PENSMAN TAKES YOU Behind the SPOTLIGHT

LIFEBELTS DESTROYED AND DAMAGED

The successful rescue of two young boys who were being blown out to sea in Dungarvan's Western bay while floating on an inflated tube last week calls for the highest commendation for Mr John Hamilton who was primarily responsible for saving the boys and Mr Billy Cooney who ably assisted him in his rescue effort. Both are well known Dungarvan men, the former being one of the leading members of the Dungarvan Swimming Club before it became defunct.

It was not true the Minister said to suggest that the strength of our police force was low in comparison with other countries. He pointed out that figures given by an OECD report, compiled from police data supplied in 1970 by European countries, the US, Canada and Japan indicated that we were not underpoliced by international standards.

OF SPECIAL INTEREST

Next Thursday, August 1, will be Show Day in Dungarvan and visitors to the show should be on the look-out for the special stand which will be found in the Arts and Crafts section and in which a variety of craftwork done by the girls being trained at the Carriglea Training Centre for Adult Mentally Handicapped Girls will be on display.

THE GREEN POUND

The debate on the advisability or otherwise of pushing ahead with the possibility of having a "green pound" introduced to improve the value of our agricultural products within the EEC has been proceeding for several weeks now. But few outside the farming community understand what is meant by a "green pound". Basically the green pound would be a special exchange rate between the Irish pound and the EEC's Unit of Account.

The unit of account was established when the EEC originally set up the Common Agricultural Policy (CAP) in the mid sixties. An important principle of this was that agricultural prices should be uniform throughout the member states and accordingly as farm prices were fixed annually, units of account automatically translated themselves into so many German marks, French and Belgian francs and so on.

STRENGTH OF GARDA FORCE

As a result of the comment from the County Council Chairman that in order to combat the more serious crimes should be referred to it is of interest to note that figures given by the Minister for Justice recently speaking at a luncheon in the Dublin Chamber of Commerce last week Mr Cooney stated that the strength of the Garda Síochána will soon rise to 10,000 men. It is now at the highest level since the foundation of the State.

CAPPOQUIN ARE FEILE NA GAEDHEAL ALL-IRELAND UNDER 14 HURLING RUNNERS-UP

Cappoquin were guests of Adare GAA Club Limerick when they participated in the Feile na Gaedheal under 14 All-Ireland competition held at Limerick City and other venues in the county last week-end. The party of 30 arrived in Adare at 7.15 p.m. on Friday evening and stayed in the homes of members of the Adare Club over the week-end. It is also worth noting that Adare Camogie Club were also hosts to the Roscommon Gaelic camogie team during the same period.

Cappoquin who were County Waterford's representatives proved worthy ambassadors for the Deise County and were runners-up to Na Piarasigh, Cork after some outstanding displays. At the very well laid out pitch and dressingrooms of Adare Club at 11 a.m. on Saturday morning Cappoquin played their first round game against Adare which they won well in the second half by 7-8 to nil.

GREAT GAME

This brought Cappoquin into the semi-final of the competition against Wexford which was played at Murroe some 31 miles from Adare at 7 p.m. on the same day. As the teams took the field Cappoquin in comparison with Wexford looked small in size—it was just unbelievable Wexford looked like a minor team. This was a great game with Cappoquin after playing with the wind advantage leading by 2 points at half-time Wexford soon got into their stride and took an early lead in the second-half but Cappoquin against sun wind and fall in field fought back and it was fitting that Pat Curran blazed over the bar to make the sides level at 3-5 to 4-2 at full-time. The teams had to start over again and this was Cappoquin's match that day. And after a great battle the superior size of Wexford won them the replay by five points. However as it appeared on the field it was disclosed afterwards that Wexford contravened several rules which put them out.

AGAINST THE WIND

As in the semi-final Cappoquin had to turn out in the second-half against the wind but what a game it turned out to be with Na Piarasigh battling for vital scores and Cappoquin goalie Eddie McGrath and his well drilled defence defying their best efforts. With minutes to go Cappoquin made a very well engineered attack which saw Eugene McLoughlin round his man and score a great goal from 20 yards. As the flag went up the other umpire called on the referee and the score was disallowed as a Cappoquin forward was ruled to be just on the fringe of the square at the corner. It seemed a harsh decision it was such a great goal. This would have meant a 2 point lead for Cappoquin. Then in a Na Piarasigh attack Eddie McGrath scored a great shot but the ball was knocked out of his hands by the forwards and it was disastrous to see it just roll over the line by six inches. Both mistakes but no further scores were registered.

