Behind the SPOTLIGHT

LOCAL ELECTIONS

The scene is now set for the local elections of June 18 which will decide who the members of the Co Council and of Dungarvan Urban Council will be for the next five years. Since nominations closed at 12 (noon) last Thursday the total number of declared candidates have entered the elections in earnest. For the Co Council a record number of 53 candidates will contest the 23 seats available in the four electoral areas into which the county is divided - Lismore, Dungarvan, Kilmacthomas and Tramore.

The total electorate for the county at present is 32,071 and this is divided as follows: Lismore 9,328 will elect 4 members or one less than the last occasion due to the fact that the electorate in this area has dropped below the required level to elect 5 in the Dungarvan area where 7 members will be elected the electorate numbers 9,327 while in the Kilmacthomas area an electorate of 7,051 will elect 5 members. The remaining area of Tramore will on this occasion elect 7 members (one more than the last occasion) because the electorate there has risen to 10,365.

An electorate of 4,014 will be involved in the election of nine members to Dungarvan Urban Council for which there is a total of 19 candidates standing.

There will be no election for Lismore Town Commissioners as following the close of nominations, the Returning Officer Mr. Moss Pollard, declared that as the number of candidates nominated was equal to the number of members to be elected no poll would be necessary.

I think that this result will be welcomed in Lismore as it was being hopefully suggested in the weeks prior to nominations that a contest should not take place as it could only have a divisive result among the local community. This wishful thinking has now happily become a reality.

NEW GAELTACHT CO-OP

While cynics may take with a grain of salt the announcement by the Minister for the Gaeltacht Mr. Tom O'Donnell that the government have decided to declare the entire parish of Ring and Old Parish as an official Gaeltacht area few will find fault with his assurances that his Department will afford generous financial assistance to help the new Parish Co-operative recently established there to get off the ground.

Ring has been recognised for several years as one of the country's smallest Irish speaking areas and whether this new plan will give it a new lease of life remains to be seen. The Minister told a well attended public meeting held in Ring last Thursday that he was satisfied from his own personal study of the area and from the representations he had received from community leaders in the county that the Gaeltacht was by declaring the area as one of the Gaeltacht units. The government had now agreed to this and he expressed the hope that the people of the parish would be able to combine together as a community from now on and that the increasing number of official recognition will see a revival of the language there is another matter that only time will tell. During the past 20 or 40 years the language which Irish has spoken has dropped considerably. The number of people who speak the language has dropped from 100,000 to 20,000. Unfortunately these are the sad statistics and whether it is too late to mount any kind

of rescue effort remains to be seen. There are those who still remain hopeful and although I have grave doubts I still prefer to align myself on their side.

The presence of the well-known pioneer of the Gaeltacht Co-operative Movement, Rev Fr J McDyer of Glencolumbkille, Co Donegal at last Thursday night's meeting should prove an inspiration for the people of Ring and Old Parish who are about to embark on this new venture. Here was a man who travelled the entire length of Ireland to give them moral courage by his presence. Surely a very fine example of what co-operative effort should be like. No less praiseworthy was the presence of the representatives of Comharthumann (Corca Dhuibhne) who travelled all the way over from Dingle to impart advice on their experience of the co-op movement. They started off in 1968 with a financial turnover of £4,000. In 1973, five years later the throughput of their co-op was £100,000.

The representatives of Gaeltarra Eireann who were also present at the meeting promised full support for the new Co-op but despite all these promises and assurances of special grants and other financial aids the entire venture will remain so much in the sky if the local people do not come together to support the co-op and make it work. The co-op, I believe, will be based primarily on agriculture (land drainage and fertilising) fishing and tourism but its success will depend solely on the local people concerned and the manner in which they respond to the leadership being given and how they stand together and co-operate in the years ahead.

KEEP DUNGARVAN TIDY

Whether by mere coincidence or not it was unfortunate that the Junior Chamber, Dungarvan should have adopted the slogan "Keep Dungarvan Tidy" as the main theme for their Community Week effort which took place last week.

Never has the town been so litter strewn as it was during the week and on Thursday especially the Square and the principal streets were in a desperately bad state.

This, needless to say was not the fault of Junior Chamber. They had put on a big publicity drive and had placed litter bins around the town and an effort to clean it up but apparently to very little avail. The necessary co-operation of the townspeople and those who come in from outside was not forthcoming and the finger of blame must, therefore, be pointed only at them.

