Behind the SPOTLIGHT

EXPENSES FOR COUNCILLORS

At Question Time in the Dail a couple of weeks ago, the Minister for Local Government, Mr James Tully, TD, stated that the discussion document on local government which he had recently issued to local authorities for comment contained a statement that the question of allowing councillors to claim expenses, within reasonable limits, incurred through loss of earnings, would be reviewed. He added that a decision on the matter would be reached before the candidates for the next local elections were selected.

As these elections are expected to take place during the last week in June and as the political parties are already taking tentative steps to choose their candidates we can take it that the Minister's decision will not be greatly delayed.

The discussion document referred to by the Minister states in its concluding paragraph "Provision will be made to enable councils to incur expenditure in the reception of distinguished visitors. Provision will also be made for extending the title of Mayor to the Chairman of urban district councils and boards of Town Commissioners. The question of expenses for councillors will be reviewed and the right of councillors to send representatives to conferences abroad will be clarified."

At present members of county councils and other subsidiary local authorities are allowed travelling expenses and subsistence allowances while in the recent past "expenses" have also been allowed to urban councillors, at meetings they attend last longer than a certain period. There is a difference though, as county council meetings are usually held during normal business hours while meetings of the urban usually take place at night time.

In the past there have been divided opinions about this question of expenses. Some members hold that they should not take money for their services which they say have been proffered on a voluntary basis while others feel that they should not be expected to be out of pocket as a result of their commitments to local authorities. Besides this there are also those who hold that local government should not be the preserve of those who are well to do and are able to withdraw such expenses out of their own pockets or to be able to afford the time to attend council meetings without incurring financial loss.

However, it now appears that under this new expense proposal membership of a local council is to become a more remunerative proposition. Whether it will make any great difference in the standards of representation and proficiency remains to be seen. Some I doubt it very much.

GAELTARRA REPORTS PROGRESS

Gaeltarra, the organisers set up to develop the Gaeltacht areas a report earlier this month in which it reported that in many fronts the report stated that there were over 2,400 persons employed in the Gaeltacht divisions, in addition to the 500 persons employed in the Gaeltarra Over 500 persons were created of this employment in the Gaeltarra, Galway, and Kerry. A report which sets out the contribution of the total of the two divisions, was allocated to Co. Kerry in the period which was covered by the report.

It is reliable information that the £3 million increase is accounted for by a shortfall of £1 million in last year's estimate plus £2 million extra needed to meet the additional charges for the coming year. Incidentally I have also been informed that the total estimate of £16,496,000 covers a 12 months period. It now goes to the Minister who will have the final say.

ONE HOUR PARKING FOR DUNGARVAN

The Parking bye-laws which have been the cause of such a great deal of controversy and the subject of much agitation since they were first introduced in Dungarvan over two months ago are to be changed. And the changes proposed should mean an end to much of the friction which has resulted especially in the O'Connell Street area.

The changes were announced at a meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council last Monday night and with one alteration they were approved. A report from the Town Clerk, Mr R. J. Keane, stated that following a recent conference attended by the Chairman, Co Manager and officials of the Council and the Garda Superintendent the following changes in the existing bye-laws were recommended -

O'CONNELL STREET

One-hour one side parking from junction of Western Terrace to junction of St Mary Street—southern side.

ST MARY STREET

As is—unlimited parking western side, no parking eastern side. Sterilize with double yellow lines, 30 ft. Mitchell Street end at eastern side. Sterilize with double yellow lines 15 ft Mitchell Street end at western side.

MAIN STREET

As is—no parking during business hours at each side.

LR MAIN STREET

At junction of St Augustine Street to point opposite Galway's Lane—southern side, one hour parking only. No parking on northern side.

T. F. MEAGHER STREET

One side unlimited parking at Hotel side. No parking from junction of Grattan Square to Court House.

WESTERN TERRACE

No parking on eastern side from junction of O'Connell Street to Mitchell Street.

GRATTAN SQUARE

One-hour parking only. Bus stops to be marked on western side from junction of O'Connell Street to Creamery entrance.

In the course of a brief discussion, the Chairman, Mr. J. D. Hally, said that following the last resolution passed by the Council calling for certain changes to be made in the English. needed badly to extend the bye-laws to this area. First step towards £100,000 swim pool

TRALEE ARCHITECT TO DRAW PLANS

The first step towards the erection of an indoor heated swimming pool, estimated to cost £100,000, was taken by Dungarvan Urban Council at their meeting last Monday night when the members unanimously approved the decision of the Co-Manager, Mr C. A. O'Connor, to appoint a firm of Architects to prepare lay-out plans. The pool will form part of the proposed new amenity complex which is to be set up under the COSAC Committee formed by the Vocational Education Committee and will be situated on the seafront at Quanns.

