Behind the SPOTLIGHT

NO EVIDENCE OF POWER SHARING

From time to time members of local authorities like to assure themselves that there are no party politics in local affairs and that at that level they are all one, big happy family. Of course this is not so or at least only in the very odd case is it so and the exception never proves the rule.

There was no evidence that party politics were absent from the first meeting of the newly elected Waterford County Council last week. In fact it was the other way round as the Fianna Fail party which dominates the Council proceeded to annex every position on the Council and the subsidiary bodies and only gave away those which they did not want or just could not fill. No blame to the Fianna Fail for doing this if the positions were otherwise then it could just as easily be the Fine Gael or Labour parties which would be taking the boot in and taking the spoils and leaving Fianna Fail out in the cold! It's the system which is at fault. PR operates in the polling booths but not in the Council Chambers.

A great deal of play has been made and much has been said about the ideal of power sharing in this country in the past year. The experiment was tested in the North and failed after a short period simply because there was a majority view against power sharing. The failure was roundly criticised as were those who were responsible for bringing it about. The criticism came in the main from south of the border. But how can we criticise those north of the border for not wanting to share power when we are so averse to it even at our own local Council level down here. It's worth thinking on, isn't it?

SHIFTING THE MEAT MOUNTAIN

While the EEC announced some measures during the week to ease the present beef crisis by selling surplus meat at half-price to old age pensioners, hospitals and other institutions, some Irish meat factories were seeking permission to buy beef from the huge stockpile now standing at well over 100,000 tons for resale to, of all people, the Russians! Last week it was reported that there were Common Market proposals to sell intervention beef to Russia at the ridiculously low price of 12p a lb. Experts, however, since then have been doing their mathematical tables and claim that in fact this will add little to a net price of 5p when storage costs and interest rates are taken into consideration. They go even further and claim that if the deal is based on delivery to Russia the net value would be a mere 3p a lb!

This shows how far the madness of the CM has taken us. This intervention idea, putting surplus beef in cold storage has developed into a nightmare with 130,000 tons now in the stockpile. Of this, 22,000 tons are of Irish origin and the figure is increasing at the rate of 2,000 tons per week. The position is so desperate here now that there are reports from reliable sources of many huge refrigerated trucks full of meat standing outside factories in nowhere to go. In some instances this pressure has led to factories are pre-arranged as 'middlemen' deal with Russia in getting the meat mounted.

While all this is going on in Ireland and the Common Market announced in Dublin last week that 20 per cent of our population in basic poverty country. The Parliamentary Secretary to the Social Welfare Department Cluskey issued a

warning that unless poverty was taken seriously, it could endanger society. How crazy is our world becoming—poverty on one hand and a meat surplus on the other! Whatever about making this intervention beef available at cheap rates to needy people and institutions, nothing can justify disposing of it to the Russians for little or nothing. And certainly the morality of keeping food locked up in refrigerated plants in order to create an artificial scarcity to keep prices at a certain (high) level while people go hungry, is, to say the least, very questionable.

Incidentally Russia has already cashed in on the European butter surplus and the US grain surplus and now looks like making it a hat-trick with Irish beef.

In each of the two previous years the Dunmore Club has made a contribution of £100 to the Lifeboat Institution and the whole effort must be viewed as a really splendid one. That there is still truth in the old saying that there's many a slip 'twixt the cup and the lip was proved once again last Sunday when Germany defeated Holland in the final of the World Cup. But so sure were pre-match favourites Holland, of winning this game, that the Dutch Authorities had actually printed a batch of 100,000 special stamps before it took place. The legend on the stamps read "Holland, World Cup Champions, 1974". The stamps had to be destroyed on Monday while the West Germans were being toasted as the new world soccer champions.

VISITORS ARE SCARCE

The tourist season seems to be extremely poor so far this year and visitors from GB are as scarce on the ground as fine days this summer not to mention the almost total disappearance of tourists from the US. In my travels around the country in recent weeks I have seen just the odd GB plated car and a friend from the Kingdom (of Kerry) with whom I was speaking lately told me that the position is the same down there.

The reasons for the poor season have been variously given as the bombings, money scarcity and high prices and poor weather. Certainly unless things pick up soon, those involved in the tourist trade stand to lose a great deal.

DUNGARVAN BORN COLONEL IS NEW O.C. CURRAGH TRAINING CAMP

An announcement was made last week of the appointment of a new Officer Commanding the Curragh Training Camp. He is Colonel Pat Dempsey, Claremount Court, Glasnevin, Dublin who has left his former post as Director of Operations to succeed Col Con Burke, who has retired.

Col Dempsey who served on a number of occasions as O.C. of the Irish Battalions attached to the UN Peace Keeping Force in the Congo and in Cyprus is married with four daughters.