PRESENTED MEDALS

After the game captain Tommy O'Sullivan was presented on the Hogan Stand with the All-Ireland runners-up medal and a beautiful pennant by the President of the Association. Dr Donal Keenan. Each member of the panel was also presented with his medal by the President.

Officials who travelled were Paddy McCarthy Chairman, Noel Mason Jimmy McGrath, John Fraher Noel Lonergan, Bro Michael De La Salle Chairman of Bord na Móna. They paid a visit to the Cappoquin team on the Saturday.

BLACKWATER SALMON SELLING FOR 20p PER LB. SAYS COUNCILLOR

When members of the County Waterford Committee of Agriculture were informed at a meeting in Dungarvan last Tuesday that nothing beyond an acknowledgment had been received from the Department of Agriculture and Fisheries to their resolution calling for a cancellation of the week-end ban on salmon fishing in the Blackwater Mr C Curran said that he was absolutely disappointed at the Minister's attitude in failing to make any decision in the matter.

Mr Curran said that all they had sought was an alteration of 6 hours in the week-end ban to allow the fishermen in the Blackwater to start fishing at 6 a.m. on Monday mornings instead of at 12 (noon). As a result of the ban he said that the livelihood of a number of people who relied on salmon fishing was in jeopardy. The Minister had just ignored the appeals of the fishermen and members of the Committee to bring in the change, he said.

Mr P Cahill said that even a mackerel would cost 7p which by comparison seemed to be more than what salmon were fetching. Prices for salmon were now down to rock bottom he said and fish were being sold for as little as 20p per lb. He added that despite this, people who bought salmon in the shops had to pay top prices as a result of the low prices being paid by the buyers for salmon he knew a man whose pay packet was only £16 in a week although his boat had taken 100 salmon.

BIG DISCREPANCY

Mr P Crothy thought there must be a big discrepancy in the price being paid for salmon in the Blackwater and those caught down in his area in Dunmore East where he understood the price paid to fishermen was 40p per lb.

Mr J Cahill said that the difficulty where the Blackwater fishermen were concerned seemed to be that they had to sell to a fish buyers co-operative which had been formed some years ago. This co-op could arrange its own prices he said.

Finally a resolution proposed by Mr Kenneally was passed calling on the Department to look into the salmon marketing system. It was also agreed that information as to the price structures which exist in other parts of the country be obtained and that the matter be discussed again at the next meeting in the light of this information.

Court sequel to two-car collision on Dungarvan's "humped back" Bridge

A two car collision on the humped back bridge linking Dungarvan town with Abbeyside on New Year's night last, was recalled at Dungarvan Circuit Court last Friday when Judge Fawcitt heard a claim and counter claim for damages.

Plaintiff in the civil action was Jack O'Grady, who brought a claim for £2727.51 damages against James Gee Kilrush, Dungarvan, for alleged negligent driving on the occasion. The defendant in turn brought a counter claim for £1000 damages against O'Grady.

Garda Martin Shanahan said he arrived at the scene of the accident and from the positions of both cars on the road it would appear that the plaintiff's car was trying to get back from its incorrect side to its correct side when the collision took place.

Anthony McCarthy, Abbeyside, Dungarvan, said he was driving home that night when he saw O'Grady's car passing on its incorrect side of the road. "I had to jump out of its way and seconds later I heard a crash on top of the bridge," he said.

Judge Fawcitt said all the evidence pointed to the fact that the plaintiff was driving on his incorrect side and made a strong effort to rectify the position at the last minute. "I have little difficulty in deciding in favour of the defendant," he added.

Dismissing the plaintiff's claim Judge Fawcitt awarded Gee a decree for £917, costs and expenses on the counter claim. Mr M Feehan, B.L., instructed by Farrell and Morrissey, Solrs appeared for the defendant, and Mr E. Ryan, B.L. instructed by J Reilly and Son Solrs, represented the plaintiff.

