Behind the SPOTLIGHT

A LOADED QUESTIONNAIRE

Last week a so-called questionnaire survey was carried out in the Dungarvan area purportedly under the auspices of the Departments of Geography from University College, Dublin and St Patrick's College, Maynooth. This survey was publicly stated, in a letter published in this paper in our issue of December 29, to be concerned with attitudes to pollution in the Dungarvan area and the selected interviewees were assured that their identities would not be recorded and the replies they gave to the questions asked would be treated in strictest confidence.

At first sight it all appeared fair and above board and as the survey was to be taken under the auspices of U.C.D. and St Patrick's, Maynooth it seemed to be perfectly in order.

It was only when the actual questionnaire came to light that it at once became apparent that the entire exercise was nothing less than another attack by a certain gentleman on one special industrial enterprise in Dungarvan. The questionnaire was "loaded" and completely biased and could, in no way, be said to be even in the least way fair. Consequently any replies, if any were given, could not in any circumstances give any results which could be taken as indicating "local attitudes to pollution in the Dungarvan area". It would have been far better for the man who mounted this survey, using the banner of U.C.D. and St Patrick's, Maynooth to have come out and stated his correct reason for his exercise in the first instance.

How far and to what extent University College, Dublin and Maynooth are prepared to stand behind this so-called survey I do not at this moment know. I was in contact with the Registrar's Office at Maynooth last week in an effort to ascertain this but because of Christmas holidays the necessary information was not available. I was given a promise however that the matter would be looked into and that the College would supply me with their comments in due course. I await these comments with interest.

 In my post-bag last week was a letter, all the way from

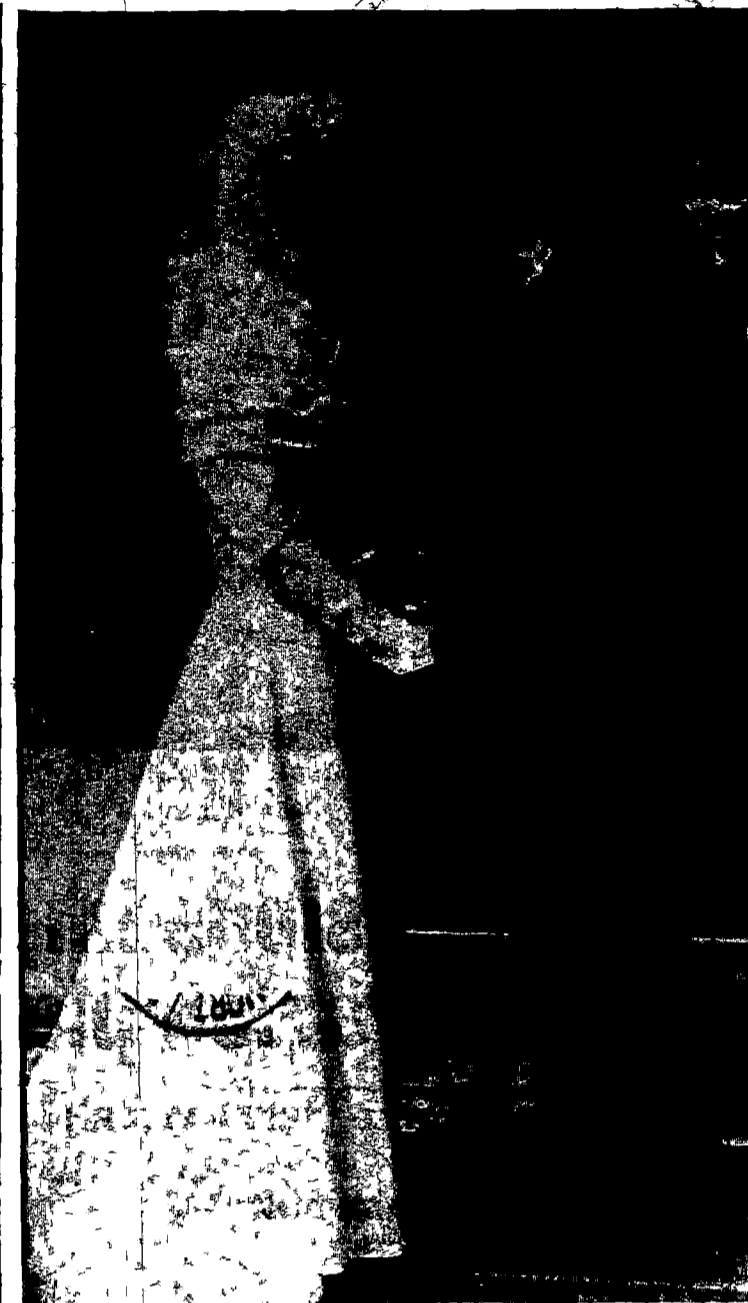

Secretary's report to Western Convention

In the course of his report to next Sunday's Western G.A.A. Convention to be held in Lisnare, Secretary Seamus O'Brien states:

