### Behind the SPOTLIGHT

#### THE WINDS OF CHANGE

The winds of change blew strongly through the meeting of the Dungarvan Urban Council at the top of the local town hall last Friday night when the first annual meeting of the newly elected Council took place.

Blown out was the Chairman, Mr Tom Kyne who had occupied that position for the past nineteen years, since 1955, as was also the Vice-Chairman, Mr R Walsh and in their places a new Chairman and a new Vice-Chairman were elected. It was indeed a big turnout which many, even those close to the political scene did not expect despite the increase in representation on the Council achieved by the Fianna Fail Party in the elections.

For Mr Kyne who has been the Council Chairman for nineteen consecutive years it must have been a great disappointment to have to vacate the position which has given him the honour of being Dungarvan's first citizen for an unbroken period of almost two decades but it emphasised, more than anything else the political swing which took place in the June elections and the vox populi had to be interpreted.

Now for the first time in more years than I can recall, certainly it must be somewhere in the region of thirty, a Fianna Fail member has become Chairman of the Council. This despite the fact that in all that time they remained the largest single party on the Council. In fairness it was an honour which in many ways has been overdue and I feel sure that the majority will be pleased with the change.

Equally so will most people be pleased by the idea voiced by Mr Paddy Whelan that occupancy of the Chair and Vice Chair should rotate annually and it looks as if this idea will be activated for the life span of the present Council. Mr Whelan holds the balance of power and he has publicly stated that he will maintain an independent role on the Council and will not become tied to any political party or group. He has also declared that there was not nor will there be any question of "deals" where he is concerned.

At the various elections held at the Council's annual meeting last Friday night it was evident that in fact no deals could have been done. Apart from the assurances given at the meeting by spokesmen for each of the political groups represented on the Council that no overtures or agreements had been made where the election of Chairman and Vice-Chairman was concerned it was evident from the manner in which Mr Whelan spread his support that he was not tied to any party.

#### BAD TIMING

About a fortnight ago one of the morning papers which I usually read carried bold headlines on the front page about two matters of great interest in inch high letters over six columns across the top, one declared "Central Bank Curb on Lending" while in smaller type the message read "Some rates reduced but no new credit for personal purposes".

Further down the page and mentioning only a two column heading was "Another pay boost" for TD's and Senators. This gave the good news (for TD's and Senators of course) that the allowance payable to a TD is to go up from £3,416 to £4,237 while Senators who now have an allowance of £2,023 are to get an extra £386 to bring it to £2,409 a year. The story also stated that the salaries of the Taoiseach, the Tánaiste and the Government Ministers, Parliamentary Secretaries, Ceann Comhairle and Attorney-General are also to be increased by hefty amounts some of which run to almost £3,000.

I like the subtlety by which the payments to TD's and Senators are called "allowances" while the Taoiseach and his Ministers are paid "salaries". I read the difference as being that the Ministers have to work for their pay while the others, certainly very many of them at any rate, are paid for doing little or nothing.

The message continues to be more for the "boys" but a tighter belt for John Citrizen. The timing of these news items was certainly not the best!

#### NO HOPE FOR NIRE TV RECEPTION

It looks as if the poor television reception which people living in the Nire Valley have had to put up with since the very beginning is to continue. At least the erudite Dr Conor Cruise O'Brien, Minister for Posts and Telegraphs, holds out little hope for any improvement in the position according to an answer which he gave to Mr Jackie Fahey, TD when the latter raised it at Question Time in the Dail lately.

The Minister said that RTE would get £1 million towards their plans to improve TV reception in the next few years. "However," he is then reported as saying in the Official Dail Reports, "to be perfectly straight and candid with those concerned about this matter, there are some areas where, owing to unusual topographical configurations and to sparse settlement, it would appear uneconomic in present technological conditions to improve reception. I am afraid that the Nire Valley, which is very thinly populated, is in that unfortunate position. I would like to hold out hope but I am afraid it would not be fair to the people concerned if I did so because in present conditions I do not see much hope of change."

#### THE AFTERMATH

I have been asked by a number of people in Dungarvan and throughout the county to pass word on to the local parties and to those who put up posters and other material during the local elections to please see to it that they are taken down and removed.

