THE LOCAL ELECTIONS

The election of members to the local councils for the next five years is over and the excitement which at times, reached fever pitch during the counting sessions which took place in Dungarvan last week, has once more simmered down and the dust is once again beginning to settle on the ballot boxes.

As usual the vox populi proved to be somewhat unpredictable but now that the results for both the County and Urban Councils are a matter of record it is easy to read the story.

As far as the County is concerned the Fianna Fail party remains supreme, holding on to their 12 seats on the 23 member Council to give them a comfortable majority. Gaining a total of almost 52% of all the votes cast they have maintained the support of most of the electorate within the county. By comparison the Fine Gael-Labour combination polled approximately 40% of the votes and with the advent of two Independents to the Council has dropped its representation from 11 to 9. For Sinn Fein (Gardiner Place) the election brought no comforting news and the results showed that the party or its policies has little or no support throughout the county or in the urban area.

The Dungarvan Urban election also saw the Fianna Fail party gain a seat and the final result here shows that there

will be a 4-4 line-up (4 FF and 4 Coalition) with Mr Paddy Whelan, now the sole independent member also remaining the only uncommitted one. Following the midnight demand for a recount after a cliff-hanger finish in this election, the Returning Officer announced the following day that the original result stood as only one or two minor errors which made no difference were found.

The next excitement now will be caused by the first meetings of each Council to elect a chairman and representatives to other bodies. In all probability there will be an "as you were" situation on the County Council but the Urban Council could prove a different kettle of fish. Despite rumours of deals being made by one or other of the major groups on the Urban Council, I have been reliably informed that Mr Whelan has not made any commitment to either. His attitude, I understand, is that the Chair should rotate, with a different member occupying it each year during the 5 year life-span of the Council. While his support in this respect would go to the Labour and Fianna Fail Parties it would not, I am almost certain extend to the Fine Gael group. However we can only wait and see what the outcome will be. The new members of the Urban will meet to elect a Chairman to-morrow (Friday) night. What might be considered a coincidence is that in the

case of each Council, roughly one-third of the members returned are new Councillors — 8 out of 23 on the County and 3 (including 1 lady) out of 9 in the Urban. Political observers also saw peculiar significances during the counts in the facts that candidate Noel Hackett who made much play of the number seven in his pre-election publicity went out and had his votes transferred in the 7th count in the county, that candidate Nicholas Kelly, after serving 33 years as a member of the Urban Council, made his exit from public life having polled a similar number of first preferences and that Clir Paddy Cahill of Kilmeeaden who has been the stormy petrel at meetings of the County Council in recent years was re-elected after having headed the poll in the Tramore area with a poll of 999—the number to call in any emergency!

Court sequel to Dungarvan horse fair row

A row in which three friends became involved with each other on the day of the Dungarvan Horse Fair on May 17 had a sequel at Dungarvan Court last Wednesday when Declan Quealy, Barracrée, Ballymacarby was summoned for assaulting John Hickey, Kilmeeaden and Anthony Harrington, also of Barracrée was charged with being drunk and disorderly.

John Hickey in evidence told the court in reply to questions by Supt M English who prosecuted that he was in Dungarvan on the day of the horse fair. At about 5 o'clock he said he was in a pub at the Square and got involved in an argument and Quealy came and took him away. He admitted that he was fairly drunk at the time and he then had words with Quealy and invited him down the quay to settle the matter. He then got a few belts in the mouth from Quealy and Harrington came along and went between them.

In reply to Mr E P King Solt who appeared for both defendants witness agreed that what happened to him was his own fault as he said when they got to the quay he tried to hit Quealy.

Sgt M Hayes gave evidence that he went to the quay on the evening of the horse fair. It had been a very wet day and he saw Hickey sitting on the wet street and his face was covered with blood. Quealy and Harrington were also there and Hickey told him that he had been assaulted by Quealy. The Sergeant then added that Harrington became argumentative and was difficult to handle as he was drunk. They had to take the defendants easy as otherwise the matter could have developed into a serious situation. They took all three to the Garda station and there Quealy admitted striking Hickey. He agreed that there were no previous

convictions against the defendants. District Justice Carroll said that as far as the assault charge against Quealy was concerned he would apply the P.O.A. in view of the defendant's previous good character. Anthony Harrington then gave evidence and denied that he was drunk on the occasion. He said that he had come to town that day at 12 o'clock and had drunk about 5 pint bottles of ale up to 5 o'clock. When the Guards came along he was sober and denied being difficult beyond refusing to make a statement. Declan Quealy in evidence said that Harrington had come between Hickey and himself. He said that Harrington was sober at the time. In reply to Supt English witness said that he only struck Hickey in self-defence. The District Justice then said that he would give Harrington the benefit of the doubt and dismiss the charge against him.