Dungarvan born, he is son of the late Daniel and Mrs Dempsey, Shandon Farm, Dungarvan and is brother of Mr Con Dempsey of Shandon Farm and of Mrs Anne D'Alton, Ros Murre, Knocknagravan, Dungarvan. He is a past pupil of Dungarvan CBS.

RIGHTS-OF-WAY IN DUNGARVAN HOUSING SCHEMES WOULD COST OVER £3,000 TO RESURFACE

Subsequent to a request at a previous meeting by Cllr T Wade for an estimate of the cost of preparing and resurfacing the rights-of-way in housing schemes in the urban area the Town Clerk Mr B J Keane, submitted a report to the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council last Monday night which gave an estimate of £3,200 from the Town Engineer for the work. The cost on the rates would be 14p in the £.

The rights-of-way concerned and the cost were as follows: Congress Villas, £900, Keating Street, £220, St Martin's Terrace, £250, Cathal Brugha Place, £825, between Cathal Brugha and Caseyville, £110, Caseyville, £844, between Caseyville and Shandon, £299.

Cllr Cotter said that the rights-of-way were listed in the report but all were in Dungarvan and there was no mention of McCarthyville or Murphy Place.

The Town Clerk said that the Engineer had looked at Murphy Place but had deliberately omitted it as some of the rights-of-way here had been taken over by adjoining tenants and tiled. It was decided to defer further consideration of the matter to the next meeting.

SEA BED DRILLING OFF ARDMORE

The Marathon Company which has announced significant finds of gas off the south coast resumed their exploration drilling this week when the exploration vessel Glomar North Sea took up a position off Ardmore, about 32 miles south east of Cork harbour and 50 south-west of Waterford. The vessel is operating out of Cork and left the deepwater quay at Cobh on Monday evening for its new location in the Celtic Sea.

NO EVIDENCE OF CONTAMINATION BY LARVAE IN DUNGARVAN WATER SUPPLY

But Councillors Insist That There Is

Moving a motion in her name at the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council last Monday night Cllr Mrs R O'Brien called for 'an immediate investigation into the water supply at No 27 McCarthyville with a view to pinpointing the source of the foreign matter which has been found to be present there.

This matter has been discussed on a number of occasions during the past twelve months and the Council has had samples taken and exploratory works and pipe scouring carried out in connection with it. Cllr O'Brien said she realised that the Council had done a great deal about this complaint but it continued to exist and the tenant at 27 McCarthyville, Mrs Mulvihill, had shown her a sample of water taken from her domestic supply recently which showed foreign bodies. She said that she understood that there was a dead-end pipe at the end of McCarthyville and she wondered whether in the stagnant water in this area these muggles were breeding. Because of this she said that the trouble that affected the area could occur again this year and she asked whether there was any chemical which could be introduced into the water supply to kill off these foreign bodies which she understood consisted of midge larvae, permanently.

Cllr W Cotter supporting the motion said that there was a lot of trouble over this matter last year. He lived in the area and had his domestic water supply in churns for a number of weeks. He did not want the same thing to occur this year he said.

Mr D. Goode, Chairman said that he understood that the pipes had been scoured and there was no evidence of any nuisance in the area at present.

NO FOREIGN MATTER

Mr C A O'Connor Co Manager said that water samples taken from Mrs Mulvihill's house had been analysed and the bacteriological report proved completely satisfactory and showed that there was no foreign matter present. He said that the Council's water supply from Ballinamuck was at present supplying 12 to 13 hundred houses in the town including McCarthyville and Murphy Place and no complaints from any other source had been received.

Mr O'Connor said that it had been represented to the Council officials that there were larvae in the supply but the Analyst's report showed that there was no evidence of contamination by larvae. The factory and slaughterhouse reports are there for examination he said and they showed that the Council is doing all that can be done where this factory is concerned.

O'Connor added that there were many local authorities throughout the country who would be delighted to have water of the quantity and quality such as was supplied in the urban area from Ballinamuck.

Questions concerning the provision and laying of special type piping in McCarthyville were also raised.

The Co Manager assured the Council that he would have this matter examined and that he would continue to have samples of the water taken and analysed whenever complaints were received until it was cleared up.

Mr Harty owner of the car stated in Court that he knew the defendant and his family and said that if the defendant had asked him for the wheels he would have given them to him. He asked the District Justice to deal lightly with the defendant.

JUVENILE GROUP PLEADS GUILTY TO "INCREDIBLE LIST OF CRIMES" AT YOUGHAL COURT

The most incredible list of crimes he had ever come across was how District Justice P J Brennan described the one hundred larceny charges which eight juveniles, six boys and two girls, pleaded guilty to between them at Youghal Court last Friday.

The court was told of the rampage of crime which the defendants went on at different times in recent months and Supt J Ward said the people of the town were greatly disturbed at the series of incidents.