INCREASED BUILDING COST

In the course of a report to the Town Clerk, Mr R. J. Keane informed the members as follows -

"Following the report on the proposed amenity centre prepared by Messrs Patrick O'Sullivan & Partners, Architects, Tralee which was discussed by the Council at the meeting in September, 1973, the County Council considers that the Urban Council should proceed as quickly as possible with their part of the amenity centre namely, the swimming pool. Consequently, the Manager has decided to appoint Messrs Patrick O'Sullivan & Partners to prepare layout plans and specification for the swimming pool. It is envisaged that the pool will be designed in accordance with the Department of Local Government's guideline plans and specifications—25m x 9m indoor heated pool with ancillary facilities, including changing rooms, lockers and toilet facilities. It is considered that this approach will give an impetus to other organisations involved to proceed without delay with the other components of the centre. The total estimated cost of the pool as per the amenity centre report of August, 1973 was £91,630.00 (excluding site services, etc.). Allowing for increased building costs and including site works, drainage, etc., it is considered that the current estimate would be in the region of £100,000."

LOCAL CONTRIBUTIONS

The report then went on to state that the total approved cost must be provided by way of local voluntary contribution, i.e. £20,000. Quigley Magnesian Division and Pfizer Chemical Corporation have kindly donated £2,500 to the fund and have confirmed that they will contribute £1,000 (to be received annually) every year. Mr J. A. Mulcahy has also kindly promised to contribute £10,000 to the fund. Therefore, by 1975, the fund should amount to approximately £15,000. There is every reason to believe that other large industries in the area will be willing to contribute to the fund, and consequently there should be no difficulty in reaching the target of £20,000. If there is some balance outstanding, it might be wise to enlist the interest of local organisations, such as the local Chapter of the Junior Chamber to under take a local fund raising campaign. Arrangements will be made for the Council to adopt the Acceptance of Gifts Act, 1949, and to form a Civic Improvements Fund. The money contributed will be lodged in various financial institutions at attractive interest rates. The remaining £80,000 would be raised by way of loan from the Local Loans Fund. Annual loan charges will be in the region of £8,000 of which 50% will be recouped by way of subsidy.

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I enclose herewith for your information, Schedule showing details of financial arrangements in operation in relation to pools provided by other Urban District Councils. As can be seen, in many cases the County Council makes a contribution of 25% of the loan charges and Waterford County Council might be approached with a view to making such an arrangement in this case.

As can be seen from the attached list the annual running costs of the swimming pool can be quite high. Apart from the maintenance of the swimming pool structure and mechanical equipment the cost of staffing the pool can be high. It is normal to employ a staff of three to a person to collect admission charges and provide general supervision, a Lifeguard/Swimming Instructor and a Fitter/Maintenance Man to maintain the mechanical equipment, etc. Offset against the above costs would be admission

charges and it would be wise for the Council to fix these at a realistic level and to revise them periodically in order to keep the net cost of maintaining the pool at as low a level as possible.

In order to view the operation of swimming pools at first hand, it might be wise to arrange for the Council to visit various swimming pools being provided by other Local Authorities."

APPROVED

The report was approved and it was agreed that when the Architects had submitted the new estimates that the members should visit such places as Fermoy, Malloy, Thurles, Nenagh, etc. to see similar pools in operation at these centres.

MARINE OUTFALL SURVEY FOR DUNGARVAN SEWERAGE SCHEME

A report submitted to members of the Dungarvan Urban Council by the Town Clerk, Mr R J Keane, at the monthly meeting of the Council held last Monday night stated that on 11th inst. a survey was received from the Department of Local Government for the acceptance, as instructed by the Consulting Engineer and ordered by the Council, of the tender received from Messrs. Solmes and Ireland Ltd, 56, Tritonville Road Dublin, in the sum of £5240 for the execution of the following works:—

1—Hydrographic Survey £1800
2—Strata Survey £1100
3—Boring £2300

The Council had also requested approval for the undertaking of a float survey at a cost of £1800, but the Department in their letter of sanction stated that following discussions between the Town Engineer, the Consultants, and the Department's Engineering Inspector, it was agreed that the proposed float survey should be deferred for the present.