## Full Treatment Given County Council Appointments

BUT RESULTS WERE FOREGONE CONCLUSION

The first annual meeting of the newly elected Waterford County Council was held in Dungarvan last Tuesday evening for the purpose of electing a Chairman and Vice-Chairman and of appointing the membership of the various Statutory Bodies and appointing members to represent the Council on other bodies.

Although the democratic system of voting was gone through and the various elections occupied the entire evening the results were a foregone conclusion as the Fianna Fail dominated Council ensured that the party kept control of all the other bodies by voting en bloc for their own nominees.

The party representation on the 23 member Council is Fianna Fail—12, Fine Gael—7, Labour—2, Independents—2.

#### ELECTION OF CHAIRMAN

Mr C Curran (FF) outgoing Chairman, presided from the outset and the first business taken was the election of Chairman.

Proposing the re-election of Mr Curran Mr S Whelan (FF) said that he had proved a most impartial Chairman of the Council for close on 14 years.

Mr D Ahearne (FF) seconded Senator A Deasy (FG) proposed Mr T Kyne, TD (Lab) for the position stating that as had been expressed at another Council the position was one which should rotate.

A third candidate entered the field when Mr T Healy (Indp) proposed Mr P Crotty (Indp) and the latter seconded himself but at this stage Mr Kyne withdrew stating that he had agreed in the first instance only to allow his name to go forward to ensure a contest as he felt that it was the proper thing to have a contest for the position.

A vote was then taken between Mr Curran and Mr Crotty as follows: For Curran—Mr S Whelan, Mr Goode, Mr Walsh, Mr O'Ryan, Mr Kenneally, Mr O'Rygan, Mr Quirk, Mr Cahill, Mr Ahearne, Mr Deasy, Mr Coffey, Mr Walsh, Mr Qualeally (all FG), Mr Kyne and King (Lab), Healy and Crotty—11.

#### VICE CHAIR

Mr D Goode proposed the re-election of the outgoing Vice-Chairman Mr S Whelan and this was seconded by Mr W Kenneally, TD.

Senator Deasy proposed Mr Norman Walsh and this was seconded by Mr P Coffey.

On a vote the 12 Fianna Fail members plus Mr Healy Indp supported Mr Whelan giving him 13 votes against 9 FG and 2 Lab for Mr Walsh. Mr Crotty abstained Mr Whelan was declared re-elected.

#### ESTIMATES COMMITTEE

For this committee of 8 members 2 from each electoral area the appointments were made without a contest as follows: Dungarvan—Messrs Whelan and Kyne; Kilmac Thomas—Messrs O'Ryan and Coffey; Lismore—Messrs Ahearne and Walsh; Tramore—Messrs Cahill and Qualeally.

There were 16 members to be elected of which 3 could be non-members of the Council.

Mr N Walsh proposed that all 16 members of this Committee should be members of the Council and he suggested a party division of 11 to 5.

Mr P Kenneally proposed that 13 members of the Council be appointed and 3 non-members.

On a vote Mr Kenneally's proposal was carried by 12 votes (all FF) to 11 and the Council then proceeded on this basis with the appointments of first of the 13 Council members.

The Fianna Fail party nominated 9 members as follows: S Whelan, C Curran, P Kenneally, K O'Ryan, P Cahill, M Hennebery, J Fahey, J Quirk and D Ahearne.

Fine Gael then nominated the following 4 Mr Harty M Veale, M Qualeally and N Walsh and also nominated Mr F King (Lab) and P Crotty (Indp) making a total of 15 for the 13 seats.

A first ballot was then taken and as each of the nine Fianna Fail nominees received the support of a majority of the members present and voting (at least 12) all were declared elected. The voting for the other six was: Veale Qualeally and Walsh (10 each), Harty (9) and King and Crotty (8 each).

The Chairman then directed that another vote for the election of the other six should take place and in this Mr Crotty who received the support of the bulk of the Fianna Fail party was declared elected with 14 votes but as the other 5 still had not obtained a majority of the members present and voting a third vote to elect 3 from the remaining 5 was taken. On this the result was Walsh 20, Harty 12, Veale 13, Qualeally 10, King 6, Walsh, Harty and Veale were then declared elected and thus completed the Council panel.