In keeping with the trends of recent years, the number of teams which entered for the various championships showed a new record total of one hundred and forty-nine and of this number, only four teams withdrew before the first rounds. With such a huge number of teams taking part, it is understandable that finishing our ten championships within the season, created some problems, but with the splendid co-operation of clubs, players and referees all our competitions were finished in reasonably good time.

The completion of the championships was considerably facilitated by the re-opening of the Fraher field which eased the venue problem in the division.

As members are now fully aware the famed venue was purchased by the County Board in May of this year and the clubs within this division who are currently sharing in the efforts to detract the purchase price are to be congratulated for their wonderful co-operation. It is confidently expected that their continued support will be forthcoming when financial help is required to further develop this historic venue.

RECORD NUMBER OF TEAMS IN 1973

Continuing the Secretary says - It must be a source of satisfaction to all Gaeils in the Division, that our games continue to increase public support and in a number of cases this year, the attendances at some of our most attractive matches reached record proportions. As a result our gate receipts reached an all-time record, despite the fact that several of our attractive fixtures clashed with other county and inter-county games.

In the majority of our matches, the satisfactory standard set in recent years was well maintained and the evidence of a thorough preparation was revealed in the displays of many of our leading teams. On the other side of the picture we had many mediocre and very poor displays by clubs who took matters for granted and did little or no training. Such clubs are advised to take a serious look at their position in the association and made to realise that the future holds nothing but disappointment and frustration for their members and supporters.

BORD NA NOG

Having given a detailed account of the various championships the Secretary draws his attention to the activities of Bord na Nog during 1973.

Recording the thanks of the Board and the Gaeils of the Division to the officer of the Bord for the tremendous amount of work they had done during '73, Mr O'Brien refers to the Annual Report of the Bord which shows that a record number of games and an increased number of competitions were run off by the Bord during the year.

SCORE '73

Referring to the Score competitions the report states - "It is disappointing to record that a big percentage of our clubs again refrained from entering in the competitions organised by the County Board Score '73 Committee. For many years clubs complained that there was no outlet for a hidden talent of the members and that the cultural aspect of our Association was being neglected.

"Thanks to the efforts of the County Board Chairman and a very hard working committee, the opportunities are now being presented to the clubs, but with a disappointing response. Many of our more enterprising clubs did participate and helped to make the 'Score' a success."

SUBJECTED TO ABUSE

Concluding the Secretary says - "Once again I must offer the very sincere thanks of the Board to our faithful band of referees who continue to function on behalf of the Board. It is sad to state that on many occasions these dedicated members while in the performance of their duties, have been subjected to abuses and interferences by some sections of the Association within this Division. The appeal to clubs in recent years to exercise better control and discipline over such offending members appears to have fallen on deaf ears as this year saw little or no improvement in this respect. It is certainly something that is not done to arrest this unsavoury trend, then nothing less than an all-out purge of the offenders will have to be undertaken if the business of refereeing is to recover its deserved respectability. If nothing is done then the whole Association is in danger."

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WATERFORD MACRA DELEGATES AT CONFERENCE IN ROME

Mr Nicholas Wall and Mr Bill Canning were the two Waterford delegates on the Irish delegation which attended a two-day conference in Rome recently. The delegation consisted of eleven Macra na Feirme representatives led by the National President, Mr Tom Sheehan.

The Conference was sponsored by Comite D'Entente for Young Farmers Organisations from EEC countries. Its aim was to come up with a solution for practical aid to the Third World.

It was recommended that Governments should give 0.7% of their gross national product as aid to poorer countries. It was also recommended that food production and marketing arrangements for agricultural produce within Third World countries could be improved if the countries involved in the Conference would draw up projects with the Third World countries.

It was an historical occasion when the first time Ireland took part in the conference which is held every five years. It was also a very memorable occasion for a number of reasons particularly that Mr Wall as a member of the Kilmacothomas Branch and can claim credit for setting up some of the most successful clubs in the county when he was County Organizer some years ago. Kilmacothomas is a member of the Dungarvan Club and is one of the stars of their excellent Badminton team.

