THE YEAR OF THE LIFEBOAT

This year of 1974 is to be known as "The Year of the Lifeboat" as it marks the 150th Anniversary of the founding of that wonderful voluntary body, the Lifeboat Institution.

A record of 150 years of voluntary service, as a result of which the lives of nearly 100,000 people have been saved from death at sea, offers every justification for a feeling of pride. Pride too may be felt in the individual qualities of those who have helped to mould the service and indeed this will be a year in which everyone connected with the lifeboat service may feel both pride and humility.

It was on March 4, 1824 that a meeting was held in the City of London Tavern, presided over by Dr. Manners Sutton, Archbishop of Canterbury at which it was resolved to form the body which has since come to be known as the Royal National Lifeboat Institution and through the century and a half which has intervened the annals of the Institution tell of countless acts of heroism and bravery.

Here in Ireland the year will be marked by special events which will include a State Reception to be given by the Minister for Transport and Power and the issue of two special commemorative stamps.

Nearer home the occasion was recognised by Waterford County Council at their meeting in Dungarvan last Monday when the members recommended that a contribution of £150 be included in the estimates for the Irish Committee of Management of the RNLI towards its national target for 1974 of £100,000.

Later in the year a new lifeboat will arrive at Dunmore East and this £100,000 is aimed towards offsetting part of the cost of this new 44 foot steel craft which will then take up duty around our coast.

A very topical occasion then also should be the function organised by the Dungarvan Harbour Sailing Club at the Hotel Ormonde, Dungarvan on next Friday night when a film, "2,000 Miles of Peril," made by George Morrison and dealing with the work of the Irish Lifeboat Service will be shown.

Certainly they are not backward when it comes to spending money as recent meetings of the Council would tend to show.

At the December meeting, a sum of £25,000 was put up as an estimate for the conversion of the ground floor at the Town Hall into offices for the Clerk and his staff. One member was prompted to ask, when told of the probable cost, whether it was a marvellous hall they wanted there but another remarked "what can you expect for £25,000 now?" What indeed!

The Council already have a very fine suite of offices and a meeting chamber on the top floor of the building which were reconstructed and redecorated at considerable cost only a few years ago. It was felt that the fact that there were 42 steps, in three flights, leading to these offices was sufficient reason for scrapping them. One might well ask—42 steps worth £25,000?

Then at the January meeting held last week we had the announcement that the £8,000 scavenging truck bought only four years ago is facing the scrap heap and that the Council should face the fact that it will have to be replaced. The cost? Oh, I suppose 8 or 10 thousand pounds or maybe more! But who cares? We're in the big spending league and what are a few thousand pounds one way or the other!

WHAT ABOUT RINN O'GIANACH
Sometime ago reports in the press (not this paper) painted rosy pictures of an industry that was shortly to be established in Gaeltacht na Rinne for the benefit of muintir na Gaeltachta.

Last week, the Taoiseach and the Minister for the Gaeltacht announced with a flourish that nine new industries were about to be established in Gaeltacht areas. When the list was published it was found that all these new industries were to be located in the Gaeltachts of Cork, Kerry, Galway and Donegal. Not one for Gaeltacht na Rinne.

Library post will be filled by open competition

BUT ACADEMIC QUALIFICATION NOT REQUIRED

The creation of a post of Assistant Librarian for the Co. Waterford Libraries Service which was approved at the December meeting of Waterford County Council was again discussed at the January monthly meeting of the Council held in Dungarvan last Monday. The matter came before last Monday's meeting by way of a motion signed by seven members of the Council, Messrs H. R. Dowd, Sean Whelan, John Keane, T. J. F. Foley, J. Kennedy, T.D. and P. Kennedy. The motion stated that we urgently request the County Manager to promote the post of Assistant Librarian (Messrs Bolger and O'Leary) to the positions of Assistant Librarians and to employ a Clerk Typist for Library Headquarters at Lismore. This to be in lieu of the decision made on December 10 to advertise for an Assistant Librarian.

Observations on the motion of the County Manager Mr. C. A. O'Connor were contained in a report from Mr. O'Connor which was circulated to the members. This report pointed out that the motion referred to the creation of certain posts and the method of appointment to be used and said that in view of its terms it became necessary to set out the areas of responsibility in these matters.

MANAGER'S RESPONSIBILITY
The report then went on to say: "In relation to the creation of new posts there is an onus on the Manager to formulate his proposals and submit them to the Council for approval. The Council have the authority in law to either (a) reject the proposals or (b) approve of them. In the latter event the sanction of the Minister is generally required to the proposal in conformity with the foregoing procedure a proposal submitted to the Council at the December meeting seeking approval to the creation of a post of Assistant Librarian. The proposal was approved by the Council and sanction of the Minister is now awaited to the creation of the post.

In regard to the filling of posts responsibility in this area devolves on the Manager. All grades of staff are represented by Unions who are not only concerned with rates of pay but with methods of recruitment and appointment as well. It is proposed to fill this post by open competition. This procedure fully accords with Unions policy. The present staffing of the County Library is—1 County Librarian 1 Assistant Librarian 3 Library Assistants. The appointment of a second Assistant Librarian will considerably improve the position. It is an expanding service and the need for additional staff will be reviewed from time to time. A clerk-typist was made available to the Library Service during last summer. A proposal will be submitted at the Estimates Meeting for the creation of a permanent post of Clerk-Typist.

former treasurer new chairman of County G.A.A. Board

At the Friary Hall, Dungarvan on Sunday last, County Board G.A.A. Board Chairman Niall Mac Craith performed his last official act as chief administrator for the county when he officiated at the annual Convention.