Each of the eight defendants was fined £5 and between them were ordered to pay varying amounts of compensation depending on their degree of involvement to a total amount of £209 6s 1d.

The District Justice said he was also deeply shocked at the reaction of some of the defendants during the hearing. They were certainly starting off life on a very bad basis but if anyone of them ever again came before him on similar charges they would not be going home to their parents after the court.

He said that it was the South Eastern Health Board that was responsible and the matter should be taken up with them.

TWO JAILED AT LISMORE FOLLOWING NIGHT ATTACK ON SISTERS

The story of a 'shocking night of terror' for two young sisters, after they had accepted a drive home from a dance in Lisamore, on the early hours of July 21, 1973 was told to District Justice Patrick J Brennan at Lisamore Court last Wednesday.

Before the court were Nicholas Falvey (19) a married car salesman of Piltown Co. Kilkenny, and Peter Cullen (21) farmer, of Ballygowan, Piltown.

Outlining the facts of the case, Supt M English, Dungarvan prosecuting said the terrifying ordeal began for the two girls when they accepted the offer of a drive home from a dance in Piltown at 2 o'clock in the morning from another man. When they got into the car the two defendants were already in the vehicle and shortly afterwards their night of terror commenced.

He urged however that the court would not take a decision that would extend Falvey's stay in prison beyond the 12 months sentence he was at present serving in connection with the indecent assault on the girl in Kilkenny.

Mr O'Reilly said, was a married man and the father of a very young child and despite all of this his wife was standing behind him. He urged that some minor punishment be imposed because at best he would not be a free man until shortly before Christmas.

Mr O'Reilly said Cullen worked on his father's farm in Piltown. He submitted that the incident was an isolated incident in the lives of both and would not be repeated again.

Recognisances were fixed in the event of an appeal.

RELAXATION OF CONTRIBUTION CONDITIONS FOR DESERTED WIFE'S BENEFIT

Deserted wife's benefit is payable if the husband or the wife's insurance meets a certain standard. Up to now this standard related to insurance between 1953 and the date of desertion. From now on insurance prior to 1953 may be counted. Alternatively title can now be established if there is a yearly average of 39 contributions over the three or five years prior to the date of desertion.

ADDITIONAL ALLOWANCE FOR DISABLED DESERTED WIVES

A deserted wife who is aged 68 years or over and who is receiving deserted wife's benefit may if she is so incapacitated as to require full-time care and attention qualify for an allowance (called a prescribed relative allowance) if a relative is providing that care and attention.

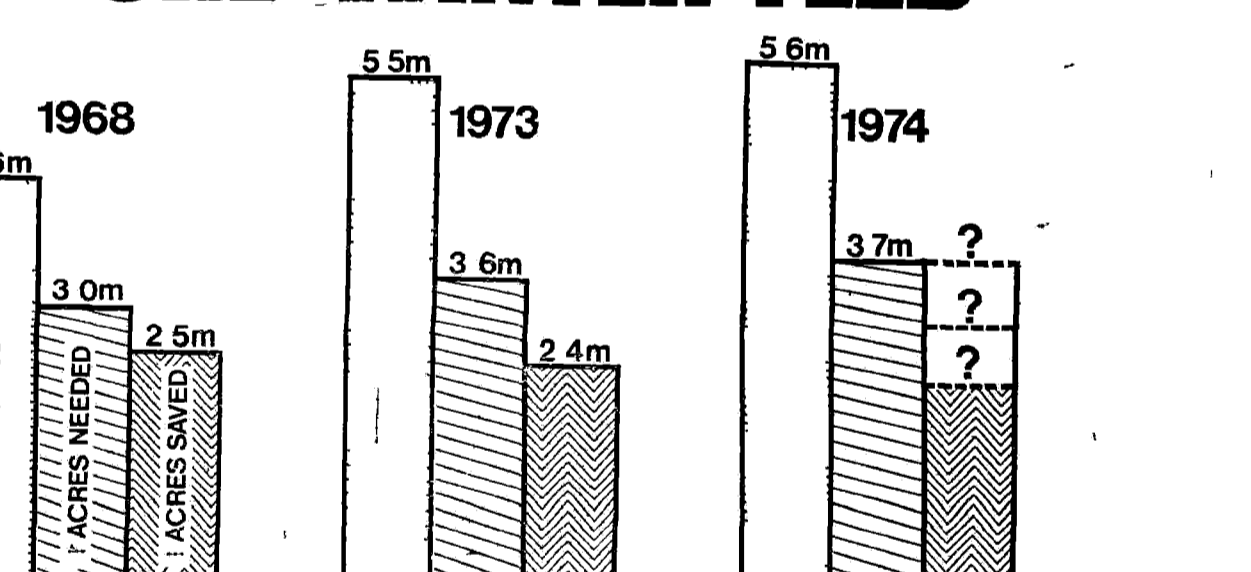
