PENSMAN TAKES YOU Behind the SPOTLIGHT

COAST EROSION AND REMOVAL OF BEACH MATERIALS

Coast erosion is a big problem in this county because of our many miles of coastline. It is equally a very expensive problem so expensive that work involving thousands of pounds would hardly be seen in erecting the necessary bulwarks to fully protect all the lands exposed to danger.

One of the areas which shows the worst effects of the erosion made by the sea stretches from Youghal to Ardmore and this problem area has been the source of a great deal of discussion in recent years.

At the request of the County Council the Minister for Industry and Commerce last year made an order prohibiting the removal of beach materials such as sand and gravel from certain areas along the coast except under licence. This order was aimed at reducing the effects of erosion which the removal of such material undoubtedly accelerated. However some difficulties arose when it was found that farmers with land adjoining the sea in those areas where this prohibition order was in force and who had traditional rights to draw loads of sand, gravel and seaweed for their own use found that they now had to have a licence to do so. This has been the source of much discussion between members of the local authority for some time past but I understand the position has now been clarified.

It is a fact that because of the massive removals of beach materials from Caliser Bay and Ballyquin, made by contractors using mechanical shovels, the coastline at Ardmore is becoming more and more exposed. Now in an effort to put a stop to this the Co Engineer has decided that hand operated shovels only be used by local farmers wishing to draw materials from the beach for their own use. He has further decided that no removals may be made from Whiting Bay and that only small quantities be removed from Caliser Bay and Ballyquin.

Local farmers should see this action as one in their own interests to save their farms from the depredations of the sea and should therefore co-operate fully with the local authority. I say this because it has been alleged that some farmers in those areas draw the materials from the beach in their own carts on to their land and then when a sufficient quantity has been gathered they sell it off to industrial interests. If this were to continue then there could be little or no control and the erosion would just continue to take its toll!

COUNTY AMENITY SCHEMES

At the County Council Rates meeting held last month the members of the Council were informed in a report circulated to them by the County Manager that during the past year the State grant allowed for amenity schemes was £4,000 or just half the amount that had been anticipated. Because of staff difficulties which I presume, refers to the "work to rule" policy adopted by members of the Council's engineering staff and the limited monies available it was stated that the programme of works anticipated could not be achieved.

The report then went on to state that for the coming year provision had been made in the Council estimate for a grant of £6,000 and subject to the availability of money and the necessary land required it was proposed that the works to be undertaken would be a continuation of the work adapted in 1973 and which for one reason or another could not be done during that period.

Among the eighteen amenity projects which were listed were the following: Play-

ground and sport facilities at Cappaquin, Viewpoint at Flowerhill, Ballyduff, Lay-bys on Dungarvan — Clashmore road, Improvement works in Nire Valley, Viewpoint at Mocollop, Picnic areas at Glendine and in Cannon Wood near Clonmel, Cliff walk and picnic area at Ardmore, Viewpoint at Glencullen and a lay-by at Dromana.

The report also referred to the carrying out of a survey of the estuarine area at Barnawee Bridge near Dungarvan for the local Rowing Club and said that this was a project which the Council might consider in conjunction with those already listed.

This survey was requested by the officials of the Dungarvan Rowing Club last year when plans which they had for the erection of a dam at the bridge, to turn the estuary into a shallow lake to allow the club members to pursue their rowing activities there, came to an abrupt halt when a local landowner objected to the erection of this dam on the grounds that it might cause flooding to his land which adjoined the estuary. I understand that the Rowing Club have ceased activities at Barnawee as a result and have no further interest in any development there.

Finally the Council approved that the following works be carried out: playgrounds at Cappaquin and Portlaw and laybys at Gortnadhra (Ring), Russellstown, Strike's Hill (Dungarvan) and the Nire. I presume that this means that the other projects listed but not approved have now been put on the long finger once more.

