PENSMAN TAKES YOU

Behind the SPOTLIGHT

STUNNED
 The country was stunned last Friday and most of us are still reeling under the impact of the toll of lives lost and bodies maimed and mangled in the car bombs which ripped through the heart of Dublin and the centre of Monaghan that evening. The toll is the greatest any single bombing incident has taken north or south of the border since the present troubles began. The bombs three in Dublin and one in Monaghan, went off without warning, hurtling 27 innocent people to eternity and leaving over 100 seriously injured. Two of the victims were young girls from County Waterford who lost their lives in the Dublin holocaust.

At a time like this words are but poor instruments to express sympathy with the bereaved or to offer comfort or consolation to those whose bodies were maimed and mangled in this terrible, dreadful happening. But voices must be raised and inhuman acts of violence of this nature, no matter where they occur, involving innocent people, old and young and even infant children, who are not in any way involved in the northern situation must be condemned as murderous, inhuman and utterly brutal. They are minimal and absolutely futile as measures to further any political ends and those concerned on all sides should realise this and once and for all end this slaughter of innocent, defenceless people.

ANNUAL COLLECTION FOR ST JOHN'S SPECIAL SCHOOL

Once again the year has gone full circle and on Sunday next the annual collection in aid of St John's Special School in Dungarvan will again be taken up. Collectors will attend at the gates of all the Churches throughout Mid and West Waterford and will be relying on the generosity of the public to make this as good a collection (if indeed not better) as was taken up this time last year.

After a great deal of disappointment and not a little frustration the hard-working committee of St John's have at last seen the realisation of their efforts by the recent commencement of the building of the new school. The final planning and preparation for which has occupied the last couple of years.

As a result the Chairman of St John's Association Mr. Norman Walsh, had good news for the delegates from the many branches throughout the region at the annual general meeting of the Association held last week when he informed them that the building work at the new school was now proceeding and that the contractor had assured him that the school would be ready for occupation within twelve months. No less pleased I feel sure, with this news will be the parents of the child on who are attending the school in its present temporary quarters and indeed the teaching staff who despite the difficulties they have to cope with continue to do wonderful work for their pupils.

Because of the huge increases in building costs, there has been a big jump in the cost of erecting the school and some anxiety this will put an added strain on the finances of the Association because there will be a pro rata increase in the local contribution which they will have to make to the overall cost. However, once the school is completed, the Association will find itself in a position to extend the school which it is at present doing for the handicapped children as the lack of accommodation which is now a major problem will be solved. The establishment seven years ago of the Association is due to the generosity of the people of Mid and West Waterford who have subscribed almost totally the

Two Waterford girls among Dublin car bomb victims

Two County Waterford girls were among the victims of the terrible car bombings which took place in Dublin last Friday evening and both died instantly when the bombs exploded. Marie Butler (21) from Belleville Cappoquin was walking along Parnell Street at about 5.30 p.m. and had just passed the car containing the bomb which was parked there when it went off. She was a member of the staff of Clergy & Co Ltd but because of a strike there she was not working and is stated to have been on her way to collect her strike pay when she was caught in the fatal blast.

Educated at St Anne's Cappoquin Marie was a most popular young girl in the town and her tragic death is mourned by all. She was a vivacious and happy dispositioned young lady and was loved by all who knew her. Before going to Dublin about a year ago she had spent some time in Holland as an au pair. In Dublin she shared a flat with three girl friends and when she failed to return home by 11.30 p.m. on Friday night the girls got worried and became suspicious. They at once started making inquiries at the hospitals where those injured by the bombs had been taken but when these proved fruitless they went to Store Street Police Station and from a description which they gave a Garda Inspector said that she was one of the victims who had been killed. Positive identification followed later.

Store Street contacted the Cappoquin Garda Barracks the following morning and word of the dreadful tragedy was then conveyed to the bereaved parents and other members of the family in Belleville by Sgt T. O'Donnell. The remains were removed on Monday to Afane Church and the interment took place on Tuesday after the celebration of Requiem Mass by Very Rev Canon Hally P.P. Very Rev M. Kelleher P.P. Aglish Rev M. Curran C.C. Modelgo Rev P. Fitzgerald C.C. Aglish and Rev J. McGrath C.C. Cappoquin officiated at the obsequies. There were huge crowds present on both occasions to show their sorrow at the terrible death of such a popular young girl and to express sympathy to her bereaved parents, sisters, uncles, aunts and other relatives.

