Behind the SPOTLIGHT

THE COMMON MARKET DISENCHANTS

The Common Market of which so much was expected because of the rosy picture which the politicians painted as they dangled carrots before the electorate in the days prior to the great EEC Referendum does not seem to be living up to the promised expectations.

Those who show an interest in international affairs have been reading the signs of threatened break-up long before now as the first cracks in what was hoped would become a great federation of European countries began to appear.

Here in this country the politicians kept telling us that as we became members of the vast European Economic Community we would have to forget our identity in the national sense of being Irish and become — Europeans.

The Common Market has been presented to us as a splendid example of international co-operation, a proof that nationalism was out of date and that the era of the supra-national conglomerate was at hand.

But the past year has shown that the spirit of nationalism is far from dead and that it works away inside the EEC Germany and Britain have been at loggerheads and so have each of the other member states as factions built up.

The most recent rift and the one which could well prove fatal has seen eight of the nine member countries align themselves with the U.S. to the exclusion of France on the matter of an oil policy.

France has consistently been proving herself to be a nigger in the woodpile. As a member of the Community, Ireland however cannot have the slightest blame placed on her for the roughness of the going.

Allowing that the policy of the politicians who brought us in was that we were to get in and fight for all we could get and not perish outside, our chief concern has been to wait hopefully for the crumbs that might fall from the table of the richer countries.

along the grain growing belt of the Mid-Western States Moralists, mostly on this side of the Atlantic, raised their voices in anger as so much good food was being destroyed while so many people were dying of hunger in many other parts of the world.

However the grain barons were more concerned with keeping prices up than with the morality of the situation. I was reminded of this as I read the following headline in one of the Dublin daily papers last week: "Meat held in storage to prevent price fall."

The story referred to ourselves and told how enough beef to meet a quarter of the annual total Irish domestic requirements — 6,500 tons — is hanging in cold storage here to keep prices up and prevent a drop to pre-EEC level.

There was a follow-up story to this a few days later when it was revealed that this "meat mountain" (we already have had "butter mountains") is to be reduced by 1,000 tons. This quantity is at present being offered by tender to the highest bidder, but subject to the condition that it is exported outside the Common Market.

And all this is happening while the cattle price situation is in a shambles to an extent which has been causing general alarm among farmers. However the most puzzling aspect of this massive meat mountain and the drop in cattle prices is that the price of meat has not come down one penny for the home consumer.

If cattle prices have dropped so drastically towards what they were last year then there should also be a comparable drop in meat prices. Consumers therefore are correct in raising their voices and in asking why this has not been so.

FACTORY SITE IN RING
Apropos my recent references to the failure of Gaeltarra Eireann to provide any worthwhile industry in the Ring Gaeltacht as compared with what they have done for the other gaeltacht areas in counties Cork, Kerry, Mayo and Donegal, Senator Austin Deasy has passed me a letter which he received from Tomas Uas O'Donnail, Aire Na Gaeltachta, under date 21 Feabhra 1974.

The letter states: "Mor fhreagra ar an bhfiartraí a rinne tu faoi thionscal nua don Rinn tuigim o Gaeltarra Eireann go bhfuil reamh-mhionarcha 5,000 traigh ceirnach a togail acu ann faoi lathair agus roinnt tógair tionscal a bplé acu di."

FIRST YEAR IN C.M. DISASTROUS FOR SMALL FARMERS

Disillusion, disappointment and frustration were the feelings generally expressed by members of the Co. Waterford Committee of Agriculture at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan last Monday during a brief discussion on the position of farmers after Ireland's first year in the Common Market.

Mr C. Curran said that they were facing a very serious situation as the EEC was at present on the point of breaking up. Referring to the devalued value of money he remarked: "there is buckets of money around but it's no good!"

He added that of the nine member countries in the Common Market only three, including Ireland, had stable governments at present.

Mr P. Cusack said the position the farmers were in now was that cattle could hardly be sold. The Common Market has let us down, he said.

Mr K. O'Ryan, Chairman — The first year in Europe has been disastrous for the small farmers of this country. Mr F. Kenneally said that the situation was generally very critical. He said that there was no demand from farmers for lime and as a result Coughagh Lime Ltd could not keep men employed.

He compared this position with last year when he said the Company had 13 lorries going and still could not cope with the demand.

Mr O'Ryan said that the price of feeding stuff was scandalous and the reason no fertilisers were being put out was that farmers could not afford to buy them. "The small farmer is being eliminated by rising prices," he said.

Mr Cusack criticised the people who went on TV advising farmers what to do about the Common Market. He said these were the people who were responsible for putting them where they were and he added "but they are all silent about the position now and the best they can tell us is to wait and see."

E.S.B. FUEL CHARGES LESS THAN FORECAST

The ESB has announced that the fuel surcharge on electricity bills issuing in March would be 0.14p per unit, less than half of the 0.30p per unit, foreshadowed earlier in the year. The introduction of the surcharge, which was announced in December, is designed to cover the massive increase in the price of oil used in electricity production.

The formula on which the surcharge is based was agreed by the National Prices Commission and approved by the Government in December last.

The ESB says that three factors have contributed to the substantial reduction of this estimate. ESB consumers cut down in their use of electricity in January and February. The ESB increased its production from its peat stations by about 10% and the mild winter reduced the demand for electricity, especially for heating.

The surcharge is likely to increase as the year progresses and as the older stocks of cheaper oil are depleted. Costing into periods of lower utilisation, Spring and Summer the impact will not be so keenly felt.

