PENSMAN TAKES YOU Behind the SPOTLIGHT

URBAN RATE

The Dungarvan Urban rate to cover the next nine months to December 31 shows, at £5.09, a decrease of £1 on the rate for the current year. The principal factor in bringing about this decrease was the drop of almost £15,000 in the demand from the County Council due to the phased transfer of the cost of the health services from the rates to central funds.

Were it not for this decision of the Government to ease the health burden on the rates we could otherwise have another colossal jump in local taxation at county and urban levels for the coming year.

In the case of the Dungarvan rate the summary of changes in expenditure as between the next and the current periods shows a jump of £2,451 in the cost of sanitary services while housing costs go up by £1,600. And it must be borne in mind that this is for a nine months period as compared with a full year.

The principal cause of the sanitary services increase is the cost of our water supply, which goes from £8,735 for 1973/74 to £10,138. This large increase is stated to be mainly due to the extra cost of pumping from the boreholes at Ballinamuck and gives credence and backing to the argument that a borehole water supply is the most expensive method of providing this essential public service. It has been argued since the Dungarvan town supply was switched from the old gravitational system, that the cost of providing water from boreholes based on the costs of continual pumping, would increase from year to year. The jump in the costs since the introduction of the borehole system has proved this to be so and with the present position in regard to electricity charges it shows every likelihood of further heavy rises while proposals to sink two new boreholes at Ballinamuck will undoubtedly, further increase the pumping demands.

Another public service which has been the cause of steep increases in the rates in recent years is that of domestic scavenging and street cleaning. For the past year the total cost of this was £11,674 while for the next nine months it will be £10,933 and while the cost is increasing it is, to say the least, highly questionable whether the standard of service being provided shows any great improvement.

AN MHUINTR S'AGAINNE

The dismal failure of the programme planners of Telefís Eireann to provide any kind of worthwhile entertainment last week-end and which I heard generally commented on as brightened a little bit for me on Monday night when I tuned into Radio Eireann at 10.35 and listened for half an hour to songs and reminiscences in Irish from the Ring and Helvick areas.

Fortunately I had learned beforehand that the programme, "An Mhuintri S'Againne O'Deas," would carry some material gathered by the presenter, Padraig Tyers when he visited Ring a week or so previously as otherwise I could well have missed it.

First on came Jack Curran from Ceann A' Bhathalaigh Helvick, who recalled the days of his youth remembering among other things the times when Ring College was founded and when the pier at Helvick was built. Jack's interesting memories were followed by a song "An Buacailin Bán" given in her own inimitable fashion by Póilin Bean Uí Fhaoilain from Baile na nGoll. Bean Uí Fhaoilain will be better remembered under her maiden name Polly Kelly and I must say that as I heard the song sung so sweetly as ever, memories of great nights of song and music in Ring and Helvick came back to me.

After this we had a bhearsc of "An Bothar Go h-Eochail" from Níoclás Toibin and the programme concluded with a comhra between Padraig Tyers and Seamus O'Faolain of Killinorin in which we had a great deal of wit as once again the old days when things were not so good, were recalled once more.

THE BARNAWEE PROJECT

Appropos my reference in last week's column to the County Council proposals under their Amenity Schemes for a survey at the estuary at Barnawee to test the feasibility of a plan put forward by the Dungarvan Rowing Club, I have been informed that the Club still has a very lively interest in such a project.

I had a call from some of the Club officials during the week and they informed me that the Barnawee Project is still very much on with them if the survey could be carried out by the Council to show that proposals to erect a dam would not cause flooding to the lands of a farmer which adjoin the estuary. The Club still believes that from the point of safety for their members this would be a far better training area for them than the open sea at the Look-Out where they are at present forced to operate.

MARAUDING DOGS

I passed through a few of the predominantly sheep rearing areas of the county last week end and as I watched the many newly born lambs I thought what easy prey they can fall to marauding dogs. Every time that the lambing season comes round we hear of losses sustained by sheep farmers as stray dogs steal through the countryside especially at night, killing and maiming ewes and young lambs.

Appeals have gone out year after year to dog owners to keep their dogs locked up so that they cannot roam through the country on night time forays. But despite these constant appeals the slaughter goes on and the position still remains serious.

Now a new drive is being made in a fresh effort to reduce these killings. It is being spearheaded by a member of the Kilkenny Agricultural Society and the idea is that County Committees of Agriculture should consider the payment of a bounty for the destruction of stray dogs under somewhat similar conditions as those which apply to the schemes being operated in the destruction of foxes.

