Behind the SPOTLIGHT

ON GOING SLOW

For more than twelve months now we have been reading regularly about the "go slow" policies being adopted by a number of organisations representing people employed in certain branches of the public service. This is a comparatively new and more sophisticated method, aimed, however, at achieving the same end result, as the good old-fashioned strike action. It concerns more money, easier working conditions and in some cases the question of status and the prospects of promotion.

The latest group to take on this go slow action to push their claims are members of the agricultural advisory service and part of their campaign is a ban on operating the Farm Modernisation Scheme. As at the end of last month a total of 101 completed applications under the scheme had been filed from farmers in County Waterford which is well up on the list of overages as the combined total of 2366 for the entire 27 county committees of agriculture at that time shows. What is to become of these applications? Will they lie neatly filed, in the offices of the County Committees of Agriculture until the row between the agricultural officers and the Minister is resolved and will farmers, consequently, stand to lose the grants which would otherwise become available to them under the scheme?

The matter was raised in the Dail just before the Easter recess when the Minister for Agriculture replied to a number of questions on the subject put down by Mr Gerry Collins the present shadow Minister for Agriculture of the Opposition. Dealing with a query as to the amount of time, in terms of days, which it would take to process one application under the Scheme the Minister Mr Clinton said that while it was not possible at this early stage to make an estimate of the number of hours which it would take to deal with one such application, he had been informed, from the information already available, that it would take only about an hour to classify a farmer provided the necessary information had previously been collected.

When Mr Collins pressed this point and asked whether the Minister was aware that the view was held by many of the agricultural officers in the different counties that it could take up to three days to process one application, the Minister replied that he thought Deputy Collins knew that the Minister was aware of the fact that it was a good deal of time around these times and that people might be looking at these things through coloured spectacles.

Mr Clinton then went on to say "The Deputy is aware of the dispute which exists in the advisory service and they will not underestimate the time it takes. I think it is fair to say that in the planning exercises which were carried out in each county during the past two months the time devoted to each farm was intentionally long to give all the advice an opportunity of understanding the details. While they could say it took this time during these planning exercises, an educational exercise of the information I have that it takes nothing like that time when they get down to doing their job."

On the prospects of settling the dispute, the Minister stated that he did not think there was anything further he could do. He had gone to the limits in the circumstances and the thought was now up to the advisory officers to make up their minds. Regarding the ban on the operation of the Farm Modernisation Scheme, the Minister stated that if the ban continued and the applications were not getting through he would ask the farmers to send their applications direct to the

Department of Agriculture where they would be dealt with "If this organisation (the advisory officers) does not want to become involved in what is a first-class national development," the Minister is then quoted as saying, "then I regret it very much." And indeed so do we all.

POACHING AND POLLUTION

At the local court in Dungarvan last week the Waterford Board of Fishery Conservators were complainants in four different cases involving poaching on the river Colligan during the recent close salmon season. Fish running in the river to spawn were subjected to attack by strokahauls, gaffs, nets and even shotguns.

It is a great pity that this little river, which runs into Dungarvan harbour should be subjected to such abuse, as with a little care it could prove a much appreciated amenity for local anglers besides a great attraction for tourists who might come to the town not only because of its proven sea angling capabilities but also because of the sport which a well-stocked and cared for river could provide for fresh-water anglers.

In addition to what it has put up with from the strokehaulers and the gaff and spear men the river is also much abused by people who use it for the indiscriminate disposal of refuse of all kinds at many points where it runs close to the public road. I walked along the banks of the river in the Kiladangan area last week-end and the pollution caused by these dumpers was plainly evident from the amount of empty plastic containers, socks and other general refuse which could be seen strewn along the river or lying at the bottom of the quiet water of the pools.

I thought about how really civilised the society in which we live is when so many are prepared to go out and deliberately destroy the very environment in this manner. For these people the standard morality would seem to be that nothing is wrong until you're caught. What a great pity! And indeed what a crying shame that a beautiful little river such as the Colligan can be destroyed in this manner by poaching and pollution.

THOSE PARKED CIE BUSES

I note that there are two CIE buses still parked regularly on the footpath at the Clonea Road in Abbeyside. I referred to this matter before and pointed out that the County Council surely did not go to the expense of laying a footpath along this busy stretch of road within the last few years just to have CIE come along now and allow their buses to be parked on it for long periods at a time.

