## PENSMAN TAKES YOU Behind the SPOTLIGHT

### TAX RELIEFS FOR WORKERS

In a further effort to salvage the National Wage Agreement, talks between trade union and employer leaders and the Minister for Labour will be resumed to-day (Thursday) at the Department of Labour. Six or seven hours of hard bargaining between the parties on Monday last resulted in stalemate following the previous rejection by workers of the proposals which emanated from the Employer-Labour Conference of last December.

One of the main reasons for the rejection of these proposals by the workers (by a 3 to 1 vote) was the failure of the Government to grant any concessions on income tax and rising prices.

The impression was created at one stage that the Minister for Finance intended to tackle the whole area of a tax on increments of wealth but if this means that reform of the income tax area is to be left aside then the Minister should think again.

The ordinary worker is more concerned with the big inroads which PAYE as at present operated makes in his pay-packet than with any new forms of taxation aimed at replacing the old death duties and other such levies.

The present tax system is gravely unjust as it bears most heavily on those least able to pay. What good is there in granting a worker an increase in his weekly wage if the tax man reaches into his pay-packet for an even bigger share while spiralling prices on essential household commodities erode what is left?

If there is to be any movement towards a new acceptable agreement, some concessions along these lines will be necessary. Let us hope for the sake of stability and the welfare of the country in general that such an agreement can be reached otherwise the year ahead will prove far more critical and catastrophic than it already promises to be.

### THE SOARING COSTS OF HEALTH SERVICES

The huge cost of providing health services for the community is due for another mammoth increase for the coming year. At present the various Health Boards around the country are finalising their annual budgets and all, without exception show a big gap as between last year's figures and what will be required to meet the estimated expenditure for the nine months ahead. I say nine months because I presume the Health Board like all other public bodies will have its financial and calendar years merged as from January 1 next.

Here in the South-East region at which we are a part the health services bill ran to some £3 million last year. I understand that this will have to be increased by as much as 25 per cent to cover existing debt and to meet the requirements for the coming year. A colossal rise surely by any standards.

Members of the Regional Health Board will I understand meet in Kilkenny on Thursday of next week to consider the estimates and we can await the outcome of their deliberations to see what impact the financial year which will rest with the Minister for Health will have.

### UNIQUE DISTINCTION FOR CAPPOQUIN PRIEST

As from the 'Evening Echo' of Bournemouth and from the 'Bournemouth Times' we are sent to me this news of an unique distinction achieved by a young priest. He is William J. Kelly, son of Mrs. Richard Kelly, Cappoquin and the first of not one but two Catholic priests to be ordained in England.

### Sacrificing most of his leisure hours which he devoted to a three years course based on correspondence material and radio and TV broadcasts, Fr Kiely has now succeeded in gaining his BA degree.

Fr Kiely was educated at St. Augustine's College, Dungarvan and pursued his theological studies for the priesthood at St. John's College, Waterford from 1957 to 1964 when at the age of twenty-four he was ordained for the diocese of Plymouth. Having spent six years as Assistant Priest at St. Mary's Catholic Church, Falmouth, Cornwall, he took up his present appointment as Assistant Priest at St. Bernadette's, Ensbury Park, Bournemouth in November last.

While in Falmouth, Fr Kiely was port Chaplain at Falmouth Docks, Catholic Chaplain for the Scouts of Cornwall and Catholic Adviser for the local voluntary County Youth Organisations. In Bournemouth he will continue his good work for the scouts of Dorset and has already become deeply involved in youth work there as well.

Prior to his departure from Falmouth he was presented with a cheque on behalf of the parishioners as a token of their appreciation and thanks for all the credit work he did while in the parish. At the farewell function at which the presentation was made Fr Kiely said: "I shall miss all the people I have got to know so well here and of course, I shall miss Cornwall which I now feel is almost my second home."

Fr Kiely has two sisters in religion, Sr Imelda Kiely, M.A. D.P. Ed. Psych., A.B.P.S.S., Hillinadon, London and Sr Selina Kiely, Norwood, London. He is also brother of Mr. Richard Kiely, Knockolara and of Mr. Michael P. Kiely, Ballyhane, Cappoquin.

### OBSTRUCTION TO PEDESTRIANS

Following representations by local Councillors in recent years Waterford County Council laid, a new footpath along the north side of the Clonea Road at Abbeyside. It cost quite a deal of money to lay these footpaths which were put there for the benefit and safety of pedestrians using the road.

It is a road on which the volume of traffic has increased a great deal in recent times and despite a number of speed limit signs, motorists travelling on it are inclined to drive at much more than the permitted 40 m.p.h., possibly because it is a good, long, straight stretch.

This of course, makes it more dangerous for pedestrians and obliges them for the sake of safety to keep to the footpath. However, in recent months one or two C.I.E. buses have been parked at regular intervals for long periods on the road and have been driven on to the footpath right against the boundary fence when they are left there.

As a result, pedestrians walking along the footpath are forced on to the road when they reach the point occupied by these parked buses and are at once out in jeopardy. Surely C.I.E. could find somewhere else to park their buses than on a footpath which was provided by the Co. Council at considerable cost for the benefit of the walking public. If they have to place them at that point why not park them across the road in on the grass margin and allow the footpath to remain unobstructed.

### AGRICULTURAL ADVISERS RESUME NORMAL DUTIES BUT REFUSE TO OPERATE FARM DEVELOPMENT SCHEME

Members of the Irish Agricultural Advisors Organisation of which instructors employed by County Committees of Agriculture are members have agreed to resume normal working hours which include the holding of evening classes and lectures but they are now refusing to implement EEC Directive 159 which deals with Farm Modernisation and Development.

These facts were revealed at the monthly meeting of the Co. Waterford Committee held in Dungarvan last Monday. In a communication from the I.A.A.O. the Committee was informed that the regulation of hours of work of instructors no longer applied as their claim for extra pay for attending at night classes and evening lectures had been allowed to go to arbitration by the Ministers for Agriculture and Finance. In the circumstances the letter stated that all instructors would resume normal working hours.

**NO PROSPECTS OF PROMOTION**  
 In a further communication the I.A.A.O. which claimed a membership of 573, stated that their members would refuse to co-operate in implementing EEC Directive 159 (Farm Modernisation and Development) until a number of long standing grievances had been dealt with to their satisfaction.

The letter stated that the instructors had been seeking a reorganisation of the Advisory Services for the past 7 years particularly in regard to promotion of which there were little or no prospects at present. There had been no response to these demands. The letter added that until these grievances had been met the instructors would refuse to implement the EEC Directive.

**VERY DIFFICULT**  
 Mr. J. O'Ryan, Chairman, said that it seemed to him that it would be very difficult to provide the type of promotion sought by the instructors. He said that it looked as if they all wanted to be officers.

Mr. G. Frost, C.A.O. said that they now had a number of sub-offices and promotions could be achieved by appointing one man in charge of these while another could specialise in a field such as pig production and be promoted for that. These would be the type of outlets which could be provided.

Finally on the proposal of Mr. J. Keenan, seconded by Mr. J. Walsh, it was unanimously decided to ask the Minister for Agriculture to introduce measures which would meet the grievances referred to by the I.A.A.O.