The Consultants are being requested to have Messrs. Solmes undertake and complete these services at the earliest possible date.

The report was adopted unanimously.

Salmon Fishing—Salmon licences have been granted to all those boats in the Ardmore area that had such licences last year.

The net fishing season is almost here but fishermen are having great difficulty in purchasing rope, nets and skins. They have been told by suppliers that they were unable to get them from the manufacturers and those they received are costing considerably more than at this time last year.

It is hoped that when the fishermen eventually get to sea that they will have a good season.

Knock Marriage Introduction Bureau
In his annual report Rev M Keane C.C. Ballyglass Claremorris Director of the Knock Marriage Introduction Bureau states that the latest figures at a recent meeting of the Bureau were as follows: There have been 6,833 enquiries in 1968 men and 1,313 women have returned completed questionnaires 1,674 couples have met 186 introductions are in progress there have been 8 engagements and 100 marriages.

The above report compares favourably with our 5th Annual Report issued in March 1973. We then had 61 marriages, 7 engagements 1,172 introductions were in progress, 1,267 questionnaires had met 1,672 men and 1,107 women had returned completed questionnaires 5,870 enquiries had been made.

For the eleven months 297 men and 206 women have returned completed questionnaires, by far the best year so far.

DUNGARVAN U.D.C. NEGOTIATING FURTHER LAND PURCHASES

When a deputation from the Eire Oge hurling club attended a meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council last Monday night seeking training facilities for club members in the Council's proposed amenity complex at Quinins, it was stated that the Council was at present engaged in negotiations for the purchase of additional land at the rear of the brewery of Messrs Thomas Power & Co Ltd, at Shandon.
The Eire Oge deputation consisted of Mr Patrick Drumme, Sr, Mr Patrick Drumme, Jr, and Mr Kieran Quinn, Mr Drumme, Sr, who acted as spokesman, said that the club had no grounds at present on which to train and he asked the Council to do anything they possibly could for them. All they wanted was somewhere to train. He added that the club was located in a very populated area of the town and the youngsters there had no place to play at present except on the streets.
In reply to a question by Mr T. Kyne, T.D., Chairman, Mr Drumme stated that his club had applied for permission to use the Gaelic Field but they had not yet received their application. He added at the same time that it would not be suitable for them as it would mean dragging a lot of youngsters through the town.
The Chairman said that at present the Council was negotiating with Mr P. I. Power for the purchase of 9 acres which were located behind the brewery. These negotiations proved successful, as he hoped they would, it might be possible when the canal was drained that the upper portion of this site would be dry enough to use. If the negotiations with Mr Power were successful, Mr Kyne said that the Council would then proceed with plans to purchase the land in the locality owned by the Poles, and by another Mr Power.
Mr C. A. O'Connor, County Manager, said he would not favour letting any of this land if it did come into the Council's possession as it would be required for industrial development. He thought that the Gaelic Field provided a ready-made answer to the club's problem and he suggested that the Council should recommend to the G.A. authorities that the club be facilitated there.
Chairman—The Gaelic Field should be ideal for everyone interested in G.A.
The Council then approved of the Manager's suggestion.

The following statement has been issued by the Government Information Services on behalf of the Tanalste and Minister for Health and Social Welfare Mr Brendan Corish, T.D.

The adoption by the Council of the EEC of the Community Social Action Programme gives rise to a number of important considerations in Irish social policy.

The Social Action Programme represents the first step along the road to the creation of a Social Community in Europe. Its implementation and its future development along progressive lines demands action at national level.

The Departments of Health and Social Welfare are particularly concerned with those sections of the Social Action Programme which deal with the problems of the handicapped and the alleviation and elimination of poverty and with the extension of social security to those who are excluded by the proposed actions to achieve important advances in these areas. Major developments will be required in terms of domestic programmes and policies if the country is to obtain full benefit from the communities provisions.

Equally there can be a significant Irish contribution to the long term evolution of the Social Action Programme. 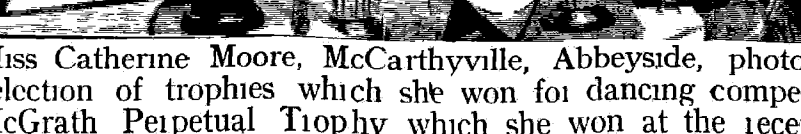