FOR SOCIAL WORK IN DUNGARVAN AREA

Mr C. Curran, Chairman, Waterford County Council and member of the South Eastern Health Board has been informed by Dr V. Barry, Programme Manager, Community Care that the Board is at present recruiting a Senior Social Worker and a Social Worker for Waterford and that an appropriate amount of their time will be allocated to the Dungarvan area.

AN EXCELLENT JOB

When it was done a few weeks ago I meant to comment on the resurfacing of the roadway at the Causeway, Dungarvan, which, since the closing of the railway line a few years ago and the removal of the tracks which crossed the roadway at that point, was badly in need of attention. Now however an excellent job has, at last, been done and the County Engineer is to be complimented as well, of course, as those who were actually engaged in removing the hollow and sealing the road with such a fine smooth surface. There are a few other places on the main road passing through Dungarvan, notably at the top of Mary Street, which could also do with some of this expert attention.

Incidentally mention of the closing of the railway line prompts me to ask whether there is any possibility of having the old house which stood at the Strandside South level crossing at Abbeyside and which is now an eyesore and a source of a great deal of nuisance demolished and the site cleared. In its present condition it certainly does nothing to enhance the locality there.

FURTHER OIL SPILLAGE IN DUNGARVAN HARBOUR

Creamery Admits Responsibility

Mr D. Goode at last Monday night's meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council stated that on Thursday, March 7, it was reported to him that a very heavy flow of oil had again polluted the harbour and the individual who saw it was prepared to say that he saw the oil coming out of a pipe leading to the Co-op Creamery.

Mr P. Walsh, Town Engineer, said that this had also been brought to his notice and he had spent about half a day at the Creamery investigating the matter and as a result he located the source of the spillage, at least in part.

He went on to say that they failed to find any evidence of a direct leakage from the oil tanks but concluded that the oil was coming from old drums which had not been in use for a considerable time. He said that the Creamery had assured him that they would do all they could to clear up any pollution that had occurred in the harbour as a result.

In reply to Mr Goode, the Town Engineer said he was satisfied that the oil spillage had come from the Creamery and the people in the Creamery were also satisfied that this was so. It had not been due to direct spillage or to someone dumping oil in steps being taken to have the old drain from which the oil was thought to have come sealed off.

Senator Deasy said that these recurring oil spillages were most worrying. They had got an assurance from the Creamery 2 years ago that such spillages could not happen again as they had taken corrective measures. Mr Walsh said that at that time the spillages had occurred at the old filling point which was located on the footpath. This had been changed at that time and he was satisfied that there was now no spillage from that source.

CLEANING GULLYS

The discussion then ended. Mr P. Whelan said that residents at Murphy Place and Fernan Place had complained to him that after the recent heavy rains they had to clear the shores in the streets themselves. The people should not be expected to do such a job which was one for the Council, he said. The Town Engineer said that he was not aware of this but he added that he would draw the matter to the attention of the County Council whose function it was to look after such gullies.

ENGLISH "CON-MEN" HIT DUNGARVAN TRADERS

Two young Englishmen operating as a team hit a number of traders in Dungarvan last week and after getting away with small sums of money in each case, they disappeared. Gardaí who are now investigating the matter have warned shopkeepers to be on their guard in case the tricksters should strike in other areas.

The modus operandi adopted was that the first man entered a shop and asked for the change of an English £5 note or made a small purchase with it. The note bore the number 54 marked on it. Almost immediately the accomplice was in to make another small purchase for which he tendered a £1 note. However when the latter was given his change he claimed that it was a £5 note he had tendered and staked his claim that he was sure of this as the note he handed in bore the marked number 54. In all cases where they carried out this "caper" the Englishmen walked off as winners. Both were in their early 20s and spoke with pronounced English accents. One had fair hair and the other brown or dark hair.

DUNGARVAN RATE IS £5 09

Dungarvan Urban Council at their estimates meeting held last Monday night adopted a rate of £5 09 in the £ for the nine month period from April 1, 1974 to December 31, 1974. This is a decrease of £1 over the current year's rate.