WATERFORD VICTORY POSSIBLE

MAMMOTH EFFORT NEEDED

(By Commentator)

WATERFORD v LIMERICK On Sunday next it is expected that one of the biggest crowds ever to leave the Daise will head for Semple Stadium Thurles to see Waterford do battle with the All-Ireland champions Limerick. In a meeting that has aroused interest among hurling people in almost every corner of the land some of the best known hurling scribes have even gone so far as to say that the game will prove to be the All-Ireland champions of 1974. Of course if you were to judge the respective merits of the sides on the standard of hurling that the National League match between the same sides produced on that awful day last November, the game might justifiably be referred to as Waterford's annual outburst. Since then however a big change has come about to put a much different light on matters. In the National League final over at the May Lane, Limerick showed their first signs of inconsistency when they finished eighteen points behind Cork (6-15 to 1-12) at Limerick Gaelic Grounds and then to rub salt into the Limerick wounds as it were Waterford defeated the league champions Cork (4-9 to 3-8) in a thrilling first round match at Walsh Park just two weeks later. This was a game that saw Waterford at their brilliant best a game that proved that our form against Galway, Wexford and Kilkenny in the National League was no fluke in the pan. Waterford hurlers have now completed a training session that has been as thorough as any session ever undertaken by a hurling team in the past and when the boys finished up on Tuesday night last every player was reported to be in the peak of fitness. The selectors have given a vote of confidence to the side which defeated Cork and the only change on the team is necessitated by the forced absence of mid-fielder Andy Heffernan, who has become injured and is replaced at centre-field by Mossie Whelan who is reckoned to be the ideal partner for John Galvin in that area. Stephen Greene, Michael Michael and Michael Power, Butlerstown, have been dropped from the substitutes and they are replaced by Ballyduff's Mossie Walsh currently in brilliant form with his club and likely to be drafted into the team in attack at some stage and young Liam O'Brien of Tallow who is one of the youngest players ever to win the confidence of the selectors. In goal for Waterford will be gunner's Pat Flynn, an improving player of every game and now has sufficient experience to condition him for the big stuff in front of him. Martin Kirwan, Pat Coakley and Sean Hannon if reproducing their brilliant form of the game against Cork, will make scoring very difficult for Limerick's Ned Reilly, McKenna and Nolan. Paul Kelly who was the surprise choice for the right-half back position against Cork Jimmy Greene and man of the match against Cork, Pat McGrath face a mighty task in trying to water down the attack. Richie Bennis and L. O'Donoghue, but if performing again as they did against Cork they could survive the hour with their reputations enhanced. Limerick have changed left-half back Foley to centrefield in place of Fr Fitzmaurice, relegated to the subs and he will partner the flying Eamon Sheehy in the new formation. Because it is so simple it is taking God at His word that anything you ask the Father in My Name He will give it to you 'Anything means everything, which means what we want, namely peace in our country This kind of thinking (or believing) is too simple for many people to-day The reason some people have not yet taken the Pledge is because they are scrupulous, afraid they might miss a day This is very sad Because we desperately need the constant prayer of such good people Please remember that all that anyone who takes the Pledge is doing is sincerely and 'er forewardly to ensure an her best, nothing more The basic reason (apart from sheer laziness) why most people have not yet taken the pledge is that their attitude towards the trouble in the North is the same as was their attitude towards the horrors in Korea or Vietnam It is the attitude of decent people which explains their genuine distress at the suffering blood shed and destruction) decent people who are not personally involved (which explains their ability to go on sitting and talking while the hideous growth on the face of fair Kathleen continues to spew out corruption and blood and looks as if it could go on doing so forever Long ago a man you probably never heard of (one St. Dorothaeus) said something which is very, very relevant to the Irish context today The reason for that is that no one blames himself Night after night the Irish out-talk out-manoeuvre, out-smart and out-wit every public figure whose daily exploits appear on television but there is never anything to indicate that the viewers feel that they themselves are personally implicated in that they themselves to some extent personally share the blame for the sinfulness that has broken out on Ireland in the form of that cancerous growth Because it is a growth that remembers something that has come from the whole body, and not some kind of disfigurement that just happened to stick on from without If we the Irish faced up to the fact that we share the blame then we might become less self-righteous, and we might become

more humble, and more willing to kneel down to ask God to bring us together in peace And that's all the Pledge is No more and no less So here it is again, in both its forms, to enable anyone of whatever religious persuasion to join if you wish to spend the ten extra minutes in your own kind of prayer for peace this is the formula for you (A) Prayer-for-Peace I pledge myself (1) each day (2) on my knees (unless legitimately excused) (3) to devote an extra 10 minutes to prayer, (4) for peace in Ireland Amen And if your choice is the Rosary Rosary-for-Peace I pledge myself (1) each day, (2) on my knees (unless legitimately excused) (3) to say an extra Rosary-for-Peace (4) after each decade of which I will say, Mary, Queen of Peace pray for us St. Michael the Archangel, pray for us St. Patrick, pray for us Amen Have your choice, and send me your name, with 'Prayer-for-Peace or Rosary-for-Peace to show which formula you have chosen I will not refer to your letters (because I am only one man who has his own work to do, and because it is quite unnecessary to complicate what is basically a very simple matter) But I will read your letters, carefully even though they will now please God, begin to arrive in their thousands since 23 May over 1400 people have already pledged themselves Thank you (FR) PATRICK KELLY St. Patrick's, Kiltegan, Co Wicklow June 20 1974 P.S.—by the way, we take the Pledge until the end of the year If necessary we may renew it say until Easter, and so on

To the Editor 'Dungarvan Leader' The I.A.W.S.

