Behind the SPOTLIGHT

FIRST AID FOR MOTORISTS

Deeply concerned with the number of deaths and injuries caused by road accidents, the Irish Red Cross Society has launched a campaign to encourage motorists to learn First Aid and to carry First Aid Kits in their cars.

Many people injured in accidents have suffered further injuries through the thoughtlessness of well-meaning but frantic rescuers whose first instinct is to run to a car involved in an accident and to start pulling people out. The Society points out that rough handling can worsen injuries very considerably and can make bleeding more severe. Injured people should be handled very gently and without panic. A trapped casualty should be treated where he is until qualified helpers arrive, unless there is imminent danger, such as fire or if the car is in danger of toppling over. To reduce the risk of fire at the scene of an accident, the first precaution to be observed is to turn off the ignition of all vehicles involved while other minor precautions include no lighting of matches or lighters and no smoking.

A list of "Hints For Motorists Arriving At Scene Of Accident" printed on a handy size card has been drawn up by the Red Cross Society and this contains all the principal "do's" and "don'ts" which should guide rescuers in these situations. Among the first of the "do's" is: Do remember the danger to yourself and to others from oncoming traffic especially at night. Park your car at a safe place and at a safe distance from the accident. The first of the "don'ts" is "Don't panic."

POOR, YES; BUT DIRTY, NO

The need for more hygiene and general cleanliness in our hotels and eating places was stressed by Mr Dick Barry, TD Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Health when he spoke at an official luncheon in Galway last Friday. Mr Barry said that here in Ireland we have had an uphill fight on the question of

hygiene and against the image projected in some countries abroad of the "dirty Irish".

Mr Barry holds that our forbears never merited such a term of opprobrium. Poor, yes, but dirty, no. However he went on to stress that present standards of cleanliness make it abundantly clear that we have no grounds for complacency. We still had the careless food manufacturer and retailer, the dirty kitchen and the toilets without soap or towels. With the fairly general prevalence of conditions such as these it is not surprising then that many of the complaints made by tourists are associated with lack of hygiene. Perhaps in this regard we can stand accused especially in regard to the lack of cleanliness where toilets are concerned. Our careless attitude to these matters of hygiene and cleanliness will have to be rectified if the country is to continue to benefit economically from the income from tourism estimated for this year to run to £130 million which must undoubtedly be reckoned as a very significant factor in these difficult times.

GOING AUTOMATIC

Information released by the Minister for Posts and Telegraphs in reply to a recent question asked in the Dail revealed that among the list of telephone exchanges of sub-post offices which were expected to be converted to the automatic system within the next three years were the following sub-offices in West Waterford:

Ballinacorney, Ballyduff, Ballymacarbray, Ballymacart, Cappagh, Cappoquin, Lismore, Ring and Tallow. ALLEGATIONS OF INTIMIDATION IN COUNCIL ENGINEERS' STRIKE

MINISTER FOR LABOUR ASKED TO INTERVENE

Allegations that Council overseers had been intimidated to get them to support the strike action at present being taken by Council Engineers were made by a member of Waterford County Council at a meeting of the Council held in Dungarvan last Monday.

At the outset of the meeting and at the suggestion of the Chairman, Mr C Curran, the members unanimously agreed to suspend standing orders to allow them to discuss the position arising from the strike action which 10 engineers employed by the Council had taken since the previous week.

Four members of the striking engineering staff were present at the meeting but they did not take part in the discussion.

Mr Curran stated that he had met members of the engineering staff prior to the meeting and they had informed him that they were only seeking their basic constitutional rights in wanting to have their union the Amalgamated Union of Engineering Workers (TASS), recognised under the National Conciliation and Arbitration Scheme. He said that they had told him that the Co Managers Association could give this recognition at once if they wished and they wanted to know whether the members were going to stand idly by and see the present situation continue. He added that the engineers claimed that the matter was not an inter-union dispute.

Mr Curran then said that they were all conscious of the very serious situation and the consequences which the strike would have. All Council services would come to a standstill throughout the county and the engineers had told him that they were going to go the full way to win a settlement of their claim.

MANAGER'S STATEMENT

Mr C O'Connor, Co Manager then made a statement outlining the position and added that basically the matter was concerned with an inter-union dispute between the AUEW (TASS) and the Local Government and Public Services Union each of which had a certain number of Local Authority Engineers members. He said that TASS sought recognition by the City and County Managers Association in 1972. The latter then consulted the Staff Panel as they were obliged to do and in March 1973 the Staff Panel stated that it was not prepared to give its consent for this recognition. He felt that they had been influenced by this by the decision of Congress (The Irish Congress of Trade Unions).