In his report to the members, the Co Manager said that the rate provided for a net estimated expenditure of £114,825 which with a sum of £111,178 estimated from receipts made the total expenditure for the period £226,003.

Steepest increases were under the headings of Sanitary Services (up by £2,451) and Housing (up by £1,600) but a big decrease of £14,600 in the County Council demand due to the phased cost of housing subsidies and health services from the rates accounted for the final decrease of £1 in the rate.

The rate as presented by the Co Manager was adopted by the Council on the proposal of Mr D. Goode seconded by Mr N. Kelly. An amendment that the rate be further reduced by taking account for an additional £1,000 in water rent receipts proposed by Mr N. Hackett was not seconded.

SUMMER TIME NEXT SUNDAY

Next Sunday March 17, being St. Patrick's Day is also the day on which Summer Time officially begins this year. All clocks and watches should be put forward one hour at 2 a.m. that day or for those who retire early before they go to bed on Saturday night. Summer time will remain in force until winter time again comes into operation on October 27.

LATE MR. M. WADE, DUNGARVAN

Regretted Passing Of Popular Personality

It was with a sense of deep shock and regret that the people of Dungarvan and district learned of the unexpected death of Mr Michael (Mickey) Wade, Friary Street, which occurred at his residence in the early hours of Thursday morning March 7th after a brief illness.

The deceased who was aged only 48 years, was son of Mrs Josie Wade and the late Daniel Wade, and brother of Rev Bro Eugene, O.S.A. He was one of the most esteemed members of the community and his many outstanding features of character enjoyed for him the respect of all.

To one and all he was affectionately known as Mickey. He was the possessor of a charming personality and his jovial manner, his friendly and cheerful disposition and above all his down to earth ways contributed to his immense standing among all who had the privilege of knowing him.

He was in fact a man almost incapable of giving offence. He was never known to have become ruffled and it is no exaggeration to describe him as one of the most popular and best loved personalities the town has known for many years. His untimely passing at such an early age is truly regretted not only by his family and relatives but by his legion of very close friends.

A brilliant past pupil of Dungarvan CBS, he was a founding member and director of Dungarvan Sand and Gravel Company. Indeed the tremendous growth and expansion the company has enjoyed in a comparatively short time were due in no small way to his administrative excellence and his keen business acumen.

In his youth he was a hurler of ability and figured prominently in many championship games with the Dungarvan club of which he was a loyal lifelong member. But sporting-wise his great love was probably horse racing and he was

DUNGARVAN CASUALTY SERVICE

COUNCIL APPOINT DEPUTATION TO SEE MINISTER

Further reference to the refusal of the doctors in Dungarvan to operate a week-end rota to provide a casualty service for the town and district was made at last Monday's meeting of the Dungarvan Urban Council. At the previous meeting of the Council, the Chairman, Mr C. Curran said he had made a request for the minutes of a meeting held in Dungarvan between the doctors and officials of the Health Board at which this decision was reached.

At Monday's meeting he informed the members of the Council that he had received a reply to their request from Dr. V. Barry, Programme Manager, Community Care South Eastern Health Board in this Dr. Barry stated that the doctors in Dungarvan had said that they were prepared to deal with casualties when called to do so. He added that at the meeting held on February 19 only the question of arranging a week-end rota was discussed. This meeting had been informal and no minutes had been kept.

Dr. Barry's letter concluded 'As you are aware I cannot require doctors to provide services other than that they have contracted to provide for the eligible patients on their lists.'

Mr K. O'Ryan said that the net result of all this was that they had no casualty service in Dungarvan.

Chairman—I'm afraid so. Mr J. Quirk said that all this came about because one of the doctors involved had refused to co-operate.

When the Chairman told the Council that if they went into Committee he would be prepared to explain the whole question and would say things that would make many people blush, Mr T. Foley interjected that they wanted a casualty service for the town and district and if something was to be said to clarify the position it should be spilled out.