GOVERNMENT AGAIN ASKED TO EXERCISE CLEMENCY IN CASE OF SACKED COUNCIL ENGINEER

By 15 votes to 6 (2 members were absent) Waterford County Council at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan last Monday again passed a resolution calling on the Government to exercise clemency as provided for in a sub-section of the Offences Against the State Act and to re-instate Mr Gerry Murphy, a former member of the Council's engineering staff, who forfeited his position under the Act following his conviction in connection with charges arising from the Claudia gun-running affair last year.

The matter was raised by Mr K O'Ryan who asked the Co Manager what the present position was in regard to the strike of the Council's engineers.

Mr C O'Connor, Co Manager replied that the engineers had resumed work last Friday but as he had been away during the previous week he was unable to say what the terms of settlement in the dispute were.

Mr O'Ryan and Mr J Quirke then asked whether this would now mean that there would be an engineer to service the Lismore area and the Co Manager replied in the negative. He added that none of the existing engineering staff of the Council would be prepared to go into the Lismore area even on a part-time basis at present.

Mr Curran, Chairman of the Lismore area will continue not to be serviced so?

Mr J D Hally County Engineer said that it was not altogether true to say that Lismore was not being serviced at present. He informed the Council that he was dealing with a certain number of problems, including planning in the area. He also said that the Council had applied to the Local Appointments Commissioners for three engineers but could not get them.

Replying to Mr M Veale, Mr Hally said that the scarcity of engineers to fill local authority posts was fairly common throughout the country and was not peculiar to Co Waterford. He agreed however that it would be true to say that none of the Council's engineering staff would go into the Lismore area at present.

Mr O'Ryan—Full marks to them for that!

Mr O'Connor Co Manager said that they would be faced with the same problem as far as the Kilmacthomas area was concerned from this week on.

Mr J Quirke said that it would be just as well for them to be straight and honest about the matter and admit that an engineer would go into the Lismore area until the man who had been there was reinstated.

SIMPLE SOLUTION

Mr O'Ryan then stated that the simple solution of the problem was to reinstate Gerry Murphy who had given good service in the area until he was sacked. He pointed out that there was a sub-section in the Offences Against the State Act under which the Government could exercise clemency and re-instate him. If this were done he assured the Council that perfect relations with the

engineers would be restored again. He proposed that the Council call on the government to exercise this clemency.

Mr J Ahearn seconded the motion and said that he would once again have to oppose such a proposition.

When the Chairman said that this matter had already been discussed time and again and that there was no point in pursuing the matter further beyond putting the proposal, several of the new members elected to the Council in last month's elections, asked to be briefed as to the position.

Mr M Veale one of those new members said that as far as he could see the matter of Gerry Murphy was just being bandied around and it had been carried on too long already.

Mr J Ahearn said that the new members said that this matter had been dealt with at national level and as it concerned subversive activities he did not think the Council should now concern itself with it again.

The Chairman then put the proposition to the meeting and it was declared carried by 15 votes to 6. The voting was as follows—

SALARY INCREASE FOR CIVIL DEFENCE OFFICER

Waterford County Council at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan last Monday approved of pension increases as from July 1 last to pensioned employees of the Council. The cost of the increases will be £5,500.

On the proposal of Mr C Curran Chairman seconded by Mr M Harty the Council also approved a revised salary scale for the Civil Defence Officer as from April 1, 1973.

Mr C Casey asked who the Civil Defence Officer was and his present salary was and the amount of the increase proposed.

The Co Manager Mr C O'Connor said that the Civil Defence Officer was Mr P Walsh Town Engineer, Dungarvan. His present salary for the position was £435 and the increase was £90 a year.

JUDGE'S COMMENTS IN GRANTING LIQUOR LICENCE FOR NEW DUNGARVAN SUPERMARKET

"While I am against the application entirely on principle no one has seen fit to object to it so I will grant it," Judge Fawcitt commented at Dungarvan Circuit Court last Thursday when he granted the licensing application of Robn Torrie a nominee of L&N in respect of their new supermarket premises at Main Street, Dungarvan.