"OFFICIAL" TRIPS TO EUROPE NOTHING MORE THAN GRAND HOLIDAYS

COUNCILLOR HITS OUT AGAINST ADDITIONAL COSTS

Tours of European and other countries by study groups, paid out of public funds, were criticised as nothing more than grand holidays for those taking part in them by Councillor Tom Foley, Stradbally, at the monthly meeting of the County Waterford Committee of Agriculture in Dungarvan last night.

In voicing his criticism Cllr Foley found himself very much alone as not one other member of the Committee backed him.

The matter arose following a request from the General Council of Committees of Agriculture for an additional ex gratia payment of £40 (made also to all other committees throughout the country) to help meet an estimated debit balance of almost £1,000 in the present financial year. The letter informed the members that the primary cause of the over expenditure were the trip abroad last year (to France and West Germany) of the study group organised by the County Council and increased travelling and subsistence allowances.

When Mr H R Dowd proposed and Mr J Keane seconded that the extra money be paid over, Mr Foley made his objection.

"We should not dish out money like this and there is no point in spending money which we cannot afford," he said. Mr Foley went on to say that he saw no valid reason why they should now be asked to come to the rescue of the General Council because that body failed to budget properly for the year.

"We have to face our own estimates," he said and an application such as this is just like coming in the back door looking for more money."

COURSING DEISE CUP WORTHY WIN BY DUFFER'S NEWDOWN

Another Deise Cup success for Jack Mullan of Newry At Clonca. Last Sunday his Duffer's Newdown which was nominated by Arthur O'Connell, proved a worthy winner of the feature event when he proved six lengths faster than Rainbow Grand the property of Mrs Nancy Walsh Mount, Odell, Dungarvan in the final. The loser was nominated by Mr Denis Ahern of Dungarvan.

Beaten in the final of the Derby Trial Stakes at Rathcoombe recently by Rainbow Gem (Bartog) owned by the Treasurer of the Dungarvan Coursing Club Mr Billy Fitzgerald went one better when winning the Derby Trial Stakes when getting the better of John Moloney's Double Guy by six lengths in the deteler.

The Oaks Trial Stakes went to Clonmel owner Mrs V Murphy when her Powerstown Pink proved too good for Martin Cheasty's Blunt June in an exciting final.

The Cup final was rather one-sided as Jack Mullan's breeze which was beaten in the final at Lisconnor and was badly grieved and had to be withdrawn from the final of the Deise Cup raced away in front to make it all and more a most impressive winner at the finish.

ONE-SIDED

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ITEMS OF INTEREST FROM THE COUNTY COMMITTEE OF AGRICULTURE

It was bad news for many farmers said Mr K O'Ryan Chairman of the County Executive Council of Agriculture when he held his meeting of the County Committee of Agriculture in Dungarvan last Monday when the CAO, Mr George Frost, stated that in reply to a query made at an earlier meeting a letter had been received from the Department of Agriculture stating that they had been informed by Comhluach Shluice Eireann Tia, that there would be no surplus beet pulp for disposal this season except for contract beet growers.

Increased mileage allowances for advisory officers of the Committee with effect as from January 1974 were approved in another letter from the Department. Mr Frost, CAO said that these new travelling expenses were allowed to bring the instructors into line with corresponding Civil Service rates.

Mr C Curran remarked that he would not object to such increases as he was aware that the cost of running motor cars had risen enormously.

The Local Appointments Commissioners notified the Committee of the permanent appointment of two Farm Home Advisers as follows: Miss Kathleen J Power, Lacksanary, Ballinacull (already employed by the Committee in a temporary capacity) and Miss Mary E Corcoran, Harbour View Bantry.

Both appointments were unanimously approved.

PIGS, HAY DESTROYED IN YOUGHAL FARM FIRE

A number of bonhams died and several tons of hay were destroyed in a fierce farm fire on the County Waterford side of Youghal Bridge in the early hours of last Monday morning.

The fire was on the farm of Mr David Barry Rinnerey, Youghal, and the Dungarvan and Youghal brigades fought it for almost eight hours before finally getting it under control. The outbreak was discovered by a member of the Barry family who was returning home from a late night dance. The alarm was immediately raised and within a short time the Youghal brigade under Station Officer Michael Roche was on the scene.

But so fierce was the blaze that the Dungarvan unit under Sub-Officer John Shanahan was also summoned and together both units fought the fire until noon.