Nominations for the 3 seats to be filled by non-members of the Council then followed. Fianna Fail nominated 3 of their defeated candidates in the recent elections 1 an outgoing Councillor—Mr Tom Foley (Strabally) and Mr P Wall (Kilil).

Fine Gael nominated Mr W Dowler Clashmore and Mr T Dunphy Dunmore East both

defeated Councillors and Mr Pierce Butler Lackendarra, while Labour nominated Mr James O'Sullivan Knockboy Waterfoot.

The resultant vote was Wall 13, Cullinane and Foley 12 each, Dunphy 10, Dowler 8, Butler 9, O'Sullivan 2.

#### OTHER APPOINTMENTS

Other appointments were made as follows—Waterford Harbour Commissioners (12 members)—Mr W Kenneally, TD (FF) (12 votes) defeated Mr Con Casey FG (9).

County Councils General Council (3 members)—Messrs Cahill Ahearne and Whelan (all FF) elected by 12 votes to 9 for Messrs Coffey Kyne and Walsh.

SERDO (2 members)—Messrs Fahey and P Kenneally (no opposition).

County and City Infirmary (2 members)—Messrs Hennebery and P Kenneally 12 votes defeated Messrs Coffey and King (10).

SERTO (1 member)—Mr D Goode (13) defeated Mr M Harty (9).

Health Committee (12 members 3 from each electoral area) Dungarvan—Messrs Goode, Kenneally, Whelan, Lismore—Messrs Quirk, Armstrong, Ahearne, Kilmac Thomas—Messrs Hennebery, O'Ryan, Fahey, Tramore—Messrs Cahill, Crotty and Healy.

## CHARGE OF WATER CRISIS IN ARDMORE DENIED BY CO. ENGINEER

There was no justification for saying that a water crisis occurred every summer in Ardmore said Mr J D Hally, Co. Engineer at a meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan last Tuesday. He was replying to a charge made by Senator Deasy who asked for permission to raise the matter at the close of the annual meeting of the Council.

Senator Deasy said that since mid-day on Sunday and up to 11 o'clock on Monday night the second largest seaside resort in the county had been without water. This was something which was happening in Ardmore every summer for the past seven years, he said.

Local residents and visitors to Ardmore were absolutely infuriated by this cut in the water supply and he said this major crisis was occurring in Ardmore every year.

Mr Hally disagreed that this was something which happened every year. The cause of the failure was the break down of the pump which supplies Grange but this had been repaired and a high level tank had now been installed. He said that Senator Deasy's claim that there was a crisis every year was an overstatement of the position.

Senator Deasy said that many people in Ardmore were left without water and this to him constituted a crisis and consequently he would not withdraw the statement.

# Agonising defeat for Waterford

## LIMERICK CLINCH VICTORY IN CLOSING STAGES

**LIMERICK** 3-12, **WATERFORD** 3-11

Waterford suffered one of their most agonising defeats ever when they were beaten by Limerick at Thurles on Sunday. This was a point just over three minutes from time robbed them of a place in the Munster hurling final.

Indeed, that victory should have been the final which dominated for almost three-quarters of the hour might be taken as a poor reflection on their ability to match the champions and now not contenders Limerick in the vital closing stages.

The simple fact was that Limerick after being swamped by an avalanche of first half Waterford scores and being forced to concede ground for 10 minutes found the reserve to come back as only true champions can and in the final stages called on the experience which Waterford lacked to grab the equaliser and then the winner to steal the spoils which looked Waterford bound for such a long time.

Not that Waterford lost any caste in defeat far from it. They proved conclusively that their form against Cork was no fluke in the pan and more conclusively that they are a team with All-Ireland potential.

**POOR CONSOLATION**

This in all probability will prove poor consolation for Waterford who must have suffered heartbreak to see a game which they looked so confident of winning slip from their fingers in the closing minutes. Even more so when it was the brilliance of their hurling their unbounded enthusiasm and their ability to pick their scores which sent Limerick reeling in the first half and kept them tottering early in the second half.

A noticeable pull in the centre of the field where John Galvin and Mossie Whelan performed well helped Waterford to gain their unexpected first half supremacy. Limerick were totally unprepared for the Waterford onslaught and found themselves trailing 1-11 to 1-1 after John Galvin had the first of his three goals after only three minutes.