Some people have been under the impression that these buses are the property of local bus owner and operator Mr Jackie Kennedy who resides in this area and who has a garage to house and service his own fleet of vehicles there but I have been assured that this is not so and that CIE merely park these two buses out there as a matter of convenience for themselves. CIE are perfectly entitled to make whatever arrangements suit them but they are not entitled to preferential treatment when it comes to parking their vehicles in such a manner as to totally obstruct a footpath and force passing pedestrians out on to the road. If they are not prepared to remedy this position themselves then surely there is a method by which they can be brought to book.

Health Board decision on Dungarvan casualty service

A delay in getting medical attention for a Cork hurler injured in a game in Dungarvan was one of the instances given by Mr C Curran, at the monthly meeting of the South-Eastern Health Board, in Kilkenny last Thursday, moving his motion "that as a matter of urgency a casualty service be provided in Dungarvan".

The motion was accepted in principle and it was left to the CEO, Mr P G McQuillan, to draft the minute on the basis of an emergency service to provide the normal GP service on an organised basis in the case of casualties.

Mr Curran said the motion was tabled at the request of Waterford County Council.

Mr James Quirk said such a service was badly needed particularly at weekends to deal with minor accidents at matches.

Dr O'Brien-Moran said he had been in touch with one of the doctors in Dungarvan who prepared to provide the service but no room was made available at the hospital.

casualty service in the district saved hundreds of lives. It was a grave injustice that he had not been given permanent responsibility and could be liable if anything went wrong. They would not have the facilities in a district hospital such as x-rays, consultant staff and anaesthetist.

He pointed out that the recommendations should go to the nearest surgical hospital where they would have a resident staff and all the facilities.

Mr R I Gallaher saw a danger in the wording of the motion and thought that arrangements should be made to have a doctor on call to provide GP attention in an emergency.

Dr P Meenan also expressed reservations about the proposal.

Mr Curran said that he objected to the remarks of the three previous speakers who were only trying to draw red herrings across the issue. They would not settle for anything less than a seven-day service to which the people were entitled.

Mr P G McQuillan CEO said that he understood what Mr Curran and Mr Quirk wanted—a properly equipped room in the hospital with a nurse in attendance and a doctor on call. He saw no difficulty in providing such a service.

ABUNDANCE NEXT WINTER

What will be the bale of hay cost in February 1975, £1.52 or 50p? Now is the time to make yourself independent of next Spring's hay market.

Bought in feed is very poor value in comparison to fertilizers. Think of a cwt of Ration costing £4 or 4 bales of hay costing £4, when you are buying your fertilizer £4 worth of Nitrogen is enough to spread on an acre of hay — enough for 120-140 bales of hay. Lime, Phosphate, Potash and Nitrogen — don't spare them. Hay should be made with different requirements of NPK. Most farmers know what amounts are needed. Briefly, you need 2 cwt of 0.10 20 per cent for grazing, 1.0 20 per cent for hay and 4 cwt 0.7 30 for silage.

4 cwt 28% CAN per acre or equivalent for a cut of silage. 1 1/2 cwt 25% CAN per acre or equivalent for hay. Make arrangements with your silage contractor early. Spread 1 1/2 cwt CAN per acre at 6 weeks intervals from grass in if your stocking rate is high.

WHO GOT CAUGHT FOR FEED LAST WINTER? Was it the men with the high stocking rates? No. The shortage of feed was worse on farms where the grazing and feed position was not planned.

PLAN NOW FOR NEXT WINTER. Money at 4% interest rate. Did you ever hear of that? In 1974 money for fertilizers is available at 4% 60 years to repay. I am speaking of the Land Project Credit Fertilizer Scheme. Apply now for this scheme as it is being reviewed and may be abolished. The scheme about three months before you require the fertilizer as the land has to be tested. Quotations obtained etc. No excuse for not having your land properly limed and fertilized. A cow needs 6 tons silage for a 5 month winter. A cow needs 75 bales of hay for a 5 month winter. Cattle need the same amount or less for lighter cattle.