The Board proposes to publish the surcharge rate on the first of each month to keep customers advised of the actual charges.

FURTHER CALL FOR STORM DAMAGE GRANTS

There were further echoes of the great storm which caused so much havoc all over the country last January at the monthly meeting of the Co Waterford Committee of Agriculture held in Dungarvan last Monday when a further call for special grants to assist farmers who had suffered such big losses in the storm was made to the Departments of Agriculture and Finance.

When Mr P Kenneally was told that there had been no reply so far to the recitation passed at last month's meeting calling for such grants he said that this was something unique as they had no storm like this one for 100 years. So much damage was done at the time that contractors had been working all over doing repairs since and a great deal still remained to be done. When it could be accepted that the cost of replacing a single slate could be as much as £4 it could be easily understood how costly some of the repair jobs which had to be carried out would be. He added that many people had no money to pay for these repairs and what was wanted were increased grants and low interest loans to help them.

Mr K O'Ryan Chairman said that the damage which was done in his area by the storm was enormous but a tremendous amount had also been done all over. He agreed that many people required financial assistance to meet the cost of repairs. Mr N Walsh said that the extent of the damage and the terrible force of the storm could really be seen by anyone who travelled through Dromana estate to Wallstown. Trees had been snapped in the middle by what had really been some kind of whirlwind.

Finally it was unanimously agreed to again call on the Departments concerned to make such grants and loans available.

Better News— About Electricity Prices. Earlier this year we informed our customers that, because of the massive increase in oil prices, electricity bills would carry a special additional charge on a basis approved by the Government. At the end of January, the ESB announced that in order to reduce the impact of oil price increases to the consumer, residual stocks of lower priced oil would be taken into account in calculating the necessary addition to the bills. Even with this measure it was estimated that the additional charge could be 0.30p per unit in January/February. Three things have happened to improve this situation. Our customers reduced their use of electricity, the Board increased its production from peat and the mild winter cut down on electricity usage. There have been significant savings in the use of oil as a result and the additional charge on January/February bills issuing in March will be 0.14p. In the months ahead, more high-cost oil will have to be used to meet the electricity demands of our customers. However, this should coincide with the Spring and Summer periods when the use of electricity is reduced. Details of the addition which will apply to February/March bills will be published on April 1st. By the way, are you availing yourself of the ESB Stamp Savings Scheme? 50p saving stamps are available at all ESB Cash Offices to make bill paying easier. ESB logo.

What's All The Secrecy About In Relation to Bovine TB? - Some high official in the Ministry of Agriculture, indeed, it could be the Minister himself, has sent instructions to the officers of the Department in relation to the Bovine TB Eradication Scheme.

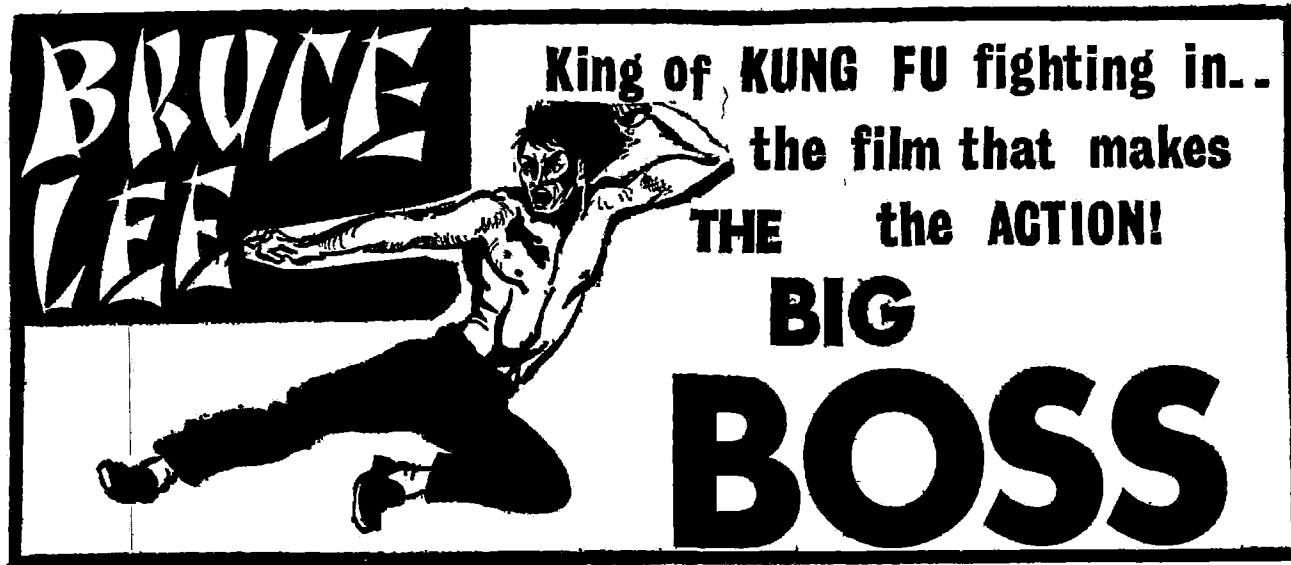

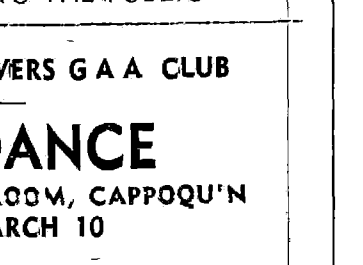