In addition the suggestion has also been put forward that when the new legislation to deal with stray dogs is introduced it should include a provision under which dog owners will be obliged to keep

DEFENDANT TOLD: NO PEACE IF YOU ARE LEFT ROAMING AROUND

PRISON SENTENCES FOR DUNGARVAN MEN

What was described by Supt M English as a rampage of crime had a sequel when four local men appeared in custody before District Justice B J Carroll at Dungarvan Court on a series of charges covering larceny, breaking and entering, receiving stolen goods, interfering with and causing damage to cars.

Before the court were William Fraher (27), 30, Cathal Brugha Place, Patrick Mooney (19) do, Thomas Kirby (24) and James Wright (24) both also of Cathal Brugha Place. All pleaded guilty to the charges.

Fraher had a total of 15 charges preferred against him and these covered breaking and entering the slaughterhouse of Mr M V Morrissey and stealing a quantity of meat from a motor-cycle battery at South Terrace breaking and entering the house of Joseph Dalton, Kilmurray, entering and stealing articles from a store the property of Albert Trol, Glenbeg breaking and entering and stealing stout from Powers brewery and interfering with a number of cars parked in various parts of the town.

All the other defendants were linked in one way or another with some or all of these charges which occurred between February 8 and March 2.

Supt English said that Fraher who was married and the father of 3 children had been in trouble with the law since 1967. He had a long list of convictions and said this defendant had been imprisoned on a number of occasions. He

URBAN COUNCIL MOVES TO EXTEND HOUSING SCHEME

He would contact the owners who had agreed to dispose of their property with a view to reaching agreement on the compensation to be paid stated Mr R J Keane, Town Clerk in the course of a report on proposals to acquire properties for the extension of the housing scheme at St Thomas Terrace which was considered by members of Dungarvan Urban Council at their March monthly meeting.

The Town Clerk's report stated that the properties involved included all the garages and stores fronting on to St Thomas Street and approximately 40 of the gardens at the rear. It recalled that in December 1971 when the Council decided to proceed with the making of a Compulsory Purchase Order, it was agreed not to acquire the yard owned by Mr William Pennell because of the possible disruption of his business.

The report went on excluding Mr Pennell's yard, eight dwellings could be built, but including this yard, a total of eleven dwellings could be built. Some time ago this yard was purchased by Dr Ann Casey and it appears that the yard is not now used for any particular business. Consequently, I would recommend that the Council now include this yard in the proposed CPO with the intention of erecting eleven dwellings on the site.

D.J. WARNS AGAIN 'DON'T TAKE OUT CAR WITHOUT INSURANCE'

I have said before and I repeat it now that no one should take a car onto the road without first having either a letter or certificate showing that it is insured. District Justice B J Carroll stated at Dungarvan Court.

Before the court was John Keely a 24 years old labourer of Ballingown Kilrossanty, and he pleaded guilty to charges of driving without insurance on November 2 and 7 last.

Keely told the court that he had paid a deposit of £20 towards the £60 premium and thought he was insured.

Collection under the PAYE system of Pay-Related Social Insurance Contributions

Operative date for scheme The scheme for collection of social insurance pay-related contributions under the PAYE system will come into operation on 6th April 1974

Employees in respect of whom Pay-Related Contributions will be payable

Pay-related social insurance contributions will be payable in respect of employees for whom the following rates of flat-rate social insurance contributions will be payable from 1st April 1974 (the existing rates are shown in brackets)

Table with 5 columns: Category, Employer Pays, Employee Pays, Health Contribution, Total Stamp. Rows include Ordinary Male/Female, Agricultural Male/Female, and Outworker male weavers.

*The employer pays the health contribution only in the case of employees who hold Medical Cards, otherwise the contribution is paid by the employee

Rates of Pay-Related Contributions

The social insurance pay-related contribution consists of two elements as follows 1 An employer's contribution amounting to 2% of the employee's current earnings, as computed for PAYE purposes, up to a ceiling of £2,500 a year 2 An employee's contribution amounting to 1% of these earnings to be deducted by the employer in conjunction with PAYE tax, if any, on making payment of any salary or wages to the employee

Collection of Pay-Related Social Insurance Contributions

Within nine days from the end of each income tax month, commencing with the month ending 5th May 1974, the employer must send to the Collector-General a return on the monthly remittance form (P30) showing a total PAYE tax, if any, which he was liable to remit for that month.

b the total of the employees' and employer's pay-related social insurance contributions which he was liable to remit for that month, and c the total of the amounts at (a) and (b) and, at the same time, must remit to the Collector-General the said total of tax and pay-related social insurance contributions

Record of Pay-Related Social Insurance Contributions

Pay-related social insurance contributions in respect of each employee must be recorded, in conjunction with details of emoluments and PAYE tax, if any, either on the official tax deduction card or, in the case of approved accounting systems, on the approved alternative form of tax deduction card (form P9L/11L) notwithstanding that the employee may not be liable for tax