Evidence was given by Mr James Mulligan, architect, who had prepared a map of the new premises, which he said had formerly been an old licensed premises cum grocery stores. The gardens have been demolished and the applicant's company was now constructing a new structure on the site.

Mr Robn Torrie said the proposed new supermarket would be no different to any other supermarket in the county. They proposed selling wines and spirits in one section of the premises which was part of a parcel of the supermarket. The supervision they would have would ensure that no intoxicating liquor could be sold to anyone under age and the staff had been told of that.

"It is a very valid asset in our particular field of operation," he said.

Judge Fawcitt: If I grant you this licence can a person come in and get a pint of stout in the back room? He would be entitled to do so you know.

Witness Yes.

Judge Fawcitt: Are there any objections to this application?

Dr D R Coughlan, State Solicitor, said that he was aware of I would point out though that if the new licence is to be granted in respect of the entire new premises as is being sought then children can be continually on a licensed premises.

SUPERVISING DIFFICULTIES

Inspector M McQuinn, Dungarvan said that based on the plan of the new structure there would be difficulties in supervising the sale of drink on the premises and in enforcing the law. Kids and general shoppers would be frequenting a licensed premises at all times and the premises would have to be subject to the same laws as ordinary public houses.

Judge Fawcitt said he was against the matter entirely in principle. He said he would adjourn his decision on the application for a time to consider it further.

Later in the court however Judge Fawcitt said that seeing that no one in Dungarvan had seen fit to object to the application he was going to grant it.

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COUNTY COUNCIL APPROVE PLAN TO ERECT MORE PUBLIC CONVENIENCES

Members of Waterford County Council at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan last Monday unanimously approved a report submitted by the Secretary setting out the present position in regard to the number of public conveniences being maintained in the region of 16 centres throughout the county.

The report stated that 16 conveniences were already being maintained by the Council at an annual cost of approximately £7,000. Requests had been made by members for facilities in Anestown, Ballyquin Lismore (female), Portlaw Cappoquin, Tramore (mid-town) and Woodstown and where seaside resorts were concerned priority would be given to Woodstown and Ballyquin. The total cost of erecting conveniences at these 7 locations would be in the region of £30,000 and the annual maintenance cost would be of the order of £9,000.

Mr T Healy Mr F King and Mr P Crothy stressed the urgent need of providing toilet facilities at Woodstown. Each in turn pointed out that the present position there was a disgrace and constituted a definite health hazard for the thousands who visit the resort every week-end.

Mr King suggested that to meet the urgent need there a temporary convenience might be provided.

Mr C O'Connor, Co Manager agreed with Woodstown and Ballyquin should be treated as priority cases. He said that in regard to Mr King's suggestion he would be prepared to approve the placing of a temporary convenience at Woodstown if a local committee could be got to take over responsibility for it. He said that if this could not be done it was the experience of the Council that a building of this nature would be gone after a couple of days.

Mr King said that he thought this kind of local guarantee would be forthcoming and he said he would do what he could to organise it.

Mr W Kenneally TD said that they should face up to the fact that it was not local people who were responsible for this kind of vandalism but that they should be some damage well watched there was always bound to be some damage.

Mr J D Hally, County Engineer said that until a permanent structure could be erected in Woodstown the temporary convenience could be placed there at week-ends.

Mr C Curran Chairman said that the only way to stop vandalism was to have more guards.

The proposals of the Co Manager and the report were approved.

MALICIOUS INJURY AWARDS FOR NETS BURNED DURING FISHERY ROW

The fishing row which erupted following the government decision to reduce the number of fishing licenses was referred to at last Thursday's sitting of Dungarvan Circuit Court when two applicants brought malicious injury claims against Waterford County Council in respect of the malicious burning of three draft nets in the village of Villerstown on the night of July 16th/17th, 1973.

James Viliers-Stuart Ballynapparka, Cappoquin, Chairman of the Waterford Board of Fishery Conservators, brought a claim for £425.86 in respect of two of the nets, while Mrs Mary Ann Reilly whose address was given as Villerstown, Cappoquin, claimed £285 for the third.