Mr T. Kyne, T.D. said that he understood that the doctors wanted a room at the district hospital to operate the service but apparently this was not available while he also understood that one of the doctors was not prepared to work a rota while the other four were.

Chairman—It seems so. Mr Kyne then remarked that he had a request from the trade union movement in Dungarvan to present a doctor which was felt to be badly needed in town because of accidents at work and at the G.A.A. field. He said it was a pity that some agreement could not be reached.

ELIGIBLE PATIENTS ONLY

Mr W. Kenneally, T.D. said he noted from Dr. Barry's letter that the doctors would deal only with eligible patients. This apparently meant that anyone injured at the Gaelic field who was not on a local doctor's panel could not be dealt with.

Chairman—That is so and this is a most serious matter that it appears to be.

Mr Kyne asked the Chairman if, as a member of the Regional Health Board, he could find out the number of medical card patients which a doctor could deal with the number of such patients which each doctor in Dungarvan had and whether there was any need for an additional doctor in the town.

Mr Curran said he would look for this information.

Mr P. Cahill said that the Chairman had said he knew something which he could not say about this matter. Is it that the doctors are too well off? he asked.

The Chairman replied that he was not prepared to say anything which he did not have in writing.

Mr P. Coffey said that he knew that doctors worked rota systems everywhere very successfully and he could not understand why this could not be done in Dungarvan.

Chairman—The sum total is that the doctors here have deliberately refused to operate a casualty service.

Finally in an effort to resolve the problem the Council appointed a deputation consisting of Deputies Kyne and Kenneally and Senator Deasy to discuss the matter with the Minister for Health.

DUNGARVAN PIPE BAND WERE LOCKED OUT OF BANDROOM SAYS COUNCILLOR

When an eight-man deputation from the Dungarvan Pipe Band attended the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council last Monday night seeking a site for the erection of a bandroom it was stated by a member of the Council during the discussion that following the meeting the band members had recently been locked out of the premises they had been using as a bandroom.

Mr Pat McGrath who was principal spokesman for the deputation said that at present the band members had no piece in which to practice or to keep their instruments and other gear. He pointed out that they were in existence 21 years this year and were still only struggling along because they had no bandroom.

Mr Michael Power who also spoke on behalf of the deputation said that they were to have attended the previous meeting of the Council but due to a misunderstanding they had not been informed to do so. He then referred to a statement or a derogatory remark which he said the Chairman had made at that meeting and at which they were not present to defend themselves. He thought such a statement should not have been made.

Mr T. Kyne, T.D. Chairman, said that the deputation were entitled to think what they liked but what he said at the previous meeting was whether anyone had seen the bandroom occupied by the band as he had got reports about the condition in which it had been left.

Mr Power replied that there was no truth in such reports and anyone who wished could see for themselves the condition in which they had left it.

OUT ON THE STREET

Mr D. Cooney said that he had remembered what the Chairman had said at the previous meeting and he did not think he had passed any derogatory remarks. He went on to say that this was a historic year for the Pipe Band as it marked their coming of age and he was sorry to see that a local firm who had bought the Friary College had put the band on the street.

He added that he would like to see the Pipe Band get the same facilities as anyone else.

Mr Kyne said that he went to the Co-op Creamery two months ago about such but the Management informed him that they had nothing to do with it. They wanted to get the property clear of all tenants before buying and they informed the auctioneers of this.

Mr Power—But I understand the Pipe Band had their rent there paid up until May and now they have been locked out.

Chairman—I know that but the Creamery say they had nothing to do with this and that it was a matter between the band and the Friars.

Mr C. O'Connor, Manager, stated that a meeting with reference to the lay-out of the site at Quann's would be held within the next week or so and a site for a bandroom might be made available.

They would be in a position to discuss this possibility in a more positive way after that meeting.

The deputation said that they would be satisfied with this and as an interim measure the Council agreed to request the Creamery management to allow the band to continue to use the room they had within the Friary property.