Behind 1-5 to 1-3 the champions really came under pressure during the final ten minutes of the first half. It was which Waterford broke through for some good scores. Kirwan scored his second goal in the 20th minute and had another two minutes later when he pointed with the goal in his mercy but made amends in the 27th minute when he had his third goal which helped Waterford to a 3-7 to 1-5 interval lead.

**IMPROVEMENT**

Waterford continued to dominate on the resumption but it was a gradual improvement in a Limerick in fighting to pull back from the precipice of defeat. Changes in the side helped to settle down, the more significant of these being the introduction of Bernie Hartigan at midfield and the switch of John Foley back into his customary left half back berth in the introduction of Paddy Fitzmaurice to the half forward line before the interval.

The Limerick defence on the whole tightened up and allowed less scope to a Waterford forward division which was handicapped by the loss of second half substitute Mossie Walsh forced to retire through injury just when he was beginning to make an impact at centre forward.

Limerick for all their pressure were still eight points down with just 15 minutes to go. The big break-through came in the 17th minute when Pat Flynn in an attempt to clear struck the ball off the boot of the centre forward, Limerick forward, Liam O'Donoghue and the rebounded up in the net.

Within a minute they struck again. This time Eamon Grimes collected a pass from 'No. 1' and beat the Waterford defence with a well placed shot.

The change in party strength brought about in the recent elections was fully reflected at the new Council's first annual meeting held last Friday night by a further big number of changes. Not only were the outgoing Chairman Mr T. F. Kyne, TD (Lab) and Vice-Chairman Mr R. A. Walsh (FG) unopposed but Senator A. Deasy (FG) who was one of the Council's nominees on the County Vocational Education Committee also failed to obtain re-election.

At the outset of the meeting the outgoing Chairman Mr T. F. Kyne presided and read the formal declaration of the election of the nine members returned to the Council all of whom were present.

Fianna Fail members, Messrs D. Goode, John A. Murphy, W. Cotter and Mrs. R. O'Brien grouped together at the left of the table with Senator Deasy and Mr Walsh (both FG) seated at the centre and Mr T. W. Whelan (Indp) on the right.

The business of the meeting was proceeded with without ado with the election of Chairman Mr T. W. Deasy proposed the re-election of Mr Kyne pointed out that Mr Kyne was well versed in Local Government law and he thought for this reason that it would be beneficial for the new Council if Deputy Kyne was re-elected Chairman for his first year.

Mr R. Walsh (FG) seconded. Proposing Mr Declan Goode for the position Mr John A. Murphy said that although Fianna Fail had been numerically the strongest party on the Council for a long number of years they never had the distinction or honour of holding the Chair or Vice-Chair. He paid tribute to what he described as the "utter impartiality" of Mr Kyne throughout all the years he had been Chairman.

Mr Billy Cotter who seconded said that as the Fianna Fail party had increased its representation on the Council in the election he felt they were entitled to the Chair. A vote was then taken and resulted as follows: For Kyne—Messrs Deasy, Kyne, Walsh, Wade (4) For Goode—Messrs Goode, Cotter, Murphy, Mrs O'Brien and Mr P. Whelan (5).

Mr Goode was accordingly declared elected and Mr Kyne then vacated the Chair and moved down to the right side of the table alongside his Labour colleague Mr Walsh. He assured Mr Goode who then took the Chair of his fullest co-operation during his term of office and congratulated him on his election.

Mr Goode said that it was for him a great honour to be chosen for the first time as Chairman of the Urban Council of Dungarvan. He thanked the outgoing Chairman for the wonderful co-operation and the concern he had always shown and he thanked those who had proposed seconded and voted for him. He said that he

realised the task that had been placed on his shoulders in accepting it he was fully aware of what the office meant and what it stood for. He then welcomed the 3 new members elected to the Council and said that it was a unique and historic occasion in the history of the Council that they had a lady member for the first time.

**NO DEALS**

Mr Whelan said that as the man who made the difference in the election of Chairman, he would like to make his position clear. He was sure they all had read the statement in the "Dungarvan Leader" which he had made when asked by the Editor whether any deals had been made about the Chair. "The statement in the "Leader" was correct," he said "and I want to say again that I made no deals with anyone. I should not feel that the Chair should rotate each year and insofar as I can, I will see that it does."