The Manager went on to say that both the unions concerned were affiliated to Congress and the Co Managers Association had not taken a final decision on the question of recognition as Congress was still deciding as to which union should represent the local authority engineers. He said that Congress was attempting to reach an amicable solution and he understood that the attitude of Congress was that all the machinery for conciliation had not been exhausted in the present case and consequently that TASS should not have resorted to industrial action.

The blunt fact of the matter is "said the Co Manager that if recognition is given to TASS as the engineers claim the Local Government Union will then resort to industrial action and that Congress may well support them in that action. He said that he could see an analogy between the position and the bus strike in Dublin in that whether they turned left or turned right it would result in industrial action.

The Manager concluded his statement by saying that a continuation of the engineers strike would affect the continuation of the public services in the county and he suggested that the Council might bring the matter to the notice of the Minister. A solution to the dispute would have to be reached he said but it was a complex situation which would not be solved by a "yes" or "no" from the Managers Association and would require some ad hoc machinery to be set up to deal with it.

Mr T A Kyne TD said that while he regretted that the local engineers had found it necessary to take this action it was their right to do so. However he pointed out that Congress felt that such action jeopardised any chances of solving the dispute and the only hope he now saw was the intervention of the Minister to try to reach some interim settlement. He thought there should be some way of bringing this about and he felt that if an offer to intervene was made TASS should accept it.

Senator A Deasy said that this strike had now lingered on for 14 months and he felt that Congress should have found a solution to it by now. A similar strike by the engineers had cost upwards of £1 million in Co Cork and he

asked "are we going to go through the same thing here in this county?" He added that the Council would have to make an effort to get the strike settled as soon as possible and they should press the Minister for Labour to immediately start a conference between the parties concerned. Otherwise said the Senator there will be no water schemes or amenity schemes or road repairs done and everyone in the county will be at a loss. He added that he would not be prepared to wait much longer for Congress to take action.

RUNNING THE COUNTRY

Mr K O'Ryan said that to him it seemed fair to say that the country was now being run by the Trade Unions. Prior to this strike action the engineers had a "go slow" policy which to him was nothing else but a strike but they were able to draw their salaries. At the moment he understood that they were drawing 96 per cent of the salaries which they normally drew.

He then went on to say that he wanted to object to people going around the county intimidating overseers from carrying out their duties in order to support this strike. He knew it was a dangerous time for a public representative to stand up and say things like this but he felt someone had to do it in the interests of the people who were suffering as a result of the strike. Mr O'Ryan asked who would pay the overseers and other workers if they came out in support of the engineers' strike. Would the engineers union pay them if the boot was on the other foot and it was the men who were on strike would the engineers pass their pickets? "I'm sure they would" he said.

Mr O'Ryan added that this matter would have to be settled once and for all and the settlement would have to include provision for the reinstatement of Mr Gerry Murphy as engineer for the Lismore area. He then proposed that the Council request the engineers to resume work pending negotiations.

Mr H R Dowd seconded and the resolution was passed.

On the proposal of Mr P Kenneally seconded by Mr P Coffey, the Council also passed a resolution calling on the Minister for Labour to intervene in the engineers strike as a matter of urgency and to set up ad hoc machinery to deal with the situation.

A further resolution proposed by Mr J Currie and seconded by Mr P Cahill calling on the Taoiseach to reconsider the matter of the reinstatement of Mr Gerry Murphy as a member of the Council's engineering staff was also carried by 14 votes to 5.