Incidentally a number of Abbeyside's leading residents were up in arms because the Junior Chamber ignored the village in their campaign during the week. However one put forward the consoling thought that while Abbeyside was always seeking its independence from Dungarvan it never received it until now!

DUNGARVAN'S NEW SEWERAGE SCHEME

Council Approves Extra Loan For Higher Costs

The main causes for the huge increase of £13,000 in the overall cost of Dungarvan's new sewerage scheme were increases in wages and materials and additional works which had to be carried out by the contractors. It was stated in a report submitted by the Town Clerk to the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council held last Monday night. It will be recalled that when the information about the increase was released at the April monthly meeting several members expressed shock and a demand which was not pressed was made for a public sworn inquiry into the entire matter.

In the course of his report to last Monday night's meeting, the Town Clerk, Mr R J Keane, referred to a report which had been received from the Consulting Engineers for the scheme, Messrs F G Pettit & Co Cork and which set out in detail under various headings the principal items making up the estimated increases on the scheme. The increase was £4,236 made up as follows: Wages and materials £14,103 (26%); Extras, variations and contingencies £33,786 (62%); VAT (recoupable) £6,337 (12%).

The Town Clerk's report went on to state that other costs to be covered by loan finance amount to a total estimated sum of £19,000 made up as follows: Contribution to the cost of the pumping station at Clonea Road, £4,020; road restoration by Waterford Co Council at Fr Two-mey's Road, £5,381; Overheads—fees salaries and other costs £9,599. This brings the total estimated extra cost of the schemes to over £73,000.

The report then states "The above figure includes an amount for VAT the sum of approximately £7,500. While VAT on these contracts must be paid by the Council it is recoupable from the Revenue Commissioners. A capital contribution of £10,000 was made by the Creamery towards the cost of the sewerage works. The report concluded by stating that the scheme allowed for the recoupable VAT and the Creamery contribution the supplementary loan finance required was £55,500.

COLOSSAL INCREASE
Mr P Whelan said that the cost of stage II of the scheme which took in the Stuisheen had jumped from £56,000 to £95,000. This was a colossal

Mr D Goode referred to charges for timber left in unstable trenches in one case £1,780 and in another £2,060 and he asked if it was mahogany that was used. He thought that a great deal of these amounts could be purchased for these amounts.

Mr O'Connell replied that the excavations in some of the trenches were 20 feet deep in some cases and to avoid collapses it had been decided not to remove the timber used for shoring. He said that the contractors had met with tremendous difficulties especially in Fr Two-mey Road and also at the Clonea Road.

Senator Deasy stating that he was satisfied with the explanation given by Mr O'Connell proposed that the Council approve the raising of the extra loan to meet the additional cost and this was seconded by Mr D Goode.

Mr T Wade said that while he thought work on the scheme should not be held up he was of the opinion that the extra costs were excessive and he proposed that the total be reduced by £10,000.

This was seconded by Mr N Hackett.

On a vote Senator Deasy's proposal was carried by 5 votes (Messrs Deasy Walsh Goode Kyne and Kelly) to 3 (Messrs Wade Hackett and Whelan).