Mr Whelan then added that he was sorry that by his vote he had put out a man who had done a great deal for the town but he had voted in accordance with the belief he held that the Chair and Vice-Chair should rotate. He assured Mr Walsh that he was sure that Mr Walsh would be a good Chairman on another future occasion. He said that as Council members should forget their political affiliations and work together for the good of the town and added that he would be tied to no party or group and that he would vote as he saw fit and right on any matter that came before the Council.

# ELECTRICITY PRICES

Electricity bills are subject to a fuel cost variation which varies from month to month depending on the level of increased costs which the Board has to pay for its supplies of oil.

The fuel cost variation for the May/June billing period (these bills will issue this month) is now fixed at an additional 0.494p on every unit of electricity used in that period. This variation applies to all consumers with the exception of those on maximum demand rates who have taken supply at high tension.

In the case of the latter the fuel cost variation for the May/June billing period is an additional 0.466p on every unit used in that period.

**Group Accounts**

The rate of charge for Group Accounts (code 138) — applying to premises incorporating flats and bed-sitting rooms in which electricity slot-meters are used — for the May/June billing period is equivalent to a total rate of 1.65p per unit inclusive of fuel cost variation and VAT.

Details of the fuel cost variation which will apply to the June/July bills will be published early in August.

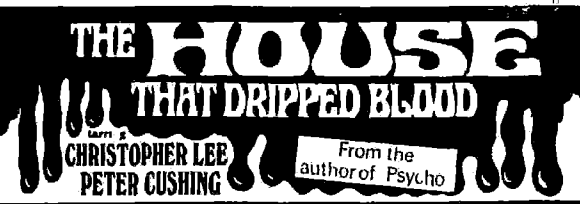

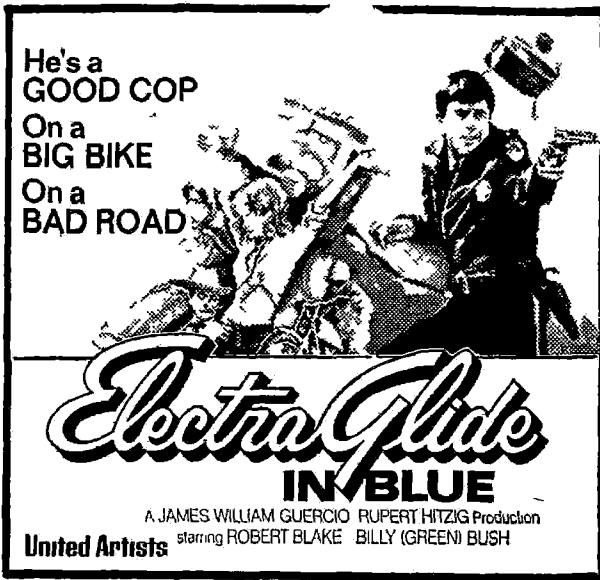

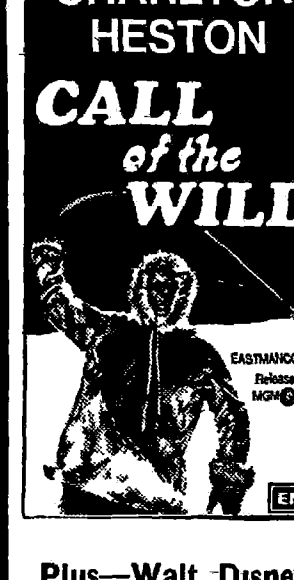

BANKS ASKED TO GO EASY ON OVERDRAFTS

In view of the huge amount of finance tied up in cattle at present and because of the depressed state of the livestock market the IFA has already approached the banks and lending agencies and is now seeking an urgent meeting with the Irish Banks Standing Committee to discuss the whole situation. A spokesman for the IFA said that prices for cattle particularly for store cattle and calves are very depressed and confidence in the industry is at a low ebb. The IFA is pressing very strongly for a Government level and at EEC level, for action to deal with the basic causes of the present difficulties, notably excessive beef imports from non-member countries, the Monetary Compensatory Levy system and Britain's failure to operate the Beef Intervention System. The IFA spokesman said that on the basis of a positive response to these efforts the IFA believed that the current depression can be alleviated.