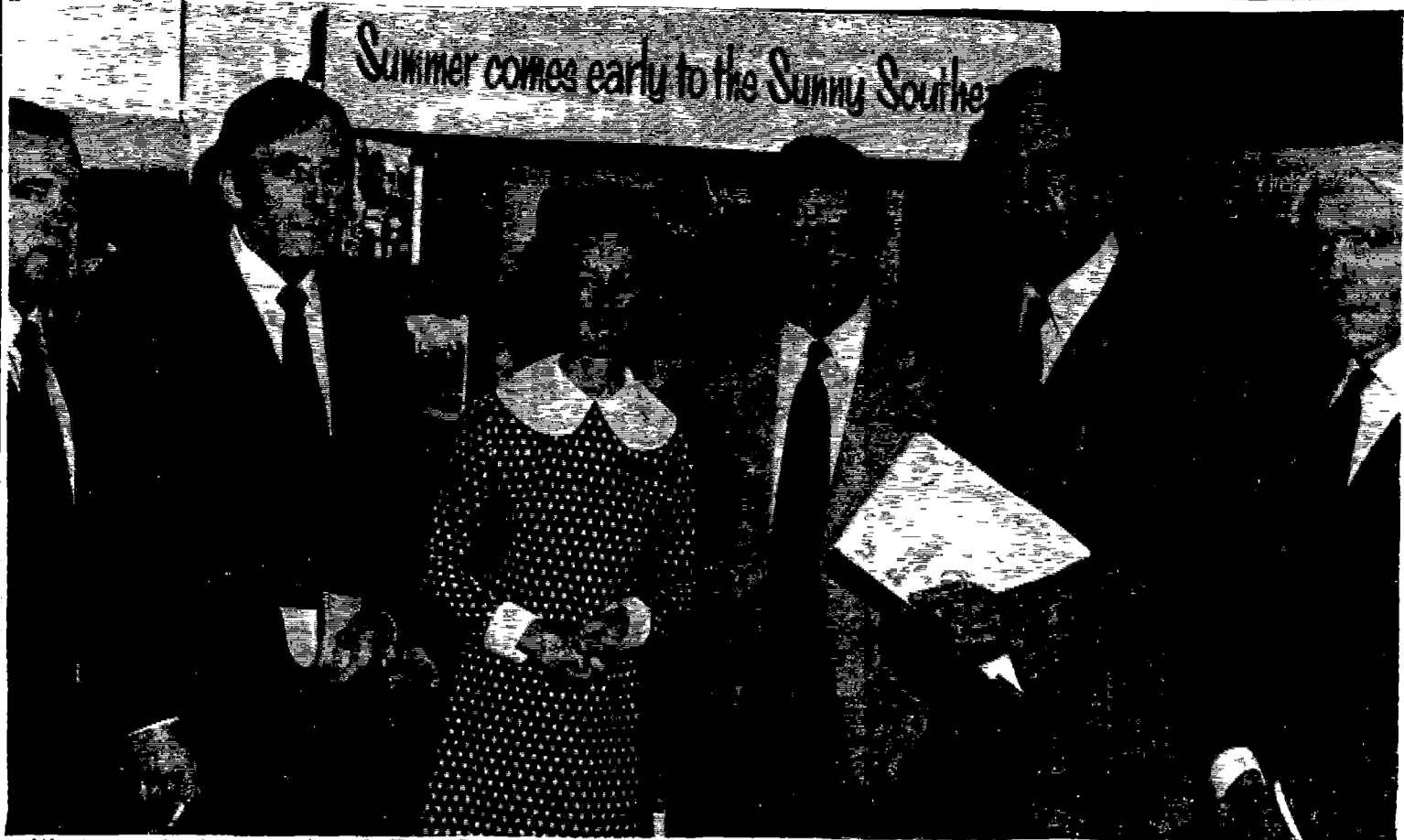

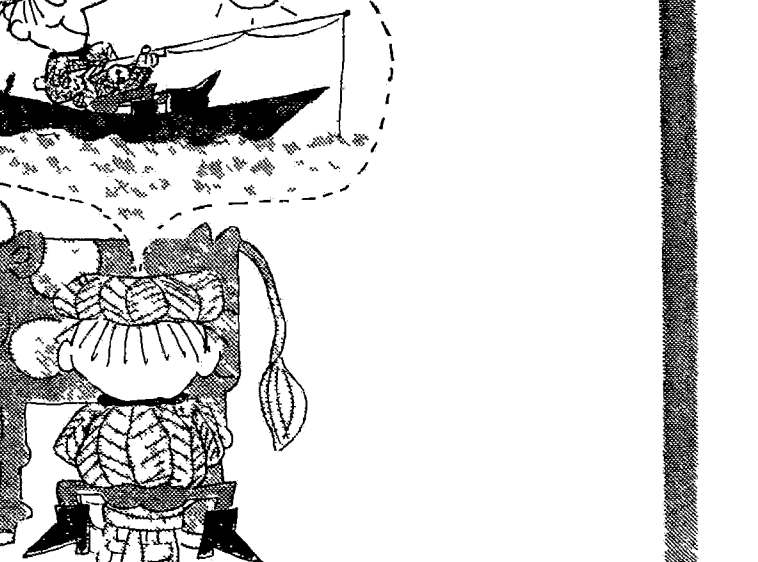
