## PENSMAN TAKES YOU

### Behind the SPOTLIGHT

#### NO GRANTS FOR DUNGARVAN HARBOUR

Whatever may have been said or written in the past about the future of Dungarvan as a port the fact of the matter is that no financial help for any improvement works to the harbour will be forthcoming from the government. This was made clear by the Minister for Transport and Power, Mr Peter Barry, when in a recent Dail statement he said that his department had no plans for the repair and improvement of the harbour and that responsibility for its upkeep was a matter for the local Urban Council.

Mr Barry said that no special funds were available for this type of work and that government policy in general where harbour improvements were concerned was that these should be undertaken locally and be paid out of the fees received by the local authority for the use of the harbour.

Pressed on the problem which a possible collapse of the quay wall could create and the danger to the roadway which runs along the quay Mr Barry said that the responsibility for this roadway also rested on the Urban Council and they should either through the rates or through the County Council or by application to the Department of Local Government obtain funds for this work.

Certainly, despite all the talk and promises, the Minister's statement does not hold out much hope for the future of the harbour nor indeed for the quay wall either which appears to be in imminent danger of collapsing at several points.

#### A PLAGUE OF FLIES

On many occasions in recent weeks I have heard stories about swarms of flies from various districts in Dungarvan and Abbeyside. Where the flies come from I do not know but I have seen literally hundreds of them in one premises.

Flies are recognised as one of the greatest agents for spreading infection and whether they are responsible for propagating the mystery bug which has "downed" many adults and sent several young children off to Cork hospitals for treatment in recent times I do not know either.

I do know however that one of the hospitals where some of these children have been treated believe that there must be some reason for the infection in the area whether it be contaminated water or other such liquid perhaps helped by the agency of these flies.

#### LIAM HOURICAN FOR DUNGARVAN CONFERENCE

The Social Study Conference held in Dungarvan for the first time last year will return for its 22nd annual session to the same venue—St Augustine's College—again this year Hugh Kennedy, the Conference Press Officer tells me that this decision resulted from the very favourable impression made on the visitors who attended the conference last year. The dates for this year's gathering officially known as a Summer School will be August 3 to 10 and the theme will be "Sectarianism—Roads To Reconciliation".

The opening lecture of the Conference on Saturday night, August 3 will be delivered by Liam Hourican RTE's Northern Correspondent. Liam is one of the best known and one of the most intelligent broadcasters in Ireland to-day who has a tremendous talent for pinning interviewees to the point, for detail in explaining protracted negotiations and for nicely balancing strict neutrality with moral involvement.

The lecture he is to give on "Myth, Prejudice and Stereotypes" will be on these elements in the Northern conflict and should be quite exciting and prove a very strong opening for the conference.

For those who may not know much about his background Liam Hourican has many different interests and his commitments go beyond broadcasting. Those who know him well say they would not be surprised if he were to become a Minister in some future Coalition Government. He was subjected to some pressure to run for Fine Gael before the last general election but he decided to go North instead because he thought it was in a situation which required an on-going commitment as a broadcaster. He can be sure that he will be given a most warm reception when he comes south to Dungarvan in August.

Incidentally before departing from this subject of the Social Study Conference, Hugh Kennedy says that there will be the usual attendance of about 150 at the conference. Some will be accommodated at the College but many will stay at guest-houses in the locality. However he says "some of my friends complained that they could not get family accommodation in the town, this August." #### PADDY CURRAN'S FIGHTING MEN

The recent death of Eddie Curran Windgap, Dungarvan, recalls many of the incidents of the Anglo-Irish war and subsequent Civil War but especially the episode of the rescue of Bill Lennon from the Dungarvan hospital.

I am indebted to a reader from Ring for the ballad which tells this story and which will be our choice for the ballad corner this week. Lennon was wounded and captured during the Civil war and was undergoing medical treatment at Dungarvan until well again. He was under sentence of death at the time and was to be executed later.