Sir—Many people do not know the meaning of the letters I.A.W.S. and are apt to confuse them with the letters I.A.O.S. The former stands for the I.R.I.S.H. AGRICULTURAL WHOLESALE SOCIETY and the latter for the I.R.I.S.H. AGRICULTURAL ORGANISATION SOCIETY Both are of great importance to the Farming Community of our Country In the latter part of the last century many Irish farmers had come to own their own land and ceased to be tenant farmers and in an Irish Exhibition held in London in 1888 a Mr. Jones wrote a paper on 'The Possibility of Developing the Resources of Farmers by a Scheme of Co-operative Production' Sir Horace Plunkett who had learned about the co-operative in America enthusiastically started a co-operative movement in this country his slogan being 'Better Farming, Better Business, Better Living' and the organisation he set up eventually became the I.A.O.S. In 1897 the Irish Agricultural Wholesale Society (I.A.W.S.) was formed to ensure supplies to the Co-operative Societies The Society was capitalised by money subscribed by co-operative societies for the purchase of shares and all the ordinary shares of the Society are held by the co-operatives to this day Preference shares and Debentures had to be issued in financing the I.A.W.S. but it is still the property of the farmers through their Co-ops Through many difficulties the Society has progressed to its present position of being the largest Seed Merchants in the country and also supplying manures feeding stuffs, machinery and other goods to the tune of a turn-over of more than £30m In dealing with their co-operatives the farmers are in fact giving any profits they may make to themselves and likewise the co-ops in dealing with the I.A.W.S. are in fact dealing in turn with themselves The policy of the I.A.W.S. has always been to supply goods of the best quality at the lowest possible prices Any profits made by the I.A.W.S. eventually return to the farmers via the co-ops No individual is making any money whatever out of the I.A.W.S. and it is hoped that farmers and co-ops in dealing with the I.A.W.S. should real-

I have been told that empty milk bottles placed in doorways for collection by an early morning milk roundsman were also removed in a number of cases and smashed on the roadway.

HOW FAR CAN A FLY FLY? — Further to my reference last week to the swarms of flies which have descended on Dungarvan and its environs periodically in recent months, readers from the area have drawn my attention to at least three known sources of fly infestation within a radius of a few miles of the town.

When I was inclined to rule out some of these as being too far from the town to be the cause of the trouble I had to change my opinion when a medical source assured me that a fly can fly as far as five miles from its base. This information would certainly put all of the flies generated at the sources mentioned within striking distance of the town.

WOLFE TONE — The month of June brings with it the annual commemoration of Wolfe Tone. The Wolfe Tone Club, Bodelstown in the Co. Kildare and these have been taking place over the last two week-ends. There are several well-known ballads about the great Irish patriot but this one written by Alice Milligan may not be so well known. It can be sung to the air of "The Croppy Boy."

The first storm of winter blew high, blew high. Red leaves were scattering to a gloomy sky. Rain clouds were lowering over the plans of Kildare. When from Dublin south wards the mourners came there was a wailing cry. "My number wasn't up yet" or "it just wasn't my turn this time." But how does this escapes come about? Is it just a case of a number not being up or is it due to Providential intervention in a miraculous manner? When you read what comes after, I do not think that you will have much difficulty in making up your mind.

This story is contained in a newspaper cutting from the US dated May 22 last which was sent to Dungarvan and which was then passed to me. It originated in the town of Irving, Texas and tells of the miraculous survival of a 14-year old boy who was struck by lightning while playing baseball. Describing his experience later, the boy said that he had been watching the dark clouds that were gathering. He was standing at third base during the game. "The next thing I remember I was in hospital," he said.

The boy was struck by lightning and the bolt shredded his baseball cap, entered his body through his forehead and made an exit through his right heel. Burns on both spots showed the power of the lightning. He lay unconscious for 40 minutes. His legs, burned together, had to be pulled apart. The zipper on his uniform was melted. His heavy metal belt buckle was so hot it could not be touched. A chain around his neck was disintegrated.

The medal on the chain was blackened but not destroyed. It said O. Mary conceived without sin, pray for us who have recourse to thee. Those familiar with devotion to the Blessed Virgin will at once recognise that this was what is familiarly known as the Miraculous Medal.

Without doubt this was a miraculous escape from what should have been certain death. Was it due to the fact that at the time the young boy's number "was not up" or was it due to God's providence and the intervention of the Blessed Virgin. What do you think?
