GLOBE-TROTTING DUNGARVANITES
My post bag, among other things, contained a few colourful postcards from far-away places last week bringing me news of the globe-trotting activities of some friends of mine from Dungarvan.

First from Newport, Rhode Island in the U.S. came a card from Tadhg Regan who may not now be so well-known to some of the residents of Dungarvan. FUTURE OF CARAVAN SITE AT HELVICK

County Council Threatened With Injunction

The position in regard to the continued use of land owned at Helvick by Waterford County Council as a caravan site was again discussed at a special meeting of the Council held in Dungarvan last Monday...

Two years ago following complaints from some residents in the area regarding the condition of the site and reports from the County Engineer and the Assistant Chief Medical Officer to the effect that the site was not suitably equipped for use as a caravan park a proposal was put forward that its use for that purpose be discontinued until such time as the same standard as required in the case of other such parks in the county...

In the course of a report before last Monday's meeting of the Council, the County Secretary, Mr J McEnally pointed out that in July 1972 it was agreed to use a sum of £4,000 originally intended for the development of beach facilities at Fall a Development grant by the South East Regional Tourist Organisation to develop the caravan site. However Mr McEnally would not agree to this proposal and the development of the caravan site was not proceeded with.

ABANDON OR DEVELOP

Mr C A O'Connor County Manager said that the position was that the Council would either have to abandon the site as a caravan park or develop it so as to bring it up to the required standard.

Senator A Deasy suggested that the Council should acquire land in the area and establish a proper caravan site. He felt that the site at present being used was too close to the private residences in the area and agreed that the objections which had been made were valid and understandable.

Mr P Kenneally said that the caravan site was used only in the summer. No local people were objecting to it and he understood that the objections were coming from people who only came to the locality themselves during the summer months.

Mr J D Hally Co Engineer said that it would not be as simple as Senator Deasy suggested to acquire suitable sites in Helvick. He added that he was speaking subject to correction when he said that he understood that some of the caravans which were left permanently on the site were owned by some people who were at present raising the objections.

HIGH COURT SETTLEMENTS IN DUNGARVAN WORKERS' CLAIMS

Two Dungarvan factory workers who were scalded by boiling water in the course of their work on September 18 1971 settled their claims for damages in the High Court in Dublin.

Thomas Costigan of 15 Cathal Brugha Road is to be paid £19,500 and costs and his workmate Patrick Moore of Ballinacorney Cappagh is to be paid £5,000 and costs.

They had brought separate actions against their employer Quigley Magnetics Ltd whose registered offices are at 4 Lapps Quay Cork and they complained that while working at the defendants factory at Ballinacorney Dungarvan they were ordered to clean out a tank while they were in the tank performing this work boiling water was passed through a connecting pipe into the tank and they were severely scalded.

Oklahoma, with music by Richard Rodgers and lyrics by Oscar Hammerstein II, was first staged in New York city on the evening of March 31, 1943.
