## PENSMAN TAKES YOU

### Behind the SPOTLIGHT

#### FREE FLOW AGAIN —ALMOST

The great petrol scare seems to be over and the desperate situation that built up during the month of December appears to have eased a great deal in recent weeks.

One of the best moves to break up the practise which saw motorists move from one queue to another in the Dungarvan area was the agreement among the local members of the Petrol Retailers Association to adopt uniform opening hours for their garages and filling stations. This means that all now open at the same time and remain open for a similar period.

Prior to this, each garage chose its own hours and this gave hoarders and panic-buyers and toppers-uppers the opportunity to move from one filling station to another as they always appeared to have ample time to remain in the long queues for whatever period was required.

A further easing of the supply position next month is also expected so this will be a further good news for motorists even if the price will then be little short of 50p per gallon.

#### WHOSE WAS IT?

In the letters column of the "Dungarvan Leader" in the issue dated December 29, a letter was published over the name of Mr Francis Walsh who gave his address as New Lane, Abbeyside and St. Patrick's College, Maynooth. This letter stated that during a questionnaire survey under the auspices of the Department of Geography from University College, Dublin and St. Patrick's College, Maynooth and concerning attitudes to pollution in the Dungarvan area would be carried out in the locality.

Subsequently a copy of the questionnaire came into our possession and having studied it we referred to it in this column in our issue of January 12 and called it "a loaded questionnaire". People with experience in these matters to whom we showed this questionnaire were also satisfied that it was indeed "loaded" and that it showed a certain amount of skill in the manner in which it was prepared.

Anxious to ascertain how far and to what extent University College and St. Patrick's College, Maynooth were concerned in the taking of this survey we contacted the Registrar's Office at Maynooth but the Registrar was not available at the time for any comment. Since then we have received a personal letter from Rev Dr Gerard McGreevy, Registrar at the College about the matter. In addition we have received a letter from Mr Stuart G. Daultrey, Lecturer in Geography at University College, Dublin which appears in our letters column in this issue, and a further letter from Mr Francis Walsh which because of its abusive nature has been consigned to the waste-paper basket.

Dr McGreevy in his letter refers to "the questionnaire of Mr Francis Walsh" concerning which he had very little to say. "Obviously," he stated "the Administration here in Maynooth could not be expected to have any control over the type of questionnaire included in questionnaires issued by any Academic Department in the College." His letter adds "In most cases it would have very little competence to make a judgment on any type of questionnaire which are or are not of a subjective matter."

Professor Daultrey's letter indicates that the survey was carried out by a 3rd year student of the Geography Department at U.C.D. Walsh's letter, apart from the abusive pieces states an allegation that my survey constituted an attack on the industrial enterprise in question is an insult to the responsibility and independence of mind of the 200 persons in the Dungarvan locality who were, after all, only being asked for their opinions.

(Note the emphasis on "my" above has been placed there by me) From the three letters it immediately becomes obvious that the question must now be posed again "who was responsible for this questionnaire survey?" Was it Mr Walsh or was it Professor Daultrey's student? And additionally it might also be asked, with reference to the Rev Registrar's letter, what structure of control and discipline at present exists within the University. Perhaps when the Registrar, Professor and the Lecturer sort themselves out we will get an answer. One last comment I still hold that the questionnaire was biased and loaded.

#### BRING THEM HOME

The Price sisters Marion, 19 years and Dolours, 23 years were sentenced to life imprisonment for their part in the London car bomb explosions. They are currently on hunger strike in Brixton prison in London and from accounts which appear to be well founded both are being subjected to the most awful brutality in being forcibly fed by the prison authorities. This has been going on since November 15 last.

This forcible feeding can only be described as a form of the most acute torture which is applied twice or three times daily. It means that the jaws must be clamped open and then tubes are forced down the throat through which food is passed into the abdomen. A London psychiatrist said recently that it was impossible to predict how long the girls would survive if they continued their hunger strike which is now in its tenth week. At that time they had suffered a loss of over two stones each in body weight.

A few weeks ago the Bishop of Ardagh and Clonmacnoise, Most Rev Dr Daryn made a dramatic appeal to the British Government to transfer the hunger striking group of Winchester prisoners or at least the two Price girls to prisons in Northern Ireland. "There are times in history and politics when gestures of clemency could be the cause of a change of heart," he said.

Brixton prison has an infamous name where all true Irishmen and women are concerned. It saw the mortal end of Terence McSwiney after he, too, had fasted until death but McSwiney's spirit lives on after all those years. Will the British never learn! The Price sisters should be sent home to serve their sentences and not be let die in a British prison. To demand their return is a humanitarian act and one with which we should all concern ourselves.

## £8,000 scavenging truck to be scrapped?

### ONLY FOUR YEARS IN USE

The probability that the special scavenging truck purchased by Dungarvan Urban Council for £8,000 only 4 years ago may have to be scrapped and replaced was mentioned at the monthly meeting of the Council last Monday night in the course of a discussion which at times became completely chaotic on a circular from the Department of Local Government concerning Scavenging Services.

