As a nation we have never produced adequate winter feed Our cattle numbers have been expanding in recent years but

in livestock numbers next winter and because much of our hay and silage crops are backward the situation is likely to be serious next winter unless proper action is taken now

still time to remedy the posi-

tion by further increasing winter feed production HAY/SILAGE

1—Most pasture land is un-derstocked during the summer months For June July and the first half of August cattle can be confined on a smaller area and the fields thus released can be fertilized and cut for hay or

2—Meadows and silage fields cut before mid June and properly fertilized will provide second crop in early August 3—Fields closed in early August can be cut for silage in mid-late September These three approaches must be exploited to provide the bulk

CATCH CROPS On suitable land, catch crops like kale, rape, fodder turnips and rve can also contribute greatly to winter feed supply 1—Kale sown in July fed with a little hav can support 5 to 6 cows per acre for three

2—Rape sown early August can provide sufficient feed to finish 20 lambs per acre in six months 3-Fodder turnips sown at the same time can provide suffi-cient to finish 30 lambs per acre in six weeks
4—Rye sown August-September can provide two grazings in

early Spring or one grazing and early silage 5—Italian ryegrass sown after barley in early September will also provide early grazing STRAW