His rescue effected the night before he was due to be removed from the hospital was planned and executed by a group led by Paddy Curran (Eddie's brother) and which also consisted of Mick Ryan, Ross Paddy Wylie Waterford (and later of Dungarvan) Tom

# Great double victory for Senator Deasy

## RESULTS FROM COUNTY AND URBAN ELECTIONS

Following the close of the polls at 9 p.m. on Tuesday evening the ballot boxes from the various booths throughout the county and Dungarvan Urban areas were brought to Dungarvan where the counts commenced at 9 a.m. on Wednesday morning.

Compared with the national average of 55 p.c. the average percentage poll in the urban and the two county electoral areas counted on Wednesday showed a turn out of 70 p.c. plus of the electorate.

The results of the first counts showed a great double victory for the Dungarvan Secondary Teacher Senator Austin Deasy who headed the polls in both the Dungarvan Urban and County Council (Dungarvan Area) elections with totals which put him far ahead of any of his nearest rivals.

The first result came in the County Council (Kilmacthomas Area) count where the Returning Officer, Mr B. J. McNally Co. Secretary who was assisted by the Co. Accountant Mr J. Higgins declared the first preference count at about 12.30. The first count of the Urban was not announced until after 1 p.m.

Mr R. J. Keane Town Clerk was the Returning Officer for the Urban election.

In the County Council elections the counts for the Dungarvan and Kilmacthomas areas proceeded simultaneously on Wednesday and the counts for the Lismore and Tralee areas are taking place simultaneously to-day (Thursday).

#### THREE ELECTED IN FIRST COUNT

The first count in the Urban election, completed shortly after 1 p.m., saw the election of three outgoing members. Senator Austin Deasy headed the poll with 612 votes away ahead of his nearest rivals Mr J. Keane T.D. outgoing chairman of the Council who was on 293 and Mr D. Goode another outgoing member on 283.

Of the two lady candidates, Mrs R. O'Brien proved strongest with 138 first preference votes.

**OUR SMALLS BRING BIG RESULTS**

Following a marathon 15 hour count, with breaks of one hour each for lunch and tea, the count for the Dungarvan Urban election proceeded until 12 o'clock (midnight) last night (Wednesday) when the Returning Officer, Mr R J Keane, Town Clerk, declared the last two members elected to the nine member Council. The result meant a Fianna Fail gain from Labour but no sooner had he made this announcement than Mr Tom Kyne TD, leader of the Labour Party demanded a full recount on behalf of the Labour candidates. The Returning Officer agreed to the request and announced that the recount would commence at 10 o'clock this (Thursday) morning.

While the decision was something of a sensation it was not altogether unexpected as the hour with but a single vote separating several candidates at various stages. The recount seemed to have come in the Labour Party candidates Mr Paddy Power standing at 179 votes at the time, just below the next candidate, Michael Organ found himself eliminated.

Following the election of the three candidates in the first

count (see page 1) the count proceeded with the following candidates being eliminated: Kelly (4th), O'Donnell (5th), Coleman (6th), O'Connor (7th), Creedon (8th), Walshe (9th), Foley (10th), Hackett (11th) and Power (13th).

**CLIFF HANGER**

Other candidates declared elected were W O'Keefe in 8th count, R Walsh in 11th, Wade in 14th and P Whelan in 15th. As the cliff-hanging election moved towards its climax the tenor mounted as small surpluses and transfers were dealt with and in the end (16th count) three candidates were still standing for the remaining 208, Mrs Rita O'Brien at 205 and Mr Michael Organ at 204. A surplus of two transferable votes from the surplus of Mr Whelan had to be distributed to Mrs O'Brien to put her on level terms with Mr Murphy. The Returning Officer then eliminated Organ and declared Mr Murphy and Mrs O'Brien both elected to the last 2 seats. This meant that Fianna Fail had gained a seat at the expense of Labour (the seat held on the last Council by Mr Hackett). The crowded Town Hall then heard Mr Kyne's dramatic request for a recount and this was fixed for this morning.

Incidentally Mrs O'Brien's election marks an historic occasion as it is the first time ever that a lady member was elected to the Council.

Asked by a 'Leader' reporter after the decision to have a recount Mr Kyne said that in view of the circumstances he had no option but to demand a recount.

The Town Hall, where the count is taking place, was placed under guard by members of the Garda throughout the night as was also the Priory Hall across the street where the County Council count continues to-day.
