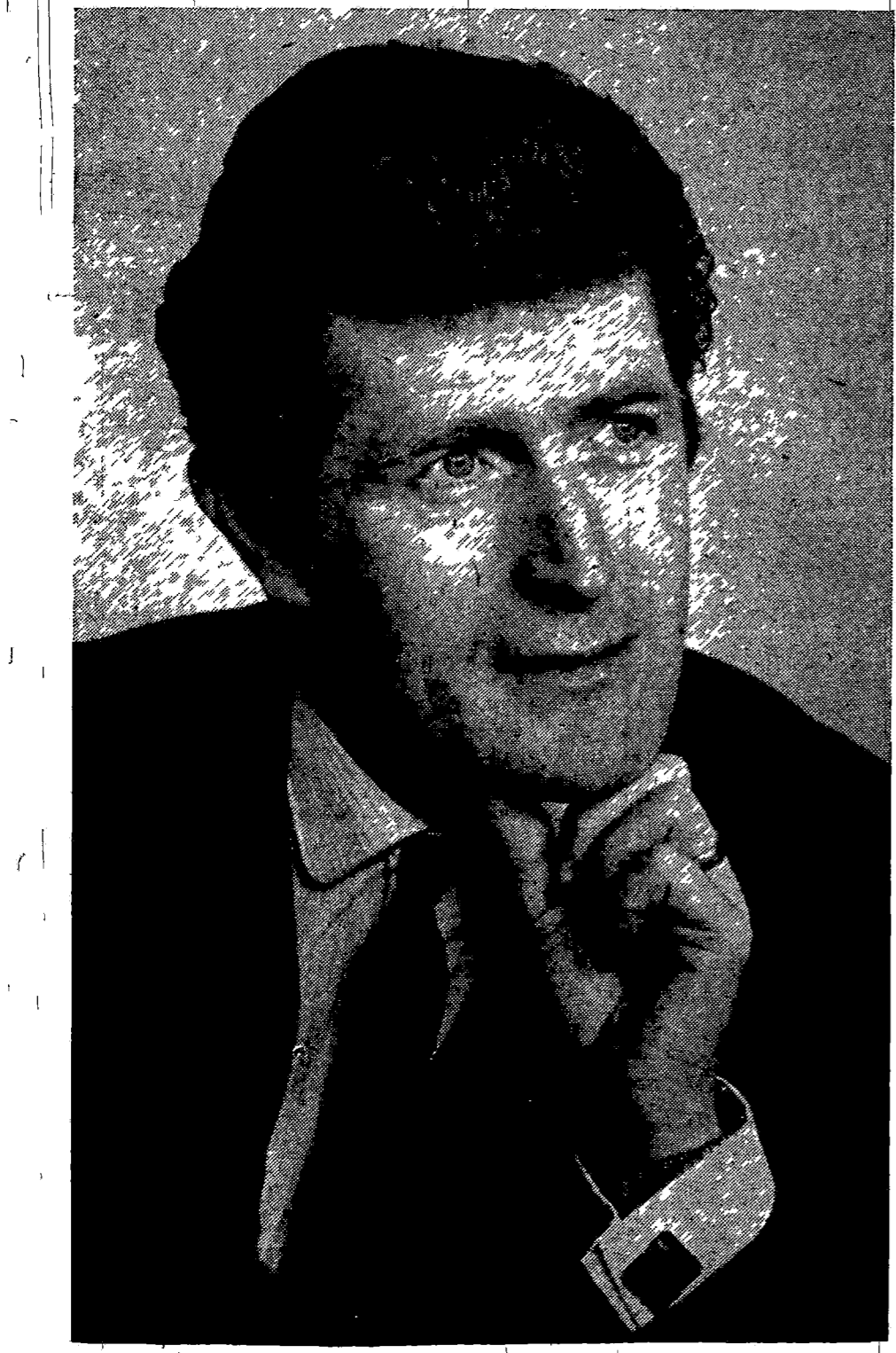