OTHER OFFICERS RETURNED UNOPPOSED

Two hundred and thirty nine delegates were present for this annual meeting (almost a full muster) and the Chairman delivered a final address (for some time any rate) to the Convention as he bowed out of Waterford County affairs after holding the office for an uninterrupted four year term.

MOMENTOUS DECISION

Mr Mac Craith moves up to the ladders and now takes over as Chairman of the Munster G.A.A. for a three year term in succession to the late "Weesh" Murphy of Cork.

One of the most momentous decisions of the past four years, the Chairman said, was the founding of Coliste na nOG. It was a decision, he believed, which would have the most far reaching effects.

As a result of the Convention the administrative positions are now filled by Eamonn P. Kennedy (Erin's Own), Secretary, Seamus Grant (Mt. St. Mary's), Treasurer, Noel Dalton (De La Salle).

The welfare of Cumann Luth-Chleag Gael depended almost entirely on the work done with the under 14's and under 16's. As well he believed that the under 16's could not be properly catered for until Coliste na nOG take them under its wings.

The Secretary Seamus Grant in his well-prepared report said that there was an unmistakable feeling that far too many clubs had lost all concept of what membership of the Association entailed and were merely affiliating teams for the express purpose of taking part in a par-

ticular championship. There was something amiss in this sort of situation and unless the trend now regretfully of widespread dimensions was arrested one feared for the future and what it held.

The active virtue club unit was the said fast becoming the exception rather than the rule and there was an urgent necessity for much re-appraisal all round.

Continuing the report states "I am one with those who contend that we have far too many competitions and that quantity in this regard is a poor substitute for quality. Potentially we possess the two finest fields in the world but tend to lose sight of the fact that far too many grades are acting as counter-measures towards perfection.

This is particularly painfully obvious at intermediate and junior levels, where the ridiculous situation exists of clubs endeavouring to field out in both grades from a restricted panel of some twenty or so players.

This is first accomplished by having wholesale regradings at the outset of the year leaving in most instances insufficient personnel to legally constitute an intermediate team.

Referring briefly to discipline the report says "In a year when both Divisional Boards report a record number of games played when activity at senior level scaled unprecedented heights and when the various subsidiary bodies dealing with juvenile affairs indicate marked progress it is gratifying to record that out of a total of some six hundred games scarcely half a dozen produced an unfavourable incident.

No doubt a statistician would argue that the percentage is negligible and all concerned can feel pleased with a great year's work. Nevertheless we cannot be complacent and any breaches of conduct on the field of play or otherwise must be dealt with in a manner which will protect the good name and image of the Association.

The motions, there were 42 on the agenda, did not arouse much spirited discussion. There was full support for the Lisvane motion which asked County Convention to protest to RTE at the nature of the present Sunday night sports programme.

In like manner unanimous approval was given to motions from Abbeyside and Talloewy condemning the unjust sacking of Central Council member, Donal Whelan and requesting the incoming County Board and Central Council to use every means available to ensure his reinstatement.

Other motions passed were those dealing with the under 21 championships, the motion from Mount Slon dealing with installation of phones and public address systems in venues under Board's jurisdiction.

Clubs participating in County senior finals will be now entitled to 10% of the gate receipts to a maximum of £75, while in future all applications for regrading will be on a personal application basis, signed by the player concerned.

SENATOR OPPOSES CALL FOR TRANSFER OF PRICE SISTERS

Senator A. Deasy opposed a resolution proposed at the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council last Monday requesting the Government to make representations to the British Government to return the two Price sisters to serve their sentences in Northern Ireland for the London car bomb incidents.

Mr K. O'Riordan who proposed the resolution said that the Irish Government should do everything possible to get these girls and the others sentenced with them back to Northern Ireland where they could serve the sentences imposed on them. They were in prison on hunger strike and were subject to the most brutal treatment in being force fed by the British prison authorities.

Mr C. Curran, Chairman, who seconded the proposal said he would do so on humanitarian grounds only and because of the barbarous and brutal treatment the sisters were being subjected to.

Senator Deasy who was the sole member of the Council to oppose the resolution said that there was a great deal of emotional feeling about this matter. These people, he said, had been convicted and sentenced in England and as the law required they would have to serve their sentences where the crime was committed.

Mr H. R. Dowd said that on purely humanitarian grounds he would like to see a cessation of the forcible feeding of the prisoners. If the Price sisters were prepared to give an undertaking to cease their hunger strike, he returned to a Northern Ireland prison he would favour the resolution.

The resolution was then put to the meeting and passed with Senator Deasy dissenting.

The Chairman said he understood such an undertaking had already been given. All they were seeking was to have these prisoners transferred to their own country. He was against violence of any kind and he supported this resolution purely on humanitarian grounds.

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CANON CLARKE INSTALLED AS DEAN OF CASHEL

Rev Canon David Clarke, Stradbally, who has been Rector of Dungarvan for a number of years past was installed as Dean of Cashel in the Cathedral of St. John and St. Patrick's Rook Cashel, last Friday night.

He replaces Very Rev. Dean Charles Woulfe who retired some months ago through ill health. Right Rev. Dr. J. Ward Armstrong, Bishop of Cashel and Emly, Waterford and Lismore presided, and the officiating clergy were Archdeacon Hogg, Tipperary and Canon W. T. Hazel on Dundrum.

Dr. Armstrong addressing the congregation said it was fitting that Canon David Clarke should be instituted in this Cathedral Church at the end of the Octave of prayer for Christian unity—for much of his life in the Church has been wedded to that end.

Dr. Armstrong praised the former Dean Woulfe and said his knowledge and zeal were mainly responsible for the present fine state of the Diocesan library and they would like to remember him with affection and with thanks for all his work during his 12 years in Cashel.