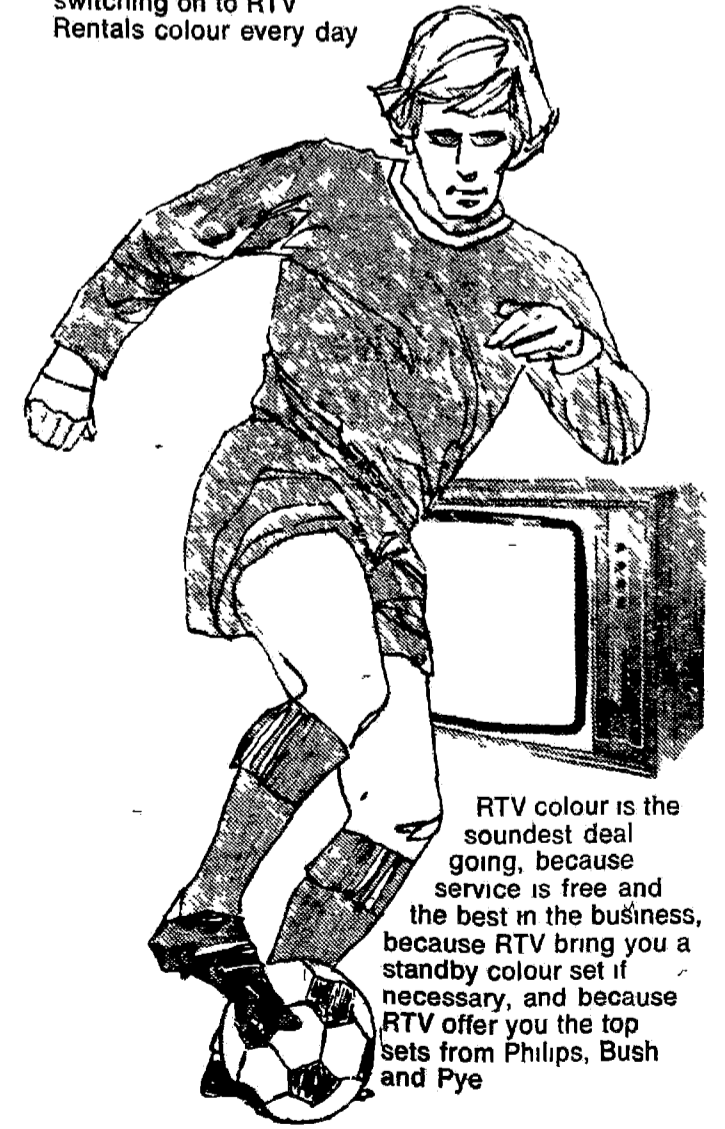

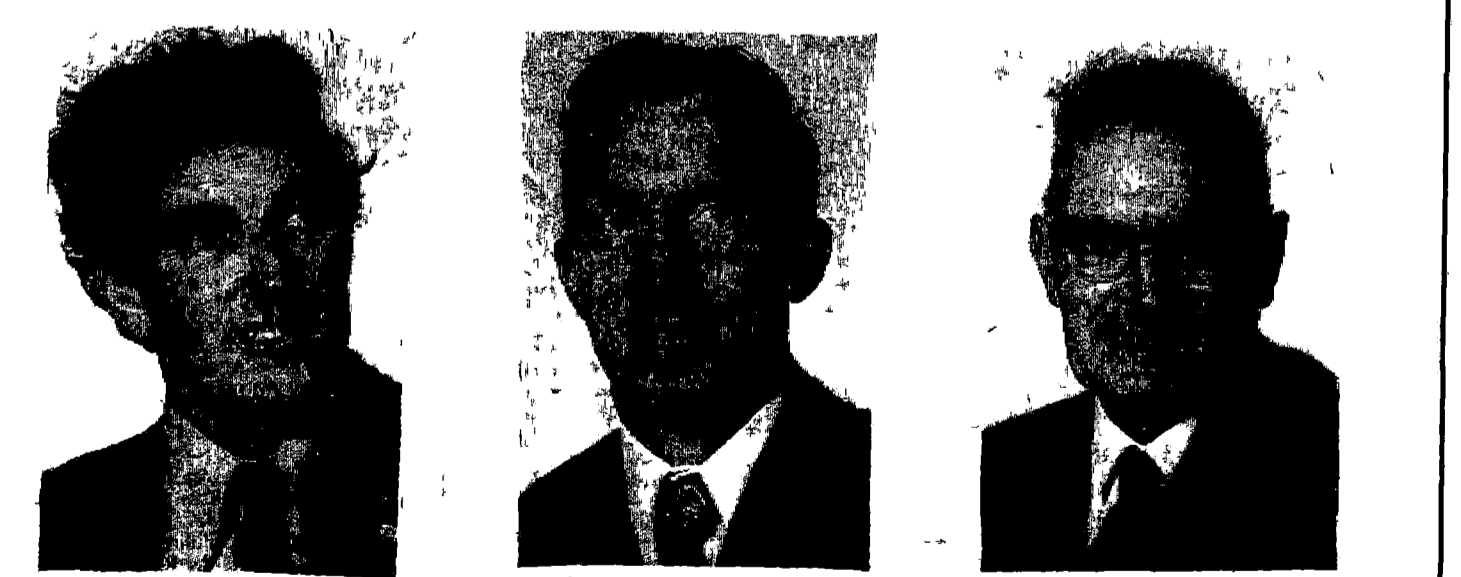