Mr D Budd BL represented the claimants while Mr J Langan-O'Keefe (JL) of Langan-O'Keefe (JL) solicitors, Waterford, defended for Waterford County Council against Mrs Reilly.

Evidence was given by Sergeant H Boylan Villerstown who told the court that the Order made by the then government reducing the number of draft licences had led to considerable unrest in the area among fishermen. On the morning of June 17, 1973 he was out on the quay at Villerstown where he saw the remains of three fishing nets which had been destroyed by fire. Subsequently a man was arrested, charged and pleaded guilty to the offence. He was currently paying compensation and so far had paid back £110.

Sergeant Boylan said two of the nets were owned by Mr Viliers-Stuart and the third by Mrs Reilly.

SMOULDERING

James Viliers-Stuart said he had been to Villerstown quay around 10 o'clock on the night of June 16. He saw the nets there and everything was then in order. At 11 o'clock on the following morning he again visited the quay and saw the smouldering remains of three draft nets, two of which were his.

Witness said the nets had been bought in 1967 and were virtually irreplaceable. He valued each of them at £207 and were virtually irreplaceable. He valued each of them at £207 at the time they were destroyed.

Mrs Mary Ann Reilly told the court that she had already in order for a replacement net for the one that had been burned and she would have to pay more money before delivery. Her claim was for £285 and this included a sum of £50 which she had to pay to hire out a net following the Villerstown incident.

Judge Fawcitt said the burnings were clearly malicious and he assessed the value of each net at £190. He awarded Mr Viliers-Stuart in all a net in respect of each net £110 in respect of a replacement net. Judge Fawcitt also intimated that any monies paid by the man convicted of the burnings would go towards offsetting the amounts of the decrees.

Mr G. Frost C.A.O. stated that the increase would cost an additional £37,000 which had not been provided for and in reply to Mr Curran he said that they would have to face a debit balance at the end of the year.

Mr Curran then remarked that it was a very unhealthy position for the Committee when they were running headlong into debt like this but it was a trend which was operating in every sector of public administration in the country. If it continued he said that they would be heading for a disastrous situation.

Mr D. Ahearn referred to the present position in regard to agriculture in the country and said that many small farmers were in a distressed state. The farmers he said were throwing the blame for their plight on the agricultural advisers who had gone around telling them to increase their cattle numbers. Those who had done so now found that they could not sell them.

Mr K. O'Ryan Chairman - What happened all the pie in the sky we were promised when we entered the Common Market?

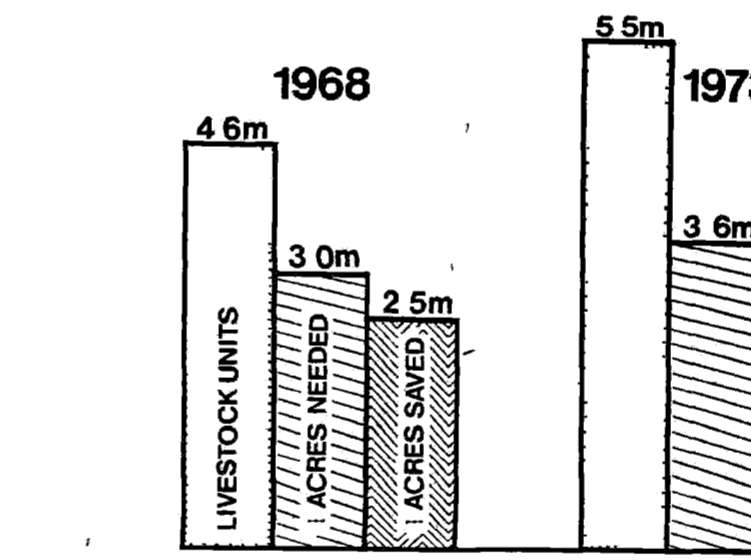
Mr P. Crotty said that from what he could see the whole concept of the EEC had broken down completely just because the Italians were allowed to break all the rules. He thought that the Minister for Agriculture and the Minister for Foreign Affairs should adopt tougher attitudes in their negotiations in Brussels. "Either we have an EEC or we don't," he said.