The Department circular stated that from recent assessments of the Collection and Disposal of Refuse, the conclusion had been drawn that while the service had been reorganised and operated to a high standard in a number of areas the standards left much to be desired in the majority of cases and there was evidence of considerable dissatisfaction with the service provided at present by some local authorities. Deficiencies included the inadequate extent and frequency of collection unsuitable collection vehicles objectionable location of sites and most notable failure to keep sites in a reasonable condition.

The circular suggested that the tip-head (dump) should be kept open for the disposal of waste from private sources outside normal working hours and at week-ends as this would greatly reduce the offensive practice of "fly tipping" on roadsides and rivers.

Mr P. Walsh opened the discussion when he remarked that the Council seemed to have lost its regular scavenging truck. What has happened it he asked.

Mr P. Walsh, Town Engineer said that the truck had been broken down for a number of weeks and was at present under repair in the County Council yard. The packing mechanism in it had failed and there was some difficulty in getting replacement parts. He added that he could not say how long the truck would be off the road.

Mr Walsh added that from his experience, the truck which should be capable of dealing with the demands of the town had not proved itself to be a good machine since they purchased it.

Mr Walsh said that he was afraid that the Council would have to face up to the fact that they would have to buy another new truck.

In reply to Mr Whelan the Acting Town Clerk, Mr E. White said that the Council had purchased the present truck only four years ago at a cost of £8,000. To a further question by Mr Whelan, the County Manager Mr C. O'Connor said that the scavenging trucks being used by the Council were under present pressure that he admitted that they were not breaking down.

## HIGH-COURT DECREE FOR KILGOBINET MAN

### Sequel To Accident At Ballyneety Cross

A jury in the High Court in Cork last Tuesday found that a cyclist who came out of a minor road bearing a stop line, on to a major road where he was knocked down and injured by a passing van, was 35 per cent responsible for his accident and that the van was 65 per cent at fault.

The plaintiff in the action was Michael Hanley, Dungarvan, who sued John and Liam Morrissey, 88, Council Street, Dungarvan, as owners of the van for damages. John Morrissey was the driver on the occasion.

The evidence showed that the accident occurred at Ballyneety Cross where the Waterford Cappoquin road, designated the main road is crossed by the Dungarvan-Kilgobinet one. The plaintiff was cycling from the Dungarvan road in the direction of the junction when he had to cross a stop line, and there was also a stop sign UNAWARE.

Just prior to the accident on June 7, 1972 three cars stopped on the Kilgobinet side of the junction. The first of these, driven by Miss Cait Halinan, negotiated the crossing to the Dungarvan road successfully and she drove on unaware a collision had occurred just as she left the scene. According to the plaintiff, he was hit by the van just after he had passed the back of Miss Halinan's car which was going in the opposite direction. Miss Halinan said the bicycle passed her around the stop line on the mouth of the junction, and the defendant driver also maintained that Miss Halinan's car was off his road when he saw the cyclist.

The van driver also said he had slowed to let Miss Halinan's car get clear and then he had to pull violently to his right to attempt to avoid a collision with the plaintiff, who continued to cross the road. The collision took place between the centre and the far side of the road.

As a result of the collision the plaintiff suffered a compound fracture of both bones of his right leg above the ankle and he was incapacitated for a period.

Mr R. G. Sutton, SC Mr F. Morris SC and Mr P. O'Sullivan (instructed by Messrs B. St. J. Blake and Co., solicitors) were for the plaintiff. Mr T. K. Linton SC Mr P. Walsh SC and Mr A. G. Murphy (instructed by Messrs Oakley, Moloney and Flynn, solicitors), were for the defendants.

No decision was reached and the matter was again deferred until next meeting.

## DUNGARVAN CAR PARK LIKE BUILDERS' YARD

### But Urban Council Does Not Own It

The Dungarvan Urban Council does not own the public car park at Scanlon's Yard as was claimed at a recent meeting of the Council and no action is to be taken on a proposal to charge motorists using it.

These were two of the many aspects about the car park which came to the surface during a further discussion on this problem area which took place at the monthly meeting of the Urban Council last Monday night.

Mr P. Whelan raised the matter when he pointed out that at the December meeting they gave those who were using the car park as a storage space a month to remove the stuff and to get out. They should have got out he said but had not yet done so.

Mr Whelan went on to say that just before the meeting started he went to the car park to have a look at it and he found it worse than ever. There were building materials stored there steel girders and even a caravan. What kind of a car park are we supposed to have at all he asked. It is a disgrace the way it is with all this stuff thrown around there so that people can't go in there and leave their cars there in comfort.

Mr Whelan said that whoever was using the car park in this manner should be fined on the Council workmen should go in and take out this stuff and charge whoever was responsible.

The Co. Manager Mr C. A. O'Connor in a brief report on the car park pointed out that this property became vacant in the County Council following the confirmation of the Compulsory Purchase Order made by the Council. The report added that there was no scale of charges for car parks administered by the County Council.

Mr O'Connor added that in the light of what had been stated by Cllr Whelan the Council would now have to take action to have the car park cleared. He said that the park was the property of the Co. Council and not of the Urban Council as had been stated at a previous meeting.

Mr T. Wade referring to his motion to have a levy put on motorists who use the car park pointed out that his motion was to safeguard the interests of motorists using the car park that a caretaker could be employed there. If this was not done he felt that the ratepayers of the town would ultimately face a heavy bill as there would be claims for cars damaged there.