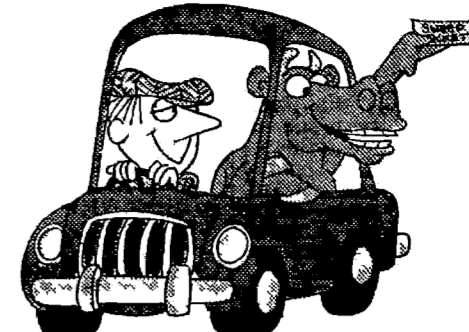

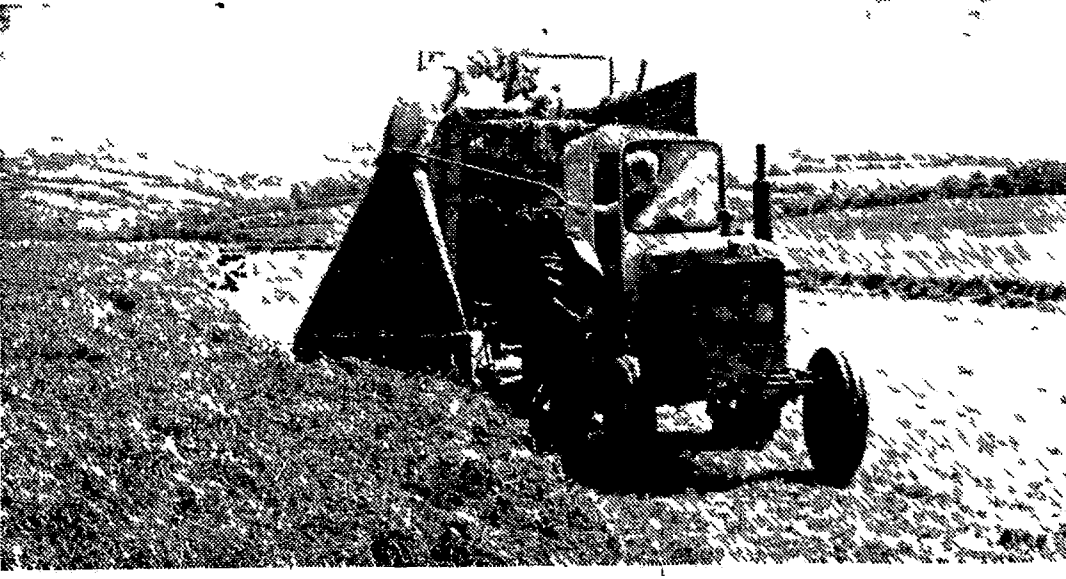

COUNCILLOR CALLS FOR DEVELOPMENT PLAN FOR CLONEA STRAND

At a meeting of Waterford County Council held in Dungarvan last week Mr. Foley moved a motion asking Bord Failte to carry out a survey of Clonea Strand and its environs with a view to having it developed as a recognised seaside resort whereby grants could be channelled into its promotion

Mr Foley said that Clonea Strand was to Waterford a great deal of capital had been used for the development of Tramore. He said but they would have to be equitable and for that reason he thought that there should be a similar development plan for Clonea. As he understood that the grant for the proposed sports complex for Dungarvan was likely to gather dust it was all the more reason why Clonea should be developed

Mr T. Kyne TD said that it was not correct to say that the grant for Dungarvan would gather dust. Senator A. Deasy supported Mr Foley's motion and said that each of their resorts could be developed in its own way. Bonmahon was crying out for money he said and there was a great deal of land around Clonea which might be developed while Ardmore also had great potential

C. Curran Chairman said that it had been stated at a meeting of the directors of Tramore Failte that direct contact would be established between Tramore and Ardmore. Mr Kyne said that Tramore Failte was not set up to be a profit making concern and the promise had been made at the outset that as soon as it began to make money some of the proceeds of it making a profit would be spent on other resorts in the county. He thought that such a position would arise within the next five years and that as far as Ardmore and such other resorts in the county were concerned it would be more beneficial for them to be linked with Tramore Failte than to deal with the entire country

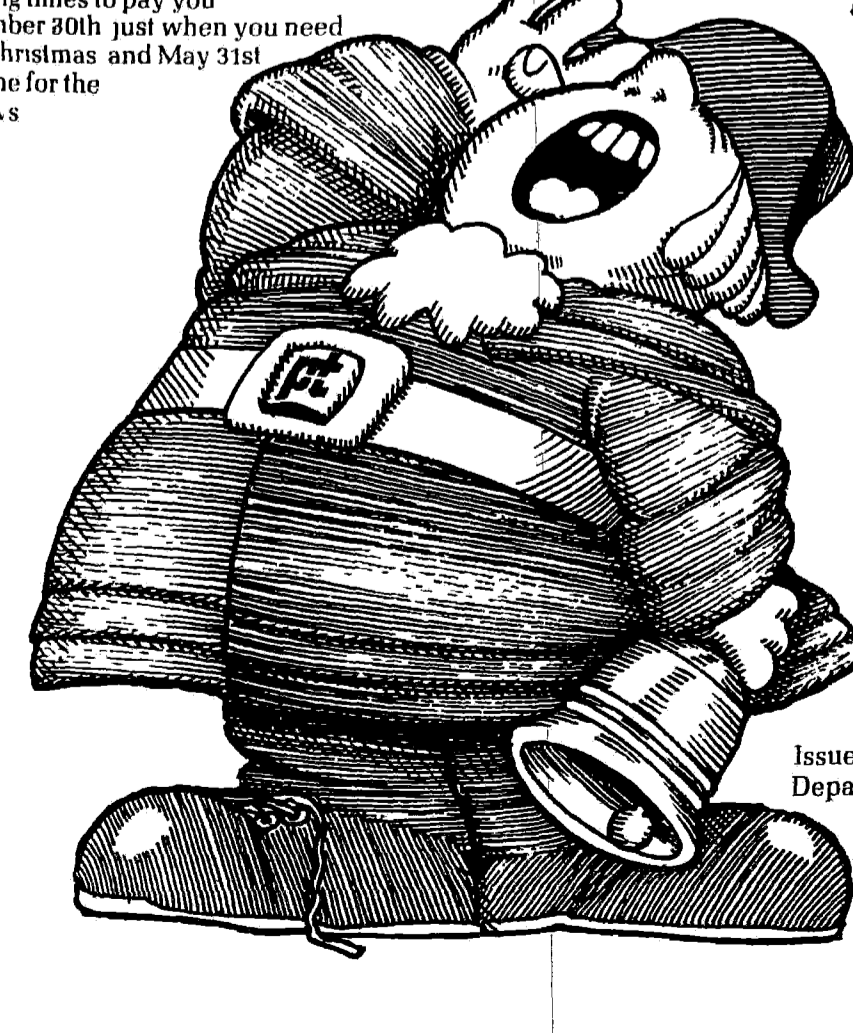