IF YOU HAVE A JOB, YOU MUST BE COVERED FOR SOCIAL INSURANCE

1. All employees - whatever they earn - will be covered by Social Insurance from next April.
 2. Social Insurance benefits for sickness or unemployment will be increased by Pay-Related benefit from next April.
- This extra weekly payment will be based on previous earnings.

1. ABOLITION OF LIMIT

Who will be brought into Social Insurance?

Until now, employees in non-manual jobs who earned more than £1,600 a year were not compulsorily covered for Social Insurance. This limit will be abolished on April 1. All employees will then be compulsorily insured.

If you are employed in a manufacturing, commercial or service industry - or in agriculture - you will be covered for the full range of Social Insurance benefits. You must hold a Social Insurance Card which must be stamped each week. You will also be covered for Pay-Related benefit.

If you have a permanent and pensionable job in the public sector, you will be covered for a limited number of benefits only - widow's and orphan's pensions, deserted wife's benefit and occupational injuries benefit for which you will pay a special flat-rate contribution. This will include the Health contribution of 15p.

Make sure you have a Social Insurance Card

If you do not have a Social Insurance Card now, make sure to have one by April 1. You will need to fill in an application form to get one. Check with your employer, he may have already got a form for you. If not, get the form from any Employment Exchange or Employment Office. (They are listed under "Employment Exchanges" in the Telephone Directory, parts 1 and 2.)

Coming under Social Insurance for the full range of benefits for the first time?

If so, your eligibility for benefits builds up according to the number of weekly stamps on your Social Insurance record as follows:

- Immediately, you are eligible for occupational injuries benefit
- After 26 Stamps, you are eligible for unemployment, disability and maternity benefits. If you are under 21 years, you are covered for optical and dental benefit as well.
- After 156 Stamps, you are eligible for optical and dental benefit, whatever your age, and will be able to satisfy one of the conditions for pensions.

Coming back under Social Insurance for the full range of benefits again?

If you were insured before and are now coming back into the scheme your previous stamps will count. You can claim benefits on them and build up your eligibility with them (see above). The Department of Social Welfare will revive your previous insurance record and will credit you with contributions which will help you to qualify immediately for unemployment, disability, maternity, dental and optical benefits.

2. PAY-RELATED BENEFIT

How will Pay-Related benefit work?

Under the old arrangement, a sick or unemployed worker was paid a flat-rate of benefit. The amount of benefit varied only with the number of dependants he had.

From April 8 on your Social Insurance benefits for sickness or unemployment will be based on what you previously earned when you were working. You will be paid benefit at the flat-rate for the first two weeks. If the benefit continues beyond that, Pay-Related benefit will be added each week to your flat-rate benefit. This extra amount will be based on what you earned in a previous income tax year. Up to 5 January 1975, Pay-Related benefit will be based on earnings in the 1972-1973 tax year.

How much will the Pay-Related benefit be?

The Department of Social Welfare will work it out for you, on the following basis:

- 1 They will take your total earnings assessable to income-tax under Schedule E for the tax year 1972/73 including wages, overtime, bonuses, commission etc.
- 2 They will divide by 50 to arrive at your weekly earnings. (If your earnings come to more than £50 a week, you will be allowed £50 only, that is the most you can be covered for under the scheme.)
- 3 They will subtract £14 from your weekly earnings.
- 4 Your Pay-Related benefit will be a weekly amount equal to 40p in the £ on the amount remaining. It will be added to your flat-rate benefit.

Here is a table showing some examples of how the scheme works in practice:

If the total amount of benefit to be paid exceeds your weekly earnings, then the Pay-Related benefit will be appropriately reduced.

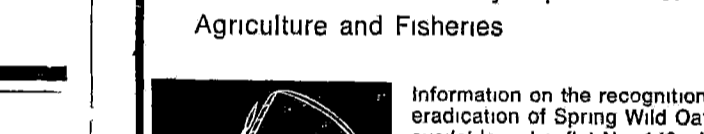