POACHER TELLS WATERKEEPER "I DON'T DO MUCH OF IT"

In the fourth of a series of prosecutions brought by the Waterford Board of Fishery Conservator for illegal fishing in the river Colligan at Dungarvan Court last week, Martin Mansfield, Bailinamult, Dungarvan, was fined a total of £1250 by District Justice Carroll. Mr F Power Solicitor for the Fishery Board said that this was a similar type of offence to the others and concerned the taking of spawning fish from the Colligan with a strokehaul on October 2 last. He told the court that at about 3 pm on the evening in question the defendant was observed by a Waterkeeper on the river bank and when challenged he agreed that he was fishing illegally but told the Waterkeeper "I don't do much of it". Mr Power said that the defendant had been convicted in October 1969 on a charge of using a strokehaul. The District Justice remarking that that was now five years ago imposed the fines stated and allowed the defendant two months to pay.

MOTORIST WITH "NO EXCUSE IN WIDE WORLD" FINED TOTAL OF £68 AND SUSPENDED AT DUNGARVAN COURT

This man has no excuse in the wide world and he showed a blatant disregard for the traffic laws of the country to drive around like this without insurance or tax said District Justice B J Carroll at Dungarvan Court last week. He was replying to an appeal for leniency by Mr M Lavan, Solicitor on behalf of Robert Cochrane Mount Odell, Dungarvan, described as a building contractor who had pleaded guilty to charges of driving a motor car without tax or insurance on September 3 last and again on October 14. Stating that from the evidence of the Garda it was clear that the defendant had got every opportunity and had been warned about the position on a number of occasions, the District Justice imposed a fine of £20 on the insurance charge and £8 on the tax charge in respect of September 3 and a fine of £30 on the insurance charge with a suspension of his driving licence for 6 months and £10 on the tax charge in respect of October 14. He fixed recognisances in the event of an appeal.

HAD GEAR TO GO SALMON POACHING IN CAR

When Mr Feigus Power Solicitor for the Waterford Board of Fishery Conservators made an application for the forfeiture and disposal of fishing gear at Dungarvan Court last week he told District Justice B J Carroll that the owner of the gear was not prosecuted as they had no evidence of any offence against him. Garda F Lohan in evidence stated that on November 6 last he was on duty in Dungarvan and stopped a car driven by William Butler, Kiladangan, Dungarvan. He searched the boot of the car and there found a 12 volt battery with a light attached, a net, a spong and a landing hook. He took possession of the gear and when he asked Butler for an explanation he admitted that he was going poaching for salmon in the Colligan. The District Justice granted the order as applied for.

SEQUEL TO TWO-CAR COLLISION ON ABBEYSIDE CAUSEWAY BRIDGE

A collision in which the two cars involved were damaged to extents in excess of £550 each and which occurred on the bridge at the Causeway, Abbey side on New Year's night last had a sequel at Dungarvan Court last week when one of the drivers involved was convicted on a charge of driving without due care and attention on the occasion. He was Jack O Grady, Lyre East, Ballymacarby and he was fined £2 and ordered to pay £20 witnesses' expenses. James Gee Kilrush, Dungarvan, the driver of the other car involved said that at about 10.45 pm on the night in question he was returning home and was driving his car into town from the Abbeyside direction. He drove across the Causeway and just as he was going over the bridge the other car came against him at a fast speed on his side of the road. It collided with his car which was very severely damaged by the impact. After the accident witnesses said that he spoke to the driver of the other car and asked him what had happened. Jim Witness said that O Grady replied that as he approached the bridge from the Dungarvan side he had to overtake some people who were walking along on the left-hand side. As he was passing them he had to go over on to his wrong side of the road.

WHITE LINE

The defendant in evidence stated that his car had been parked outside the Courthouse on Bridge Street that night and he and a number of companions were going on to a dance in Kilmacthomas. He pulled across by his own side and was going out towards Abbeyside and was not more than 15 mph. As he came to the bridge he saw two men walking on his left towards Abbeyside. As he passed them he pulled out close to the white line on the centre of the road and while his right wheel could have actually been on the white line he denied that he had crossed over it. He then pulled back to his own side after passing the pedestrians. The next thing he saw was two lights coming straight at him and the whole thing then happened so fast that there was nothing he could do to avoid the collision. He said that the witness who was involved in the accident saw his car which was only a few months old was a write-off as a result.

District Justice Carroll said that he thought that the position of the cars were found in after the accident and the point of impact as shown on the Garda sketch were very significant factors. Having heard the evidence he said that he would have come to the same conclusion as Mr O'Grady had moved over the white line to his wrong side when passing the pedestrians and did not get back to his own side in time. He convicted him and fined him £2 and allowed £10 expenses each to Mr Gee and a Mr McCarthy who also gave evidence.
